State Warns Of Bogus Health Insurance Offers/ Unlicensed Tennessee Company Shut Down For Not Paying Claims 400 Oregonians Affected

As Tennessee insurance regulators shut down a company that failed to deliver on its promise of affordable health care, the Oregon Department of Consumer and Business Services is warning consumers about illegitimate companies that aggressively market insurance through Internet advertising and fax blasts.

"Anyone buying insurance over the phone or Internet or as the result of an unsolicited letter or fax should proceed with caution," said Teresa Miller, administrator of the department's Insurance Division. "One quick phone call to the division's consumer advocates can help you determine if the company is legitimate."

Some Oregonians last fall received faxes offering "affordable health care" at prices as low as \$369 for an entire family. Two companies linked to the faxes, the American Trade Association (ATA) and a subsidiary called Smart Data Solutions (SDS) were not licensed to offer insurance in Oregon. Nonetheless, nearly 400 Oregonians purchased health insurance or thought they did through the groups.

The companies collected millions of dollars in premiums from consumers in Oregon and other states. However, when Tennessee insurance regulators investigated the companies they found boxes of unpaid medical claims. A court has since declared the companies insolvent, froze their bank accounts and placed the regulators in charge of running the companies.

The Oregon Insurance Division has notified affected Oregon families of the problem and cautioned the families not to believe any letters saying they are automatically being moved to another health insurance plan. Tennessee regulators have not authorized any rollover to another plan or allowed any other entity to debit bank or credit card accounts.

Unfortunately, these types of scams are not unusual, Miller said. To find out if a company or agent is legitimate in Oregon, call the Insurance Division's consumer advocates at 503-947-7984 or toll-free at 1-888-877-4894 or go to http://insurance.oregon.gov/insurer/insurer.html. 

An introduction to Invasives

Samuel Leininger, WeedWise Program Manager Clackamas SWCD

Invasive weeds are plants that adversely impact the social, economic, and ecological resources of our community. They can adversely affect our community by displacing native flora and fauna, as well as reducing our economic viability.

These invasive weeds are a form of biological pollution that not only degrades the quality of our land, but converts that land into new sources of biological pollution. As a result, controlling our invasive weeds is critical to preserving the integrity of our public and private lands.

It has been estimated that weeds have a total direct and indirect impact of 143 billion dollars per year within the United States. Within the State of Oregon the cost associated with just the twenty-one noxious weed species costs the residents of Oregon \$125 million dollars a year in lost agricultural production, fire damage, and control expenses. These expenses are absorbed by all of us through increased food costs, higher taxes, and decreased property values. These economic impacts clearly demonstrate the potential economic benefits associated with controlling invasive weeds.

Weeds can have a profound impact on our native ecosystem by displacing diverse native plant communities and replacing them with weedy monocultures. This expansion of weed populations alters ecological processes and disrupts complex food webs which adversely affect fish and wildlife. The result is a loss in biodiversity that leaves behind a landscape that is much less productive and less resilient to changing environmental conditions. Weeds result in land that is homogenous and less "Oregon-like".

The Clackamas Soil and Water Conservation District WeedWise program provides assistance to local landowners to promote more effective and efficient weed control strategies and management practices.

WeedWise Tips for Reducing the Impact of Invaders

· Know your invaders - Familiarize yourself with problem invaders in your area, so that you can properly identify

these species on your land.

- · Prevent weeds from invading By preventing disturbance and maintaining healthy vegetative ground cover you can prevent many problem weeds from establishing.
- · Eradicate weeds before they become a problem Controlling weeds when populations are small reduces the time and expenses needed to eradicate them.
- · Don't let weeds go to seed By preventing weeds from set- 5/18 13:22 Gas Leak S Cliffside Dr ting seed, you can reduce the rate of spread by that weed in 5/19 - 10:36 - EMS/Rescue - S Steiner Rd future generations. Pull, dig, cut, or spray flowering weeds before they set viable seed
- · Avoid spreading weed further If you are working in weed infested areas, be sure to clean your shoes, clothing, equipment, and vehicles when leaving the site to prevent spreading seeds to other locations.
- · Be patient and diligent Controlling and preventing the reinfestation of weeds is a long term process. It is easy to get discouraged when tackling an infestation. Just remember that controlling these invaders gets easier over time.
- · Know when to seek help Some weeds can be difficult to control and may require particular methods or techniques for eradication efforts to be successfully. Contact the Conservation District for additional information about controlling a particular invasive weed.

Bryn Seion To Celebrate 75th Annual Gymanfa (Welsh Singing Festival)

On Sunday, June 27, 2010, Bryn Seion Welsh Church in Beavercreek will hold its 75th annual Gymanfa Ganu. The theme will be "75 Years of Singing to the Lord." There will be a special morning worship service, lead by Pastor John Hasenjaeger, followed by afternoon and evening sessions of the Gymanfa. The church is located at 22132 S. Kamrath Road in a beautiful wooded setting.

The Gymanfa will be lead by John Good, who will also provide some special music in the evening session. John was born in Wales, surrounded by music and poetry.



He is a multi-instrumentalist, songwriter and poet. He attended Cardiff Universit, studied with Alan Hoddinott, received a Master's in music composition at twenty-one and has practiced his trade -- arranger, performer, studio musician, teacher -- in Europe and, for thirty years, in the United States.

