Saturday, January 18, 2003 A Dangerous Night To Be On The Roads In Beavercreek

Saturday evening, January 18, 2003, was not a good time to be out driving in the Beavercreek area. There were three accidents involving alcohol within a couple of hours.

At 6:54 p.m. a vehicle flipped over on Beavercreek Rd., near Henrici Rd. The accident closed the road and caused a detour. The cause of the accident was attributed to alcohol The male was not seriously injured, but was sent to Willamette Falls Hospital and later booked at the jail on a DUII. More detailed information was not available by press time.

At about 10:30 p.m. a 1985 Chrysler LeBaron driven by Hector Garcia-Maldonado, address Oregon City, and his passenger lost control and ran up onto the wooden boardwalk in front of the Beavercreek Grocery. The car missed the three steel posts that are sunk into the ground, knocked the support from the east end of the roof, smashed a wooden bench attached to the wall and almost went into the beauty salon at the east end of the building.

The driver blew a .27 which is more than three times the legal limit of .08.

The driver had a drivers license, but no insurance. Neither he nor his passenger, who gave his residence as the same address as the driver, were injured. The driver was booked into custody on a DUII.

The third incident happed at about 10:35 p.m. near Buckner Creek Rd and Hidden Rd. Anyone who has driven Buckner Creek Rd knows that the corner where Hidden Rd comes in is a dangerous corner. It is practically a 45 degree turn.

Apparently some young people were out riding around and missed the corner and the car went down a 30 foot embankment. When the fire department arrived they were all out of the car. There were bottles scattered around the scene. The Sheriff was called, but because no one was injured and the car was off the road and did not pose a hazard to other motorists and because there were so many other accidents the Sheriffs Office was responding to at the time, they did not send an officer out.

Luckily no one was seriously injured. The sad thing is that this is the second time in recent memory that a speeder has run into the Beavercreek Grocery causing

classroom field trip is planned between now and June, it must be supported instead through fund raising, outside donations, or other sources of funding such as the Educational Foundation, Rotary, PTA, state/federal grants, etc.

If the field trip occurs during the instructional day, and students miss their "regular" school time, it is considered "instructional time" for all students. The purpose of such a trip is instructional in nature and provides an important educational experience not able to be duplicated in the classroom. In such instances, the entire cost of the field trip of all students, including transportation and admission fees, must be covered by raised/donated funds. It is not acceptable to charge students fees to cover the costs of the field trip. Parents may donate funds to help offset the total cost of the trip for all students, but they may not be asked to pay a fee or to "donate" to support their child's participation.

If a field trip occurs outside the school day (i.e. during the evening or weekend), and it is optional for students to attend, fees may be charged to those who choose to participate to cover the costs in the same way that in their honor to the birthday book club.

"Beavercreek Oregon a History Through the Looking Glass"

This is Part VIII of a series of articles on the history of the Beavercreek area. Written by Jack Watts, whose family were some of the early settlers of the community. This history is reprinted from his original manuscript that had until now never been published, by permission of Gordon Watts. We dedicate this series to a man and his love of the Beavercreek countryside who took the time to stop, look, listen and capture for all, his rememberances. The Editor.

The Need for Railroads

These were times when almost everyone depended on wood for fuel. Most farmers had woodlots and in the off season they cut wood and banked it out to or near the road where they stacked it up, usually two cords high and as long as necessary to accommodate his output. (A cord is a stack eight feet long by four feed wide, and four feet high, plus three to four inches to make up for any holes in the stack). Banking the wood out was a way of making the wood easily available when the weather was bad when it became time to deliver it to the Oregon City customers. This made it convenient to load the woodrack that was mounted on his wagon when it was time to deliver it.

Usually the wood was delivered to the curbside in front of the home and again ricked up and ready for the buzz-

saw that cut it into I6-inch lengths, ready for the stove. There were those who were engaged in this, operating the buzz-saws; the saw was powered by a gasoline engine.

There were a number of sawmills in the area, and most operated under difficult conditions because any time they left the main roads in the rainy season they were either in the mud or on plank roads. In order to operate, they had to get their lumber to market and much of this work was done with horses.

For many years farmers had been discussing the desirability of rail transportation east of the Willamette River, but financing seemed impossible because the "railroad brass" were not interested in what to them were insignificant lines at best. It was not until 1908 that Mr. Fred M. Swift of Portland, a civil engineer, figured out a route that was feasible. A meeting was called in Beaver Creek at the Central Grange Hall at which Mr. Swift outlined a plan to the farmers for building and financing their own railroad, using only local money.

It was to be a cooperative effort, powered by electricity that would soon be available from the River Mill Hydro-Electric plant, which was then under construction on the Clackamas River below Estacada. The railroad would connect with the Portland Railway Light and Power line in Oregon City, and eventually join other lines to the south. An outlet for logs, cordwood, lumber and farm products from a wide area, as well as commuter service, would be attainable. The undertaking would run to one million dollars.

The farmers were sceptical, but Swift explained that contributions of work, ties, ballast, and granting right-of-ways would amount to shares of stock for those who had no money to invest. He emphasized that the line would bring city advantages almost to their doorsteps. Some were downright hostile about exchanging a slice of their land for a few sheets of

paper with a fancy seal.

Eventually enough support was forthcoming to establish The Clackamas Southern Railroad, as it was named originally, and the line met its goal of completion to Beaver Creek by June, 1913, with traffic beginning to

move over the first seven miles of track.

The cost averaged \$58,249.12 per mile and construction continued toward Mulino.

Portland Region Offers Free Lead Risk Assessments and Lead Hazard Reduction Grants for Qualified Homeowners

The Portland Regional Lead Hazard Control Program is now offering free risk assessments to qualifying households in the Portland metropolitan region. Assistance is also available to reduce exposure to harmful lead paint and dust that can cause lead poisoning in young children.

Houses eligible to receive assistance must be owner occupied, built before 1978, and located in Multnomah, Washington, Clackamas, or Clark counties, and have a child under the age of six living or spending time in the home. Once a free risk assessment has identified lead hazards in the home, a lead hazard reduction grant of up to \$10,000 may be offered to eligible households. Funding is limited and risk assessments and grant assistance will be provided on a first come, first served basis.

Lead poisoning can cause permanent health problems such as learning disabilities and brain damage. Parents and physicians often do not realize that the risk of lead exposure exists, so many young children do not have their blood tested for lead poisoning. Parents may not know that their children have high lead levels because generally lead poisoning does not have any noticeable symptoms.

The Oregon Health Division has found that three to five percent of children tested in the Portland metro area have elevated blood lead levels. Children in the Portland metropolitan area are at-risk of lead poisoning because almost sixty percent of the housing was built before 1978 when lead was still being added to paint in significant quantities. In Multnomah County, this percentage jumps to eighty-eight percent of housing built before 1978 and may contain lead paint.

A 2001 study by the Multnomah County Health Department examined houses before 1930 in Multnomah County. Of the homes included in the study, over seventy of the homes studied contained lead hazards. There are over 28,000 homes built before 1930 in at-risk neighborhoods where older housing is concentrated. Investigators estimate that over 6,000 children are at-risk for lead poisoning in these neighborhoods alone.

The Portland Regional Lead Hazard Control Program is a partnership between housing agencies in the Portland area, including those in Multnomah, Washington and Clackamas counties in Oregon and Clark County in Washington State.

Parents interested in free risk assessments or concerned about lead poisoning prevention and the blood lead levels of their children should call the LeadLine (503) 988-4000. Households will be screened for eligibility and may be placed on a waiting list depending on interest in risk assessments and
