

Clackamas Fire District #1 Board Of Directors Names Next Fire Chief

Monday, October 17th, 2011, was a historical day for Clackamas Fire District #1. After an internal resume review and interview process, the Board of Directors announced the name of the next Fire Chief to replace retiring Fire Chief Ed Kirchhofer. It was an internal process which was open to Deputy Chiefs and Battalion Chiefs. The three applicants were Deputy Chief Jim Syring, currently assigned as the Administrative Services Chief, Deputy Chief Scott Weninger, currently assigned as the Support Services Chief and Deputy Chief Fred Charlton, currently assigned as the Emergency Services Chief. Out of those very qualified candidates, the Board of Directors chose Fred Charlton as the next Fire Chief to lead the organization.

Chief Charlton began his fire service as a volunteer with the Forest Grove Fire Department in 1989. In 1994 he was hired as a paid firefighter for the City of Milwaukie. In 1997, the Milwaukie Fire Department merged with Clackamas Fire District #1.

Chief Charlton was promoted to the positions of Lieutenant in 2001 and Captain in 2003. In 2007, he was promoted to Battalion Chief and supervised numerous programs including the Urban Search and Rescue Team (USAR). Chief Charlton currently supervises the Emergency Services Division which includes Fire Operations, Technical Rescue, Training, Emergency Management, and Safetv.

Chief Charlton holds an Associate's Degree in Fire Science Technology from Portland Community College, a Bachelors Degree from Eastern Oregon University in Fire Administration, and a Masters Degree in Public Administration through Portland State University.

Chief Charlton will not officially take over as Fire Chief until July 1, 2012. He will work side by side for the next eight months with current Fire Chief Ed Kirchhofer to assure a smooth and seamless transition. Also, during the next eight months Chief Charlton will be involved in several mentoring opportunities with other leaders and CEO's of large organizations to gain further insight as to emerging issues, challenges, and opportunities facing today's leaders.

Board Director Marilyn Wall, along with the other directors, noted during the announcement just how important and hard it was to have to choose one applicant to lead the fire district into the future. Director Wall stated that "this was the most difficult decision I have had to make,

Stevens Crawford House To Hold Annual Holiday Open House

Oregon Veterans' Home Loan Rate Is Lowered To 3.65%

The Oregon Department of Veterans' Affairs (ODVA) has again lowered their 30-year term fixed home mortgage rate, this time to 3.65 percent for qualified veteran home buyers.

The new rate takes effect on Nov. 11.

The ORVET Home Loan Program offers one of the lowest home loan interest rates available for 30-year and 15-year term loans. The APR on a 30-year fixed rate loan is 3.714 percent while a 15-year fixed rate loan has an APR of 3.765 percent.

The ORVET Home Loan is an Oregon veteran benefit and is separate from the federal VA home loan guaranty program. Veterans may still be eligible for an ORVET home loan even if they have previously purchased a home using the federal VA program.

"The ODVA wants to make it possible for even more veterans to take advantage of an outstanding opportunity to own a home," said Jim Willis, Director of the Oregon Department of Veterans' Affairs. "They gave their very best while serving America so, our veterans and their families always deserve the best we can offer them."

The ORVET Home Loan is a lifetime benefit for eligible veterans after Oregon voters approved ballot Measure 70 last year. The measure expanded veteran eligibility for the ORVET Home Loan and eliminated the previous constitutional 30-year eligibility restriction.

ORVET's current maximum loan amount is \$417,000 for a single family, owner occupied residence.

FDA Approves First Artificial Aortic Heart Valve Placed Without Open-Heart Surgery

OHSU has a list of patients who've been waiting for this new device. They are either too sick or too frail for openheart surgery.

OHSU's Albert Starr, M.D., who co-invented and implanted the world's first successful artificial heart valve and works closely with the manufacturer, Edwards Lifesciences, was available to discuss the significance of the FDA approval.

The new valve, called the Sapien Transcatheter Heart Valve, is used to treat senile aortic valve stenosis, an age-related disease caused by calcium deposits on the aortic valve that cause the valve to narrow, which can

Propane Explosion Sends Elderly Man to Hospital and Kills 200 Quail

At 1:35 p.m. on the afternoon of November 14, 2011, Clackamas Fire crews were dispatched to a possible barn fire. What was actually found was a propane heater that had exploded burning an 80 year old man and nearly catching his barn on fire.

