Traffic Crash Turns Fatal - Hwy 213 North of Molalla

January 18th, 2005 7:49 P.M.

Those of you who get the Oregonian may have seen the photo of the log truck involved in this accident in the paper. Here is info received from the Oregon State Police

The investigation at the scene is near completion of a four-vehicle crash on Highway 213 north of Vick Road in the Molalla area that has resulted in the death of one person. Investigators are looking at alcohol as a contributing factor on the part of the deceased driver.

On January 18, 2005 at approximately 1:00 p.m., a loaded log truck driven by Charles Johnson, age 55, from Salem, was northbound on Hwy 213 approaching three other southbound vehicles. The lead southbound vehicle, a 2001 Toyota Highlander, drove across the center line and struck the left side rear axle of the Kenworth truck. After the initial impact, the Toyota sport utility vehicle traveled down the side of the log truck trailer and collided with the trailer axle.

A second southbound vehicle, a 2000 Dodge Durango sport utility vehicle, traveled through the debris and came to a stop in the middle of the highway. It is not known if this vehicle collided with any other involved vehicles, but it did have some minor right front damage.

After the trailer axle collided with the Toyota Highlander, it began to rotate into southbound lane where it struck a third southbound vehicle, a 1992 Ford Escort four door station wagon. The impact caused extensive front damage to the Ford Escort before it came to rest in a ditch bordering the southbound lane. The rear portion of the log load came to rest in the same ditch and the front portion was still resting on the front part of the pole trailer still partially attached to the back of the truck blocking all lanes.

Mr. Johnson was not injured. He is employed by Jon L. Golly logging company based in Dallas, Oregon. The loaded log truck weighed approximately 80,000 pounds.

Michael Steven Keesey, age 48, from Oregon City. He had been transported by Lifeflight helicopter to Oregon Health Sciences University where he died from his injuries. Safety restraint use information is not available, but both front airbags did deploy during the crash.

The driver of the Ford Escort station wagon is identified as Kenneth V. Rogers, age 49, from Molalla. He was using safety restraints and was transported by LifeFlight to Oregon Health Sciences University.

The driver of the Dodge Durango is identified as Anne Hendrickson, age 29, from Colton. She was transported from the scene by a relative and did not have injuries that appeared to require treatment. She was using safety restraints.

Assistance at the scene was provided by ODOT and Molalla Fire Department.

The investigation is being continued by members of the Oregon State Police Portland Area Command with the assistance of the Clackamas County Interagency crash investigation team (CRAFT - Crime Reconstruction And Forensic Technicians) comprised

"Beavercreek Oregon a History Through the Looking Glass"

This is Part XXX of a series of articles on the history of the Beavercreek area. Written by Jack Watts, whose family were some of the early settlers of the community. This history is reprinted from his original manuscript that had until now never been published, by permission of Gordon Watts. Immediately following the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor, Beavercreek, among other Clackamas County communities, was contacted and Aircraft Observation Posts were set up. On December 8, 1941, the Beavercreek Observation Post was activated at 1:00 p. m., with J. H. Watts, a local businessman (and the writer), appointed Chief Observer.

Bill Mault and Gordon Watts were pressed into service in the open field directly across the road from the Beavercreek Mutual Telephone Company's Central Office; and as they spotted any aircraft, one of them ran across the road to the telephone office and reported the kind of plane, the direction it was traveling, and where it was seen in relation to the post. As they carried the burden out in the open on a very cold day, efforts were being made to provide some kind of shelter, as this was to be a 24-hour continuous watch. It was the following day when a tent was set up that was equipped with some crude, makeshift seats from an old car, along with a heating stove and wood fuel for same.

and also Captain Beavercreek School District

The Observation Post was moved to a new location on the Willis Hughes place north of the Beavercreek-Highland Road, approximately 400 yards up what is now Ferguson Road.

