Businesses Beware: Internet Scam Trying To Sell Sales Tax Certificates, Tax ID Numbers

If you're a business owner, an official-looking website selling federal employment identification numbers (FEINs) and sales tax certificates is a scam, the Oregon departments of Revenue and Justice announced.

Because Oregon doesn't have a sales tax, businesses don't need a sales tax certificate, even though the website, www.online-tax-id-number.org, says you do.

According to the website, "If you live in Oregon and you sell or ship something to someone else in Oregon, then you must collect and pay sales tax to the State of Oregon."

"The first problem with this is that Oregon doesn't have a sales tax," said Elizabeth Harchenko, Revenue department director. "Retailers don't need Oregon sales tax certificates. The second problem is that no one has to pay to register as a business with Oregon or with the IRS."

FEINs are issued by the IRS and businesses can get them free.

The Oregon Department of Justice receives thousands of calls a year about internet and e-mail scams. Most involve phishing, where scammers seek sensitive financial information from consumers.

Another common complaint is about international wire transfers, where scammers try to trick consumers into sending them money. The Department of Justice received 1,021 complaints about international wire transfer scams in 2009 with \$707,783 in reported losses.

PP&R will be issuing a total of 50 parking passes each spring season in order to support frequent boat ramp users and to alleviate traffic back up in the park and local streets associated with boater traffic. Fifty passes represents roughly half of the 'vehicle with trailer' parking spaces available in the park, leaving the remainder for other boaters on a first-come first-served basis on any given day.

The new Fishing Season Parking Passes cost \$50 each and are valid for the months of March, April and May 2010 only. They are valid for any day during those three months, during pay-to-park hours.

These parking passes are valid ONLY in designated "Trailers Only" spaces in Willamette Park. They are not valid for use at the other two lots in Willamette Park or for any street parking.

The new parking passes do not save or reserve parking spaces for boat trailers, but do allow frequent users to pay for parking ahead of time at a discounted price. However, all parking spaces are still available on a first-come, first-served.

The new Spring Fishing Season Pass was created in response to the crowded parking lot faced each spring fishing season. This will help alleviate the backup in the parking lot, as well as provide those who use the park frequently with an opportunity for savings.

Spring Season Fishing Passes can be purchased by phone at 503.823.2525 or in person at the PP&R Customer Service Center in the Portland Building lobby (1120 SW Fifth Avenue) from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. on weekdays.



Backyard Burning Season Is Here!

The backyard burning season began March 1. Residential backyard burning is restricted to the Open Burning Seasons.

These two seasons are:

March 1st - June 15th October 1st - December 15th

Prior to burning, property owners **must** call Clackamas Fire District #1's burn information number at **503-632-0211** to determine if it is a burn day and the hours in which burning is allowed.

They must follow the Fires-Out Time, meaning that piles must be smoke and flame free by the end of the prescribed burn hours.

Burn piles may be no bigger than 10' x 10' x 10'. There must be 50' minimum clearance from other combustibles or structures.

Please visit Clackamas Fire District #1's website at www.clackamasfire.com and review the rules, regulations, and best practices regarding Open Burning. This information can be found under Fire Prevention.

Here are some "Best Burning" practices to review:

- · Cover your pile and allow material time to dry
- Burn loosely stacked dry material and restack as necessary
- · Consider using a leaf blower to increase air flow
- Be courteous, as smoke should not affect others

A list of "Open Burning Alternatives" has been developed to give property owners options in ways to get rid of backyard debris without having to burn it. Local resources include the Metro Recycling Hotline at 503-234-3000 and/or the Clackamas County Office of Sustainability at 503-557-6363.

- · Reduce-Reuse-Recycle
- · Compost
- · Use chippers, shredders, and grinders to mulch
- · Curb side yard debris pickup
- · Firewood
- · Debris drop box
- · Community cleanup days

Truck Hits, Kills 3 Horses On Hwy 211 North Of Colton

On Friday March 5, 2010, a crash occurred in which three horses were struck and killed while they were on Highway 211 north of Colton. The driver involved in the incident was not injured and the horses' owner was located and helped with their removal.

