## If At First They Don't Succeed... Try, Try Again!

Well, it is finally official, according to Metro Executive Mike Burton. Metro is looking to expand the Urban Growth Bounday as far south of Oregon City as the Beavercreek area. They are looking at 20,000 acres which lie east and south of Oregon City, with the exception of an area that includes part of South Leland Road. It also includes areas as far east as Redland.

The area is ripe for the picking because it is close to existing services and because it would be easier to develop in the next 5 - 10 years.

Metro is not saying whether the expansion will occur around Oregon City, but with the shortage of industrial land it seems likely that some of the land will be included.

Burton said that he is looking particularly hard at land east of Clackamas Community College and South Beavercreek Rd for possible industrial development. It includes several flat undeveloped pieces of land, the airport and golf course.

This area is also Oregon City's first choice for expanding the boundary. The Oregon City Commission wants to use the land for industrial purposes that would boost the city's tax base.

Burton said that the area near the college as well as other sites near Oregon City would be relatively easy and quick to develop. It is near sewer, water, streets and other city infascture. He views it as a place where development can occur sooner than in other possible expansion areas.

Another area looked at was South Henrici Rd as a possible industrial area, but most city officials don't support developing the area just yet.

City Commissioner Doug Neeley said the area is too close to the Beavercreek community which has adamantly opposed urbanization in the past. He also said industrial development in the area could clash with residents.

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## Clackamas County Offers Three Percent Home Repair Loans to Eligible Applicants

Clackamas County Community Development Division is accepting applications for its Home Repair Loan Program. The division offers loans for furnace replacement, roofs, paint, exterior repairs or complete repairs. Loans are available up to \$35,000 at a rate of three percent interest with deferred payment and monthly payment plans.

Eligible people are those living in Clackamas County who are buying or own the home that needs to be repaired. Property taxes must be current and the loan applicants must be living in the home. Yearly gross income guidelines are as follows: 1 person \$32,050; 2 persons \$36,600; three persons \$41,200; four persons \$45,750.

The amount of the loan depends on the repairs that need to be done and the amount of equity in the property. County housing representatives will assist

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throughout the construction process.

Clackamas County also offers Rental Rehabilitation Loans to rental property owners and first time homebuyer loans. Funding is provided by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

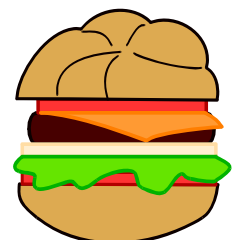

## "Beavercreek Oregon a History Through the Looking Glass"

*This is Part II of a series of articles on the history of the Beavercreek area. Written by Jack Watts, whose family were some of the early settlers of the community. This*

*history is reprinted from his original manuscript that had until now never been published, by permission of Gordon Watts! We dedicate this series to a man and his love of the Beavercreek countryside who took the time to stop, look, listen and capture for all, his remembrances! The Editor.*

### --- THE BEAVER CREEK SCHOOL ---

As we begin our journey back through time, we fine-tune our "LOOKING GLASS" to focus on the year 1854 when the neighborhood was first called by the name, "Beaver Creek." It came about when a small group of scattered country folks recognized the need for providing their children the opportunity not only to gain in stature but wisdom as well. A pertinent story follows:

A father bought a globe of the world for his little son. He set it in the boy's room where the lad might twirl it around, and in this way, perhaps, gain some

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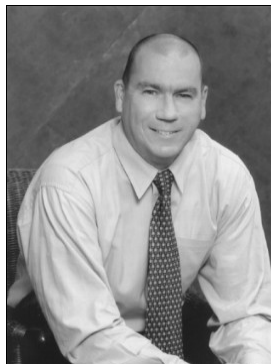

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idea of the shape of the world, its oceans, and its continents. The boy became very fond of his globe and it stood on a table in his room. Through this early acquaintance and through toying with the globe, the father hoped to broaden and expand the mind of his young son. One night the boy had gone to sleep, and the father for some reason wanted to look up the longitude of Shanghai, so he crept slowly up the stairs, tiptoed into his son's room and took the globe into his hands and was tiptoeing out the door when his creaking shoes awakened the boy. The boy sat bolt upright in bed, rubbed his eyes, and asked, "Daddy, what are you going to do with my world?"



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What we do with our world is still a real challenge. To meet their challenge, a small group of caring and concerned parents, under the leadership of Charles F. Beatie took the first steps to do what they could with their children's world by writing a very short letter to the Superintendent of Common Schools, part of which was as follows:

"We desire to have a School District with the following boundaries commencing on Range S.E., opposite the south line of the Holmes District, thence west to Range 1; thence south to the Molalla River; thence up said River to the first section line south of Thomas Mayes place, thence east to the east side of Township 4; thence north to the place of beginning."

These folks stated very simply their strong desire. Even though Oregon was not yet a State, mention was made of Clackamas County. Their petition was granted and the first directors, who were either appointed or elected, were composed of the following: Mr. William Kirk, chairman; Mr. Charles F. Beatie, secretary; and L. B. Kirk, Robert Worsham, Charles Adams, William Armpriest, F. Garret, members at large.