The Observation Post was organized around the six

adjacent school districts from which its volunteers were drawn. The schedule was drawn up so that the Beavercreek District became responsible for 36 hours of aircraft watching and reporting beginning each Sunday morning at 7:00 a.m., then the Carus District began another 36-hour stint, which was then relieved by the Clarkes District and carried through the following 24-hour shift; they in turn were relieved by the Henrici District for the next 24 hours, when they were relieved by the Highland District serving another 24 hours, until relieved by the Schuebel District which rounded out a full week of watching and reporting to the Portland Filter Center where all flights were plotted.

The schedule repeated itself week after week, with each Captain responsible for supplying observers for their time period. The daily routine was arranged in four-hour shifts with two observers on duty at a time. At first this was a weekly schedule, but later in the busy summer months we enlisted still more observers to change the schedule to four-hour shifts every two weeks.

Mr. Franzen (then the City Manager of Oregon City) drew up plans for observation posts while Clackamas County supplied the lumber, and volunteers supplied the labor. The Post was built on land belonging to Mr. Willis Hughes at a point which was the highest and best vantage point for observing planes. Mr. Fred Bluhm, a

local carpenter, was in charge of construction and managed the work crew. He also volunteered his services and the work was done on Sundays so as not to interfere with anyone's daily schedule.

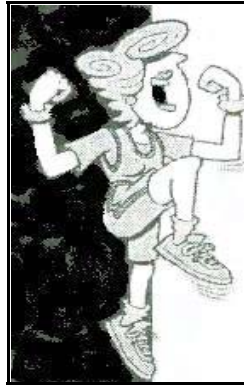

Final Emergency Board Meeting

At our final Emergency Board meeting we refrained from spending all the money left in the general and special appropriation accounts. Your stewards will turn over between 10 and 20 million to the 2005-07 Legislature. Given our projected budget shortfall for the next 2 years this is very welcome news.

We had some serious problems to deal with at the January 4th meeting. The Department of Revenue over-estimated the revenue it could obtain from enhanced cigarette tax collection efforts. They came up short by over 30 million dollars. Not only does that cause us some major statewide budget headaches, it made for a shortfall in funding their own department since we were going to use that revenue to fund their operations. We forced them to find alternatives and gave them only three million out of our emergency fund toward their shortfall so they would be more accountable in the future.

The Oregon Student Assistance Commission had

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gone bankrupt over our student federal loan program. Most of this is a result of federal changes to reserve requirements. We approved selling this asset to a private company to assure student success. If they can do it, why have the state do it? It also allows your state to avoid a six million dollar penalty from the Feds. The question for us next session: Is it appropriate for OSAC to remain a stand alone agency? The opportunity grant, ASPIRE program, and private loan programs could easily be subsumed by one of the education boards or agencies.

We did fill a big hole in our Indigent Defense budget to the tune of seven million dollars. Without the restoration our inability to provide defense services for poor Oregonians was grinding our Public Safety system to a halt. Or worse yet - setting dangerous offenders free due to a lack of a speedy and timely trial.

We also allotted \$2 million for gang enforcement at the request of the Speaker of the House and Portland delegation. These preventive monies have statewide implications however. Even my own home town, Canby, has 2 or 3 gangs drawing our young people into a cycle of crime, violence and poverty.

Finally, we once again shored up the State Fair to the tune of \$540,000. The Emergency Board was reluctant to make the policy decision to shut it down. That should be the result of deliberation by the entire Legislature. I did indicate to my colleagues that while I am a huge fan of the State Fair, I would have a tough time prioritizing it over other critical education, human service or public safety programs.

For those that are upset about the Emergency Board allocating a bunch of money for a basketball arena for the University of Oregon, I want to point out that they are spending NO taxpayer money in that endeavor. The only reason they come to us, is to get our permission and an independent review of their donation, grant, etc. plan is so that taxpayers and or students don't get caught holding the bag if a proposal is not particularly well thought out. The debt service does not come out of your taxes.

There were some exciting developments as well. Oregon Department of Transportation is embarking on a process of encouraging public private partnerships. \$20 million in state funding is available to partner with private firms on projects of statewide significance. Workshops have been held to encourage private sector participation in these transportation projects. Consultants are being retained for traffic analysis, testing and fiscal services.

