
Molalla High School Grad Party Fundraiser

Vaccinating Horses for West Nile Virus

A 2002 Census of Agriculture Inventory ranks Clackamas County 9th in the nation for horses.



Due to the warm Spring it is suggested that horse owners vaccinate their horses against West Nile Virus.

Horse owners in Oregon are once again advised to help protect against West Nile Virus by vaccinating their animals and taking steps to control mosquitoes this spring and summer. State Veterinarian Don Hansen of the Oregon Department of Agriculture says it is very likely more cases of the disease will be reported in Oregon this year, and that owners of livestock need to be prepared.

"We are reminding horse owners that vaccination against the disease provides good protection against West Nile," says Hansen. "For those who have already vaccinated their horses several months past, a booster shot now will strengthen protection. Knowing that the virus has already made its way to Oregon, it is now even more important to vaccinate animals before the mosquito season gets into high gear." The vaccine for horses is available through local veterinarians.

Oregon became one of the last states to report the presence of West Nile Virus when the disease was confirmed last year in eight counties. The final tally for 2004 showed detections of the virus in 32 horses, 23 birds, and five humans.

Insect control on individual animals remains a good preventive measure against the virus. Insect repellents applied to animals according to label directions, screened housing at night, and controlling exposure to mosquitoes at dusk and dawn can all work to limit the possibility of infection. Reduction of mosquito breeding sites is also effective in controlling the spread of the disease. Any source of stagnant water is important. Tires, wading pools, wheelbarrows, birdbaths, or wherever water can stand for more than four days is a potential breeding site. Local vector control districts can offer advice and assistance.

Infected wild birds are the source of West Nile Virus. Mosquitoes bite infected birds and then can potentially transmit the infection to horses and humans. The disease does not transmit from horse to horse or human to human. A bite by an infected mosquito is the only known route of transmission.

A low percentage of mosquitoes carry the virus and a low percentage of horses bitten by infected mosquitoes

become ill. But a horse showing signs is a serious situation. The disease causes inflammation of the brain and about one-third of affected horses die. Symptoms include stumbling, lack of coordination, weakness in the legs, depression, muscle twitching, and death.

"Beavercreek Oregon a History Through the Looking Glass"

This is Part XXXII of a series of articles on the history of the Beavercreek area. Written by Jack Watts, whose family were some of the early settlers of the community. This history is reprinted from his original manuscript that had until now never been published, by permission of Gordon Watts. We dedicate this series to a man and his love of the Beavercreek countryside who took the time to stop, look, listen and capture for all, his rememberances. The Editor.

THE A.W.S OBSERVATION POST and THE BEAVERCREEK RURAL FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT (CONT)

It is thought that the Beavercreek Rural Fire Protection District was a "spin-off", in a sense, of the Aircraft Warning Service. It came about in this way: Early in 1942,



during a critical period of the war, the Japanese started sending balloons with incendiary bombs attached and sent them with the favorable wind currents. This posed great danger for our Northwest forests and became of great concern for all.

On February 16, 1942, Mr. Dewey Mault and the writer pooled a ride into Oregon City to register in compliance with the Draft Law; during the trip this new danger was discussed. It was thought some action should be taken to protect the community especially during the hot, dry months of summer. On returning to Beavercreek we stopped to talk with Mr. Earl Heft, one of the owners of the Heft Brothers Garage. mentioned our concern and agreed that some effort should be made. The thought that haunted us was, what could we do?

In the beginning our thinking centered on obtaining a trailer and equip it with a portable pump, some hose, sand, hand tools, etc. The trailer could be hitched to a car or truck and taken to a creek for water supply and to house it at a central location where it would be quickly available when needed. Then attention was called to the fact that the Civil Defense meeting was scheduled for February 19th at the Beavercreek Grange Hall, and it was agreed that this would be the first logical step to take and the matter was presented at that meeting. There were 50 people in attendance. The Civilian Defense unit had been organized from four school districts: Henrici. Carus. Schuebel and Beavercreek. Lloyd Schram was Chairman, Luke P. Duffy was the Vice Chairman, and Mrs. Irene Steiner served as Secretary. In the meantime, arrangements

had been made for a Mr. Surface of the Oregon City Fire Department to speak on "Incendiary Bombs." A motion was made, seconded and carried instructing the Chairman to appoint a comittee to solicit funds in the four communities which would be used to purchase firefighting equipment.

