Beavercreek Fire Station Open House Scheduled for April 12

The date for the open house for the new Beavercreek Fire Station has been set for Saturday, April 12, 2003, from 10:00 a.m. - 4:00 p.m. The dedication ceremony will be held at 10:00 a.m. and will include local officials and the news media.

Clackamas Fire District #1 is extending an invitation to all citizens to attend the dedication ceremony or stop by during the day and tour the station. Hot Dogs and picnic style food will be served free of charge to everyone and fire hats and balloons will be given to the children.

Tours of the facility will be given with an opportunity for questions and answers and interaction with the Beavercreek firefighters.

New Phone Number for Beavercreek Fire Station #10

I was a little confused as to why after all this time the business phone number at the Beavercreek Fire Station was going to change. Well, here is the scoop... The Editor

Four years ago Clackamas County Fire District #1 had a dilemma. Most of the districts stations were in need of telephone system upgrades and/or replacement. Some stations had phones where parts were no longer available, none of the phone systems were interconnected and costs continued to escalate for service. This often made communication difficult between stations. Further complicating the situation, the district had seven different brands of phones and received telephone service from five different providers; QWest, Beaver Creek Cooperative Telephone, Clear Creek Co-op, GTE and Clackamas County.

It was determined that the district needed a common system to better serve the citizens and that tied all the locations together for internal communications. After reviewing many different options and systems it was

determined to use Cisco's IP (Internet Protocol) based telephone system. This telephone system utilized existing line connections the district already had. This made the installation cost effective and reduced reoccurring costs. Most installation and maintenance was done by existing district personnel. Cost was not the only factor, IP phone systems are the future in telephones. Phones have been changed in the fire stations as the buildings were updated, opened or replaced over the past two years.

Most of the telephone numbers the district used were from other providers like Beavercreek Cooperative Telephone Company. The decision was to change all of the numbers for standardization. There is now one main number to the district (503) 742-2600. Calls can then be transferred to any station, person, or voicemail. Citizens may still contact their local fire station directly. The business number for the Beavercreek fire station is 503-742-2610. For emergencies Dial 9-1-1.

Clackamas County Dog Control Hosts National Tag Day and 4th Annual Amnesty Day April 5

Clackamas County will host the fourth annual Amnesty Day from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. on Saturday, April 5. The event will be held at Dog Control, 2104 Kaen Road in Oregon City and is part of a nationwide effort to get dogs licensed and vaccinated.

Licenses are required by both State and County law for dogs' six months of age or older. As part of this observance the agency will waive all administrative late fees on unpaid or past due licenses if the licenses are purchased at their normal price of \$13 for spay/neutered dogs (presentation of veterinarian's spay/neuter certificate is required) and \$25 for fertile dogs. Amnesty Day is only available to those that appear personally at the event.

For the convenience of the public, local veterinarians will be volunteering their time to

administer rabies vaccinations at the shelter for the nominal fee of \$5 per dog. Because a current rabies vaccination must be presented at the time of licensing, persons with unvaccinated dogs will be able to vaccinate and license their dog in "one-stop". Those owning dogs that are presently vaccinated should bring the veterinarian's certificate of rabies vaccination.

Dog owners living within the city limits of Lake Oswego, West Linn, and Gladstone should note that they must buy their licenses at their respective city halls. Such owners may still have their dogs vaccinated for rabies during Amnesty Day at the county shelter.

The shelter will also be open for viewing of adoptable dogs.

"Beavercreek Oregon a History Through the Looking Glass"

This is Part VIII of a series of articles on the history of the Beavercreek area. Written by Jack Watts, whose family were some of the early settlers of the community. This history is reprinted from his original manuscript that had until now never been published, by permission of Gordon Watts. We dedicate this series to a man and his love of the Beavercreek countryside who took the time to stop, look, listen and capture for all, his rememberances. The Editor.

- - The Need for Railroads (Cont.) - -



In some places the new planks made the road high and very risky. It was a common occurrence for cars and trucks to slip off the road, especially in wet or frosty weather. When this would happen, it was a task of major proportions to get the vehicle back on the road. The truck drivers filled lots of sacks with sawdust at the mills and scattered them along the banks of the road for use whenever wheels began to spin on the steeper grades. They would retrieve a sack quickly and spread the sawdust along the planks in order to gain the necessary traction to get underway again.

The Upper Highland Road had been planked but almost completely worn out. Again, the mills in the area furnished planks that were laid lengthwise over the old, two planks wide, and resembled a railroad track. In the early days the Lower Highland Road

turned east at what is now known as the South Carus Road. It meandered through the canyon and emerged where the new Lower Highland Road met the old in Schuebel.

In the mid 1920's when more and more cars and trucks were in use, Clackamas County embarked on a valiant effort to get itself out of the mud. A \$1,700,000 bond issue was proposed, resulting in a hard-fought political battle between two factions, one favoring "roads now and pay later", and others favoring a "pay as you go" plan. Eventually the bond issue was passed.

A great deal more could be said about the trials and tribulations of the Willamette Valley Southern

Railway, much of it brought about by the sudden disappearance of its President, Grant B. Dimmick, in April of 1924. All of Clackamas County and much of the state were completely stunned.

After 1936 the trains were gone and the flat log cars had the rails to themselves, and in 1939 the Willamette Valley Southern Railway faced bankruptcy. competition with trucks and cars had become too great. So the promised profits never came and most stockholders were never able to realize anything on their investments.