On March 5, 2010, at approximately 5:30 a.m. an

unloaded 1997 Kenworth log truck driven by NORMAN C H A R L E S TERRILL SR., age 59, from Sandy, was traveling southbound on Highway 211 near milepost 22. Another motorist traveling on Bonney

Road near the Highway 211 intersection saw the horses run from Bonney Road onto Highway 211. This witness followed the horses and flashed his headlights in an attempt to alert the oncoming truck of the group of 8 horses on or next to the highway. TERRILL was unable to stop or avoid the horses, striking and killing three of them.

The other horses took off and were all later found and reclaimed by their owner, MARGE SMITH, who reportedly lives about a quarter mile from the scene.

TERRILL was not injured. He was able to drive his truck from the scene.

An investigation was conducted to determine how the horses got off the property where they were located before this incident.

ODOT personnel and equipment came to the scene and removed the deceased horses. One lane was kept open during most of the morning until the horses were removed.

\$100,000 Grant Supports Entrepreneurial Veterans

A \$100,000 grant to Clackamas Community College's Small Business Development Center (SBDC) will provide business support services to entrepreneurial veterans.

The Small Business Administration grant will support the Veterans Small Business Management (VSBM) program.

The purpose of this project is to assist Oregon's veterans and active duty military returning from combat zones who were self-employed, owner/operators prior to their deployment and need help to continue their business operations. The VSBM program will deliver more than 2,000 training hours and 900 hours of one-on-one counseling to 50 veteran business owners each year.

The lead program developer for the VSBM project is longtime CCC faculty member and Vietnam War veteran Dr. Thomas Jones. Dr. Jones is a small business management instructor and has taught at CCC for more than 20 years.

The SBDC is a member of the Oregon Small Business Development Center Network and serves new and established businesses in the Clackamas County area.

County Approves Parks Fee Increase And Alcohol Ban

The Clackamas County Board of Commissioners (BCC) has approved a fee increase for day-use County parks and a ban on alcohol in those parks. The day-use fee will rise to \$5 a day seven days a week.

Previously proposed to increase to \$8, the BCC decided to set the fee at \$5 after citizens voiced concerns about what they considered a drastic entry fee rise. Annual day-use passes in County parks will cost \$40 for one year, \$60 for two years.

Alcohol will be banned in the parks without a special permit. Permits will be available for reserved campsites and group areas, but not in day-use areas.

The extra funding will help pay for security in the parks as well as for parking meters at the gate rather than adding staffing. McIver State Park, upriver from Barton and Carver parks, and Metro Parks charge \$5 for day-use entry and have similar meters.

"We want to continue providing a safe place for our County parks patrons to play and stay," said Commissioner Bob Austin. "Barton, Carver and the other County parks draw thousands of outdoor enthusiasts, rafters and campers every summer. We can keep that a part of our safe summer traditions while keeping the Clackamas River healthy, keeping administrative costs to a minimum and trying to ensure public safety for all."

Campsites at Clackamas County parks will be \$21.

Commissioners also approved a ban on alcohol that would be in effect in County parks during the summer season without a reservation and permit. Reservations may be made for the covered and other picnic areas as well as for the campground at 503-742-4414 or at www.clackamas.us/parks/reservations.htm.

Additional fees will go toward funding additional security in the parks in an attempt to ease overcrowding there. Public use of riverfront parks such as Carver and Barton parks has increased along with criminal activity, which has led to the ban.

Volunteer and education efforts through the two-year-old ecOzone program will continue, with enhanced ranger and sheriff's patrols throughout the summer season. Anyone interested in volunteering or who has other questions may call 503-742-4353 or e-mail parks@co.clackamas.or.us.

Did You Remember To Check Smoke Alarms When Changing Your Clocks?

Smoke alarm laws in Oregon are different from most other states. Since 1999, law requires all ionization-only smoke alarms sold in the state to have a hush feature; and if an ionization-only smoke alarm is also solely battery-operated, it must also come with a 10-year lithium battery.