The Workers Compensation premium assessment rate will drop .2% for 2005 for most employers.

We also received a report from the State Treasurer and The Department of Administrative Services that by selling the Pension Obligation Bonds we saved over \$7 million in interest for Oregon taxpayers over the next 20 years.

ODOT also reported that the bridge repair projects are moving toward construction at a faster pace than

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originally anticipated due to streamlined project processes and a recent contract with a private sector partner "Oregon Bridge Delivery Partners" to manage the \$1.3 billion state bridge replacement program. They may actually be able to do more projects than originally expected. Before some get too upset (or excited) about state taxpayer dollars going to roads and not kids, you need to know these are dedicated monies that cannot be used for anything but these transportation projects. This is very similar to our dedicated gas tax dollars that can only be used for roads. Oregonians mandated this at the ballot box a few years ago. These projects will hopefully get our economy going in addition to providing much needed jobs as we work our way out the worst recession in Oregon history.

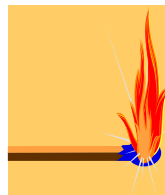

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Safety Rules for Children

from Clackamas County Community Corrections

Since I have included a Sex Offender notification in this issue, I thought I would pass along the following information for parents with information to share with their children.

Because sex offenders get their power through secrecy, the single most effective means of protecting your child is communication with them. Open communication between parents and children are vital components of family safety. Talk to your children. They have to feel comfortable discussing sensitive matters with you, then they are more likely to tell you when they have been put in an uncomfortable situation by a sex offender. Be aware of the common lures and **don't accept a ride from a stranger**.

If someone follows you on foot or in a car, stay away from him or her. You DO NOT need to go near a car to talk to people inside.

Grown-ups who need help should not be asking children for help; they should be asking other grown-ups.

No one should be asking you for directions or to look for a lost puppy or telling you that your mother or father is in trouble and that he or she will take you to them.

If someone tries to take you somewhere, quickly get away from them and yell or scream, "This man is trying to take me away!" or, "This person is not my mother (or father)."

It is safer to be with other people when going places or playing outside, so always use the BUDDY SYSTEM.

If someone tries to touch you in ways that make you feel uncomfortable, or frightened, tell them "NO" and go tell a grown-up you trust what happened.

Know it is NOT your fault if someone touches you in a way that is NOT okay. You do not have to keep it secret.

The information gained through a sex offender notification should assist children and their families in

avoiding situations that allow sex offenders easy access to victims. Do not harass your neighbor; an offender put in a stressful state is more likely to re-offend.

The Trust will govern its use and has created a set of rules for priority of messages and also allowable uses. There has been a photo cell installed so the sign can be lit at night, but not during the day. This is to save on power. This is especially important during the Winter months when it is dark when most residents are commuting to and from work.

Lumber has been donated to local Scout Troop #139 to construct approximately 5 tables. Additional tables may be constructed in the Spring.

The goals for 2005 were discussed and it was decided that with the pending approval of the conditional use permit, at least one ball field will be constructed. Identification of location and clearing for the drain field will be completed and the leased uses of the park property will continue.

A couple of organizations have inquired about using the property in the summer, and one has set a date for the weekend of August 13 - 14th.

He stated that major funding is being reserved for bridges and overlays. He stated that the work on

Beavercreek Road south of Henrici was a considerable time away.

He discussed with the members the Beavercreek Rd/ Hwy 213 Interchange and explained some of the reasoning behind its construction.

At this time there is nothing planned for Leland Road between Beavercreek and Hwy 213. The Conway/ Henrici improvement has been approved and is now in the STIP (Transportation Infrastructure Plan).

There is nothing officially approved for Carus Road at this time, although the County did submit a request for left turn lanes.

The biggest impact on highways is from trucks, busses and 18 wheelers. The ratio is 1000 to 1. If preservation can be accomplished on a highway before it needs to be completely ground down and resurfaced the cost is a quarter of the cost for a new roadbed.

The Sunrise Corridor was discussed in length. It will probably be built in phases from I-205 to Rock Creek and from Rock Creek to Hwy 26.

