Clackamas Community College Graduation Held June 11th and 12th

Clackamas Community College celebrated 2015 graduation in two ceremonies in June.

On Thursday, June 11, 2015, students earning Adult High School Diplomas and General Educational Development (GED) graduated. Students earning certificates and degrees graduated on Friday, June 12. Both ceremonies took place in the Randall Gym.

On Thursday, June 16, 2015, students received their Adult High School Diplomas and 16 received their GEDs. The youngest graduate is 17 and the oldest is 33. The college will award 1,574 degrees for certificates for the academic year. About 300 graduates walked on Friday. The youngest graduate is 17, and the oldest is 76 years old.

Clackamas County Social Services Receives \$18,000 Grant

The Social Services Division of the Clackamas County Health, Housing and Human Services Department was recently awarded an \$18,000 grant to assist in the transportation of seniors and people with disabilities throughout the County.

These funds, which came from the Hugh G. Starkweather Fund of the Oregon Community Foundation, will support the expansion of services for Clackamas County Volunteer Connection's Transportation Reaching People (TRP) program.

"We are so grateful for these funds from the Oregon Community Foundation," said Clackamas County Social Services Division Director Brenda Durbin. "We've had to scale back the number of volunteer rides that we can offer due to a lack of funds for mileage reimbursement and staffing limitations. Our program provides a truly meaningful opportunity for volunteers, many of whom live with fixed incomes and would not be able to volunteer in this way without the financial support provided through the mileage reimbursement program."

The TRP program provides door-to-door transportation services to seniors and people with disabilities for medical appointments and other essential errands. The program, which provided more than 30,000 rides to people in 2014, uses both paid drivers and trained volunteer drivers to provide this service, which is a lifeline for isolated seniors and people with disabilities that are unable to access other transportation options. Funds received from the Hugh G. Starkweather Fund of the Oregon Community Foundation will be used to reimburse volunteer drivers for their mileage, increasing the number of rides provided by 20 percent.

The purpose of the Clackamas County Volunteer Con-

nection (VC) program is to improve the quality and delivery of social services in our community through volunteer opportunities, public and private partnerships, faith-based and nonprofit agencies, advocacy, education and empowerment. VC strives to strengthen the community by increasing opportunities for individuals and families to become more self-reliant, healthier, safer and connected. VC is funded in part by Social Services of Clackamas County, a 501(c)(3) organization dedicated to helping individuals with low incomes when no other resources are available.

Improved Economy Leads to Expanded Clackamas County DTD Public Service Hours

In response to an increase in customers, beginning Monday, June 8, 2015, the Clackamas County Department of Transportation and Development (DTD) will expand the hours of operation in its public service lobbies.

Effective June 8, the second and third floor DTD public service lobbies in the County Development Services Building in Oregon City will be open from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday-Thursday, and 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. on Friday. Currently the lobbies close at 3 p.m. Monday-Friday.

The expanded schedule will give residents, business people and developers four additional hours per week to meet in person with representatives from the following offices and divisions: Building Codes, Code Enforcement, County Surveyor, Development Services, Engineering, Planning & Zoning, Resource Conservation & Solid Waste, and Soils.

The Development Services Building is located on the County's Red Soils Campus at 150 Beavercreek Road in Oregon City. Information and links to all DTD services are available at www.clackamas.us/transportation/.

Order Replacement Boater Education Cards Online

Life jackets? Check. Fire extinguisher? Check. Food and water? Check. Boater education card? It's Friday night at 11 pm and you're leaving at dawn for the lake when you realize, "Oh no, what did I do with it. Is it in the boat?" No worries. With the Marine Board's new online storefront (open 24/7), boat operators can order a replacement boater education card and print out a temporary permit

and go boating right away. Boaters no longer have to call or visit the Salem office during business hours to verify they have a card, and then wait for snail mail for their replacement, which typically takes two to three weeks.

"This time every spring, boaters get their boats and gear prepped, and sometimes panic when they realize they can't find their card," says MariAnn McKenzie, Boater Education Coordinator for the Marine Board. "It's easy to go to our online registration system to order a replacement." The cost of a replacement card is \$8 and the storefront accepts most major credit cards.

Go to www.boatoregon.com and click on the RegLine icon from the homepage. If boaters have purchased an AIS permit, applied for a boater education card, or registered a boat,

the Marine Board's online storefront already has the boater's baseline data. Simply register to create an account. Once boaters establish a user name and password, they can login, and click on online services drop-down, and select the Boater Education Card Replacement Application link, then follow the directions. Once payment is verified, boaters will have the option to print a temporary permit, which is valid for up to 60 days and must be carried on-board the boat. If you need assistance with the online process, please contact the Education Section at the Marine Board at 503-378-8587.

