Clackamas County Seeks Governor Kulongoski's Help to Modify M37 in Legislature

The Clackamas County Board of Commissioners has sent a letter to Governor Ted Kulongoski asking for his support and assistance in working with the legislature to modify Measure 37 within the first 90 days of the session.

Clackamas County has an extraordinary number of claims filed under Measure 37. "We know this may be a difficult, contentious effort, but time is of the essence," the Board wrote. "Clackamas County is faced with reviewing subdivision and partition applications that will allow new development, based on Measure 37 claims."

The commissioners feel that Clackamas County and the entire state needs to strike the right balance between the need for equity for individual property owners and the right to a livable community for all of the County's citizens (See bulleted examples below.)

By the Measure 37 deadline of December 4, 2006, Clackamas County had received 1,052 claims, affecting over 37,000 acres. The last group of claims between November 1 and December 4, 2006, totaled 466, almost as many as had been received during the entire previous two years. Claimants have asked for compensation exceeding \$1.6 billion.

In the letter, the commissioners stated that they believe it is critical that the citizens of Oregon understand the tremendous impact that these claims could have on Clackamas County and Oregon:

* 37,000 acres is almost half the size of Portland; virtually all of the Measure 37 development will be in rural areas, where public services and infrastructure do not exist, on rural roads not designed for the large increase in traffic.

- 55 percent of the claims are within our Exclusive Farm Use zone. 20,000 acres of land zoned for farm use could be developed with new residences. Assuming just one household per acre for the Measure 37 claims, Clackamas County's population would grow 25 percent, adding almost 400,000 vehicle trips per day to rural roads.
- Currently, Clackamas County has reviewed over 500 claims. "We know there are countless legal questions about virtually every section of Measure 37," they wrote. "This would be an opportune time to answer some of these questions by clarifying the law."

Clackamas County will mail a map and information of the Measure 37 claims made in the County to every household in Clackamas County to share with them the potential impacts of the claims.

The Commissioners are asking the governor and legislature to carefully rebalance the land use system that has been so important in creating the livability of the communities. They also invited the Governor to visit Clackamas County and see the potential effect of Measure 37.

Read Quest Begins at Carus

Beginning January 5th and continuing through February 23rd, students will be asked to read for 30 minutes (K-3), or 60 minutes (4-6) each day. For every 30 or 60 minutes read, they will bring in a signed confirmation slip so their teachers can record their progress on a world chart. Nonreaders in the younger grade levels may have stories read to them (but also encourage them to practice their emerging reading skills during this time).

For each class achieving their targeted number of minutes over the course of the celebration, we will be ringing the historic Carus School bell. This year's school wide goal is 300,050 minutes of reading.

We ask that you please encourage and support your child in his/her attempt to "Read Around the World of Seuss" as we strive to reach our goal.

If Your Child is Home Sick

In order to receive maximum benefit from their education, students need to be present every day that school is in session. Oregon law makes it the responsibility of parents to have their children in school, and the responsibil-

ity of the school to keep accurate records concerning each child's attendance. For this reason teachers ask children for a note from home after an absence. Acceptable excuses for absence include illness, death in the family or emergency situations, which make it impossible for a child to attend school.

Students are excused for doctor and dental appointments if they bring a note to their teacher that morning. Students who are tardy are expected to bring a

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note explaining their tardiness and report to the office when they arrive at school.

Top 10 Winter Driving Tips Can Reduce Auto Accidents

1. Slow down! The major cause of accidents during the winter is drivers going too fast or using their brakes

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aggressively. Drive according to road and weather conditions. Remember, the posted speed limits are for dry pavement and good weather conditions. The faster your vehicle is going, the more distance it will take to turn, slow, or stop.

- 2. Don't get overconfident with four or all-wheel drive vehicles. Four-wheel drive helps you get going quicker, but it won't help you stop faster. Slow down!
- 3. Leave plenty of room for stopping, brake early and look further ahead in traffic. It takes more time to stop when roads are wet or icy; actions by other drivers may alert you to problems and give you extra seconds to react. Bridge decks will ice up first, even when the rest of the road seems to be in good condition.
- 4. Don't use your cruise control or overdrive when it's

freezing (or colder).