It was announced that the Port of Portland is having Noise Abatement hearings on February 9, 2005, and April 13, 2005, from 9:00 to Noon at the Port Building.

Tom Farr and Ariel Mars reported on the Greater Oregon City Watershed Council meeting that they attended. They encouraged other members to also attend these meetings. Bill Mars also reported on his attendance at the meeting regarding the rock quarry on Macksburg Road. The latest report is that the trucks will be routed down Hwy 211 instead of Hwy 213. The issues that will arise regarding fish and the streambeds was also discussed.

The proposed Speakers for the March meeting will be members of the newly formed Watershed Council mentioned previously.

Beavercreek CPO Spotlight

The January meeting of the Beavercreek Community Planning Organization, aka Beavercreek CPO, took place on Wednesday, January 26, 2005, at 7:00 p.m. in the Beavercreek Grange on Kamrath Road with 19 members and guests in attendance.

There was no Guest Speaker, although Gary Kerr, a CPO member and Commissioner on the Board for Clackamas River Water, gave a short presentation regarding the latest news, about the proposed merger between Clackamas River Water and The Rockwood Water Peoples Utility District.

On Tuesday, January 11, 2005, the Clackamas County Board of Commissioners and the Board of Clackamas River Water held a joint informational workshop at the request of the Clackamas County Commissioners. The County Commissioners and staff presented a way for CRW to obtain, in their view, the boundary protections sought by the CRW Board through a merger with Rockwood Water Peoples Utility District.

This idea came about after the Sunrise Water Authority and the Oak Lodge Water District notified Clackamas River Water that they did not want to form a joint water authority. The Board of County Commissioners have suggested that a possible solution would be for them to form a Section 450 Water Authority, that would be exclusively what is now Clackamas River Water.

Under this proposal the County would organize the Sec 450 Authority and allow CRW to transfer all of its assets and liabilities to the Authority with the current Board of Commissioners of CRW serving as board members of the Sec 450 Authority until a statutory election could be held that would elect a Board of Commissioners for the new entity.

The following is new information received after the January 26th Beavercreek CPO meeting, but I felt it

would be better to place the information here in context rather than put it somewhere else in this issue.

At the January 27, 2005, joint special meeting of the Clackamas County Board of Commissioners and the CRW Board of Commissioners, both entities passed a resolution agreeing to explore the necessary statutory studies required under Sec 450. It is anticipated that these studies will be completed not later than May 2005, but could be earlier. The County presented a time line that, depending on the completion of the statutorily required studies and hearings, could have a new Board elected as early as May, possibly September, and definitely by November 2005.

It is suggested that people watch for new information and future informational meetings to be held as it becomes available. It will be placed in customer billing statements, in flyers in their bills, through the normal meeting notice channels/locations, and/or by direct mailings. Also, if you have access to the Internet, please go to www.crwatwater.com for details and meeting as they become available.

Measure 37 was also discussed at this meeting. There were three Measure 37 actions that had been sent to the CPO, but the CPO realized that the County had sent the information to the Beavercreek CPO by mistake, as the land in question is in the Carus CPO. It was decided to notify the County of the error so that the paperwork could be sent to the Carus CPO in a timely manner for their members' information and input.

A partial slate of nominations for the February election was put into the record. The CPO is still looking for someone who could be the President. This is due to the fact that so many of the members are currently involved in so many committees and other functions that there are too many time constraints to allow them to take on this role.

It is hoped that a civic minded individual who has some time to spare can step up to fill the position.

It was a very light evening with no land issues on the docket. This allowed discussion on the new reader board as well as committee reports from various members for their respective committees.

The next meeting of the Beavercreek CPO will take place on Wednesday, February 23, 2005, at the same time and place. All residents are welcome to attend these meetings and find out what is going on in our community. Get involved and make a difference. Your single voice does matter. CCC Offers Classes on Grafting and Pruning Fruit Trees

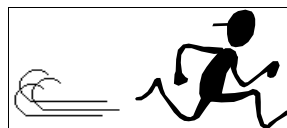
