Did You Notice The Change?

We all become creatures of habit. After a while, you don't notice subtle changes because your brain sees what it expects to see because it has seen it so any times before. Case in point, the new speed zone in front of Oregon City High School.

Have you noticed that the speed North of the school between the school and the college is now 40MPH not 45MPH? Have you noticed that the school's 20MPH speed zone has been shortened so that it does not go way beyond the school in the southerly direction? The post has been moved closer to the school.

When Dee Church went to the high school to try to find out when the new speed signs were posted, the people in the office said that the speed zone had not changed since the school was built. He told them that indeed they had changed. He asked if he could talk to the Oregon City Police officer whose car was parked out in front. When he asked the officer when the signs changed he had not noticed the speed zone change either. So you see, we need to keep our eyes open! Hopefully, these changes will help a little on the bumper to bumper traffic on South Beavercreek Road during rush hour and when school lets out.

The Hamlet had requested making the speed 35MPH from Berry Hill to just South of the school. It was hoped to alleviate the congestion a bit for those of us who live in Beavercreek and need to use Beavercreek Road to get in and out of the Hamlet. Dee Church, a member of the Hamlet, worked on trying to get the speed zone in front of the school changed for over a year. He became very frustrated with the whole process. Because there were so many entities involved, ie. The City of Oregon City, the County, the Oregon Department of Transportation and the school board.

Letters from the Hamlet board were written, but the wheels of progress turn very slowly, sometimes not at all. The outcome is not what we would have liked to see, but it is a step in the right direction. Two Local Schools Prepare To Start Student Book Exchanges

Schools seeking donations of new and gently used children's books

Molalla Elementary School and Clarkes Elementary School will both launch book exchanges for students this school year, allowing children to select books to take home and read, keeping their favorites and trading back others for new books.

MES second grade teacher Susan Lucht and CES fourth and fifth grade teacher Noelle Veveiros have been working on their reading endorsements at Lewis & Clark College to become reading specialists and heard about the idea for a book exchange during their coursework.

Lucht said reading experts have found that the more students read, the more their love for reading grows — along with their reading skills.

"So many children think that reading is just sounding out a lot of words on a page," Lucht said. "They should enjoy and understand what they read."

As a reading enthusiast herself, Lucht hopes to pass that passion on to her students.

"If they don't have that, then it's always going to be a horrible chore for them and that's not fair because reading is this life-long endeavor," she said.

The school already offers a Reading is Fundamental program, providing students with three free books each



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

year, but Lucht said the book exchange will give students a chance to trade around books until they find ones they particularly enjoy. Each classroom will get a chance to visit the book exchange throughout the year to swap books.

The program is not intended to replace or devalue the library, Lucht said, but rather to inspire students to build bonds with favorite books.

"We have a great library at our school and in Molalla we have a terrific public library, but this is a little more intimate than that," Lucht said. "The kids get to keep it."

Veveiros said researchers have found that children who have easy access to books at home tend to enjoy reading more than their peers who own fewer books.

"Our goal is to get books on bookshelves and nightstands

at home where they feel like, 'this is my book,'" Veveiros

Lucht hopes to launch the MES "Love of Reading Book Exchange" the week of Valentine's Day in 2011 and has set a goal of collecting 2,000 books before the exchange

At Clarkes, Veveiros has teamed up with her fellow teachers to get the book exchange off the ground and they hope to also partner with their parent group. She plans to start the Clarkes exchange this December, if she can acquire enough books.

The schools are looking for donations of a wide range of new or gently used children's books — from picture books and easy readers to nonfiction and chapter books up to the pre-teen level.

They're also looking for plastic baskets or small bins for organizing the books by genre and grade level.

Cash donations are also accepted, as the teachers can purchase children's books at a reduced rate from Scholas-

Book donations may be dropped off at the front office of either school during regular school hours. Anonymous donations are accepted, but Lucht said she would appreciate it if donors left their name and address so she can acknowledge their gift. Clackamas Community College has begun a discussion of an effort to update and modernize facilities and equipment to better serve its students. A resolution of intent for a bond measure proposal to voters was presented at the Nov. 10 Board of Education meeting by Courtney Wilton, Vice President of College Services. Clackamas Community College understands that in tough economic times, many families count more than ever on community colleges.

The college's facilities and equipment are limited, out of date, over-crowded and worn. As a result, students are not

receiving the very best the college can offer. CCC will address workforce training and education needs, outdated equipment and technology, plus health and safety issues relating to maintenance and aging facilities in order to prepare its growing student body to be competitive in the 21st Century.

