Upcoming Tax Symposium Aims to Help Families With Forested Property

Does your family own forested land? Are you sometimes in need of accurate tax information and help related to forestland ownership?

There's little in the way of up-to-date, comprehensive information in one place regarding all aspects of forest-land taxes affecting Oregon families, but an upcoming symposium may help.

"Understanding Oregon's Family Forest Tax Landscape," a symposium to help landowners, foresters and others learn about the myriad of taxes related to forest ownership, is being held Monday, January 26, at Oregon State University in Corvallis. The symposium is sponsored by the Committee for Family Forestlands, which advises the Oregon Board of Forestry about matters affecting family forest owners, and the Oregon Small Woodlands Association, which represents small forest owners statewide.

Three Arrested in Online Underage Sex Sting

The Clackamas County Sheriff's Office Child Abuse Team and INTERCEPT conducted a sting December 5, 2014, and arrested three suspects on online child sexual corruption charges.

Detectives from the Clackamas County Sheriff's Office Child Abuse Team (CAT) and the Interagency Child Sex Exploitation Prevention Team (INTERCEPT) worked together during the online sting, posing as both male and female children on the Internet.

Within just a few hours during the sting operation, three subjects chatting with the detectives, and believing the detectives to be children, arranged to meet at an address for

what the subjects allegedly believed would be sex with underage boys and girls.

These three suspects were arrested upon arrival at the arranged meeting place and lodged at Clackamas County Jail on charges of Online Sexual Corruption of a Child in the First Degree.

The suspects, all arrested, are:

Richard Lester Biggs, 51 years old, of Oregon City Jeremy Justin Smith, 26 years old, of Milwaukie

Nixon Gray Lange, 28 years old, of Tigard

Detectives are also investigating the identity of four more suspects for the crime of Online Sexual Corruption of a Child in the Second Degree.

INTERCEPT comprises detectives from the Clackamas County Sheriff's Office, Washington County Sheriff's Office, Multnomah County Sheriff's Office, Department of Homeland Security Child Exploitation Section, and the Depart-

Glide Community Enhanced By Work of Local Artist

This past autumn, local artist/muralist Victoria Knight from the Upper Highland area in Beavercreek finished a 66'x15' exterior mural in the small community of Glide, Oregon.

Glide is northeast of Roseburg, Oregon on HWY 138 going toward Crater Lake. It is situated beside two colliding rivers, the North Umpqua and the Little River, a former Native American Umpqua Tribal winter site.

During the last two years, Thriving Waters, a local nonprofit agency that has been promoting culture, education and beauty, worked to bring a relevant and public mural


to downtown Glide. Their dedication and vision resulted in a large portion of the project funded by individual donations, the generosity of the Glide community and an



Oregon Community Foundation grant.

Because Victoria teaches quarterly painting classes at the Glide High School, she was approached about the job in August. The mural started 2 weeks later and took 5 weeks to complete - with the entire Glide community invited to take part. Participants ranged in age from 3 to 89, as well as volunteer local artists and even a few tourists.

The Glide Community Mural pays tribute to the town and the various elements it's best known for. Beside attention to its agricultural and timber industries, the origi-







- **Becky Holiday**. Track and field, 1999-2001. Two-time NWAACC women's pole vault champion. Holds pole vault record for CCC, NWAACC, NJCAA and University of Oregon. Second-place finish U.S. Olympic trials 2012.
- **Tim Williams**. Wrestling, 1970-72. Member of the 1971 national championship team. Two-time NJCAA national champion, 142-pound weight class.
- 2004 Women's Soccer Team. 20-0-2. The Cougar team won the NWAACC championship in its third season at CCC. The team compiled 17 shutouts in 22 total games. The team won the title game 6-0 setting the record for the most goals scored in an NWAACC championship game.

sumer complaints against ARS and issued a Notice of Intent to take disciplinary action in 2012. Upon learning of these complaints and the violations alleged by the CCB, ARS changed its policies and business practices to improve consumer services and to avoid future allegations of violations of the law or injury to consumers.

ARS reports that it has paid approximately \$350,000 in restitution to the customers who raised the complaints leading to the enforcement action and agreed to reimburse CCB for its costs associated with the investigation as well as pay a civil penalty.

The CCB's decision to settle this matter was in part based on an acknowledgement of ARS's actions and the lack of new complaints from consumers. "The practices and procedures put into place by ARS address CCB's concerns and provide an additional layer of protection for consumers, and the three years of probation will allow the CCB to ensure that these practices continue," CCB Administrator James Denno said.

Free Rides to Health Care Appointments for Oregon Health Plan Members Beginning Jan 1

Beginning January 1, 2015, the transportation service Ride To Care will provide free rides to covered health care appointments for Oregon Health Plan (OHP) members in Clackamas, Multnomah and Washington Counties who have no other transportation options.

