## Working Smoke Alarm Alerts Occupant During Rural Home Fire

A single female occupant at a large two story residence in rural Oregon City was alerted by her working upstairs smoke alarm during the breakfast hours on Wednesday morning. The structure fire at 20209 S. Henrici Rd was dispatched by 911 operators through a helpful neighbor who used a land line to contact rescuers as cell coverage proved ineffective. Crews from Clackamas Fire District #1 responded a first alarm assignment to the address and extinguished the stubborn fire using two 3000 gallon water tenders to shuttle the much needed water to the occupancy. 

2008, requires retailers to sell only fire-safer cigarettes. Since then, retailers in violation of the law have received warnings from the OSFM and given the choice of disposing of the illegal cigarettes or have them confiscated. On March 1st the warnings will end and civil penalties will begin.

"We're still seeing retailers with non-compliant cigarettes on their shelves," says OSFM License and Permit Manager Anita Phillips. "They've had plenty of time to remove these illegal cigarettes from their shelves and dispose of them or return them to their distributor."

Governor Kulongoski signed the law in April 2007. Retailers had eight months, until December 31, 2007, to eliminate their current stock of non-fire safe cigarettes.

To reduce financial impact to distributors, the Department of Revenue is allowing tobacco tax refunds for distributors receiving returns of non-compliant cigarettes from retailers.

Fire-safer cigarettes, officially referred to as reduced ignition propensity or low ignition propensity cigarettes, are identified with the following markings near the universal product code (UPC):

The marking FSC (the most common marking)

A heavy black line above the UPC

The letters FS, RIP or LIP near the UPC

A diamond symbol or forward slash mark near the universal product code

Retailers may only sell cigarettes identified with a fire-safer marking located near the universal product code or on the cellophane wrapping on the pack or carton. Violators may be fined up to five times the retail value of the cigarettes involved or \$1,000, whichever is greater.





## Now is the Time to Review Your Flood Insurance Needs


March 17 - 21 was National Flood Safety Awareness Week, and now is a good time for Oregon homeowners,

renters and businesses to review their insurance needs before snow melt and spring rains bring the potential for flooding.

National Flood Safety Awareness Week is sponsored by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA), and is supported by state insurance departments, including the Oregon Insurance Division.

Floods can happen anytime, anywhere and without warning. The damage from a flood is not covered under a standard homeowners insurance policy.

What is flood insurance? Flood insurance is a special policy that is federally backed by the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) and is available for homeowners, renters and businesses. The standard flood insurance policy pays



for direct physical damage to insured property up to the replacement cost or actual cash value (ACV) of actual damages or the policy limit of liability, whichever is less.

Homeowners: You may purchase flood insurance covering up to \$250,000 of flood damage to your home. A standard flood policy will cover structural damage, including damage to the furnace, water heater, air conditioner, floor surfaces (carpeting and tile) and debris clean-up. The contents of the home are not covered under a standard policy, but for an additional premium, you also may purchase flood coverage for up to \$100,000 of damage to your personal property. Coverage for basements, crawlspaces and ground-level enclosures on elevated homes is limited. If your home has these spaces, be sure to ask your insurance agent about any restrictions in your coverage.

Renters: Flood is not covered under a basic renters insurance policy. Talk with your insurance agent about your flooding risks to decide if you need flood coverage for your

Business owners: A flood insurance policy coverage will cover up to \$500,000 on a non-residential building and its contents.

How much does flood insurance cost? According to the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), the average homeowners flood insurance premium is approximately \$500 a year. Premiums for flood insurance will vary depending on your risk level for a flood loss, the amount of coverage you choose, the type of coverage you need and your deductible. You can normally choose different deductibles for building property and personal property coverage. The deductibles will apply separately to building property and personal property claims. Your mortgage company can require that your deductible is no more than a certain amount.

How do I buy flood insurance? You can purchase flood insurance for your home or business regardless of whether the property is in a floodplain. Contact your insurance agent or company to find out if your community participates in the NFIP. You can also visit www.floodsmart. gov to get more information about your flood risk.

Plan ahead: Flood insurance has a waiting period... it's very important to plan ahead. A flood insurance policy normally will not go into effect until 30 days after you purchase the policy.

Additional tips: Make a home inventory; i.e., a record of your personal property, such as clothes, jewelry, furniture, computers and audio/video equipment. Photos and video of your home, as well as sales receipts and the model and serial numbers of items, will make filing a claim simpler. In addition, add insurance information to your inventory information; i.e., the name of your insurance company and agent, policy numbers and contact information.

