The Hamlet purchased new energy efficient LED lights this vear for the tree. This saved on the power needed to keep the tree lit during the holidays. Oregon's New ReliaCard Contract a Victory for Consumers

Oregon consumers have been handed a win with the news that Treasurer Ted Wheeler has secured an improved deal with U.S. Bank on the state's ReliaCard contract.

The ReliaCard is used to access unemployment benefits and child support payments. Research by EFO and SEIU drew critical attention to the program in April, and Oregon's fee-heavy contract has been the subject of several national and regional news reports since.

National Consumer Law Center released a report on unemployment benefit cards in May, in which Oregon received a "thumbs down" ranking for the fees associated with the U.S. Bank-issued card.

According to Treasurer Wheeler's office, Oregon's new contract eliminates several of the penalties currently in place, such as overdraft enrollment and charges to use a U.S. Bank ATM or visit a U.S. Bank teller. The new contract will begin January 1, 2012.

"Oregonians took a stand and demanded a fair deal, and they got it," said EFO Executive Director Angela Martin. "Victories such as this are achieved through public engagement and strong leadership. This is not the end of bank fees by any means, which is why we look forward to more politicians taking a cue from Treasurer Wheeler in doing what's right for Oregon consumers and their pocket-books."

Leadership Changes at the Oregon State Library

The State Library Board of Trustees voted today to appoint MaryKay Dahlgreen as Interim State Librarian at the

Oregon State Library, beginning on January 1st.

Dahlgreen will replace Jim Scheppke who will retire after 20 years as the Oregon State Librarian at the end of December. The Board also voted to immediately reopen the search process for the next Oregon State Librarian.

MaryKay Dahlgreen has been the Program Manager for Library Development Services at the State Library since 2005 and she has worked at the State Library since 1996.

Also at the Board meeting on December 9th, Jim Scheppke announced his appointment of Arlene Weible to be Acting Program Manager for Government Research Services, the post previously held by Hulshof-Schmidt. Weible is the Government Documents and Technical Services Librarian at the State Library, where she has worked since 2006.

Clackamas County Offers Free Class for Women Affected by Domestic Violence

Domestic violence affects families across Clackamas County. Abusers hurt their victims economically, emotionally, verbally and sexually. They usually control their violence carefully, and make sure their behavior is kept out of the public eye.

Sponsored by Clackamas County Community Corrections, the Women's Empowerment Project is a class designed specifically for women who were in abusive relationships in the past, or are concerned about their current relationship.

Classroom topics include: understanding the cycle of violence, safety planning, accessing community resources, and establishing healthy relationships. The focus throughout the classes is on what the participants can control in their lives, and how they can develop a strong skill set for self care and self empowerment.

Class starts the first week in January. Sign up is going on now. The class is 14 weeks long, and meets once a week for two and half hours. The class is free.

New Veterans' Home Community Center Opens in The Dalles

The Oregon Veterans' Home hosted a dedication ceremony on December 2, 2011, to commemorate the new Stan and Jean Adams Veterans' Community Center located at the Home.

More than 100 residents and employees of the Home joined the celebration where they were addressed by State Rep. John Huffman, The Dalles Mayor Jim Wilcox,

Wasco County Commissioner Rod Runyon, Westcare Management Senior Vice President Van Moore and ODVA Director Jim Willis. Congressman Greg Walden addressed the audience by recorded video to commemorate the center's opening.

After the dedication, attendees enjoyed a concert performance by the singing trio, Two Sisters and a Mister.

The community center was a much needed addition to the Home. Developed by the Oregon Department of Veterans' Affairs (ODVA), the \$3 million, 9,300 square foot center will provide a space for resident activities including group events, computer use, widescreen television viewing, theater and musical entertainment.

Funds for the community center were made possible through a grant from the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act in coordination with the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs Construction Grant program. Veterans' Home residents Leo "Bud" Hammel and John Sullivan donated the money necessary to purchase the furnishings in the lounge and library areas. All the furniture was purchased through Hampton Furniture in The Dalles.

The new center is named for a former resident of the Home, Stanley T. Adams and his wife Jean. Adams was a World War II enlisted soldier who received the military's highest decoration, the Medal of Honor, for his heroic actions in the Korean War.

Jean Adams, also a World War II veteran, volunteered her time to the Home, both while her husband resided there, and after his death in 1999. After her passing in 2008, Jean donated Stan's Medal of Honor to the Home and left a generous contribution from their estate. The Medal of Honor is proudly displayed in the Home's main lobby area.