This service is available for members of both of the Tri-County Coordinated Care Organizations (CCOs), Family-Care Inc. and Health Share of Oregon, who fit the criteria for approval.

OHP members who want to schedule their rides in advance or who have already pre-scheduled trips can contact Ride To Care to schedule or re-schedule their 2015 rides. Trips can be scheduled by phone or online, including up to three months in advance.

Ride To Care, a service of Access2Care, replaces the current non-emergency medical transportation (NEMT) service operated by TriMet.

Proposed BPA Rate Increase

To keep pace with needed investments in the Federal Columbia River Power System, which provides carbon-free hydropower at cost to Northwest public utilities, the Bonneville Power Administration has proposed a 6.7 percent average wholesale power rate increase for the fiscal year 2016-2017 rate period. BPA is also proposing a 5.6 percent increase in its transmission rates to sustain and expand the federal transmission system to meet regional needs, including renewable resource integration.

"During my time at BPA, I have become acutely aware of the economic impact our rates have on Northwest public utilities and the communities they serve," said Elliot Mainzer, BPA administrator and chief executive officer. "However, these rate increases are necessary to sustain the tremendous value of the Federal power and transmission system and to meet the electricity needs of the Northwest in a reliable and environmentally sustainable way."

In January, BPA began a discussion with the region about its proposed program levels, future costs and potential rates for fiscal years 2016 and 2017. At the outset of those discussions, BPA forecast double-digit increases for both its power and transmission rates. Over the next nine

months, BPA conducted extensive public review of its programs and budgets in a regional process called the Integrated Program Review.

The IPR process allows interested parties to see all relevant FCRPS spending level estimates in the same forum. The IPR occurs every two years, just before each rate case, providing participants with an opportunity to review and comment on BPA's program level estimates before spending levels are set for inclusion in the rate case. Program levels for fiscal years 2016 and 2017 were included in the Final IPR Close-out Report released in October of this year.

"Working closely with our customers and other regional stakeholders over the past nine months, we managed to significantly cut the forecasted rate increases," added Mainzer.

The rate proposals will be considered during a public rate-setting process beginning in early December and culminating in July 2015 decisions on final rates to take effect Oct. 1, 2015.

BPA is a nonprofit federal wholesale utility that receives no Congressional appropriations and must recover its costs through its rates. The new rates will affect local retail utilities differently depending on the amount of power and type of services they purchase from BPA. Local utilities ultimately determine the retail impact of BPA rates on individual businesses and residents.

Land Lease Offered

Oregon State University's North Willamette Research and Extension Center (NWREC), located just south of Wilsonville, is offering land on its experimental farm for lease during 2015. NWREC began their "Farmer to Farm" program in 2012 making land available to local farmers look-

ing to expand their production while working alongside the university's research and Extension staff. During 2014, three farmers were involved in the program on approximately 30 acres of land.

Mike Bondi, NWREC's Director, said, "We are interested in exploring ways we can work more effectively with local farmers, to meet their needs, and each gain by working side-by-side. We believe there are real benefits to the close collaboration of having production agriculture a part of what happens at NWREC. We believe we can all learn together." Last year's efforts included pumpkin seed production, fresh market vegetable production, and sugar beet seed research.

The North Willamette Research and Extension Center includes 160 acres of land that has served the needs of the agricultural industry for more than 50 years. Most of the current research is centered on nursery, berry, Christmas tree, vegetable and small farm specialty crops. Currently, about 50 acres of the farm are not occupied by research activities for the coming season. A portion of this area will be potentially available for the land lease project.

50 Years Later High-Water Signs Provide Reminder of 1964 Flood

In commemoration of the 1964 flood that devastated properties throughout the Willamette River basin, the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers is installing high-water signs in three river cities as reminders of the risks that floods continue to present.

Corps and City of Albany staff installed three highwater-mark signs at Monteith Riverpark in Downtown Albany at 11:00 a.m., on Friday, December 12, 2014, two weeks before the 50th anniversary of the 1964 Christmas flood. The signs are posted at the level flood waters reached at Ellsworth Street on December 4, 1861; December 24, 1964; and February 9, 1996. The signs also list the number of upstream dams in place at the time of the latter two floods and how much those dams reduced flood levels.

Albany is the farthest flood-affected city upstream to receive and install the high-water signs as part of a public outreach project to make people aware of flood history and flood risk in their area and to promote flood preparedness. Similar signs are being installed downstream in Turner and Oregon City, all at no cost to the cities.

The outreach project is coordinated by the Oregon Silver Jacket Team, a multiagency group focused on working together on flood issues. Agencies involved in the high-watermark sign project include the Oregon Department of Land Conservation and Development, Oregon Emergency Management Office, National Weather Service, U.S. Geological Survey, and the Corps.