"We have students who are training for jobs and transfer degrees. We need to give them the education and training they need to succeed now. This requires approval of a bond measure to help us make critical infrastructure investments at CCC," said Chuck Clemans, CCC Board of Education.

The recommendation presented to the Board of Education on Nov. 10 reads:

"We direct the College President to undertake reasonable discussion and planning measures to prepare the District to submit, at the May 2011 Election, a measure asking voters within the District for authorization to issue general obligation bonds for the purpose of updating, modernizing, expanding and maintaining college learning facilities, and to refinance debt for cost-saving purposes."

Oregon Lions Sight & Hearing Foundation Provides Vulnerable Oregonians With Critical Diabetes Screenings

Did You Remember to Test Your Smoke Alarms When Changing Your Clocks?

Oregon State Fire Marshal Randy Simpson urged residents to test their smoke alarms when changing their clocks to standard time Sunday, November 7th. Many Oregonians have smoke alarms with 10-year batteries so the old slogan, 'Change your clock, Change your battery' may not be correct for all households.

Smoke alarm laws in Oregon are different from most other states. Since 1999, law requires ionization-only smoke alarms sold in the state to have a hush feature; and if an ionization-only smoke alarm is also solely battery-operated, it must also come with a 10-year battery.

Although Oregon law does not require other types of alarms to have 10-year batteries, many other types of



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smoke alarms are now sold with a 10-year battery. This means if household members automatically follow the national slogan, they could be removing a good battery and replacing it at extra expense. However, some alarms with 10-year batteries are tamper proof. If you test the alarm and it doesn't work, you need to replace the entire alarm.

Maintaining your alarm includes testing it to be sure the battery is working, vacuuming it to get rid of dust and cobwebs, and inspecting the alarm to determine if it is 10 years old or older. If so, you should replace the entire alarm.

If you do need to replace your battery, follow the manufacturer's instructions to be sure you replace it with the correct type."

From 2005 through 2009 in Oregon, 39% of residential fires had no smoke alarm present or the smoke alarm did not operate. These fires resulted in 46 fatalities, 283 injuries, and more than \$105 million in property loss.

Working smoke alarms provide an early warning to a fire, allowing you vital minutes to escape, and increase your chances of surviving a fire.

Additional safety tips:

Install smoke alarms on every level of your home, inside each sleeping area and outside each sleeping area.

Hard-wired alarms (those connected directly to home electrical systems) should have battery back-ups.

Never disconnect or remove batteries from smoke alarms for other uses.

Make a home escape plan and practice it

Clackamas County Sheriff's Office Mourns Passing Of K-9 "MIK"

The Clackamas County Sheriff's Office is saddened to report the passing of one of its K-9 deputies -- a marvelous K-9 who fought crime on both the street and the printed page.

Mik (pronounced "Mick") -- a Belgian Malanois born in April 2003, and the partner of Clackamas County Sheriff's Office Deputy Don Boone -- passed away Tuesday, Nov. 2 from complications caused by a case of bloat.

Bloat is a serious medical condition in which the stomach twists on itself, shutting off blood flow and causing severe swelling.

Mik had developed symptoms on Monday, Nov. 1st and



was rushed to an animal hospital where he underwent emergency surgery. Unfortunately, he was unable to recover from his injuries.

"Anyone who has ever had a pet can empathize with the loss of such a close friend," wrote Deputy Paul Coleman in a message sent to Sheriff's Office personnel yesterday. "I know Mik will be missed by many more than just his handler. Don and Mik had worked very hard together to become the highly tuned and produc-

tive team that they were. Together, they were responsible for finding many bad guys who would have otherwise gotten away -- and in the process, they made things safer for not only the community, but for us deputies as well."

"I suspect Mik is in doggy heaven now -- catching bad guys to his heart's content."

Mik was raised as a sporting dog in Holland and was chosen and purchased by the Clackamas County Sheriff's Office in November 2006. He went through a 240-hour K-9

training course in the winter of 2007.

Mik's job was to ride in Deputy Boone's patrol car. When a suspect tried to escape or hide from the police, Mik was summoned and used to sniff out the bad guy. On his days off, Mik liked to lie in the backyard, play with his favorite toy and savored all the affection provided from Deputy Boone's kids. Mik was very playful and loved attention.

Late in life, Mik was also enjoying an unusual second career as a comic-book character -- in a series of crime-prevention comics and activity books published in print and online by the Clackamas County Sheriff's Office. reference throughout the selection process.