Although Oregon law does not require other types of alarms to have 10-year batteries, many smoke alarms are now sold with these long-life batteries. This means if a household member automatically follows the national slogan, they could be removing a perfectly good battery and replacing it at extra expense. However, some alarms with 10-year batteries are tamper proof. If you test the alarm and it doesn't work, you will need to replace the entire alarm.

Checking your alarm includes testing it to be sure the battery is working, vacuuming the alarm to get rid of dust and cobwebs, and inspecting your alarm to determine if it is ten-years-old or older. If so, you should replace the entire alarm.

"Oregonians should first test their smoke alarm battery before automatically replacing it," says Oregon State Fire Marshal Randy Simpson. "Long-life lithium batteries have

a life span of up to 10 years and if your alarm has one of these batteries, it may not need replacing every time you change your clock. However, if your smoke alarms are ten years old or older you should replace them entirely," says Simpson. "Also remember to test and vacuum your smoke alarm monthly."

Working smoke alarms provide an early warning to a fire, allowing you vital minutes to escape and in-

creasing your chances of surviving a fire. Additional safety tins:

Install smoke alarms on every level of your home and outside each sleeping area

Replace smoke alarms 10 years old or older

Hard-wired alarms (those wired directly into home electrical systems) should have battery back-ups

Never disconnect or remove batteries from smoke alarms for other uses

Make a home escape plan and practice it

Hiring An Unlicensed Tax Preparer To Do Your Taxes Can Be Risky

No matter who does your taxes - an unlicensed tax preparer, you, your brother, a seasoned tax professional - you are ultimately responsible for the accuracy of your tax returns, the Oregon Department of Revenue advises.

Marvin Rhodes, administrator of the personal income tax division, recommends checking the credentials of the person you hire to do your taxes. In Oregon, all professionals who do taxes must be licensed by the state.

"If you hire an unlicensed preparer, you take a greater risk of having your returns prepared incorrectly," Rhodes said.

Report unlicensed tax preparers to the Board of Tax Practitioners, www.oregon.gov/OTPB, or call 503-378-4034.

Rhodes also suggests reviewing your tax returns before submitting them.

"You are responsible for the information on your return."

OSP Troopers' Enforcement And Education Efforts During Second Month Of New Cell Phone Law Sees Increase In Citations Issued

Oregon State Police (OSP) troopers' enforcement of Oregon's new cell phone law banning most uses of mobile communication devices while driving a motor vehicle noted nearly twice as many citations issued during February in comparison to the number issued during January.

Updated enforcement statistics indicated OSP troopers issued drivers 72 citations and 233 warnings during February. During the new law's first month, OSP troopers issued 41 citations and 259 warnings. In total, OSP troopers have cited 113 drivers and warned 492 others since the new law went into effect January 1, 2010.

With some exceptions, it is unlawful in Oregon for a driver to use a cell phone without using a hands-free accessory while operating a motor vehicle. Violation of the cell phone

law is a primary offense, meaning that a police officer may stop a driver solely for observing the violation, and is a class D traffic violation with a minimum base fine of \$142.

A Dump Truck Hauling A Fully Loaded Flatbed Trailer Crashes Causing Extensive Damage To Bridge In Oregon City

On Monday, March 15, 2010, at 6:19 p.m. a dump truck and driver careened off from a bridge covering Abernathy Creek on S. Maple Lane Road and landed in this shallow body of water.

A Deputy Sheriff said, "The impact of the truck into the bridge was so severe, the rear view mirror of the truck was found embedded into a portion of this bridges guardrail that was ripped from the bridge upon impact."

The injured driver was pulled from the wreckage by citizens who witnessed the crash and pulled this injured driver from the cab of the truck conscious and breathing who was then airlifted to Oregon Health Sciences University Hospital in Portland.

The injured driver is identified as Steve A. Oberson, 47, of Oregon City. This involved truck is registered to Oberson Excavating Incorporated, on Holcomb Boulevard, in Oregon City.

A portion of S. Maple Lane Road, in Oregon City, between S. Fergusson Road and S. Waldo Road, was closed to all vehicle traffic while emergency crews worked to clear the roadway, extract the vehicle and trailer from the creek bed and evaluate the reliability of the damaged bridge.

