

The other day I was dropping off "Bulletins" at the restaurant in Beavercreek when two gentlemen asked me if I knew what was going on up at the Beavercreek Rd/Hwy 213 intersection. They too, were concerned about the traffic coming out of Oregon City. I told them that I too, had concerns. I was worried that the problem with the left turn lane coming out of Oregon City on Beavercreek Road was still going to be an issue because of the planting area in the middle of the road. First, I must say that I think trees are great, but moving traffic on Beavercreek Road is a must. The trees will look great, but I want to get out of town sometime in this century.



To get the proper information on what is, in fact, going to be the final configuration of the intersection I got in touch with the senior engineer on the project. Her name is Sharon Zimmerman. Sharon assured me that in about two months, when all is said and done and the signals are callibrated, the congestion getting out of Beavercreek and Oregon City will be much improved.

true in the opposite direction only there will be 2 left turn lanes to go up the by-pass to Molalla. There will still only be one lane to get out of Beavercreek and down the by-pass. Why we need two left lanes to go South is beyond me. It would have made more sense to have two right turn lanes to go toward I-205, in my humble opinion. Three of the signal posts will be on islands however. I hope this will not be a hazard.

"Beavercreek Oregon a History


Through the Looking Glass"


This is Part XXII of a series of articles on the history of the Beavercreek area. Written by Jack Watts, whose family were some of the early settlers of the community. This history is reprinted from his original manuscript that had until now never been published, by permission of Gordon Watts. We dedicate this series to a man and his love of the Beavercreek countryside who took the time to stop, look, listen and capture for all, his rememberances. The Editor.

--- THE GENERAL STORE (Cont.) ---

The old reliable cheese cutter was mounted on the counter in its own case. Two sides, the top, and one end were glass while the other end was covered with wire screen for cleanliness and ventilation. The case was hinged on the far end and had to be lifted to open and use it. This was an ingenious machine that could be set according to the weight of the cheese and the price per pound. Very accurate cuts could be made if the machine was set properly. Once the cutter was set, the knife could be lifted and then in moving a little lever five times, one could bring the knife down and have exactly one pound. In that period cheese sold for 25¢ per pound. In ordering cheese from the wholesaler we ordered a case of triplets; this was, of course, because there were three Each wheel cheese wheels packed to the case. weighed 20 to 25 pounds or more.

There was no restaurant in Beavercreek then and we had people coming in to buy something for lunch very often. The usual fare would be the purchase of a nickels worth of cheese, another nickels worth of crackers or ginger snaps, along with a nickel bottle of soda pop and lunch was served. The ginger snaps were shipped in a barrel made of very light plywood and there was a

divider set in the middle. The barrel was covered with an ising-glass top. When the ginger snaps were sold down to the level of the divider, we simply turned the barrel upside down and had the look of a new barrel of fresh ginger snaps.

Gazing upwards in the store, one would see a ceiling full of merchandise. There was a wire broom display rack hanging to save floor space. The outer part of the rack contained household brooms in a large quantity, while the inner part displayed toy brooms. These were popular with the kids.

There was another staple hanging from the ceiling on a sturdy hook--a stalk of bananas. Attached to the hook was a rope with a large knot tied in its end. When replacing the stalk with a new one, one would place one's hand through the cord fastened to the stalk and reach through to the knot hanging from the ceiling, slip the hand out allowing the weight of the bananas to settle against the knot. Bananas were sold by the dozen then and there was always a banana knife jabbed into the stalk for use the next time.

Most of the merchandise was carried and sold in bulk. Peanut butter came in a fifty-pound tin. A wooden spoon was used to dip it up and into an ice cream carton (the ones with the wire handles). The oil from the peanut butter would show through the carton before the customer could get it home. It was messy at best. Lard and shortening were packed in wooden tubs and tin containers as well as in 5 and 10 lb. pails. All the empty tubs, barrels, tins, and white sugar sacks were in good demand and were sold when available. Then

there was the ever-present 5-gallon keg of pickles; sweets, as well as dills, and sat out somewhere on the floor. A wooden dipper (with holes to drain the brine) was provided to dip the pickles into cartons. Sauerkraut was also handled in this way. Some customers preferred to bring their own containers for these items. Kippered herring was always on hand and packed in what was called a "kit" and shaped like a wooden pail cut off at the pockets. When handling these, there was a constant reminder to hurry and scrub the hands; and indeed, if one failed to do so, the "aroma lingered on." We were not equipped to handle fresh meats. We carried bacon in sides and backs and salt pork, and most was sold in either full sides or halves. Smoked hams and picnics were sold whole. The equipment

used for this was a homemade cabinet which occupied a place on the floor. It had an empty space underneath until about counter height and its sides were covered with screen wire plus a wire screen door. These products were suspended from heavy cords that were pushed through the sides of the bacon, the hams, picnics, etc., and were hooked to rods in the top of the case

Also at that meeting were the representatives with their recommendations for the Government Camp Village Pilot Project and the Colton Village Pilot Project.