The board launched a plan last Friday to recruit candidates for the position, with a goal of having a new state forester onboard early next year.

The recruitment process includes the online survey to collect public input, as well as stakeholder and Oregon Department of Forestry employee forums with the finalists, and an opportunity for incoming Gov. Kitzhaber or his representative to meet with the finalists.

Nancy Hirsch, chief of ODF's State Forests Division, has been designated to serve as acting State Forester until the position is filled.

Oregon's State Forester carries out the Board's overarching policies through leadership of the Oregon Department of Forestry (ODF). The State Forester serves as director of the department, which provides services including preventing and fighting wildfires, managing state-owned forests, enforcing natural resource protection laws on private forestlands, advising landowners, and providing urban forestry assistance.

The agency has 647 employees and a two-year budget of \$303 million.

The state forester also assists and represents the board and department in identifying and resolving policy issues and in working with interest groups, the state legislature, and others.

State Library's Talking Book And Braille Services Honors Our Veterans With The Gift of Reading

One year ago veterans across the country were the first to receive the new digital talking book players from their regional libraries for the blind and print disabled. Federal law requires that veterans be the top priority recipients of talking book library services delivered by most state libraries in partnership with the National Library Service for the Blind and Physically Handicapped at the Library of Congress.

Oregon was no exception. Beginning last September veterans received the first digital talking book players and digital talking books from the Oregon State Library, Talking Book and Braille Services. The new players and audiobooks replaced outdated cassette players and cassette talking

books that have been used since the 1970s. One year later, 617 Oregon veterans are enjoying the new digital talking books.

Digital talking books offer many advantages over cassette talking books. The new players have much better sound and are lighter. The books come on one easy-to-load flash memory cartridge, instead of on multiple cassettes that had to be turned over and rewound. There is even an option to download books from the State Library's website, rather than having to wait for them to arrive by mail.

Dale Varner of Salem is a WWII veteran who can't say enough good things about his new digital talking book player. His daughter has begun to help him download his own books. His reading interests include science fiction, westerns and historical fiction. An avid reader, Dale has read 1,600 talking books since 1989.

There are probably more veterans like Dale who qualify for talking books but have yet to sign up. The State Library currently provides talking books and Braille books to about 5,000 Oregonians, but estimates that about ten times that number would qualify for the free library service because of blindness, low vision, or other disabilities that prevent people from using conventional library books.

Oregon Department Of Geology And Mineral Industries Showcases New Ways To Visualize The Effects Of Floods And Landslides To Oregon Cities

On October 31, 2010, the Oregon Department of Geology and Mineral Industries Chief Scientist, Ian P. Madin, lead an internationally attended Pardee Keynote Symposium on amazing new advances in mapping the earth's surface using imagery generated using a laser based terrain mapping program called LiDAR (light detection and ranging), at the Geological Society of America annual conference, at the Colorado Convention Center in Denver, CO.

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Pardee Keynote Symposia are special, interdisciplinary events representing the leading edge of a scientific discipline or area of public policy.

"Seeing the True Shape of Earth's Surface: Applications of Airborne and Terrestrial LiDAR in the Geosciences" featured some of the cutting edge land surface imagery that Mr. Madin and the staff at DOGAMI are developing for Oregon including new ways to visualize the effects of floods and landslides to Oregon cities.

Madin and scientists from around the world explored the breadth of applications for high resolution LiDAR imaging of the land, water and vegetation. New data processing techniques are putting incredibly detailed models and images of the surface of Earth into the hands of geoscientists around the world.

This session explored the application of airborne and terrestrial LiDAR to topics including paleoseismology, neotectonics, salt marsh ecology, lava flow morphology, post-fire slope processes, engineering geology, rockfalls and debris flows, geologic mapping, forestry, coastal processes and stream channels. The session also encouraged participants to think of new ways to apply this exciting technology to their own areas of study.

Oregon to Reopen Residential Loan Program

After a program suspension of nearly two years, Oregon Housing and Community Services (OHCS) will again offer its Residential Loan Program.

OHCS helps low and moderate-income families in Oregon buy their first home by providing below-market rate financing and cash assistance through its Residential Loan Program. The program's below-market rate helps eligible families increase their home purchasing power and lowers their monthly house payments.

Eligible borrowers will have two options to choose be-

tween CashAdvantage Home Loan or RateAdvantage Home Loan.

With CashAdvantage, borrowers will receive 3 percent of the loan amount as a cash grant to use for down payment or closing costs, plus a home loan at a 4.25 percent interest rate.

