#### Now You See it, Now You Don't!

Or, maybe that should be you don't see it, now you do... oops! Or... things can happen in the blink of an eye... literally.

Perhaps, those of you who travel down Beavercreek Road on your way to work in the morning may have noticed on the morning of April 26th the body of a dead Angus cow! Yes, you read it right... a cow! It surprised me too! This is not something that you see everyday around these parts even though we live in the country. Thank goodness!

According to Jon Rumsey, age 17, he was driving on S. Beavercreek Road in the northbound lane traveling at 45 MPH. He went down into a dip and when he came back up over the rise an oncoming truck flashed its high beams at him. He looked down to see if his headlights were on and when he looked up he saw the cow in the road, but it was too late. He said he remembered hitting the cow, then he blacked out. He said that when he awoke, he was in The accident occurred someones yard. approximately 9:57 p.m. on the evening of the 25th. After the impact the cow apparently wandered into the southbound lane.

Another vehicle, driven by Gary Brook, was driving southbound on S. Beavercreek Road that evening and was also involved in the accident as he did not see the cow laying in the roadway until it was too late. He ran over the top of it which sent his car airborne. He said he pulled the car over, and thought it could possibly have damage to the undercarriage.

Both of these men were very lucky. Mr. Rumsey was sent by ambulance to Willamette Falls Hospital with a broken nose, cuts and a broken hand while Mr. Brooks seemed to be okay at the scene.

Mr Rumsey's car, a 1989 Honda Accord, appeared to be a total loss with extensive front end damage. The hood was caved in and the windshield was broken with a piece of wood through it.

Mr Brooks' car, a Ford Taurus, had both airbags blown and the hood looked slightly off-center, but otherwise looked in good shape.

The black Angus cow, owned by James Dunlap, had apparently wandered onto Beavercreek Rd and died at the scene. That area of the highway is very dark and a black cow would have been very difficult to see.








Friday, June 7th

More than 125 Clackamas County residents turned out on a beautiful Saturday morning to participate in the next step of the Complete Communities process.

At the third Complete Communities Congress, May 11, at the Oregon City High School, citizens presented the results of months of work to develop programs for nine areas of County life-from cultural opportunities to transportation. They also discussed governance options that connect unincorporated areas with the County and involve residents in decisions that affect them.

Generally, the two concepts favored by most participants are the "Hamlet" and "Village," both of which would provide increased involvement.

The recent attack by computer hacker(s) to Beaver Creek Cooperative Telephone Company's Internet Webmail Server is another example of just how vulnerable today's computing systems are. The mischief caused by the intruder(s) to the ISP on May 8, 2002, caused the server to remain offline for several hours.

Beaver Creek Cooperative Telephone Company has always taken measures to secure its computer systems. This intruder, however, was able to enter the webmail system and delete some server files through an unknown security vulnerability in the webmail program. When the server was rebooted it became inoperable. Initially all customers were affected as the entire email server was down for several hours.

Once the site was secure and the Beaver Creek Cooperative Telephone Company was certain that the server was operational, email service was restored with the exception of the webmail program. As a cautionary measure the webmail program was moved to a new location isolating the files to minimize damage in case of further intrusion. This move kept webmail users from accessing their email for several more days.

#### Carus Students Care for Communities

The grateful recipients of jumbo checks (and real ones, too) seemed more wide-eyed than the "inspirational" and "amazing" young students beside them on the Fine Arts Center's stage. Some of the adults looked truly stunned. The 44 students articulately explained how and why they decided to bestow grants of varying amounts upon nine area nonprofit service agencies. Some benefactors appeared teary-eyed and sounded cotton-mouthed at the kids' impressive oral presentations and poignant descriptions of people met and lessons learned, topics considered in thoughtful ways, and deliberative and imaginative choices of philanthropic good deeds.

Still, a few more check recipients and adult speakers gulped at how to follow one after another bright child with a big heart and growing brain. The 70 or so audience members - mainly beaming parents, and proud schoolteachers and district administrators, volunteers et al - seemed impressed throughout the hour-long presentation.

Carol Reed from the PGE Foundation, which gave the local students \$8,500 to divvy up for worthy causes they researched and believed in, was thrilled with the Carus students and their two teachers, Carol Dubuy and Mary Ann Ekblad. Reed said she hopes to be able to fund another program Carus next year. The 5-year old program had never before given cash to grade school children to act as philanthropists - all 36 other schools are high schools. A few Canby High School students



helped with the elementary students.

The Carus students of Mrs. Ekblad and Mrs. Dubuy's class choose to give:

- \$350 to the Canby Adult Center to buy new curtains or drapes to make a room cozier for Alzheimer's disease respite care program attendees.


