#### "Beavercreek Oregon a History Through the Looking Glass"

This is Part XVII of a series of articles on the history of the Beavercreek area. Written by Jack Watts, whose family were some of the early settlers of the community. This history is reprinted from his original manuscript that had until now never been published, by permission of Gordon Watts. We dedicate this series to a man and his love of the Beavercreek countryside who took the time to stop, look, listen and capture for all, his rememberances. The Editor.

#### --- THE BIG FIRE ---

In the early morning of October 11, 1929, we were awakened by screams coming from the bedroom of our neighbors, the Londergans, informing us that there was

a fire at the store. We had a Model T Ford in the garage, but we felt that we could get to the store quicker by the time we could have gotten it out and going. Perhaps it gave us time to pull on our clothes as we ran; anyway, we were still buttoning up when we arrived.

The fire had broken out in the warehouse that housed the truck and cars near the Telephone Office. Behind the cars was the Havill's cow. Mr. Havill rushed in and turned the cow out and was able to save his little Dort car; he tried valiantly to save the truck, but failed. He had a very close call; the fire and resulting heat became so intense that he was indeed fortunate to escape with his life. He was singed and blistered about the face and hands as well as his hair. All this happened long before there was a dream of a fire department. The telephone operator, or "Central", spread the word with a general "ring" (three long rings) and soon the place was alive with people. The neighbors worked hard and long doing yeoman service. There were five who climbed the water tower with buckets. Besides myself, there was Dick Bohlander, Jimmy Sullivan, Gene Smith, but the fifth

name escapes my memory. A hole was chopped in the roof of the tower and one person climbed through to the roof. The rest of us draped our tummies over the edge of the water tank and dipped water and passed it through the jagged hole in a desperate effort to save the tower and our water supply. It was a rather frightening experience because the fire from the garage kept us busy putting fires out on the tower. We were in an extremely dangerous situation and needed to be constantly on the lookout to keep abreast of what was happening below us. When flames broke out, we would have to douse them quickly.

The faithful old gas engine kept chugging away, and by saving the tower we were able to keep water in the hoses manned by men who were standing on the roof of the warehouse. They were up there because the heat was so intense that it was impossible to stay on the ground.

When eventually the danger had subsided, we discovered that the garage, the warehouse beside it, the Telephone Office, and Mr. W.E. Jones's barn had all burned to the ground. The electricity was the first thing to go out when the fire started, and it was indeed fortunate that the pump was powered by a gasoline engine. While it was a tragic fire, it is certain that not only would the store have burned, but many thought that the cottage behind the store would have burned also and because of the prevailing winds the house across Kamrath Road at the corner and the Grange Hall were all in danger.

At about the time the Havills were moving their store buildings, the Farmers Union, who held their meetings in the hall above the Telephone Office, were discussing plans to establish a cheese factory. This was believed to be early in 1921. Eventually the plans for the cheese factory were abandoned and they decided instead to organize a cooperative store.

## Fatal Auto/Pedestrian Crash Takes the Life of an Elderly Beavercreek Woman

Shortly after 6:00 a.m. on the morning of December 3rd, 89 year-old Mary Moser was struck by a westbound 1996 blue Nissan pickup truck driven by Bruce Alan Priem, 45, of Beavercreek, as she crossed S. Beavercreek Road in front of her home located at 25790 S. Beavercreek Road, Beavercreek. She was pronounced dead at the scene by emergency responders.

Investigators with the department's Crash Reconstruction and Forensics Team (CRAFT) believe that the victim was in the process of crossing the road to get her newspaper when she was struck.

The victim was in Mr. Preim's lane of travel and he was unable to avoid her. The speed limit in this area is 55 MPH and it was dark. It was not foggy in this area at the time of the crash.

Alcohol, drugs and speed did not appear to be a factor in this crash.



So... how many of you were lucky enough to find that Santa Claus had left you a new Windows XP computer under the tree for Christmas? I'll bet a lot of you did!