The event took place at 23595 S. Beavercreek Rd., just south of Beavercreek.

An elderly male was trying to light a propane heater inside a barn to keep his birds warm when the explosion happened. He had turned on the gas to the heater and apparently too much time had passed until he was able to get a flame lit. Then, when he was able to get a flame, the gas that was in the air flashed knocking him to the ground, burning his head and hands. This explosion was so intense it blew out a wall of the barn and killed over 200 Bob White quails.

Clackamas Fire crews were assisted by a Fire Captain from Colton Fire who happened to be in the area and several

deputies from the Clackamas Sheriffs Office. Lifeflight was called to the scene and landed in a field next to the barn.

The patient was treated on the scene by Paramedics from Clackamas Fire and American Medical Response before being loaded onto a Lifeflight helicopter and transported to the Emanuel Burn Center.

When lighting a propane heater or grill, be sure that you are ready to light the gas quickly after turning it on. If you are unable to get the gas lit quickly, turn it off and allow the gas to dissipate before re-lighting.

Clackamas County Voters Renew Public Safety Levy, Approve Measure 3-378

On November 8, 2011, Clackamas County voters continued their support for the Clackamas County Sheriff's Office, approving a renewal of the county's public safety levy, Measure 3-378.

"We are heartened by this strong show of support, especially given the difficult economic climate," said Sheriff Craig Roberts. "Over the past five years, we've done a good job keeping the community safe and holding offenders accountable and tonight's result shows that the people we serve recognize that fact."

The public safety levy was first passed by Clackamas County voters in November 2006, and was set to expire on June 30, 2012. With its renewal, the sheriff's office will be able to continue the successful programs that it put in place after the levy was initially passed.

Those programs include:

- * Opening 84 shuttered jail beds, which reduced the number of prisoners released early into the community by approximately 91 percent.
- * Hiring 19 additional patrol deputies, providing regular police protection for more than 150,000 county residents.
- * Creating a regional drug task force to combat methamphetamine-related crime.

Measure 3-378 will provide ongoing support for these initiatives, without raising taxes paid by Clackamas County residents.

Ribbon Cutting For Vancouver VA Dental Clinic Scheduled

The Portland VA Medical Center held a ribbon cutting and open house from 2:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. Thursday, November 10 at the new Vancouver Dental Clinic located at 1601 E. Fourth Plain Blvd., Building 20.

The new dental clinic is home to 12 new dental operatories. That brings the total number of operatories to 38 between the Portland and Vancouver Campus.

Since opening in September, the Dental Department has been able to schedule an additional 849 Veteran dental appointments to its schedule.

"We are really excited about opening the Vancouver Dental Clinic," said Portland VA Medical Chief, Dentistry, Dr. Craig Ling. "It allowed us to increase our capacity and relocate a portion of dental care for our Veterans." The new dental clinic also provides quality dental care for Veterans away from the very congested main facility on Marquam Hill in Portland.

The Portland VA Medical Center serves more than 70,000 veterans in Oregon and Southwest Washington. In addition to the main campus located on Marquam Hill, the Portland VA Medical Center operates the Vancouver campus and clinics located in East Portland, Hillsboro, Salem, Warrenton, Bend and The Dalles, and Newport.

The Board approved promoting Deputy Chief Fred Charlton to the position of Fire Chief effective July 1, 2012. He will be mentored by Chief Kirchhofer over the next eight months.

The Board approved the updates to the Board Policy Manual.

Phase 2 ATV Safety Requirements Effective January 1

The second requirement of a two-phased all-terrain vehicle (ATV) safety program becomes effective January 1, 2012 for youth younger than 16 riding ATVs on public lands, Oregon Parks and Recreation Department (OPRD) today announced.

Phase 1 of the program was introduced in January 2009, after the Oregon Legislature passed safety legislation introduced by rider groups in 2007. Phase 1 requires anyone operating an ATV on public lands in Oregon to carry an ATV safety education card, demonstrating that they have completed a free online safety awareness course (www. RideATVoregon.org). Over 150,000 ATV enthusiasts have completed the course since it was introduced. This requirement is still being phased in so that by 2014, all riders on public lands, regardless of age, will need to complete the safety course and carry their ATV Safety Education Card.