The Mandatory Education law was implemented in 2001 and requires boaters to take an approved boating safety course, apply for a boater education card and carry it with them on the water when operating a powerboat over 10 horsepower. The program was phased in by age beginning in 2003 and after 2009, all boaters are required to take a boating safety course. The card costs \$10 and is good for life. McKenzie adds, "Remember to make sure you have your card with you when you're out on the water. It's a Class D violation and boaters could get a \$110 fine."

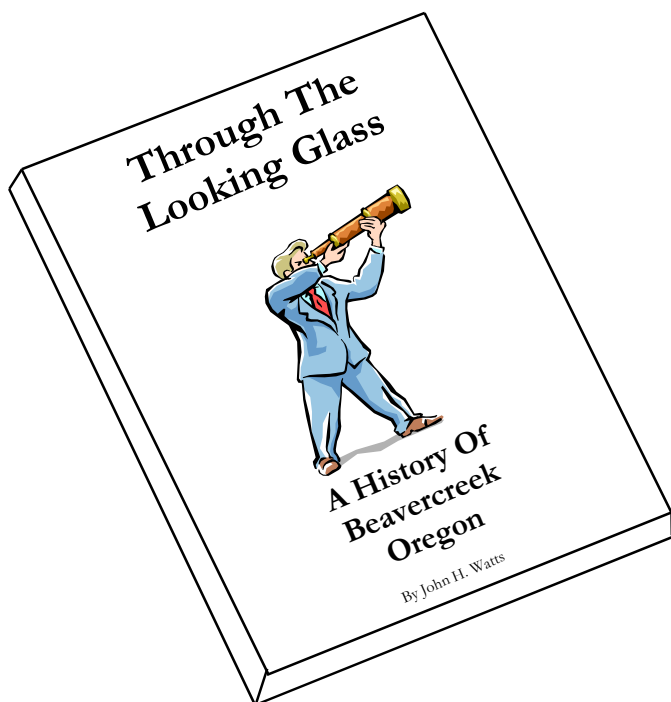

In his most recent position as provost, his responsibilities included serving as the university's chief academic officer, overseeing all academic and student engagement operations, as well as strategic planning, assessment and accreditation. He supervised the dean of students with responsibility for retention, supervised all academic deans and contributed to partnerships with industry and higher education.

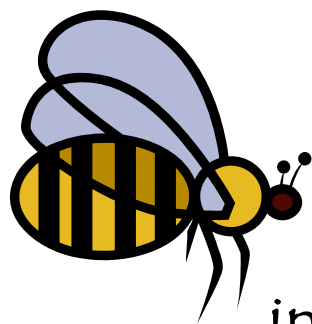

WARNING: Variation on Jury Duty Scam

Clackamas Repertory Theatre opened its 11th season Friday, June 26, with Tennessee Williams' classic play, "Cat on a Hot Tin Roof."

The production features five-time Drammy award-winning actor Ernie Casciato as Big Daddy, Portland favorite Tom Walton as Brick and Clackamas Rep company member Heather Ovalle as Maggie. David Smith-English directs Williams' 1977 revision of this iconic play, one of the most important American plays of the 20th century.

The original production opened on March 24, 1955. Directed by Elia Kazan, it starred Barbara Bel Geddes as Maggie, Ben Gazzara as Brick and Burl Ives as Big Daddy. It ran for 694 performances, won the Pulitzer Prize for drama and was nominated for the Tony Award.

Writing the initial version was a formidable task. Williams wanted Elia Kazan to direct Cat because they had successfully worked together before. However, Kazan was reluctant to commit himself as he thought the script too short and that the dramatic integrity of the play called for a more complete three-act treatment. Kazan won that round and another very important battle: as originally conceived, Big Daddy did not appear at all after the second act. Kazan wanted him back in the third act as a catalyst for the play's eventual dénouement.

"Cat on a Hot Tin Roof" runs through July 19. Performances take place Thursdays through Saturdays at 7:30 p.m. with Sunday matinees at 2:30 p.m. All performances are in the Niemeyer Center/Osterman Theatre on the campus of Clackamas Community College. Season tickets and single tickets may be purchased at www.clackamasrep.org or

We ask that people remain vigilant and continue to report these and similar efforts to defraud people. In addition to contacting local law enforcement, victims should contact the Federal Trade Commission's scam line to report any fraud or scam. You can report to the FTC online or by phone at 1-877-FTC-HELP.

Suspects involved in this type of scam often prey on our most vulnerable citizens and the elderly. This may be a good time to check with those in our lives who are vulnerable and remind them of the need to remain vigilant.

Preliminary Health Insurance Rate Decisions for 2016 Released

Beginning June 18, 2015, Oregon consumers can see the Oregon Insurance Division's preliminary decisions for 2016 individual and small employer health insurance rates. The division, part of the Oregon Department of Consumer and Business Services, must approve any rates before they can be charged to policyholders.

Health insurance rates are an estimate of future expenses, including medical and prescription drug claims costs and administrative expenses. These estimates are based on historical data and forecasts of future trends. When developing 2014 and 2015 rates, there was no claims data available for plans sold since the implementation of the Affordable Care Act. This data was available for the first time when setting 2016 rates.