Investigating Clackamas County Sheriff's Deputies report the driver declared his brakes failed while in operation of his 1987, Ford, Model TT dump truck while hauling a flatbed trailer loaded with large pieces of concrete and other miscellaneous heavy debris.

The dump truck is reported to have crashed into the guard rail of this bridge and caused extensive structural damage to the bridge. A Clackamas County bridge inspector was summoned to the scene to inspect the structural

integrity of this damaged bridge.

Major Grant Received by Local Non-Profit

The non-profit, Forests Forever Inc., is one step closer to starting construction of a classroom and natural resources building at its Hopkins Demonstration Forest near Beavercreek in Clackamas County.

The M.J. Murdock Charitable Trust of Vancouver, WA, recently made a \$50,000 match grant to the non-profit's building fund drive, according to Ken Everett, Forests Forever's Executive Director.

"The trust will match every new dollar donated up to \$50,000", Everett said. "Our goal is to raise \$25,000 by May 1, which matched by the Murdock Trust will allow us to start construction."

The construction fund drive began 2 1/2 years ago, but has been slowed by the economic recession. The estimated construction cost is \$325,000 for the 2,400 square foot, one-story wood frame building. Everett said cash donations already have exceeded \$136,000 by March 1, and \$24,000 of building materials had also been donated.

A concrete foundation, septic system and utility lines were completed last year. Forests Forever hopes a weather-tight building shell can be completed by this fall. Work on finishing the building interior's will begin when additional funds are raised.

The trust was established by the will of the late Melvin "Jack" Murdock, co-founder of Tektronix Inc. Some of its donations are for education and research causes.

Forests Forever plans to use the building to enhance natural resource learning of school classes and teachers that visit the 140-acre Hopkins Demonstration Forest. The structure will also will available for community and business meetings, and for other events. Seating capacity will be about 100.

Studded Tire Season Ends The Morning of April 1

ODOT is not planning to extend the studded tire season past 12:01 a.m. Thursday morning, April 1, 2010. Motorists should remove their studded tires by then. ODOT is working closely with the Washington State Department of Transportation, which is announcing the same decision.

ODOT encourages drivers to consider other types of traction tires or chains because studded tires cause at least \$11 million damage each year on city streets, County roads and State highways. Other types of traction tires are available. These traction tires meet Rubber Manufacturers Association standards for use in severe snow conditions and carry a special symbol on the tire sidewall showing a three-peaked mountain and snowflake. Research shows these tires provide better traction than studded tires when used on bare pavement.

Drivers with studded snow tires on their vehicles in Oregon after the deadline can be charged with a Class C traffic violation, which currently carries a minimum \$190 fine.

tion 79.08 acres into two 2-acre parcels and one 73-acre parcel per Measure 49. The Hamlet voted to recommend approval for both applications.



New Members Put Fire Board Together

The Colton Fire District Board, back from the brink of dissolution, is now back at full strength for the first time in months.

Members of the newly constituted board say they are ready to tackle the rifts that threatened the District's existence in December.

"Our position is we need to do some fact-finding," said interim Chairman Rex Rice. "We we need to sit down with everyone and get the facts. But, whatever we do will take some time."

Three of the five board members resigned under pressure in December after a series of disagreements with District volunteers. Coupled with a previous vacancy, the resignations left the board with one member, Danny Fine.

In February, the Clackamas County Commissioners appointed Rice and Ivan Maluski to the board, giving the board a quorum to legally conduct business.

On Monday, March 1, 2010, the board appointed Jim Postlewaite, 59, a food safety supervisor for the Oregon Department of Agriculture, and Don Vicars, 60, a retired Clackamas County Sheriff's Captain, to fill the remaining vacancies.

The rifts became public when the districts 22 volunteers delivered a no-confidence vote against the board and chief Gary Anderson, the districts only full-time paid fire-fighter.

After the blowup, Anderson went on medical leave, but has since returned to work. He also says he wants to resolve differences in the District. *Originally reported by Rick Bella in the Oregonian March 4, 2010.*
