
The CCB has the following advice:

Be extra careful of door-to-door repair solicitations, contractors using vehicles with out-of-state license plates and "too-good-to-be-true" bids. Don't pay 100 percent of the bill before the repairs are properly completed. If you need roofs, windows, fences, or patio coverings

fers some financial protection to consumers through the business' CCB bond and insurance. Consumers should verify a contractor's CCB license at www.oregon.gov/ CCB, or 503-378-4621 before signing a home repair contract or paying any money.

The CCB is the state agency licensing more than 43,000 contractors. Anyone who is paid to repair, improve or build a home must be licensed by the CCB. Free consumer publications with helpful tips are available at the CCB's website and 503-378-4621.

"Beavercreek Oregon a History Through the Looking Glass"

This is Part LII of a series of articles on the history of the Beavercreek area. Written by Jack Watts, whose family were some of the early settlers of the community. This history is reprinted from his original manuscript that had until now never been published, by permission of Gordon Watts. We dedicate this series to a man and his love of the Beavercreek countryside who took the time to stop, look, listen and capture for all, his rememberances. The Editor

--- THE TEN O'CLOCK CHURCH ---

In 1904 the Young People's Society and the Sunday School contributed funds that were used to purchase a gasoline lantern, "and there was light". It was in 1928 that electricity was installed at both the church and the parsonage at a cost of \$152.74.

In the meantime, the church again received a new pastor. In 1905, the church learned that their former pastor, Reverend Essig, would be a guest speaker at a mission festival in Portland, and a number of people made the trip to Portland to hear him again. Among those were Miss Louise Steiner, the church organist; and at a dinner in the evening their engagement was announced, and in August of the same year they were married in the Ten O'Clock Church.

A new parsonage was built in 1912 and completed at a cost of \$862.15, leaving a balance of \$64.65. The Rev. W. F. Vogt, the then current pastor, passed away

and was laid to rest in the church cemetery. Despite continued negotiations over a period of two years to find a new pastor, the church continued its services faithfully under the direction of its deacons; when in April of 1921 the Rev. Richard Schuetze served as pastor with a salary of \$550 for the year, and was paid an additional \$9 for janitor services. A telephone was installed in the parsonage in March of 1926 for a fee of \$5 for the installation, along with a 50¢ monthly fee for the exchange charge.

In the summer of the same year, Reverend Schuetze left to accept a pastorate in Texas. Again the church experienced difficulties in finding a new pastor. During the search, a lay preacher agreed to serve. In December of 1926, Mr. Jacob Poppinga was ordained in this church by the Pacific Conference and was the first ordination held in the church. The pastor then had a two-point charge, serving both this church as well as the one at Cedar Mill in New Era.

When the Cedar Mill church decided in February of 1930 to have a full-time minister, this church decided to follow suit. In June of the same year, the Reverend Essig was called, and he accepted the call and returned from Wisconsin at a salary of \$300 from the church, a sum that was matched by the Missionary Society, plus the entire offering from that year's Harvest Mission Society to cover Doctor Essig's moving expenses. Mrs. Essig received \$12 per year for janitor services.

Eventually with the coming of the automobile, the horse carriage shed was no longer needed and was razed.

The church celebrated its 50th anniversary three years late in 1933 because they had no pastor in

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1930. When the church was 50 years old, it was deemed beyond economical repair and was too small for the congregation. They sought the ways and means to build a new church, but funds were not available due to the severe Depression of the Thirties. New hope appeared in 1936 when the church was named the beneficiary of 40 acres of land which contained some valuable timber located on the top of the hill on the south side of what is now known as South Spangler Road. Miss Helen Stuedeman had named the church in her will.

Thus the door was opened for the realization of a dream of building the new church, and the start of the planning process to achieve that goal. The Reverend

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Essig received authority from the German Conference to solicit assistance from all member churches west of the Mississippi River. It is said that Reverend Essig spent most of 1937 and 1938 in both Oregon and Washington raising funds. This effort, along with the sale of cordwood from the newly acquired property and combined with the sale of the acreage funds, began to accumulate monies.

Clackamas County Advises Planning Ahead for Care of Pets During Emergencies

Clackamas County Dog Services reminds everyone to plan for the safety of themselves and their pets during emergencies, such as floods and other disasters. The key, notes Dog Services Manager Diana Hallmark, is to "plan ahead, just as you do for your other family members."

Before a Disaster:

Keep pet supplies in your home disaster kit – food, medications, medical records, leashes, pet carrier (large enough for the pet to stand and move around), kitty litter, water and pet bowls. Consider also newspapers, paper towels, plastic bags, grooming tools and household bleach.

Make sure your pet is wearing identification. Include the phone number of a friend or relative outside your immediate area. Microchipping is recommended for cats and dogs.

Have current pet photos and descriptions with you in case they become separated from you.

Find a safe place for you and your pets ahead of time. Check for hotels and motels that accept animals, and ask friends and family you might stay with if they could accommodate your pets, too, in case of an emergency.

As Disaster Nears:

Call to confirm any emergency shelter arrangements for you and your pets.

If you are forced to evacuate your home and you have made advance arrangements, take your pets with you! Remember, most emergency shelters do not permit pets other than service animals.

If you don't evacuate, be sure you have identified a safe place for your family and your pets in your home where you can all stay together.

After a Disaster:

Don't let pets roam loose if there has been damage they may be disoriented and get lost.

If there is damage inside your home, keep dogs on a leash and cats in a carrier for a couple of days until you're sure everything is safe.

If you and your pets have weathered a disaster together, remember to be patient with them as they recover from the stress and try to get back to their routines.