Traffic Signal Scheduled for This Summer

This summer is going to be a busy one for the County and a test of patience for the residents of the Beavercreek area.

The long awaited raffic signal scheduled for the intersection of Glen Oak and Hwv 213 is going to be installed this summer. Construction is scheduled to begin in a couple of months completed

summers end. This will undoubtedly cause delays on Hwy 213 and force more traffic on the few existing cross roads.

The upside will be that the signal will make it easier for vehicles to get onto Hwy 213 from Glen Oak. At this time there can be a long waiting period before it is prudent to pull out into traffic. The vehicles are supposed to be going 45 mph, but in fact they are speeding along in excess of that rate.

There is also a realignment of Glen Oak scheduled. This will straighten out the road and add a 6 ft. safety zone for pedestrians and bicycles on both sides.

While this is going on, there will also be an extension of the 16" water line down Glen Oak Rd.

These new improvements will make it safer for the students who will be attending the new high school next Fall. Hopefully it will avoid a lot of fatalities caused by young, inexperienced, impetuous drivers with no concept of their mortality who tangle with more experienced, in a hurry "me first" adults.

All in all it will be much safer for pedestrians and

bicycle riders that now have to dodge the cars along the narrow deteriorating road as well as provide another connector road between Hwy 213 and Beavercreek Rd.

I feel for the property owners along the road whose property in front of there homes will be greatly reduced in the name of progress. It is my understanding that if they don't sell their frontage to the County, the County could condemn their road frontage and take it anyway.

And... looking on the bright side (yeah right!). These delays will be nothing compared to the nightmare that will be happening at the Hwy 213/Beavercreek Rd interchange, also scheduled to begin in May and take 16 months to complete.

The first stage will be to widen Hwy 213 and the North side of Beavercreek Rd in preparation for two new turn lanes. This is expected to take about 5 months. The second phase is to widen the South side of Beavercreek Rd. The third phase will be the paving which will cause lane closures. It is hoped that the paving can be done when traffic is not as heavy.

In my humble opinion, this whole problem could have been avoided if the County had had a little more forsight and not opted for the short term fix when they spent all the money that it took to fill in Newell Creek Canyon in order to make the HWY 213/Beavercreek Rd., exchange at its present height. They could have built an overpass over Hwy 213 on Beavercreek Rd and let the Hwy 213 traffic go underneath.

Community Meeting Room Open for Business


The community meeting room that was incorporated into the design for the new Beavercreek Fire Station is open for business.

Last of Original CCC Instructors to Retire

Jane Rickenbaugh, the last of the original full-time instructors hired at Clackamas Community College in 1967, will retire March 22. She has taught speech, communication and dance at CCC for 36 years.

Rickenbaugh began teaching at the fledgling community college when it was located in modular buildings on Warner Milne Road. The college facilities at the time included administrative offices, a community center, library and four classrooms - one of which served as an office for all 23 faculty members. "Some great discussions took place in the faculty office at that time," she said.

After teaching speech and English for several years,

Rickenbaugh took a year off to pursue her master's degree at Reed College. She earned her master's in liberal studies with an emphasis on dance and choreography and returned to CCC to begin the college's dance program.

With no proper dance floor, dance classes were originally held at the Carpenter's Hall in Oregon City and in a karate studio on McLoughlin Blvd. Through Rickenbaugh's efforts. the college eventually added a small dance rehearsal room with a proper wooden floor in Randall Hall. Over the years, Rickenbaugh taught ballet, modern dance, folk dance, choreography and dance history. In addition, she choreographed and performed dance pieces throughout the metro area. Through a grant from the Oregon Committee for the Humanities, Rickenbaugh formed the "Dance of the Angels" which performed a series of medieval miracle mystery plays at Mt. Angel Seminary.

"There was so much interest and support in all the dance I did," said Rickenbaugh. "I felt my creative dance was fully embraced by the college and supported."

Rickenbaugh is also one of a handful of instructors who helped plan and teach in the college's Accelerated Degree

Clackamas County to Offer One and Two Year Dog License Options

County Dog Control Clackamas will begin implementing a one year and two year option for dog licenses effective April 1. This new multi-year program precedes an anticipated license fee increase effective July 1. Between now and the license fee increase, dog owners can take advantage of the savings available with a multi-year license. The one and two year options will be a permanent program.

All dogs over the age of 6 months or that have their canine teeth, must have a current dog license. If owners live in Clackamas County, they may purchase the license from Clackamas County Dog Control. When

purchasing or renewing a dog's license, the owner may choose to purchase either a one year license. Bragdon Names Clackamas County's Jordan as New Manager for Metro

Metro Council President David Bragdon concluded a national search by naming Clackamas County Commissioner Michael Jordan as his choice for the post of Chief Operating Officer for the regional agency. By selecting Jordan, Bragdon concludes a critical component of the voter-approved transition process that also created his own region-wide elected position.

"After reviewing almost a hundred candidates from around the country, I found the best candidate literally next door in Canby," said Bragdon. "Mike Jordan has administrative experience and understanding of the agency's challenges to help move Metro to the next level of performance."

Jordan has served on the Clackamas County Board of Commissioners since his appointment in February 1999. Jordan represented the county on the Metro Policy Advisory Committee, which advises the Metro Council on land-use issues. He chaired the group in 2002. Bragdon's appointment of Jordan must be confirmed by the Metro Council, scheduled for early April. Once approved, Jordan will take up his new duties on May 1.