Phase 2 begins January 1, 2012, when riders on public lands under the age of 16 must complete both the on-line

course and a "hands-on" training course designed for the type of ATV or off-road motorcycle they ride. When they have completed the second training, they will be sent a new "endorsed" ATV Safety Education Card free. The cost of the course and its duration can vary depending on which organization is providing the course. OPRD is working with the non-profit providers to pay the majority of the out-ofpocket expense to the parents.

The ATV safety requirements are designed to cut down on injuries to young riders. "Anyone who rides an ATV knows that they can be dangerous. Learning how to ride an ATV safely demonstrates a respect for the machine and its capabilities," said John Lane, OPRD's ATV Safety Education Coordinator. Lane emphasized that the safety requirements pertain only to public lands in Oregon, not pri-

vate property. Lane also urged riders to get their hands-on training soon to avoid the rush. "With about 100 trainers statewide, training classes could be hard to find if all riders want to get trained at the same time."

If a youth rider has already completed hands-on training and the online safety awareness course, they may apply for a new card with the endorsement at www.OregonOHV. org/OPRD/ATV/docs/Previously_Trained_application.pdf.

As cooler weather arrives, State Fire Marshal Mark Wallace is urging Oregonians to use heating appliances wisely and have fireplaces, woodstoves, and other heating equipment inspected for safety.

"With the onset of cooler weather, I am appealing to citizens to have the chimneys and flues on their fireplaces and woodstoves cleaned and inspected before using them," says Wallace. "This is one of the most important steps you

From 2006 through 2010 in Oregon, there were 2,169 home heating-related fires resulting in nine deaths, 77 injuries, and more than \$37 million in property loss. Seventy-six percent of home heating fires occur in the months from October through March.

Oregonians can keep themselves safe by following these home heating safety tips:

Fireplaces and Woodstoves

- * Have chimney and woodstove flues inspected and cleaned each year by a qualified chimney specialist. Ask them to check for creosote deposits, soot build-up, or physical damage.
- * Always use a fireplace screen. Make sure the screen is made of sturdy metal or heat-tempered glass to prevent sparks from escaping.
- * Keep a clutter-free environment. Clear the area around the hearth of debris, decorations, and flammable materials.
- * Store kindling, fire logs, and wood at least three feet from any heat source.

- * Install stovepipe thermometers to help monitor flue temperatures.
- * Use proper fire starters. Proper fire starters include newspaper, kindling, or specially manufactured starters designed for indoor use. Never use flammable liquid, such as lighter fluid, kerosene, or gasoline to start a fire.
- * Never burn charcoal indoors. Burning charcoal can give off lethal amounts of carbon monoxide.
- * Use fire-resistant materials on walls around woodstoves.
- * Allow fireplace and woodstove ashes to cool before disposing of them.
- * Dispose of ashes in a tightly covered metal container and place the container outdoors, at least ten feet from the home and any other nearby buildings. Ashes may retain heat for days after they appear out.

Portable Space Heaters

* When using portable heaters make sure they come with an automatic tip-over switch and a high-temperature limit switch. The tip-over switch turns the heater off if it is knocked over. The high-temperature limit switch regulates

the heater, preventing it from overheating.

- * Give heaters space. Keep at least three feet of space between the heater and combustibles such as furniture, curtains, blankets, papers, and people.
- * Check heater electrical cords. Have your cord serviced if it is frayed, cracked, or becomes hot during use.
- * Never use an extension cord with a portable electric heater. It can overload the circuit and cause a fire.
 - * Never allow children to play with, or around, the heater.
- * Unplug heaters when not in use, before going to bed, or when leaving the room.

Electric Baseboard and Wall Heaters

- * Be aware of electric baseboard and wall heaters. These heaters are thermostatically controlled and may turn on without warning when temperatures drop.
- * Keep combustibles clear. Give heaters space. Just as with portable space heaters, keep at least three feet of space between your baseboard/wall heater and combustibles items such as furniture, curtains, blankets, papers, and people.