Opened in the fall of 1997, the Home can care for as many as 151 residents who need long-term skilled nursing, Alzheimer's and memory-related care. This care is available to veterans, their spouses and parents of children who died while serving in the U.S. Armed Forces.

Three Transported to OHSU After Sunday Evening Crash in Colton

Two deer crossing Highway 211 caused a two-car crash that sent three people to the hospital with non-life threatening injuries Sunday evening in Colton.

A Silverton woman driving a small SUV with three teenage passengers slammed on her brakes to avoid striking the deer in the roadway, causing a mid-sized sedan to rearend her vehicle shortly before 6 p.m. on Highway 211 near S. Schieffer Road, said Colton Fire District Assistant Chief Gary Anderson. The sedan hit at a high impact, he said, as it was traveling on a 55 miles per hour portion of the highway.


The woman and teens were traveling home to Silverton from Mt. Hood after a day of snowboarding, Anderson said.

Emergency responders were told the teenage male in the back seat of the SUV briefly lost consciousness after the

wreck, but he was conscious when they arrived on the accident scene, Anderson said. The boy was transported by a Life Flight helicopter to Oregon Health and Science University Hospital as a precaution.

"We always want to err on the side of safety for our patients." Anderson said.

The woman and her son were transported by ambulance to OHSU for treatment. The teenage girl in the car was not injured and was picked up by friends who were also travel-



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ing down from the mountain, not far behind them. The sedan's two occupants did not appear injured, Anderson said.

One lane on the highway was temporarily blocked while firefighters and police cleared the scene. Both vehicles were towed with extensive damage.

Oregon State Police, Clackamas County Sheriff's Office

and Molalla Fire District also assisted on the scene.

Clackamas County Residents Invited To Nominate Heritage Trees

The Clackamas County Heritage Tree Program encourages residents and property owners to identify and protect individual trees or groups of trees that meet one or more of the following qualifications.

Specimen: A tree of exceptional size, form or rarity, or horticultural value

Historic: A tree of exceptional age, and/or associated with or contribution to an historic structure or district or with a noted person or historic event

Landmark: A tree that is a prominent identifying feature of a community

Collection: A group of trees in a notable grove, avenue or other planting

Heritage Tree nominations for 2012 must be completed and turned in to the Clackamas County Planning Division no later than Wednesday, Feb. 15. Nominated trees will be inspected by an arborist to ensure criteria are met, and then forwarded to the County's Historic Review Board. The Historic Review Board will recommend trees to be recognized to the County Board of Commissioners, which will designate Heritage Trees in May (National Historic Preservation Month). Nominators will be asked to pay a \$32 fee to help pay for the cost of Heritage Tree plaques and stakes.

In the four years since the program began, more than 350 trees throughout unincorporated Clackamas County have been recognized as Heritage Trees. Anyone may nominate a tree or trees, but the person or organization that owns the land on which the tree stands must consent to the nomination. Trees located in County right-of-way are not eligible. There are no regulatory restrictions associated with the designation.

Landowners whose nominations are approved have three options for recognition:

At no charge to landowner: Recognition at a Board of County Commissioners meeting, and on the County website and in the County newsletter, *Citizen News*;

For \$40: All of the above, plus a plaque, and a stand on which to display the plaque;

For \$75: All of the above, plus recognition as a contributor to the Clackamas County Heritage Tree Program.

Oregon Nursery Growers Applaud Senator Merkley's "National Christmas Tree Week" Resolution

The Oregon Association of Nurseries (OAN) have praised the U.S. Senate for unanimously passing Senate Resolution 341, which designated the first full week of December in 2011 as "National Christmas Tree Week."

The resolution recognizes the important environmental, historical, and economic role that real Christmas trees have played in the nation's

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history.

"This resolution honors the joy that Christmas trees bring to families every December, and also the Oregon farms and families that produce these beautiful trees," said Oregon's Senator Jeff Merkley (D-Ore.), who introduced SR 341. "While Christmas trees are grown in all 50 states, they are vitally important to Oregon's economy. We produce more Christmas trees than any other state in the union, and we are proud of that tradition."

This year in Oregon, growers estimate that 6.6 million Christmas trees will be harvested and delivered to locations across the globe. There are currently approximately 60,000 Oregon acres in Christmas tree production, representing nearly \$100 million in sales value.

"Sen. Merkley is telling the nation what we know to be true in Oregon: that the Christmas tree industry is an economic asset and job provider for our state," OAN Executive Director Jeff Stone said.