5. Don't pump anti-lock brakes, focus on making smooth and controlled stops.



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- 6. Leave room for maintenance vehicles and plows. Stay at least 15 car lengths (200 feet) behind these vehicles and don't pass on the right.
- 7. Be prepared for the unexpected emergency. Always carry a first aid kit, map, ice scraper, snow brush, matches, candles, flashlight, warning triangles, flares, tow and battery jumping cables, a folding shovel, a bag of sand, a blanket, winter gloves, a cell phone if you have one, and an emergency HELP sign that you can put in the back window if you need help.
- Keep all your car's windows, mirrors and lights clear of snow and ice. Take an extra minute to clear ALL the snow and ice from your car.
- When possible, keep your fuel tank over half-full. If you do get stuck or stranded, your car's engine will be your only source of heat.
- 10. Check road and weather conditions BEFORE you leave, even if it is a local trip.

* School Spirit Shirts: It was discussed if we were interested in selling t-shirts and sweatshirts with a Clarkes logo



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
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put "Beavercreek History" in the subject field so the message will not be missed.

terms are four years in length.

"Through the Looking Glass Beavercreek Oregon a History"

This is Part LIV of a series of articles on the history of the Beavercreek area. Written by Jack Watts, whose family were some of the early settlers of the community. This history is reprinted from his original manuscript that had until now never been published, by permission of Gordon Watts. We dedicate this series to a man and his love of the Beavercreek countryside who took the time to stop, look, listen and capture for all, his rememberances. The Editor.

--- THE TEN O'CLOCK CHURCH (CONT.) ---

The Rev. Clarence Covell accepted a call for \$3,000 per year, with his first service held in March of 1953; and he was loved by all that knew him. On May 22, 1955, the church celebrated its 75th anniversary--a day of worshipthe sermon presented by the Rev. Paul Davies, the Conference Superintendent. There was a potluck dinner, followed by fellowship and reminiscences. On June 25, 1965, Reverend Covell tendered his resignation to be effective September, 1965. He was honored with the title of "Pastor Emeritus". The Rev. Richard Andrews of Newtown, North Dakota, accepted a call and was installed in May of 1966.

In 1967, Mrs. Eva Weber introduced an idea to Mrs. Anita Steiner and then to the ladies of the church. The idea was to make little frogs out of scrap cloth of different designs and colors, fill them with milo seed, and sell them for \$1.25 each to raise money for a new organ. And to say that the project was a success is to put it very mildly, because in October of 1967 the fund amounted to \$122; and in January of 1968, it was \$483; then in April it had grown to \$670. By December of 1968, it had reached the \$2,900 mark, and this provided seed money toward the building of a new parsonage. The Building Committee, consisting of the Board of Trustees, Carl Steiner, Milton Essig and Earl Robinson, was named to oversee the project. Pledges toward accomplishment amounted to \$11,000 over a period of five years; and the construction began in the summer of 1971 under the leadership of Mr. Marcus Essig,

who acted as the major contractor for the Building Committee.

Early in 1969, Reverend Andrews expressed a desire to continue his graduate work. The parish decided to retain him during the three years of schooling on a 60% time arrangement. However, Reverend Andrews resigned effective as of October 15, 1971. The search committee, headed by Mr. Wesley Droz, finally decided to call the Rev. Paul Dickey, who had served 22 years at Ocean Lake United Church of Christ in Lincoln City, Oregon.

Reverend Dickey, along with his wife Lois and his brother Phillip, were housed temporarily in a local apartment until the parsonage was completed. They became the first occupants of the new parsonage after the dedication ceremony in 1972. The Reverend Dickey was warmly received, fitting comfortably into the mold of minister -- a friendly neighbor who reached beyond his parish duties in visiting neighbors as well as the sick. After his tenure of five years of pastoral service, he announced his decision to retire in January of 1977, to be effective January 1, 1978, providing ample time to find a successor.

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Late in 1977, the Rev. Michael Hanback accepted a call, who also earned the love of his congregation and the respect of this community. He is currently still the pastor. Then in September of 1979, preparations got under way for the observance of the Centennial year.

Among the plans were to obtain the services of the Rev. Huenemann, who gave the dissertation in the German language. This was followed by a ham dinner and fellowship, with a large display of pictures and artifacts; and June 15, 1980, became a "Red Letter Day" for this congregation. Those involved in these preparations were: Mrs. Natalie Essig, historian; Mrs. Milanda Moser, the German translator; Milton Essig; and James Tompkins.

In bringing this to a close, we think of Mr. Harry Lauder, the Scotch comedian who said, "The town lamplighter carried a ladder, leaned it against the lamppost, and climbed the ladder and lighted one lamp after another, and it was plain to see the direction he had taken by the lights he lit". Now, over a span of more than a hundred years there has been a procession of ministers and laypersons of this Annual Sight & Hearing Screenings church who have kept the faith and have kept the light of people; those people have touched other people, and these, still others. And so these dedicated men and women of GOD go on living forever!