Propane Appliances

- * If using a propane-fueled heater, make sure it is designed for indoor use. Read all manufacturer instructions and ensure it is properly vented.
 - * Do not use barbecues for heating or cooking indoors.
- * Make sure propane-fueled appliances are properly vented and follow all manufacturer instructions.
- * If you smell gas, do not operate any switches, appliances, or thermostats. A spark from any one of these could ignite the gas. Get everyone outside and away from the building. Shut off the gas supply. Call your propane supplier from a neighbor's phone.
 - * Avoid kerosene heaters. They can emit deadly fumes.

Smoke Alarms and Home Escape Plans

- * Working smoke alarms alert you to a fire and more than double your chances of surviving a fire. In a fire, minutes could mean the difference between life and death.
- * Install smoke alarms in every home, on every level, outside each sleeping area and in each bedroom.
- * Test and vacuum your smoke alarms each month to make sure they are working.
- * Smoke alarms 8- to 10-years-old or older should be replaced.
- * Make a home escape plan and practice it with your family at least twice a year.

Carbon Monoxide Dangers

* Home heating and cooking equipment that burn fuels

- such as gasoline, wood, coal, natural gas, propane, oil and methane are sources of carbon monoxide.
- * Carbon monoxide poisoning can be fatal if not detected early.
- * If you burn one of these fuels for home heating, make sure your carbon monoxide alarm is working properly.

"Are You Ready to Rock 'N Roll"?

On November 10th, Oregon City held it's second Community Forum focused on "Earthquake and Emergency Preparedness".

More than 100 citizens from Oregon City, The Hamlet of Beavercreek and citizens from areas surrounding Oregon City, attended this community forum to better understand the various Earthquake faults in the State of Oregon as well as faults which run under Oregon City, Beavercreek and Clackamas County, with the most predominate fault being the Bolton Fault.

Dr. Scott Burns, Professor of Geology, PSU, spoke about Earthquakes in Oregon: Past, Present and Future with comments on recent worldwide earthquakes. Ian Madin, Chief Scientist, Oregon Department of Geology and Mineral Industries, spoke about the Geology and faults of the Oregon City area and the influence of geology on likely damage in future earthquakes.

Jay Wilson, Clackamas County Emergency Management discussed the "Drop, Cover and Hold" which is felt to be the most safe position for our school children and citizens while experiencing an earthquake.

Ron Fredrickson, State of Oregon Insurance Division, talked about the subject of Earthquake Insurance, it's costs and availability. How the coverage typically works and what

Federal Grant to Help Veterans Access Transportation

TriMet, on behalf of Ride Connection, was recently awarded a \$330,728 grant from the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) through its Veterans Transportation and Community Living Initiative.

The integration will span across all Portland VA hospitals and clinics and allow a veteran to schedule their transportation concurrently with their medical appointments. The

Oregon Building Codes Division Creates Green Building Blog

The Oregon Building Codes Division has launched a new blog focused on green building. The Better Buildings Oregon Blog is now online at www.betterbuildingsoregon.org.

"The blog allows for conversation and an exchange of ideas," said Pat Allen, acting administrator of the Building Codes Division (BCD). "We hope to engage with our partners in construction and energy conservation on a number of green building topics."

The blog also provides information and ideas on issues such as energy efficiency, renewable energy, water conservation, and electric vehicle charging stations. BCD, part of the Department of Consumer and Business Services, created the blog to communicate how building codes support

green and high-performance construction around the State.

Formed in 2008, the division's green building program has focused on implementing Senate Bill 79 (2009), the legislative direction to increase the energy efficiency of buildings by strengthening the state's mandatory energy codes and developing an optional Reach Code to further reduce energy use in both commercial and residential construction.

The American Council for an Energy Efficient Economy's (ACEEE) annual State Energy Efficiency Scorecard recently moved Oregon from second place in 2010 to first place in 2011 in the building energy code category. Oregon shares first place in the State Residential and Commercial building Energy Codes: Stringency and Compliance Efforts Scoring with California, Massachusetts, and Washington. The ACEEE Scorecard is a comprehensive ranking of the states based on an array of metrics that capture best practices and recognize leadership in energy efficiency policy and program implementation. The full energy scorecard is available for download from the council's website at www.aceee.org/research-report/e115.

This summer, BCD also received a national honor for its work in energy efficiency. The U.S. Department of Energy recognized the division with the Jeffrey A. Johnson Award for "Excellence in the Advancement of Building Energy Codes and Performance."