SR 341 encourages Americans to celebrate the joy that real Christmas trees bring to families across the country. It also encourages the recycling of Christmas trees following the holiday season. "Nothing else brings in the holiday cheer than celebrating the holidays with family and friends surrounded by the aroma of a fresh cut Christmas tree," said Hollie Spivey, owner of HH Christmas Trees and president of the OAN Christmas Tree Chapter. "We are thankful to Sen. Merkley for his resolution and support of our industry."

The Oregon Association of Nurseries, based in Wilsonville, represents more than 1,200 wholesale growers, retailers, landscapers and suppliers. Oregon's ornamental horticulture industry is the state's largest agricultural commodity, with annual sales of more than \$670 million. For information visit our website at www.oan.org.

Its mission is "To provide humanitarian assistance to those who have been adversely affected by disaster, tragedy, injury or other misfortune, and to work actively toward preventing or minimizing the impact of such misfortunes in our community."

Throughout the year, firefighters and other emergency service agencies not only assist citizens during the emergency events in their lives such as fires, accidents, medical emergencies, etc., but help afterwards in various ways to minimize the effects of these events for these citizens. The Foundation also provides funds for Operation Santa Claus.

Along with the Fire District, the Foundation consists of other emergency service agencies – Boring Fire District, Clackamas County Sheriff's Office, Milwaukie Police Department and Oregon City Police Department.

When any of these agencies respond to a call and a need is determined, Foundation funds are used to help those citizens. In addition to the annual golf tournament that raises funds for the Foundation, the Foundation will be having a dinner/auction on March 10, 2012. More information to follow.

Birds of Prey in a Sustainable Landscape

Mandy McGuire of the Oregon Zoo will bring a feathered friend from the Oregon Zoo for her program on native raptors in our landscapes. There are several theories on how a Labyrinth "works;" the results are what are most definable. Many people leave a Labyrinth walk feeling more relaxed, peaceful, with gained insights and/or a deepening of spiritual connection.

The four quarterly indoor walks offered at Beavercreek UCC will be wonderful opportunities for you to have a very different and meaningful spiritual experience within the context of a safe and loving community. We begin the evening by praying briefly together, blessing the labyrinth and the space. Then individuals begin to walk the path when ready. Most of the evening is spent in this quiet, meditative walking. To complete the evening we share a little and offer a prayer of thanks. 

Public Comment Sought For Oregon Health Plan Proposal

After months of work groups and community meetings around the State, the Oregon Health Policy Board has rolled out a preliminary proposal that changes the way the State delivers and pays for health care for low-income Oregonians.

The proposal is part of last year's House Bill 3650 which laid out the foundation for integrating physical, mental, dental and other care for the Oregon Health Plan.

HB 3650 calls for Coordinated Care Organizations, creating one budget, one point of accountability and one governing entity for care in local communities.

Today care is administered through a fragmented system that includes three kinds of health plans: 14 physical health organizations, nine mental health organizations and eight dental care organizations. The National Association of State Budget Officers' recent report shows that Medicaid costs are taking up an ever-increasing portion of State budgets. http://www.nytimes.com/2011/12/14/us/indownturn-medicaid-takes-up-more-of-state-budgets-analysis-finds.html

The solution, says Governor John Kitzhaber, is to change the business model for health care.

"The status quo isn't working. It is not geared toward improving health or delivering services efficiently," Governor Kitzhaber says. "When we spend ineffectively on health care it takes precious resources from education, public

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safety and other services. The draft CCO proposal takes

us one step closer to getting better health outcomes and lower costs."

The draft proposal makes preliminary recommendations for the criteria for establishing a Coordinated Care Organiza-

tion, how it should be governed and how the budget should be established. The proposal is posted at oregon. health.gov and the Oregon Health Policy Board is asking for public comment before discussing the next draft in January.

"There has been a broad public process in pulling together the pieces necessary to build a better health system," says Eric Parsons, chair of the Oregon Health Policy Board. "We hope that stakeholders, clients and anyone interested in the new vision for health care will stay involved as we prepare the final proposals for the Legislature."

Recommendations

In this draft, the board recommends:

- * The majority of the governing board for CCOs be made up of individuals bearing financial risk, and also reflect the needs of the communities CCOs serve.
- * All Medicaid dollars be included in the CCO budget with the exclusion of long-term care and mental health drugs and tie budgets to a fixed rate of growth rather than medical inflation.
- * CCOs partner with local public health authorities and hospital systems to develop a shared community needs assessment that includes a focus on health equity and disparities.

In addition, the proposal highlights key elements of HB 3650, which calls for an emphasis on primary care, prevention and coordination with counties.

Next steps

This is the first of two public comment periods on the CCO Implementation Proposal. Public comment on the draft will be accepted until Jan. 3, 2012.

