County Invites Citizens and Business People to Fifth Community Congress

Complete Communities Congress V: A Sustainable County for the 21St Century

All City and County residents, business owners, service providers and people who work in Clackamas County are encouraged to register for the fifth Complete Communities Congress. The Congress will be held on Saturday, May 12, from 8:30 a.m. – 2:00 p.m. at the old Oregon City High School – Jackson School Campus, 1306 12th Street, Oregon City.

"We're continuing a strong tradition of citizen involvement. Participants of the Congress will consider how to build upon the County's unique urban and rural character. Our goal is sustainable communities," said County Commission Chair Martha Schrader. "Citizen discussion will provide direction to move the County to this goal."

Discussion will focus on strategic directions in urban and rural areas on subjects such as economic development, green government, community design, transportation, cultural opportunities and land use.

At the previous four Community Congresses, hundreds of participants agreed on the direction the County should take on issues such as the environment, education, housing, growth, transportation and the economy. They also laid the groundwork for the hamlets and villages in some of the unincorporated areas flourishing today.

Young people from high schools in the County are being invited. Lunch will be provided, childcare and translation available upon request.

Tax Refund Checks Can't Find Their Way To Incorrect Incomplete Addresses

If you're expecting a tax refund check, it may not find you if the address you put on your tax return is incorrect or incomplete.

"I open hundreds of returned envelopes a week," said Joann Davenport, Office Specialist at the Oregon Department of Revenue, "and a lot of them are refund checks that didn't make it to their destinations."

The department uses the address on a taxpayer's current tax return as the taxpayer's mailing address. If a taxpayer accidentally transposes house or street numbers, or if they leave off apartment numbers, refund checks are often returned to the department.

"Another common error people make is using a street address instead of a post office box number," Davenport said.

She also reminds people to provide their tax preparers with their current address.

You don't have to wait until tax time to update your mailing address. Davenport recommends updating it with the department any time you move. Change-of-address forms are

Making A Difference Through Your Oregon Tax Refund

Communities Benefit When Taxpayers Designate Oregon State Tax Refunds to #14 Oregon Lions Sight and Hearing Foundation

Eight year old Cristina of Redmond, Oregon wasn't paying too much attention to her textbooks, or even the classroom chalkboard. She always seemed to look away.

It wasn't until the third grade when her teacher noticed that it OLSHF, the address is 1410 SW Morrison St., Suite 760, wasn't that Cristina wasn't interested. Cristina was doing her best to look out from the sides of her eyes. Only then was it discovered that Cristina had congenital cataracts since birth, unnoticeable to the human eye.

With no insurance for such an operation, Cristina's family turned to the Oregon Lions Sight & Hearing Foundation for support. With their help, Cristina had surgeries in both eyes during 2006, and is now back in her classroom, learning at the same level as her fellow classmates. This truly lifealtering surgery would not have been possible without the support from the Oregon Lions and supporters who donate their tax refunds to the Foundation.

Since 1959, the OLSHF has been supporting Oregonians in need in the areas of sight, hearing, diabetes awareness and positive youth development.

Oregonians can donate all or part of their refund to the Oregon Lions Sight & Hearing Foundation by simply entering the number "14" in the "Other" box in the Charitable Checkoff section of their tax return. Current tax forms only have room to list the original grand-fathered groups, requiring that tax payers actually enter the number "14" in the Charitable Checkoff box provided in the refund portion of their tax return. The actual line for making the donation may be different depending upon which version of the return that a tax payer is filing (40, 40S, 40N, 40P).

Tax payers can also mail their donations to the addresses listed on the Oregon State web site. In particular for the





The Stillwaters:

Uneducated trout have been added to the almost all stillwaters within the last week (as of March 27) and fishing is outstanding. Fish are a mix of 11-13" stockers and larger holdovers from previous years. Emerging midges will consitute the bulk of their diet, but they will also be seeking more substantial dragon/damselfly larva crawling about on the bottom. The chill is gone from the lakes and ponds, and we are nearing or experiencing Spring rollover. Bugs have be-

gun to emerge on the sunnier afternoons...mostly midges. Look for trout sucking them out of the film.

