Beavercreek CPO Spotlight

The January meeting of the Beavercreek CPO was held on Wednesday, January 23, 2002, at the Beavercreek Grange on Kamrath Rd., at 7:00 p.m. with 11 members and guests attending.

It was unfortunate that there were not more members in attendance as the guest speakers were Malu Wilkenson and Carol Krigger from Metro. Malu and Carol explained the State's Goal 5 land use program. Goal 5 addresses stream and water quality as well as fish and wildlife protection. The presentation before the CPO membership was to explain how Goal 5 could impact the Beaverceek area.

Maps were presented of the Tri-County area that showed the streams inside the Urban Growth Boundary that have been inventoried. The women then explained that an analysis had been done to determine which streams were significant and worth protecting.

The next step is to weigh the consequences of allowing or not allowing development along these streams.

After that is done Metro will develop its plan which will address which streams will be protected, how much they will be protected and how to accomplish these goals.

Right now Metro is in the analysis stage. Metro hopes to have this stage done by the end of summer.

How does this impact the Beavercreek area? The areas known as Areas 25 and 26, Urban Reserve Areas, have been included on this map as alternative analysis areas. Areas 25 and 26 are included because they are made up of exception land, not farmland, contiguous to the Urban Growth Boundary. This means that if Metro runs out of land inside the Urban Growth Boundary, because of Goal 5, Metro will have to look at expanding the Urban Growth Boundary to get the acreage it will need to meet the 20 year growth plan.

This means, that again, Areas 25 and 26, the Beavercreek area, could be vulnerable! If you have comments or need more information, call Lydia Mel, the Alternative Analysis Manager at 503-797-1830.

It was also learned that the proposed cell tower, which was requested to be placed 900 ft NW of the intersection of Upper Highland, Scheubel and Beavercreek Roads was denied in part due to the information supplied by the CPO to the County. This just goes to show that people can make a difference when they get informed and involved!

Beaver Creek Cooperative Telephone Company History

In last months issue I presented Part IV of the Beaver Creek Cooperative Telephone Company History. Here then is part V. (The original transcript done by O.F. Dickson) The Editor

Starting in 1981, and through 1987, the Board of Directors had authorized the retirement of Capital Credits earned in the years 1963-1974, in the amount of \$438,965.00.

The 3000th customer signed up for service with Beaver Creek Cooperative Telephone Company in April of 1987; and, in 1988, Tom Lindstrom was named Manager.

Again in 1988, the Board authorized the retirement of Capital Credits for the years 1975 through 1978 for \$362,505.00. By the end of 1988 the membership had grown to 3,123.

Also in 1988 the subsidiary relocated to a new site in the Clackamas area on Sunnyside Rd. A small retail outlet was established along with the office space. The subsidiary had an established customer base of approximately 250 customers. By the beginning of 1990 this number had more than tripled in size.

The largest payout of Capital Credits in the company's history was authorized by the Board in 1990 for \$588,857.00. This would pay all credits earned in the years 1979 through 1981. By the beginning of 1990 the membership had grown to 3,191.

Time To Rat On A Pothole

Clackamas County road crews are reminding residents and travelers who spot potholes on county-area roads to call the Pothole Hotline at 503-650-3262.

Pothole crews are constantly on the prowl for holes in the roads, but with nearly 1,500 miles of county roadway, they need the community's help to find them.

The number of potholes increase as wet winter weather hammers the county. Once the crews are notified, the potholes they are generally repaired within two or three days.

The County's Pothole Hotline began in 1997 and since then thousands of potholes have been fixed. This has resulted in fewer damage claims against the County and a smoother ride for travelers.

Public Utility Commission Hearings on Extended Area Service Held January 28th

The Public Utilities Commission's Hearings regarding Beavercreek Cooperative Telephone's Extended Area Service charges was held in Salem on January 28th.

The hearing was called in response to complaints by co-op members who wanted a refund for EAS charges made to their accounts before January 1, 2002 when a new law went into effect.

At the hearing only one BCT customer showed up.

BCT had sent out a questionnaire asking for input from the members on the issue. 10 letters were submitted from members requesting the refund. 700 letters were submitted supporting BCT's actions and 30 letters, of the 700, were submitted from members who would be eligible for a refund stating that they supported BCTs actions.

As a result, BCT will be going to court sometime in April for a resolution. If you would like more information call BCT at 503-632-3113.



Study/Organizational Skills Class Offered at Carus



School Funding... a Serious Issue

The January 17th PTO business meeting was the shortest one to date. It started at 7:00 pm and was concluded by 7:20 p.m. The December minutes and Treasurer's report were given and approved as corrected. It was unanimously approved to allot \$225 for the Read Across America cookies (an annual event) and to give Laura Minato \$50 for supplies to be used for TV Turn-off Week (April 22 -28).

The meeting was adjourned and the floor was turned over to Representative Kathy Lowe. She provided the group with a legislative history as to why we are now

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facing a \$830 million state budget deficit.

Carol Sturman, Debi Poppe, and Julie O'Dwyer with the Coalition For School Funding Now (and also Redland/Ogden parents) joined us to tell us what we could do as parents...write letters! Write letters to the House Representatives and the Senators.

Barry Rotrock was also present and shared with us what the impact to our district will be when we face this kind of budget cut. If K-12 education takes a 2% to 6% cut this means a \$2 million to \$6 million budget reduction for Oregon City Schools. This will mean teachers, a lot of teachers, will have to go!

There is no quick fix for the state budget deficit, however, it is very important that we do our part to support our schools.

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DSL Update

I have been interested in DSL service for quite some time, but because our phone company is small the prices up to now had been prohibitive.

Good news... there have been a few changes made regarding DSL at BCT. The complex price structure has been simplified. You can now get:

256k DSL for \$29.95 + \$18.95 for the Internet 512k DSL for \$39.95 + \$24.95 for the Internet 768k DSL for \$49.95 + \$29.95 for the Internet

I was curious why you had to pay more for the Internet access as each packages speed increased. My reasoning was that if you pay for the faster DSL you are already paying for the increased bandwidth and the Internet access charge should stay constant, but apparently the extra charge is to cover the T-1 lines that need to be put in place as the use for each speed grows.

The prices for modems have fallen. You now have a choice between a USB modem for \$114.95 or an Ethernet modem for \$144.95. It is also my understanding that if you wish you may purchase your own modem as long as you make sure it meets BCT specs.

There is also a \$149.95 setup fee and a cost of \$7.50/phone for a DSL filter to make sure there is no interference between the phones and the DSL. This filter needs to be attached to each phone in the building. Members may also purchase these from other vendors if they wish.

This is getting more tempting by the minute. If I get DSL I can get rid of my second phone line so the cost is much more attractive. I would be shifting the cost for the secondary line to the cost of the DSL on the primary.

This way my husband and I will be able to surf the Internet at the same time and still receive phone calls. I'll even be able to receive faxes while online. Now if the technology would permit me to be online, talk on the phone and receive faxes all at the same time I'd really be wired!