Under RateAdvantage, borrowers do not receive any cash, but instead get a loan at the state's best rate of 3.875 percent. The low fixed rate maximizes borrowers' buying power.

"We're very happy to be able once again to help low and moderate income families achieve the dream of homeownership," said OHCS Director Victor Merced. "These competitive rates and programs, along with lower home prices, will make homeownership an affordable option for people who may have thought renting was their only choice."

Through the issuance of tax-exempt revenue bonds, the state will generate approximately \$55 million to invest in this program. These revenue bonds are secured by the mortgage loans purchased from the bond proceeds. These bonds are not issued under the general obligation of the State of Oregon, which would rely on the state General Fund as security.

vidual health insurance policy or change a child's coverage can do so from now through Dec. 31. Children can no longer be turned down for health reasons.

Employer-based plans are already prohibited from denying coverage to children and adults based on health. Federal health reform extends this right to children who do not receive insurance through a parent's job and seek an individual policy directly from an insurance company.

However, insurers may limit enrollment to certain times of year so that parents do not wait until a child becomes sick to buy coverage, raising the costs of insurance for everyone.

"While children will be able to get an individual policy regardless of their health, parents need to be aware of new timelines," said Teresa Miller, administrator of the Insurance Division of the Oregon Department of Consumer and Business Services.

The Department of Consumer and Business Services set an initial enrollment period from Nov. 1 through the end of 2010. After that, children may be enrolled in the months of February and August, starting with February 2011. These enrollment periods apply to all children seeking an individual



policy, not just those with pre-existing conditions.

Coverage starts Jan. 1, 2011 for children enrolled during the Nov. 1 - Dec. 31 period.

While two Oregon insurers have said they will no longer offer child-only policies, this type of policy remains available through other insurance companies. Children who are already enrolled in a child-only policy will not lose coverage.

Also, all of Oregon's largest health insurers continue to offer family plans in the individual market and will add children under 19 to these policies during open enrollment periods.

Options outside enrollment periods:

Insurers must accept children under age 19 who meet certain qualifications throughout the year. These include birth or adoption, exceeding a policy's lifetime limit on benefits, or loss of other coverage due to separation, divorce, death, or end-of-dependent status.

Insurers may choose to offer coverage to children outside open enrollment periods as long as they do not deny coverage to children with pre-existing conditions. Please check with each company to see if this option is available.

Families may be able to obtain coverage for their children through Oregon Healthy Kids or the state's highrisk pools for people who cannot get coverage elsewhere. Call Healthy Kids at 1-877-314-5678. Learn more about the high-risk pools at 1-800-848-7280.

People with questions about these new enrollment periods may call Oregon insurance consumer advocates at 1-888-877-4894 or, in Salem, 503-947-7984.

In January 2014, insurers must also accept adults regardless of health and most people must purchase health insurance.



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Oregon's Scenic Bikeway Program Rolls Into Second Year

The Oregon Scenic Bikeways Committee is asking local proponents to launch the process of nominating their favorite bicycle rides for state scenic bikeway consideration in 2011—a process that includes planning how to manage and market the routes.

The Oregon Parks and Recreation Department (OPRD) will accept nominations starting Jan.1 through March 1, 2011 for routes with outstanding scenic, historic and natural places throughout Oregon. The Oregon Scenic Bikeways handbook details the role of local supporters and contains the application form online at www.oregonscenicbikeways. org.

"Bikeway proponents serve as grassroots liaisons for organizing support of the nominations, both from public road managers and local groups willing to help maintain the routes," said OPRD's state bicycle coordinator, Alexandra Phillips. "We're alerting proponents that the nomination period is nearing to allow them plenty of time to complete the process."

The applications will be considered by the Oregon Scenic Bikeway Committee, an advisory group that will recommend scenic bikeway designations to the OPRD director. The Oregon Parks and Recreation Commission must give

final approvals.

The bikeway committee recommended its first eight routes for state scenic bikeway recognition last September. Those routes include nearly 800 miles of the 1,500 miles proposed. Local proponents and OPRD are now working on management plans for the bikeways, with launch dates expected in about nine months.

"The committee will again be looking for proposed routes that offer the best rides in the State," said Phillips. "These are routes that showcase beautiful scenic views, interesting architecture and picturesque agricultural land-scapes."

The scenic bikeway program is a partnership between Cycle Oregon, Travel Oregon, the Oregon Department of Transportation and OPRD. The Willamette Valley Scenic Bikeway, which was developed as a 2005 pilot project by the partnership, serves as a prototype.