The committee was composed of the following persons: Earl Heft of Henrici, Luke P. Duffy of Schuebel, G. R. Gwillim of Carus, and Willis Hughes of Beavercreek. This committee enlisted the help of others in this effort and found ready response among those contacted: and while the Civil Defense records do not show the results, it is known to have exceeded \$200.00.

At the March 5th meeting the committee reported, as well as heard several reports from individuals who were assigned to special investigations concerning the proposed project. Mr. Earl Heft reported on fire equipment, and Mr. L. P. Duffy reported on the area the district proposed to serve. Mr. J. H. Watts reported on the system of operating a fire district. Mr. William Essig, of the State Rating Bureau, reported on regulations governing Rural Fire Protection Districts. A committee was appointed at this meeting to plan the acquisition of firefighting equipment and to arrange for the necessary housing and maintenance of same. This committee was composed of the following members: J. H. Watts representing Beavercreek, R. F. Davis representing Carus, C. A. Baxter representing Henrici, L. P. Duffy representing Schuebel, and Earl Heft as member at large. Since the proposed district included the four school districts, it was thought that each district should be represented while the fifth member (at large) was to avoid the possibility of a deadlock developing.

The trailer concept was defeated because it was thought to be entirely inadequate. The plan became bolder, and all agreed that we should get the best equipment possible even though new equipment was impossible to obtain; and if available, it was beyond our financial means. So the goal was to try to form a Rural Fire Protection District which, once established, would enable the district to finance its needs. The revised plans called for using any available funds to provide the best possible equipment with the idea of fitting it into the proposed district if and when we were successful in



April 5 - Bluebirds in the Northwest

Western bluebirds are making a comeback in the Pacific Northwest. 

So Far This Session...

The most exciting thing that has happened so far in the session has been that the Senate and House majorities have agreed to some spending levels early in the session. This has never happened in my 10 year association with State government. With any luck, this should avoid a lot of the fighting and partisan warfare at the end of session.

The new "Common Cent\$" budgeting process that we have embarked on requires rough budget targets to be set for the key program areas (education, human

resources, public safety, natural resources, economic development/transportation, and general government). It also requires us to set Oregon's "price of government" given the revenues we can expect to receive from Oregonian's over the next two years.

Senate Democrats took the lead early in the session by suggesting that we could use our historical spending pattern to allocate program spending to start with and avoid early controversy. House Republicans were adamant that nothing would be discussed until the 'size of the pie' was set. The Senate deliberated and was prepared to do so when the House indicated that they wanted to explicitly outline the exact revenue sources. This is almost impossible given the different forecasts, revenue ideas, and efficiencies that come forward by the end of the six month session. This was February, not even 2 months into session.

Finally, the House asked the senior body to 'go up top' and present a total package. The Senate did so two weeks ago. It was a little risky politically since it is always easier to poke holes in a concrete plan than talk in generalities. But the Senate does have the more experienced Ways and Means budget team and we needed to break the stalemated discussions. Given the healthy March economic forecast, the Senate Leadership Plan estimated final revenues to be about \$12.5 billion for the biennium. (Oregon's biennial budget is based on forecasted revenues for the coming two year period. It is done by the non-partisan Office of Economic Analysis.)

The Senate Democratic Plan contains an accountable \$5.4 billion for our K-12 school children, tuition freezes for our university and community colleges to help improve access for all Oregonians, restoration of many of the cuts to senior services, and a dedicated funding source for the most critical services of our State Police; patrol and forensics. Republicans took issue with some of the revenue sources that the Senate presented, but their overall number for spending was only about \$200 million less than the Democrats. Since both sides had an interest in providing a critical level of service for Oregonians, a compromise was agreed to.

In just two days the Senate and House agreed to a \$12.4 billion spending level that kept the debate about



types of revenue off the table for now. The Co-Chairs budget must come out by April 4th and be built around that number. On the surface this may not seem too historic, but given the dramatic \$2 billion in cuts to education, seniors, health care and public safety over the last four years, it was monumental. It restored my faith in your state government. We were responsible and realized that we had to stop the bleeding. Given the still tough budget climate we also realized that we would not be able to restore a lot of the cuts to K-12 from the last 10 years, nor make much investment in our higher education system, nor restore taxpayers sponsored health care for poor Oregonian adults between 19 and 55, or do much more in public safety but lock people up. Being 45th in the nation in tax burden only buys you so much.