Make sure you have bottled water, a first aid kit, flashlights, a battery-powered radio, non-perishable food items, blankets, clothing, prescription drugs, eyeglasses, personal hygiene supplies and a small amount of cash.

If you need to evacuate your home, turn off all utilities and disconnect appliances to reduce the chance of additional damage and electrical shock when utilities are restored.

would be put in either "Urban Reserves" or "Rural Reserves."

This process was brought about by Senate Bill 1011 enacted by the 2007 Legislature. This Bill establishes the rules, process and criteria for designating the Urban/Rural Reserves.

There was also a copy of the Hamlet of Mulino's request to have all its land put into the Rural Reserves. This was submitted to the Board of County Commissioners and deemed premature as that body will not make the decision.

In this process Metro, Clackamas, Multnomah and Washington Counties MUST agree on the reserves for the next 40-50 years. This decision MUST be unanimous. The final decision also has to be made by the Fall of 2009. This means that a lot needs to be done in order to meet the deadline.

The members were assured by Ms. Rogalin that there would be public input along the way.

What is an Urban Reserve?: an area outside the current Urban Growth Boundary that may be used for potential urban development in the next 40-50 years.

What is a Rural Reserve?: an area outside the current Urban Growth Boundary that cannot be used for urban development in the next 40-50 years. This means Metro will not be able to develop this land.

The purpose of reserves is to identify land needs to increase long term protection of farmland and natural areas, predictability about location of future growth, efficiencies in

services and infrastructures and region wide support for regional growth decisions.

There is a 5 mile buffer "drawn" around the current UGB. The property in this 5 mile buffer will be looked at for placement into the reserves. Beavercreek is right in the middle of the buffer. This means that yes, we are right in the middle of it again!

There is so much information to cover that it cannot be given adequate coverage in this article. For more information go to: http;//www.metro-region.org/index.cfm/go/by.web/id=26257 and read all about it. The Clackamas County site is not up at this time, but when information is available I'll put it in the paper.

We all need to get involved and have our voices heard if we plan on sustaining the lifestyle we hold dear. Elizabeth Graser-Lindsey also gave a report on the reserves.

paperwork submitted to the Hamlet was inconclusive. It was announced at the meeting that the attorney consulted in the matter has written the Hamlet and has reversed his fees and removed himself from the controversy.

In months past it was noted that some of the entries in the By-laws needed clarification due to ambiguity in the wording. The By-laws and Rules Committee submitted a report on those clarifications at the meeting. There seemed to be a disagreement on whether the report submitted was pertinent or if it moves the Hamlet in the wrong direction. Elizabeth Graser-Lindsey was unhappy about the report and suggested that the clarifications be set aside. It was noted by Chair, Bill Merchant, that the clarifications did not change the by-laws, but merely laid out the intent of the Articles so that everyone would be on the same page. This was to avoid any misunderstandings that could arise due to misinterpretations of what was written.

Joe Keicher stated that he was unhappy about the article that states that anyone who is elected to the Hamlet Board can be removed by the Board of County Commissioners if in its opinion the individual has acted improperly. Bill Merchant explained that the article in question has always been part of the by-laws.

Due to time constraints it was decided to table the Rules and Clarifications until the next meeting.

Everyone is encouraged to attend the monthly Hamlet Community meetings and the quarterly Town Hall meetings to participate and share ideas and concerns on the issues pertinent to our community. Members 18 years of age and older who live, own a business, or property within the Hamlet area may vote on Hamlet issues. ## 13,000 Unclaimed Kicker Checks Still Waiting For Their Owners

If you're waiting for a kicker check that never came, it may have been returned to the Oregon Department of Revenue because it couldn't find you.

The U.S. Postal Service returned 25,000 undeliverable kicker checks to the department. So far, 12,000 of those have been claimed by their rightful owners.

"We still have almost 13,000 unclaimed kicker checks," said Department of Revenue Financial Manager Ken Ross. "We've posted on our website the names of people whose kicker checks are waiting for them." The checks total \$2.8 million.

The Oregon Department of Revenue keeps unclaimed refunds for two years. After that, Oregon law requires that the funds be transferred to the Oregon Department of State Lands' unclaimed property program. You can get your refund after two years from the state lands department.

The department's call center is very busy right now, so taxpayers may get busy signals or be on hold for extended periods.