There are two things that you have got to do as soon as you get that puppy all hooked up and are ready to go:

1. you need to go into your dialup connection (this is what dials the phone and lets you get onto the World Wide Web, aka, the Internet) and turn on XPs built in firewall. This firewall will only control what tries to get into your computer from the outside. It does nothing to help you monitor what your machine is letting go out to the outside. But it is a good place to start.

Click on the start button, click on "Connect To", click on "show all connections", RIGHT click on BCT Online or whatever you named your dialup connection, left click on "properties" in the box that pops up, click on the tab at the top of this dialog box that is named "Advanced". The first selection in the next dialog box you see should

have a box where you can left click and place a check mark where it says "Protect my computer and network by limiting or preventing access to this computer from the Internet." This will not stop you from surfing the Web and getting your email, it will just make your ports unseen by hackers. The only thing you need to do now is be sure that you left click on the "OK" button at the bottom of this dialog box. If you don't, it will not save what you have just done.

2. Next you need to go online to the Windows Update site and download all the critical patches and security fixes that have come out since the technician that built your system did them during the building of your system. Your technician did do all the updates for your computer when he built it didn't he or she?

To find out, once you are online, go to:

http://v4.windowsupdate.microsoft.com/en/default.asp

There should be a green arrow with "Scan for updates" next to it. Click on the arrow. You might get a message that asks to let Microsoft download a program to your system. Click "OK." This program will install the latest updating software on your system so that it can be determined if there are any updates that you need.

If it finds critical updates and service packs they will show in an area on the left. Click on these for more info to continue. The critical updates and service packs are the most important, but peek around and see what is available.

I have had less than stellar results from downloading and installing the driver updates. If it isn't broke, don't fix it, is always a good idea.

Now that that is all done... and it could take a while depending on how up to date you system was when it shipped, you still are not done. You still need to get virus scanning set up and make sure that you keep it updated. Out of date virus software does you no good. You might as well not have it all!

When you log onto "Bctonline" and click on the "Services" tab at the top of the screen you will be able to get some information regarding the "Junk Mail Assistant" and "Anti Virus Protection Assistant". At press time the page just had general information as these services are not quite ready yet. There is also information on Propel Accelerator. This program will speed up your dialup conection.

I'm testing Propel Accelerator now and will let you know what I think later. Oh, Check page 14 to an update on "Windows Update". it might be of interest to some. Well that's it for this month. Stay tuned for future info. Sharon




#### Beavercreek Charitable Trust News


### Jacquie Fitch Achieves National Board Certification

Jacquie Fitch, fourth grade teacher at Carus, is one of 8,195 elementary and secondary school teachers nationwide who achieved National Board Certification in 2003, according to the National Board for Professional Teaching Standards (NBPTS). This achievement brings the total number of National Board Certified Teacher to 32,130.

Jacquie Fitch has been teaching for 8 years and holds a degree in Elementary Education. She is the first teacher in the Canby School District to achieve this certification. Carus Elementary School honored Jacquie's achievement on December 11th from 3:45 p. m. to 5:00 p.m. in the Carus Library.

National Board Certification is the highest credential in the teaching profession. A voluntary process established by NBPTS, certification is achieved through a rigorous performance-based assessment that takes between one and three years to complete and measures what accomplished teachers should





know and be able to do.

#### **Testing at Carus**

Students in 4th grade have had the opportunity to take the state assessment test on the computer recently. The paper pencil test is being replaced with TESA - Technology Enhanced Student Assessment System. Students in grades 3 - 6 will have two opportunities throughout the year to take this test. After each opportunity we will analyze the data and see where the strengths and challenges of our students are. This information will then be used to make instructional decisions for our students. The results are sent to us from the state and take a few weeks to get to us once the testing is completed. The students who have tested so far are doing their best and we are excited to get the results.

#### **Carus Food Drive**

The Carus Food Drive to benefit needy families in Clackamas County began on December 1st and ran through December 12th. Children were encouraged to bring non-perishable canned or boxed foods. The class that brought in the most canned food per student was to be awarded an ice cream party.