Along with the members of the Task Force, also attending this meeting were, all three of the County Commissioners. The meeting was moderated by Elain Cogen of Cogen-Owens Cogan the consulting firm hired by the County as consultants to the Complete Communities project.

The meeting ran past time alotted, so a fifth Task Force meeting was scheduled for Tuesday, May 18th. This meeting took place at the Sunnybrook Service Center, 9101 S.E. Sunnybrook Boulevard, room 406.

At this meeting they went over the recommendations submitted for both hamlets and villages from the last meeting. The recommendations were redone in a more generic form that can be used as a guideline by any other community interested in pursuing these models. The new guidelines are not as specific as those initially submitted by Beavercreek, Colton and Government Camp.

It was also decided that there should be a method in place to allow interested communities a way to apply to become hamlets or villages. The recommendations will now go to the County Commissioners for approval.


A Close Friend and Community Advocate, Chuck Lyons, Passes Away



As Norwalk Virus Increases Good Hygiene a Key to Stopping its Spread

Public health officials in Clackamas, Multnomah and Washington Counties have recently seen an increase in reports of people with viral gastroenteritis. Viral gastroenteritis is an infection of the stomach and small intestines, commonly caused by a group of viruses called Noroviruses or "Norwalk".

The symptoms of Norovirus infection usually include nausea, vomiting, diarrhea and some stomach cramping. Sometimes people have a low-grade fever, chills, headache, muscle aches and a general sense of tiredness. The illness often begins suddenly. Norovirus infection is usually not serious, although people may feel very sick and vomit many times a day. Most people get better within one or two days, and they have no long-term health effects. However, sometimes people are unable to drink enough liquids to replace the liquids they lose because of vomiting and diarrhea. These persons can become dehydrated and may need medical attention. Dehydration is more common among the very young and the elderly.

Noroviruses are very contagious and can spread easily from person to person. Both stool and vomit contain the virus and can spread the disease. People develop symptoms between 12 and 48 hours after they contact the virus. Once they get the infection, they are contagious from as soon as they begin feeling ill to at least three days after they get better. Some people may be contagious for up to two weeks after they recover.

"It is always important for people to use good hygiene, including hand washing - even when they are not ill," said Dr. Alan Melnick, Clackamas County Health Officer. "People who have the infection should not prepare food for others while they are ill and for three days after they recover. People should be careful handling diapers, and always wash their hands thoroughly afterwards. Day-care center or nursing home workers should pay careful attention to hygiene, especially when attendees have had diarrhea," Melnick added.

No medicine can cure Norovirus and there is no vaccine to prevent infection. Antibiotics do not work because they work to fight bacteria, not viruses. When people are ill with vomiting and diarrhea, they should drink plenty of fluids to prevent dehydration. By drinking oral rehydration fluids such as juice or water, people can reduce their chance of becoming dehydrated.

People can avoid getting this infection by taking these steps:

- Wash your hands often, especially after using the toilet or changing diapers and before eating or preparing food.
- Carefully wash fruits and vegetables, and steam oysters before eating them.
- Using gloves, thoroughly clean and disinfect surfaces immediately after contamination with feces or vomit by using a bleach based household cleaner.
- Immediately remove and wash contaminated clothing or linens (use hot water and soap).
- Flush any vomit or feces down the toilet and make sure that the surrounding area is clean.


Carus CPO Communications

Clackamas County Offers Help with Medicare Discount Cards

Clackamas County Social Services, through the Volunteer Connection, has volunteer staff available to answer questions regarding the new Medicare Discount Cards. The volunteers will access Medicare's web site at www.medicare.gov for those Medicare recipients that do not have computer access. A print out of the discount cards that cover the clients' medications (those that offer a discount) will be mailed out to the client. Included in the mailing is a copy of the Medicare-approved prescription drug discount card instruction sheet and the Medicare standard enrollment forms for the cards.
