South Clackamas County Area Residents Invited To Participate In Phase 3 Of Complete Communities

OREGON CITY, Ore. — Phase 3 of Complete Communities for Clackamas County is underway and ready for another round of citizen participation and discussion.

Through six months of community meetings, a 1800-person telephone survey, and 1500 perceptionnaires, Clackamas County citizens were asked to answer the question, "What does a complete community mean to me?"

The results of this citizen discussion identified issues important to residents of the County including education, environmental quality, transportation, growth, public safety and more.

Draft recommendations to address these issues were developed by citizen participants at the Complete Communities Congress in October. Over the next two months, citizens of all ages have an opportunity to review and refine these and other local recommendations.

January 31, Beavercreek meeting hosted by Beavercreek CPO, 7:00 p.m., Beavercreek Grange Hall. Residents in Beavercreek and its surrounding communities are invited.

Phase 3 will culminate in a Community Congress on Saturday, February 24, 2001 at Oregon City High School. Recommendations will be presented to the Clackamas County Board of Commissioners for consideration in the Spring budget planning process.


On display will be dozens of Math activities for everyone to play, along with instructions on how to make them. Be sure to plan to attend this fun and educational family evening.

Fire District News

Clackamas County Fire District officials expressed their gratitude for the support shown the fire district by the recent bond election vote. "The results of the election have to be considered a landslide given the recent history of money measures in Clackamas County," said Hasina Squires, a member of the Clackamas County Budget Committee and a Government Relations Professional with Western Advocates Incorporated. Over 61 percent of those voting on the bond issue voted to approve the fire district \$9 million bond request.

The fire district will be using proceeds from the sale of the bonds, to construct a new fire station for the Beavercreek area on property just south of the Beavercreek Grade School. Work is underway with the fire district's architectural firm, Group Mackenzie, on a design for the new fire station. The Beavercreek CPO was asked to appoint a community member to participate in the visioning and design process of the new station.

Lieutenant Ken Johnson, who is responsible for the Clarke's community fire station (station 13) has announced that he will be retiring the first week of January 2001. Lieutenant Johnson began his fire service career in Pocatella, Idaho in 1962. From there he took a job in Edmonds Washington. In 1982 he moved to Oregon to work for the Happy Valley Fire District. Happy Valley was one of the first fire districts to consolidate into Clackamas County Fire District, which was the predecessor fire district to Clackamas County Fire District No. 1. Fire Chief Randy R. Bruegman stated, "Ken has been an example for other fire district employees in the way he has taken charge of special projects in the Clarkes and Highland area. He has done a great job for citizens of the fire district and we will miss his sense of humor and his dedication. But we know that his retirement is well-deserved."

Operation Santa Claus completed its food and toy collection parade in the Beavercreek and Clarkes area.

One of parades was in cooperation with the Beavercreek Lions and the Beavercreek Boosters. The donations given in the Beavercreek area will be supplemented with food and gifts collected in other parts of the fire district to meet some of the needs of our less fortunate neighbors. 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Carus CPO Spotlight

Highway 213 & the Oregon State Police

No one can deny that the Highway 213 Corridor is a dangerous highway. In the past two years several additional Oregon State Police troopers have been added to increase enforcement and provide additional safety for Hwy. 213 Corridor residents.

Traffic enforcement, public safety, fish and game wardens and detectives among others, are all areas that will be impacted by Governor Kitzhaber's proposed 17% cut in OSP funding.

Between July 1, 2001 and 2005, 50% of the OSP force will be retiring. It takes almost a year after hiring for a trooper to be trained. Many years would be needed to gain the type of cumulative experience that will no longer be with us in a few short years. Every trooper is needed.

The two resident troopers in the Molalla area would likely be cut. Satellite OSP offices at the new Molalla Shopping Center and at Carus Elementary could also be closed. Who would be there to use them?

Not only would vital enforcement be reduced, but also the police presence in our communities would be gone. The ongoing building of rapport with students, with the school district and with other residents throughout our communities would be a casualty of this disastrous proposal.

Carus CPO, working with the OSP, established the first citizen volunteer group in this area. The OSP radar trailer, traffic radar speed checks, traffic surveys and counts in which we mutually participate, have made a significant difference in our safety and comfort level on Hwy. 213.

Two years ago our citizens supported the OSP effort to increase their presence in our community. The governor and legislators supported that increase because it was important to us all. If it was important to them then why isn't it important to them now? It is certainly important to us.

Because of the proposed 17% cut, the OSP recruit school scheduled for January, to train the 100 previously authorized troopers was cancelled. We are now being deprived of these troopers. We don't want to go back to the time, two years ago, when the one assigned trooper for this area had a patrol assignment that stretched from Estacada, through Hwy. 211, through Hwy. 213, through I-205, to the junction of I-84.

The OSP has supported our safety and livability efforts in the past. Now is the time to support their continuing efforts to keep us safe and our area livable by writing, phoning, faxing, or E-mailing our legslative representatives and Governor Kitzhaber. Urge them to reconsider and resist efforts to withdraw funding (Cont on Page 5, Col 1- Carus CPO Spotlight)


Clarkes School PTA News

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Victim Recovering

Those of you who read the "Bulletin" last month will remember that I did an article regarding the head-on collision which occurred on the evening of November 14, 2000, in the downtown core area, involving a 1998 Ford Escort driven by Tony Windon of Canby and a 4x4 pickup driven by Jeff Crites of Portland.

I talked to Tony's wife on December 18th and Tony is making a miraculous recovery.

Tony was in a coma for some time and had a tracheotomy to assist his breathing. Apparently the 4x4 pickup not only hit the Ford Escort head-on, but actually drove up over the top of it causing severe head and shoulder injuries to Mr. Windon.

Mr Windon is now in physical therapy and the doctors are amazed at his progress. By the time you read this Tony should be home with his family for the Holidays, but will require more rehabilitation as he recovers from his injuries.

Mr. Windon's 3 year old son, Anthony, who was in the back seat of the car in a child restraint seat was very lucky and only suffered bruises and was released from the hospital that same evening, but his mother says that every time he hears sirens now he thinks that someone has died as no one was sure that his father would survive the accident.

What a trauma for a three year-old to have to go through. Hopefully since he is so young time will make him forget that night.

Tony's wife is just glad that her husband and son are lives back on track.

So let's slow down everybody... before it is too late! Next time it might be your loved one! The Editor