In 2010, the division's green building program developed the nation's first statewide solar code. Given Oregon's position as an early adopter market for electric vehicles, the green building program has also worked to streamline the permit process for installing electric vehicle charging stations in homes and businesses.

BCD provides ongoing training to local building department staff and the design and construction industry on innovative technology as well as guidance to home owners on topics of interest such as rainwater harvesting and graywater use for flushing toilets. Local resident Claire Kellogg, a member of the Clackamas County Library Board, gave a report on the status of the Oregon City Library's attempts to find a new location. She noted that in Clackamas County each library is independent.

A brief history was shared. The Oregon City Public Library has needed a new library building for many years. It was located for about ten years in the Danielson Shopping Center, now the location of the new Safeway Store on Molalla Avenue. Then it moved to the Carnegie Center. The Carnegie Center is too small. The city of Oregon City has been looking for land for a new library for several years. Citizen surveys were taken, and it was discovered that the hilltop area was a favorite location for most people in the area. There has been discussion about locating the Library at the Red Soils Campus on S Beavercreek Road, but there did not seem to be too much interest on the County's part.

The library board has made a proposal to the County for two acres of land in the Red Soils Campus. The City would not lose any tax revenue by allowing the library to be built at this location.

Handouts with frequently asked questions were passed out. It was requested that a letter from the Hamlet be written to the County Commissioners in favor of the sale of the two acre parcel. This site is also ideal due to its proximity to pub-

There was one land use issue to be addressed. It was a renewal of a temporary permit for care on Upper Highland Road. It was recommended for approval with stipulations.

Christine Kosinski gave a report on the November 13, 2011, "Are You Ready to Rock 'N Roll" earthquake forum held in Oregon City. About one hundred people attended. The full report can be found on page 14 in this issue.

Elizabeth Graser-Lindsey gave reports on the Transportation Safety and Transportation System Planning committees of which she is a member.

Elizabeth shared that the top three types of accidents in Clackamas County are:

62% - people driving off the roadway or crossing the center line.

47% - aggressive driving, which is considered to be caused by speeding and

44% - from young, inexperienced drivers

Several options have been discussed on how to help the situation, ie. "rumble strips" that are applied on the outside of a lane. Elizabeth noted "these are not of much use in a rural area such as ours because we have no shoulders". Possibly using them on the center line of the road might be a possibility.

The Board presented a check for \$200 to Sharon Charlson, who will present the check at the December 3, 2011, Beavercreek Grange meeting. The donation is in addition to what the Hamlet pays to the Grange to hold the community Hamlet meetings eight months out of the year. The check is designated as a donation to the Grange's Building Fund to help with the ongoing improvements and preservation of the historic building.

The decorating of the Korner Park in downtown Beaver-creek for Christmas was discussed. On Wednesday, November 30, 2011, at 1 p.m. volunteers will meet at Norm and Judy Andreen's home to build swags and the decorations to be put up at the park.

Beaver Creek Cooperative Telephone has graciously do-

nated the use of their boom truck to help to put lights on the tree on December 1st. They have also made two wonderful signs announcing the Christmas tree lighting.

On Thursday, December 1st between 2:00 and 2:30 p. m. the decorating of the park will be held. If you'd like to come and help we could use the assistance for this community event.

It was noted that Norm Andreen will be talking again with Paul Hauer to get the reader board repaired so it will be lit up at night.

The meeting adjourned at 8:23 p.m.

Injury Multi-Vehicle Crash Closes Northbound Lanes

Oregon State Police (OSP) troopers are continuing the investigation into Friday's multi-vehicle crash on Highway 213 in the Oregon City area that injured three people and closed the northbound lanes for about one hour.

On November 25, 2011 at approximately 12 noon a pickup transporting boxes of lettuce lost some of its load on the northbound lanes of Highway 213 near milepost 1. As an

occupant from the pickup was trying to remove the spilled load from the roadway, other traffic was slowing down to stop. A northbound commercial truck was unable to stop and crashed into two passenger cars, starting a chain-reaction crash involving at least two other vehicles.

The crash resulted in the closure of all lanes for about one hour as police, fire, ambulances, ODOT and tow vehicles responded. Three people were transported to area hospitals with minor injuries.

All lanes were opened by 1:00 p.m.