At the Jan. 10, 2012 meeting of the Oregon Health Policy Board, members will review the next draft of the proposal, which will include projections for cost reductions to the state under a Coordinated Care Organization model. There will be one more round of public comment, then the final recommendations from the board will be sent to the Legislature before the February session.

If approved by State lawmakers, the proposal would be sent to the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) for review and approval. If accepted, the first CCO could potentially begin enrolling clients in the summer of 2012. Editors Note: Most readers will not get this information in time to give input, but you can still go to the websites and get more information.



Oregon's budget has necessitated cuts to a lot of programs - including some in forestry and the Oregon Department of Forestry's flagship publication, "Forests for Oregon" - but the magazine-turned-newsletter is still available online, and it's free.

In print since 1930, "Forests for Oregon" was known as "The Forest Log" in its early years. It may be one of the State's longest continuously printed publications. In more prosperous times, it was published 6 times/year, but over the years budget cuts have forced reductions to both its frequently and distribution.

Today, "Forests for Oregon" places its focus on forestry topics of interest to both family forestland owners (there are an estimated 65,000 family forestland owners in Oregon), and the general public.

Published quarterly, the short, pithy, full color 4-page publication addresses a wide range of forestry-related topics, including:

- * wildfire prevention and suppression
- * wildland/urban interface
- * reforestation
- * fish and wildlife habitat restoration
- * tax information and tax incentives
- * forest health
- * urban forestry topics including tree care
- * a Featured Tree column geared for urbanites
- * insects and disease
- * workshops and special events
- * legislative issues
- *updates from the state forester

Includes tips for small woodland owners

"Forests for Oregon" is a great information tool for small woodland owners," says Peter Daugherty, chief of ODF's Private Forests Division. "It has evolved into a publication that offers tips to family forestland owners on a variety of topics - from reforestation to fire prevention - they may find informative and helpful."



Civic Leader Dies

Chuck Clemans of Oregon City, a longtime educator, civic activist and supporter of the arts, passed away Thursday evening in a one-car crash in Mulino. He was 77.

Clemans was serving his second term on the Clackamas Community College Board after a 10-year stint as superintendent for the Oregon City School District. He was heavily considered for appointment to the vacant state superintendent of public instruction job in 1989, when Verne Duncan resigned for a job at the University of Portland.

But it was as a civic activist that Clemans made his greatest mark, standing up for environmental protection while par-



ticipating in beautification projects, promoting local business and defending civil rights. For his efforts, he was named Oregon City Citizen of the Year in 2009.

"He will leave a hole in so many parts of the community," said Alice Norris, for-

mer Oregon City mayor. "He was a teacher and a giver -- always. With his diverse interests, he touched so many communities of people."

Clemans served as president of the Oregon City-West Linn Rotary Club, chairman of the Community Plus Christmas Party and chairman of the Three Rivers Boy Scout Council. A history buff, he also served on the boards of the development committees for the Clackamas County Historical Society and the McLoughlin Memorial Association. He was president of the Portland Sate University Alumni Association, and was named the university's Outstanding Alumnus in 1994.

He taught public school administration at Lewis and Clark College and collective bargaining at Portland State.

He was a lifelong bicyclist, tennis player, boater and skier. As a young man, he used to race Lotus and Porsche sports cars.

Clemans was born in Camas, Wash., where he graduated from high school. He then attended Clark College in Vancouver, cementing his lifelong affection for community colleges. He was a member of Portland State University's first graduating class in 1956.

Clemans then taught in Portland Public Schools before completing a two-year hitch in the U.S. Army and returning

again to teaching. He eventually became director of governmental relations, serving as the school district's lobbyist in Salem and Washington, D.C.

In 1980, he was hired as Oregon City school superintendent, a job he held until 1990.

Meanwhile, he married attorney Nancy Hungerford in 1987. They honeymooned at Timberline Lodge, where they returned every year for their anniversary.

On July 4, he suffered a bad fall at the Oregon City Dock and spent more than 10 weeks in the hospital. When he was released, he immediately went back to work.

"Chuck very much believed in community service," said Hungerford. "What he could leave to the community was the thing most important to him.

Besides his wife, survivors include his sister, Lois Buhman of Newton, Wash.; brothers, Bill of Lake Stevens, Wash., and Lloyd of Battle Ground, Wash.; sons, Glen of Sherwood and Dean of Gresham; and three grandchildren

A memorial service is planned for Jan. 7, with arrangements to be announced.

In lieu of flowers, the family suggests contributions in his memory to the Clackamas Community College Foundation.