Softball Hitting and Pitching Clinics Offered at CCC

Public Comment Sought on Fate of Long Range Navigation System

The land based navigation system may be decommissioned later this year.

The Coast Guard Auxiliary wants to inform all mariners that the US Department of Transportation, in coordination with the Department of Homeland Security, is seeking public input on the fate of the Long Range Navigation System, otherwise known as LORAN-C.

The land based navigation system, operated by the US Coast Guard, may be scheduled for decommissioning later this year. At question is whether the system should be decommissioned, maintained "as is," or up-graded to an enhanced LORAN system (eLORAN), which could be used either as a back-up to the GPS (Global Position Satellite) System, or a complimentary system to GPS.

Clackamas County's Molalla Community Health Dental Clinic Offers Local, Affordable Dental Services

Starting January 10, 2007, the Clackamas County Community Health (CCCH) Molalla Center will offer affordable and convenient dental services in a new state-of-the-art dental wing. The new space, located at 218 Center Street in Molalla, has three dental chairs that will allow the clinic to offer dental services for the first time to Clackamas County residents in the Molalla area.

The clinic will be open three days a week, Monday, Wednesday and Thursday and will offer both day and

evening appointments. Wednesday and Thursday the clinic will be open from 8:30 a.m.- 4:30 p.m.; on Mondays noon-8:00 p.m.

The Molalla Center Dental Clinic will offer complete dental services – exams, cleanings, x-rays, fillings, extractions, crowns and root canals – to people with Oregon Health Plan Multicare insurance, those with private insurance and uninsured children of Clackamas County. They will also offer emergency dental services to uninsured adults. Fees are on a sliding scale. For more information about eligibility or to make an appointment, call the Molalla Dental Clinic at 503-723-2944.

The Clackamas County Molalla Center Dental Clinic is part of three primary care clinics operated by the Clackamas County Community Health Division (the other clinics are in Sandy and Oregon City).

The primary care clinics, which are open to all, accept Medicare, Oregon Health Plan (OHP) and private insurance and see uninsured and underinsured patients on a sliding fee scale. They offer comprehensive family medical care, including prenatal care for expectant mothers, pediatric and adult healthcare, senior healthcare, routine immunizations and physical exams and nutrition assistance/education for infants, children and mothers (WIC).

The clinic in Oregon City and now the clinic in Molalla also offer dental services. For more information about the primary care clinics or to schedule a primary care appointment, call 503-723-2944.

Extra Day to File 2006 Taxes

How can a local holiday in Washington, D.C., give Ore-

gon taxpayers an extra day to file their state and federal tax returns?

Here's how: Because April 15 falls on a Sunday, and April 16 is Emancipation Day, a legal holiday in the District of Columbia, the IRS is changing its tax-due deadline this year to April 17. Oregon is following suit.

This announcement came after the Department of Revenue printed its tax booklets. "Even though our publications say that April 16 is the deadline to file and pay taxes, we are joining the IRS in giving taxpayers an extra day," said personal income tax administrator Randy Evers.

The April 17 deadline applies to:

- All 2006 federal and state individual income tax returns.
- Requests for an automatic six-month tax-filing extension.
- All tax year 2006 balance-due payments.
- Tax year 2006 contributions to a Roth or traditional IRA.
- Individual estimated tax payments for the first quarter of 2007.
- Individual refund claims for tax year 2003, where the regular three-year statute of limitations is expiring.

\$24,273,300.00 in earnings from the Common School Fund to Oregon's 198 K-12 public school districts.

"Common School Funds make a difference for Oregon's school districts. Every dollar helps in the effort to ensure that all students in Oregon are successful," said State Superintendent of Public Instruction, Susan Castillo.

Twice yearly, a Common School Fund distribution is made according to a sliding-scale policy based on the annual change in value of the fund. The fund's balance is now over \$1 billion.

The State Treasurer, one of three members of the State Land Board, and the Oregon Investment Council invest the fund. By law, the funds are dedicated for "support and maintenance of common schools in each school district."

The population of children ages 4-20 determines each county's share of earnings.

Annual distributions in recent years have fluctuated from \$9 million to \$45 million depending on board policies and market conditions

The Constitution requires the Land Board to manage lands under its care to obtain the greatest benefit for Oregonians, consistent with the conservation of these resources under sound techniques of land management.

The agency leases range and agricultural land and waterways for a variety of business activities. The Oregon Department of Forestry manages forestland under contract with the Land Board.