Property Owners May Need Approval for High Water, **Erosion Control Along Streams** and Rivers

In response to flooding from recent heavy rains, Oregonians may attempt to control stream bank erosion

In general, any new riprap, gravel-bar removal or moving a stream channel will require an emergency authorization from the Oregon Department of State Lands (DSL). Approval is not needed to repair existing riprap or dikes, or to reconstruct roads damaged by high water.

To obtain an expedited permit or for more information, Oregon property owners should call DSL during regular work hours at 503-378-3805 (Salem). During non-business hours, and on holidays, call Oregon Emergency Response at 1-800-452-0311.

Oregon's Removal-Fill Law requires people who will remove or fill 50 cubic yards or more of material in waters of the state to obtain a permit from DSL. "Waters of the state" include streams, lakes, wetlands and other bodies of water. The law applies to both privately and publicly owned land. The movement of any amount of material in streams designated as essential salmon habitat or in a state scenic waterway may require a permit.

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

Clackamas County Declares State of Emergency Nov 7

On Tuesday, November 7, Clackamas County declared a State of Emergency. Extremely heavy precipitation had caused widespread flooding in low-lying areas along rivers and streams throughout Clackamas County. Rising water levels and landslides had put citizens at-risk, and had required evacuation of numerous homes in locations such as Canby, Shady Dell, and Hoodland.

"Our first concern is for the safety of our citizens," said Commission Chair Bill Kennemer.

"We urge everyone to monitor weather reports and the County webpage for updates. Second, we encourage folks to check on neighbors who may have special needs. This is one of those times where it's important to come together as a community," added Commissioner Kennemer.

While local resources were sufficient to meet demand, there was a potential need for outside assistance if weather conditions continued or worsened.

Drivers and residents were asked to be extra cautious during commutes, particularly in late afternoon and evening hours. Many rivers were expected to crest that evening and debris and standing water would be difficult to see in the dark.

Clackamas County Vector Control District Reports on this Year's Mosquito Season

The past several months have been a very busy time for Clackamas County's Vector Control District. Supported by local option levy passed by county voters in 2004, the District has quickly moved to expand its services to residents in the area. Our mission is mosquito control and minimizing the potential impacts from West Nile Virus and its spread into the Clackamas County area.

West Nile Virus is a potentially serious illness spread by mosquitoes. Mosquitoes become infected when they feed on infected birds. Infected mosquitoes can spread West Nile Virus to humans and other animals when they bite

By the end of the summer, dead birds testing positive for West Nile Virus were identified by counties adjacent to Clackamas County, but all dead birds identified and tested in Clackamas County were negative for the disease.

We had a successful mosquito surveillance season with no West Nile Virus reported in Clackamas County. We realize that West Nile Virus is spreading westward across the United States, but we are monitoring closely and have plans in place to protect our citizens if it arrives. West Nile Virus was confirmed in 22 counties in Oregon, with 70 human and 34 equine infections confirmed. Most of the cases have been found in eastern Oregon.

The District's current five-year operating levy provides expanded field surveying of mosquito breeding areas in the County. Many of these sites were located this past spring and summer in the most populated portions of the region. The District monitored 4,384 larval and adult habitat sites in the County. More than 2,950 adult mosquito samples were tested for West Nile Virus.

With more inspection crews employed this past summer, the Clackamas County Vector Control District sampled and controlled 60,192 immature mosquito larvae, which resulted in a 52 percent reduction in the use of pesticides for mosquito control countywide

With all of the rain now upon us, it is important to remember to keep all containers around your property properly drained to discourage mosquito growth in the spring. 

Injury Hit & Run Hwy 213

A Molalla-area woman was injured on Friday afternoon, November 10, 2006, when she was struck while trying to walk across Highway 213 about three miles north of Molalla. The vehicle that struck her left the scene without stopping and Oregon State Police are seeking information to identify the driver and vehicle involved.

On November 10, 2006, at approximately 5:00 p.m., SARA BUSS, age 24, had left her mother's house located in the 2900 block of South Highway 213 to walk across the highway to her home. BUSS reportedly stopped on the east side of the highway and checked for approaching traffic in both directions before attempting to cross to the west side. At the time, it was raining and conditions were getting dark.

According to BUSS, she did not see any approaching vehicles nearby so she stepped into the northbound lane and was struck in the left side by an unknown vehicle that failed to stop and continued northbound. BUSS was knocked down by the impact and crawled to the side of the highway.

BUSS was transported by ambulance to Silverton Hospital where she was treated for non-life threatening injuries included a broken foot and facial injuries. She has been released from the hospital.

Oregon State Police out of the Portland Area Command office are continuing the investigation. At this time there is no specific description of the vehicle other than it may be missing the right side mirror. A family member has located a black plastic rectangular side mirror possibly connected to this case near where the incident happened.

Jim Willis, Director of the Oregon Department of Veterans' Affairs and Oregon's Adjutant General, Major General Fred Rees, also spoke.

Planning and fundraising efforts to establish a memorial to honor all Oregon service members who have been lost in Iraq and Afghanistan has been supported

by Oregonians from around the state.

Groundbreaking for the Memorial occurred on June 14, 2005. Crews of volunteers began erecting the Memorial on September 11, 2006. Volunteers worked nearly around the clock, seven days a week to complete the Memorial by the dedication date.

"The Memorial will be a place of healing and reflection for all visitors, especially for families, who have lost loved ones in Afghanistan and Iraq," Willis said. "It will also be a lasting tribute to the honor and sacrifice made by these brave service members while defending this nation."

A flyover by an Oregon Army National Guard UH-60 Blackhawk helicopter occurred during the dedication ceremony at approximately 2:50 p.m. The Oregon Veterans' Building is located at 700 Summer Street, N.E. in Salem.