Roughly the established school boundaries consisted of the territory extending from Holmes Lane in Oregon City, south to the Molalla River, then east up the river to Clarkes and Highland. There are some old-timers who think it included Meadowbrook. It should be noted here

that the dates given were 1866 or 1867 and are in conflict with the year 1854, previously mentioned. We can only speculate as to what is correct. In the writer's view, both are correct, but they were speaking in the first instance about the site of the original "Log Cabin School," and in the second instance about the second site of the school on what is now Ferguson Road. The first school on Ferguson Road burned according to information given the writer by Fred Kamrath, Jr., who said he had seen partial frames of slates that were in use at that time.

It is recorded that there were 75 "scholars" living in

some time in the 1890's

the district and that of these, 43 attended school. On February 24, 1855, the financial secretary or clerk drew the sum of \$233.20

from the County treasury. Again, we find a discrepancy when it is said that Mr. W. H. Lewis became the first teacher, while an account prepared for one of the school reunions stated, "Mr. Charles F. Beatie was the first teacher." And again it is the



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writer's view that both accounts may be correct, with Mr. Lewis being the first teacher in the log cabin structure, while Mr. Beatie was the first teacher in the first school on Ferguson Road. Robert Beatie, Jr. informed the writer that the "Log Cabin School" was located on what is now South Leland Road across the road from the home of the J. H. Watts family and sat somewhat back from the road. The Beatie family at one time lived in the home the Watts now occupy; and, Bob says his father, who attended that school, pointed out to his family where the old "Log Cabin School" stood. Mr. Lewis received \$57 at the end of the term, which amounted to somewhat more than his \$40 per month salary; and it is assumed that some additional services were rendered to account for the difference, probably janitor work. The term was for approximately three months of the year. The District's cash balance always seemed to be near \$40, seldom much more or less. It may be of some interest to note that some of the text books used in the first school were Olney's Geography, Thompson's Arithmetic, Wilson's History, and Sander's Reader and Speller.

Mrs. Tirsah Daniel's writing of September 5, 1931, describes school life:

"The religious education and social life all centered

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around the 'Old School House' The children went there five days a week to learn the "three R's." Sunday School, worship services, and prayer meetings were held there, as well as socials, singing classes, spelling matches, debates, mock trials, political meetings, and general entertainments. My family loaded the old family organ onto a sled, hauling it to and from church services held at the school house.

Elections were always holidays for the children as the school was also the voting place for the community."

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### *Board of Property Tax Appeals*

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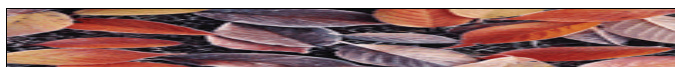

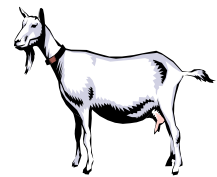

### Annual Recap:

The Beavercreek Charitable Trust has been very busy over the past year planning for the park layout. Through generous donations of time and professional expertise, the park property has been surveyed, partially cleared and an architectural design has been finalized for submission to the county, as well as a grading plan for the start of land preparation.

The year has also included rigorous studies to determine and resolve wetland issues as well as sewer and drainage plans. The Trust board fully expects the next phase to begin quickly, as early as this fall, and a fund raising campaign will be kicked off at the ground breaking.

Many individuals and companies have expressed an interest in donating to the park project and their much needed support will be the boost to get this project moving from the architect's rendition to something that is taking shape and is useful to the community.

As shown in the architects drawing of the park, when all phases are completed over several years, it will provide a children's play area, 3 baseball playing fields, 2 soccer fields, a nature path, educational area for native plant species, a horse arena, scouting area, a caretakers residence, basketball/tennis courts, and concessions/restroom facility.

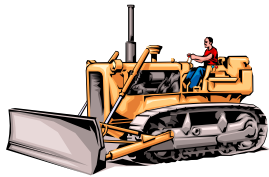

flatbed truck that belonged to his employer, "A Professional Fire Systems." Mr Silagy stated that he was driving southbound on Beavercreek Rd. at about 55 MPH. As he came over a small rise, he saw a gold car stopped in his lane. He attempted to brake and swerve to the right to avoid the car, but struck it.

The gold car then hit the red truck that was stopped in front of it before being pushed by Mr Silagy's truck into the northbound lane where the gold car was struck almost head-on by a white Tahoe, driven by Victoria Gately travelling north.

The driver of the gold car, a gold Hyundai, was Brenda Olson. She had stopped on Beavercreek Rd. and was waiting for the red Ford Ranger pickup, driven by Michael Blood, to make a left hand turn onto Wilson Ct. The impact of the crash pushed Ms. Olson's car back in the southbound lane quite a distance behind the red truck.

Last but not least, a black Ford Explorer, driven by

Marla Jones, who was driving southbound behind the flatbed truck, came upon the scene and managed to miss all the vehicles involved in the crash only to lose control of her vehicle and strike a tree.