Beavercreek Pond closes Fri., March 30 at dark... better say your goodbyes.

Marquam Lake fished good on Sat. night with one giant old kyped up buck in the mix... stay on the gravel in the parking area as the grass is soft and mushy. Did you read the article about the New Zealand mudsnails? We are very concerned about getting those critters as we know some of you fish rivers where they've established. Wet Deschutes waders shouldn't be worn in your floattube out on the stillwaters... please be careful to take care of your gear after visiting snail dwelling waters.

The Rivers:

Winter steelhead are still present in most of our streams, but the majority are of native stock. Fishing the upper ends of the coastal rivers is most likely to produce winters for the rest of the season.

Trask #2 is reportedly a little brushy, but there should be good fishing from Rowe Creek down.

Summer steelhead are beginning to show in the Clackamas, Sandy and Santiams (when visibility allows) and a few springers are being caught as well (mostly Willamette). A summer was hooked by a member at the S Santiam site end of last week.

The South Santiam has shifted again at our property and has brought the majority of the current back to our side. There are a handful of good steelhead drifts and one good springer hole. Trail was cleared (somewhat) to both the upper and lower reaches. The fish was hooked on the upper end. Bring a net as slippery gravel faces can give way and you might end up in the river.

The Molalla looked good, too... should be a couple



steelies in the 'House Hole'.

Also worked on the Willamette river site... the slough looks like it changed again... the island seemed further away. Spring smallmouth fishing can be excellent here with 2" white 'twisty tail' grubs on 1/8 oz jigs. Fish the mouth of the slough where the current rolls through... bring a small boat to fish most effectively. Mud at the bottom of the hill kept me from venturing to close to the river... looked like a good place to get stuck.

The upper end of the Salmon River site is closed to OFC access as reported in your newsletter.

"Through the Looking Glass Beavercreek Oregon a History"

This is Part LVI of a series of articles on the history of the Beavercreek area. Written by Jack Watts, whose family were some of the early settlers of the community. This history is reprinted from his original manuscript that had until now never been published, by permission of Gordon Watts. We dedicate this series to a man and his love of the Beavercreek countryside who took the time to stop, look, listen and capture for all, his rememberances. The Editor.

--- THE BRYN SEION CHURCH (WELSH) --- CONT

The church requested the Rev. T.C. Edwards (CYONFARDD) to suggest a minister for Bryn Seion, since the pulpit was vacant at the time.

In his reply he suggested the name of the Rev. R. Mawddwy Jones of Gomer Ohio who wanted to move westward. An invitation went out to him, and he accepted and served from October of 1888 and to the end of 1892, and during this same time he served the Church at Oswego, Oregon (Lake Oswego, now) in conjunction with his Beaver Creek Pastorate. The next pastor to serve Bryn Seion was the Rev. William Powell, who remained for the years 1893-1894. It appears there was no record of a regular minister until the year 1900, when the Rev. J.M. Richards took charge, remaining until March or 1902. Again, there seems to be no minister until October of

R.H. became 1904. when the Rev. Owens congregation's pastor, a position he filled until March of 1906. Then for the following two years the congregation was without a Pastor, but in March, 1908, the Rev. John R. Griffith came from Llanfairfechan, North Wales and began his long service at Bryn Seion, first as a Lay Pastor. Ordination Services were held in the Bryn Seion church on May 30, 1912 and Rev. Griffith was officially ordained. And he has served the church faithfully and well and it was due to his persistent efforts, his broad interpretations of the gospel along with his practical application of the teachings of Jesus Christ.

