Another Head-On Accident When Will They Slow Down

Well... we had another head-on accident in the Beavercreek area. Some of you are aware of the wreck since Beavercreek Rd was shut down for some time in order to clear away the cars and give the authorities time to do their investigation.

This time the accident was the result of an individual who was out test driving a vehicle, a 1999 BMW 23 roadster, who was not familiar with the vehicle or Beavercreek Rd.

The accident occurred at approximately 5:23 p.m. on Wednesday, October 18, 2001.

The BMW was driven by David Hazlet, 38, of Gresham, OR. Also in the car was Karen Hazlet who was taken by ambulance to Providence Milwaukie Hospital for facial injuries. She was released on November 7, 2001. Both airbags had deployed, but the car was a total loss.

Mr Hazlet was driving the BMW northbound on Beavercreek Rd., just south of Lammer Rd., when he lost control and crossed the center line and hit the 1994 Dodge 2500 Pickup head on. He stated that he was not familiar with the power of the vehicle. That he was northbound on Beavercreek Rd when he accelerated and lost control. "The rear came loose" he said. Mr Hazlet estimated that he was going about 30 MPH

The driver of the pickup was Shawn Young, 20 of Oregon City, OR., and his passenger Scott Young, 23 of the same address. Neither of the two men were seriously injured. Mr Young stated that he was going southbound on Beavercreek Rd., at about 45 MPH when he saw the BMW loose control. He said he had no time to react or move. He estimated the BMW to be going about 60 MPH which was corroborated by his passenger.

A witness to the accident stated that she saw the BMW loose control, leave its lane and strike the pickup head-on. She stated that the pickup was moving southbound normally with the flow of traffic when the BMW accelerated and lost control. She estimated that the BMW was going greater than 65 MPH. The impact forced the pickup to the shoulder of the road and the BMW spun around at least two complete turns before it stopped. We are lucky that the injuries were not more serious and that no one



Clackamas County Reaches Agreement to Bring Jonathan Mantay On As New County Administrator

The Clackamas County Board of Commissioners has reached an agreement with Jonathan Mantay of Florida to become the next Clackamas County Administrator.

Mantay has been the County Manager of Bay County Florida since 1997 and has 15 years experience in county and city government.

Mantay will replace Steve Rhodes who has been the County Administrator since 1995. He will be paid \$110,000 per year and is expected to begin work here by mid-December.

Michael Jordan, chair of the Clackamas County Board of Commissioners, is pleased to have reached an agreement with Mantay. "We are very excited that Jon is coming to Clackamas County," Jordan said. "We are looking forward to working with him as we guide our county into the future."

State Board Approves e-Commerce Program

OREGON CITY - The future of commerce is linked to the Internet as more and more companies conduct a portion of their business electronically. Clackamas Community College will help prepare students to join the world of electronic business through a new e-Commerce program.

The State Board of Education approved the CCC e-Commerce program at its October meeting. Over the past year and a half, the Business Department at CCC in cooperation with the Art and Computer Science departments, has developed a one-year certificate and two-year degree program in e-Commerce.

Courses are being offered for the first time this fall that will lead to the certificate and degree in e-Commerce. By next fall, Department Chair Joan Ryan says she hopes to have 50 students moving through the program.

The curriculum was developed by a steering committee and an advisory committee composed of business professionals and faculty from CCC and other

schools and colleges. All courses will be taught by professionals working in the field.

"This is not just an academic view of e-Commerce," Ryan said. "The field is changing so fast, we can't be behind the curve"

Many e-Commerce curriculums currently offered have grown out of computer science or business programs. At Clackamas the program was developed through an interdisciplinary approach and includes course offerings in business, computer science and art.

Other departments within the college will soon offer courses that will complement the e-Commerce curriculum. The English Department has developed a course about writing for the Web, and the Social Science Department has developed a two-course sequence in e-Culture.

Cooperative Work Experience will offer internships in e-Commerce that will link teams of students to work on a Web site or an e-Commerce project for an area business. Plans are in progress to link high school students with the college program and to develop a

four-year coadmissions program with the Oregon Institute of Technology.

By next year, the entire program should be available online.

The job potential in e-Commerce is great. Students who earn a two-year degree can expect to start work in jobs such as Web technician, webmaster, project manager or graphics designer for about \$35,000 to \$40,000 annually. With a four-year degree, a starting salary of \$60,000 a year is typical.




Clackamas Community College December Calendar of Events


Beavercreek Charitable Trust

Beaver Creek Cooperative Telephone Company History

In last months issue I presented Part II of the Beaver Creek Cooperative Telephone Company History. Here then is part III. (The original transcript done by O.F. Dickson) The Editor

In 1957 Beavercreek Ccoperative Telephone Company relocated again to the site on Spangler Rd. A new full time lineman was hired in anticipation of the new dial system soon to be put into service.

On April 9, 1958, at 11:00 p.m., Beaver Creek Telephone cutover to a dial system. Out with the crank phones, in with the new modern dial telephone. Customers had their choice of a black desk phone or a black wall phone. There were 463 telephones in service. Most of these lines were multiple party residential lines.

The next twenty years saw many changes and additions to accomodate the fast growing community. In 1961, PT&T (Portland Telephone & Telegraph) installed direct distance dialing to Beavercreek. 1965, saw the completion of a new Central Office Building. In 1970 Wes Whelchel took the reins of the company and, by popular demand in 1971, established Extended Area Service (EAS) to Portland. Prior to this any call outside the company's boundary, other than Oregon

City, was a toll call. Also that year, the company installed an ITT Crossbar Switch and offered "Touch Tone" dialing to its members. By 1976, the year Ken Haugen became manager, membership had reached 2,000.

By 1980, "Universal Telephone Jacks," or what we now refer to as modular jacks, had been installed in 80% of the homes serviced by Beaver Creek Cooperative Telephone Company. Membership with the cooperative reached 2,627. The business office was busy, along with the plant department, redoing records to reflect the new metropolitan addresses that were introduced in 1979.

CCC Offers Condensed Work Training Programs

OREGON CITY - Oregon is leading the nation in unemployment as companies lay off workers. Clackamas Community College is working to support the state's economic recovery through offering a series of condensed training courses designed to provide workers with the skills needed to find employment.

The 11-week "WorkFirst Training" programs offered at CCC winter term will prepare people for work as an office specialist, construction specialist, production and warehouse specialist and as a computerized numerical control operator.

The classes run about 35 hours a week and include on-the-job training as well as basic skills training in areas like math and computers. The training includes one-on-one career coaching for each participant. The condensed training courses can lead to a one-year certificate or two-year associate's degree.

The "WorkFirst" trainings are funded through the federal Workforce Investment Act. In many cases,