With 2014 claims and cost information in hand, Insurance Division actuaries determined that the cost of providing coverage for individual plans in Oregon was \$830 million, while premiums were only \$703 million. This means costs exceeded rates by \$127 million, or an average of \$624 per person.

"As regulators, our mission is to protect Oregon's insurance consumers. That means consumers are not overcharged for health insurance, but it also means that rates must cover the cost of patients' medical bills when they go to the doctor, hospital, or pharmacy," said Insurance Commissioner Laura Cali. "We have proposed increased rates in order for consumers to continue counting on the coverage they have purchased."

ODF Increases Fire Prevention Restrictions in North Cascades

News Release from Oregon Dept. of Forestry
Posted on FlashAlert: June 22nd, 2015 1:27 PM

Increasing wildfire danger has prompted the Oregon Department of Forestry (ODF) to tighten public fire prevention restrictions in its North Cascade District, which provides wildfire protection to private and public forestlands in Clackamas, Marion, northern Linn and eastern Multnomah counties. On June 13, 2015 a "Regulated-Use" closure went into effect, aimed at reducing the chance of fires starting from public activities in the forest.

The following activities are restricted or prohibited:

- * Smoking is prohibited while traveling, except in vehicles on improved roads.

- * Open fires are prohibited, including campfires, charcoal fires, cooking fires and warming fires, except in designated areas. Portable cooking stoves using liquefied or bottled fuels are allowed. Open fires are allowed if conducted in compliance with a valid Burning Permit issued pursuant to ORS 477.515.

- * Chainsaw use is prohibited between the hours of 1 p.m. and 8 p.m. Chainsaw use is permitted at all other hours, if the following firefighting equipment is present with each operating saw: one ax, one shovel, and one 8-ounce or larger fire extinguisher. In addition, a fire watch is required for at least one hour following the use of each saw.

- * Cutting, grinding and welding of metal is prohibited between the hours of 1 p.m. and 8:00 p.m. At all other times

the area is to be cleared of flammable vegetation and the following fire equipment is required: one ax, one shovel, and one 2-1/2 pound or larger fire extinguisher in good working order.

- * Use of motor vehicles, including motorcycles and all-terrain vehicles, is prohibited, except on improved roads and except for vehicle use by a landowner and employees of the landowner on their own land while conducting activities associated with their livelihood.

- * Possession of the following firefighting equipment is required while traveling in a motorized vehicle, except on Federal and State highways, County roads and driveways: one shovel and one gallon of water or one 2-1/2 pound or larger fire extinguisher, except all-terrain vehicles and motorcycles, which must be equipped with an approved spark arrestor in good working condition.

- * Mowing of dried grass with power-driven equipment is prohibited between the hours of 10 a.m. and 8 p.m., except for the commercial culture and harvest of agricultural crops.

- * Use of fireworks is prohibited.

- * The release of sky lanterns is prohibited. (These two items are banned in fire season, not part of Reg-Use)

- * The discharging of exploding targets or tracer ammunition is prohibited.

- * Blasting is prohibited.

- * Any electric fence controller in use shall be: 1) listed by a nationally recognized testing laboratory or certified by the Oregon Department of Consumer and Business Services; and 2) operated in compliance with manufacturer's instructions.

The second guest speaker was Lt. Jason Franklin from Beavercreek Fire station #10 who was accompanied by three other firemen. Jason spoke about wildfire prevention.

All dead materials should be removed from around your buildings for 30 feet. You should also trim your trees regularly. There should be 10 feet between the branches between trees. Fire resistant plants should also be used. Fire resistant plants have a low oil content. From 30-60 feet keep the grass mowed, etc.

Firemen are available to come to your home and evaluate your risk and show you how to minimize the impact in case a fire happens.

The third guest speaker was Joe Maresh, President of the Portland Metro Beekeepers Association. The group meets on the second Tuesday of the

food to sustain the colony. The bees will depend upon you to provide them food to make it through the winter months. Some resources he mentioned was Ruhl Bee Supply, the Oregon State Beekeepers Association and the Oregon Master Beekeepers Association.

Many times people decide to raise bees, buy them, but are not successful. Bees need to be treated like you would any other livestock you own. They need care. One to two colonies require about one day a week of your time. Honey bees are not native to the Americas.

They originated in Europe and Asia.

To buy a colony of bees could cost up to \$150.00. The cost to maintain the colony runs about \$800.00/year.

Reports: Christine Kosinski, Corresponding Secretary, gave a Transportation report. She announced that HB 2633A that addresses landslides has passed. The Beaver-

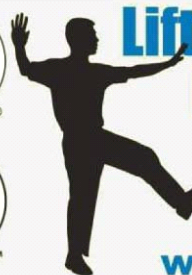

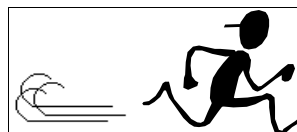