Nonetheless, we now have a blueprint for ending

this Legislative Session and conducting ourselves in hopefully a more statesman like manner. As Co-Chair of Ways and Means for the Senate, I definitely have my work cut out for myself. At least the original Senate Plan, proportionately adjusted for the \$12.4 spending level, will be a good guide. Please wish us the best and keep us in your prayers.

Beavercreek CPO Spotlight

The March meeting of the Beavercreek Community Planning Organization, aka Beavercreek CPO, was held on Wednesday, March 23, 2005, at the Beavercreek Grange on Kamrath Rd at 7:00 p.m. with 16 members and guests in attendance.

The Guest Speaker was Judy Shioshi, Community Development, with the Oregon Department of Transportation (ODOT). She was accompanied by Steven Harry, Community Affairs Manager for Region 1, Darlen Rose, Project Manager, Right of Way and Bud Roberts, Design. Ms. Shioshi gave a presentation on the proposed improvements, that are are in the initial stages, for the section of Hwy 213 between S. Conway Dr, and Henrici Rd. (approx. one-half mile).

The proposal is to widen Hwy 213 and put in center left turn lanes. There may also be sidewalks and planting areas.

The project has been funded at a cost of \$5.08 million.



This project is the result of traffic studies on the number of rear-end and side-swipe accidents in this corridor from 1998-2002 in which there were 30 crashes. These consisted of 17 injury accidents and 13 property damage only accidents.

The construction is expected to take place in the summer of 2007.

There was considerable discussion as to why there are sidewalks figured into this improvement as it is unusual for the State to pay for sidwalks with taxpayer dollars. Funding for this type of roadside improvement usually falls to the developer as the adjoining property is developed.

Plannning for sidewalks in a rural area at taxpayer expense did not set well with some of the members present.

Measure 37 was also discussed as a new item has come before the members. Is involves approximately 28 acres near Beaver Lake. It was decided to wait until a Measure 37 public informational meeting took place on March 29th. Members did not feel comfortable commenting on the proposal until they had more up to date information on how these issues are



to be addressed by the County.

The next meeting of the Beavercreek CPO will take place on Wednesday, April 27, 2005, at the same time and place.

County Commissioners to Hold Hearing

Frequent readers of the "Bulletin" will be familiar with the attemps of the Board of Clackamas River Water to protect their infrastructure, in lieu of possible impending annexations of its territory.

When their infrastructure is annexed into an adjourning entity's boundary, such as a city, the water company loses all the infrastructure to that entity without benefit of compensation. This can lead to a smaller customer base and eventually higher prices.

Not to mention the loss of assets that can have a value in the millions of dollars.

To that end, the Board of Clackamas River Water is attempting to form a Water Authority.

The Clackamas County Commissioners will be holding a hearing on the organization of the Clackamas River Water Authority on Thursday, April 7, 2005, at 10:00 a.m. in the Commissioner Hearing Room (4th floor) at the new Administration Building on Kaen Rd. (County hilltop campus just east of Beavercreek Rd.)

Highway Crossover Crash Seriously Injures Beavercreek Man

One person was seriously injured on the morning of March 24, 2005, at 11:34 a.m., after the vehicle he was driving crossed the center grass median on Interstate 205 and crashed headon into the axle of a southbound commercial truck.

A brown 1986 Ford Thunderbird two door driven by Lawrence Clinton Anderson, age 51, from Beavercreek, was northbound on Interstate 205 south of Johnson Creek Boulevard when it drove across the inside grass center median and into the southbound lanes. The Ford Thunderbird crashed into the drive axle on the left side of a Freightliner truck towing a box semi-trailer in the center southbound lane. The Ford Thunderbird came to rest on the inside southbound shoulder.



Mr. Anderson was seriously injured and was transported by ambulance to Oregon Health Sciences University. He was wearing safety restraints.

The driver of the truck, John Hitzfeld, age 38, from Portland, was not

injured. The truck was registered to Jet Delivery System. Traffic was originally narrowed to one lane due to extensive debris in the roadway. All lanes were reopened about 1:00 p.m. ODOT assisted at the scene.

The Trust is scheduled to have a public hearing before the County on its application for a conditional use permit for the park. The hearing is scheduled for around the 12th of May.


The County will determine what is required from the Trust to move forward with its grading permit as well as the initial construction on the park property.