In the early days of his ministry Rev. Griffith came by interurban train to Oregon City and many times walked the six miles, plus from Oregon City to Beaver Creek to conduct the worship services here, while at a later time some one from the congregation would drive to Oregon City to bring him by horse and buggy to the Church. Still later the Willamette Valley Southern railroad began operating from Oregon City to Mount Angel and this brought him within a half mile of the church.

Rev. Griffith served this church for thirty eight years, from March 1908 until his passing in 1946, his death occurred while performing a wedding ceremony.

He was a devout and dedicated minister who, during the week was a business executive with Roberts Brothers Department store in Portland.

He is said to have christened, married and buried, first, second and third generations of some of the founders of the church. He was dearly loved by his congregation and all who knew him. There were

periods when the church could not secure ministers who could speak in the Welsh tongue and English speaking ministers filled in, as did some Lay members in an emergency, but there was never a time when the church was not blessed with a number of dedicated men and women to carry on the worship of the Lord. Considering the distances most of these farmers had to travel to attend services, the attendance held up real well. The roads were a problem for those who became the proud possessors of an automobile and when none but those who had an abundance of worldly goods could afford an automobile. Many came by horse and buggy, but traveling was anything but comfortable before good roads came, and it required a strong faith and stout hearts to attend church during winter conditions.

Bryn Seion (Hill Zion) is the only Welsh church in the State of Oregon, where each Sunday services are held and pleasant memories of years gone by are revived in the

singing of the old familiar hymns, which never grow old.



North Clackamas Aquatic Park Bids Farewell to Dog Daze

Popular event for pooches takes toll on facility

North Clackamas Parks and Recreation District will no longer organize the Dog Daze of Summer at North Clackamas Aquatic Park. The event was popular with hundreds of dog owners in the region who wanted to bring their dogs - of all shapes and sizes - to the facility for an afternoon swim.

Dog Daze kicked off the annual maintenance shutdown, when pools were drained and cleaned extensively.

"The operational wear from the event has become a problem to the physical plant," said aquatic and recreation supervisor Jason Kemmerich, who has worked with the event since it began about a decade ago. "It was great while it lasted, but we can't let the Aquatic Park itself suffer in the name of one event."

Dog Daze received national attention as one of the best aquatic events for pooches in the country. The County's Health Department had worked closely with Aquatic Park staff to ensure that the pools were safe and clean before patrons again used the water.

The event also generated excessive costs to disinfect the facility properly so that it is safe for reopening. Staff said safety is a top priority, and the increasing risk of dog and human conflict or potential human contact with dog waste exceeds their comfort level in maintaining that priority.

He discussed the Metro Ag Survey and showed that the Beavercreek area is in "conflicted" status. That means that the land is under extreme pressure from development because we are considered exception land due to small lot sizes.

You might be familiar with this area as it has been in the papers recently with respect to the development on ancient landslides and the impact to the homeowners in that area. The concept plan is the planning part of the process. It is imperative that there be citizen involvement in the process as the residents have first hand knowledge of the issues at hand.

What happens here is important to Beavercreek since the rate of development and the transportation issues that will result will impact us all in many ways including opening us up to further development pressures.

All the committees gave their reports and the proposed changes to the By-laws, that were approved by the Board of County Commissioners, were read for the second time and approved by a unanimous vote of those present.

The Board of the Hamlet is still discussing the fate of the "Corner Park" with the County. The hamlet would like to

see it remain a park. Vandalism of the reader board for the community was also discussed. People were asked to keep their eyes open and try to find out who the culprits are.

The Beavercreek Road Concept Plan was discussed. You have seen the signs on the side of Beavercreek Road when entering and leaving the area. Apparently, the development is not going as it was laid out to the community. It was reported that there is going to be 120 acres of industrial land as well as 1,400 dwelling units on the property. It is planned to accommodate 5,000 jobs and in excess of 24,000 trips per day on Beavercreek Rd. We had better sprout wings if we ever expect to be able to get in and out of Beavercreek in the future.

The 39 house Measure 37 claim on the Rosebrook prop-