Beginning in the 1840's, increasing numbers of Welsh immigrated to all parts of Oregon in search of opportunity and fertile, affordable farmland. Beavercreek reminded the settlers of their home back in Wales and they called for family and friends to join them. The Welsh families longed for a church where they could come together to

worship and sing in the Welsh tradition.


In June 1884, this dream became a reality with the founding of Bryn Seion (Mt. Zion) Church. First listed as "The Welsh Evangelical Church" and a year later as "The Welsh Congregational Church," Bryn Seion is now nondenominational. as being "covered in blood." This stretch of road has many descending tight curves in which accidents are not uncommon.



A Clackamas District Battalion Chief was scene on within minutes of the accident and called additional resources to assist in extrication and

treatment of the driver. Within two more minutes the first engine crew arrived and began stabilizing and treating the drivers' injuries. Clackamas Fire Heavy Rescue 4 responded and arrived quickly. They then began the process of extricating the driver by cutting the roof off of the vehicle, this allows paramedics/firefighters to safely care for the driver and remove the pt. for transport to a hospital. The extrication was swift and the driver was put onto a stretcher, transported by ambulance to the landing zone which was set up at Clackamas Community College where Lifeflight was waiting and transported her to OHSU to be evaluated.

The driver was conscious at the scene, but due to the impact and extrication time the driver was sent by Lifeflight and entered into the trauma system. By entering the driver into the trauma system there was a surgical team standing by if her injuries require quick surgical intervention.

Speed, wet roads and being unfamiliar with an area are always a recipe for disaster. Always, always wear your seatbelt and keep your eyes up and on the road.

Passenger Dies From Injuries Sustained In Crash In Oregon City

A passenger in a two-vehicle traffic crash near Oregon City on the afternoon of May 20, 2010 has died from her injuries at a Portland-area hospital.

KEITH LLOYD and FRAIJO were not injured. Both were using safety restraints. The Kia's drivers side airbag deployed in the crash.

The Toyota's right front passenger CAROL ELAINE LLOYD, age 76, was transported by AMR ambulance with serious injuries to Oregon Health Sciences University (OHSU) for treatment. She was using safety restraints.

According to the State Medical Examiner's Office, CAROL LLOYD died from her injuries Friday night, May 21st, at OHSU.

Do You Have Stream Bank Erosion? Planting Native Trees And Shrubs Can Help!

If you are losing large chunks of stream bank every time we have a large storm event, or even if you stream bank erosion is less dramatic but clearly evident, then you will want to read this article.

Stream bank erosion is a natural process and in a stable stream system typically occurs at a relatively slow rate; however, alteration of natural stream channels and clearing of vegetation along stream banks often results in accelerated erosion. Accelerated stream bank erosion can lead to property loss, poor water quality and loss of fish habitat. Property loss from accelerated bank erosion is most evident when large chunks of bank material become unstable, toppling into the stream following each large storm event (several times a year).

One way to counter accelerated erosion and bank failure is to plant native vegetation in the riparian zone, which is the area adjacent the stream channel. A properly functioning riparian zone helps protect water quality, provide habitat for fish and wildlife, and stabilizes stream banks.

When preparing to plant, strongly consider using native vegetation. Native plants are adapted to our local soils and moisture conditions, and provide food and habitat for wildlife. Some of the best native plants for the riparian area are native willows like Pacific and Scouler's willow or Red Osier Dogwood, which can be recognized by its bright red stems and small white flowers. Native trees to consider in the riparian zone are Oregon Ash and Red Alder. Willows and dogwood form dense hedges with fibrous roots, which can greatly reduce water velocity and in turn slow down erosion. Oregon Ash also has a very strong root system that is excellent at holding soil in place.

The best time to plant trees and shrubs are when they

are dormant, typically between November and March. If you live in an area with beaver, mice, or other wildlife it may be necessary to protect your plantings with tree protection tubes. Keeping the ground around each planting free from competing grass and other vegetation will also help reduce wildlife damage.

While adding native vegetation typically reduces stream bank erosion, in more extreme erosion cases, such as when banks are steep or vertical, planting trees and shrubs may not be enough to stabilize the stream bank. When this occurs other techniques may be necessary to control the erosion.

Superintendent Shares Letter To Staff Regarding Drastic Revenue Reduction

Oregon City School District Superintendent Roger Rada sent the following letter to staff and faculty following the May 24, 2010, budget reductions announced by Governor Kulongoski.

Dear O.C. Faculty and Staff,

Yesterday the State of Oregon received some shocking news - revenues for the remainder of the biennium are down \$562 million dollars. As a result, Governor Kulongoski plans to reduce all State budgets by 9%. K-12's share of that is about \$237 million, and Oregon City School District's share of that is \$2.5+ million.

At a problem-solving session Monday afternoon the district reached tentative agreements with OSEA and OCEA regarding contract concessions to help us get through next year. Those agreements helped fill a \$2.8 million shortfall and allowed us to construct a budget that maintained positions and programs at this year's levels. (Some positions will be eliminated due to declining enrollments, but student-teacher ratios will remain the same.)

Now we are faced with the ominous task of taking on an additional \$2.5+ revenue shortfall. Just to put this number in perspective - \$2.5 million could fund about 38 teachers, or could pay for about 12 days of instruction.

I am meeting with members of the school board this afternoon in order to establish a time line and process for making some very difficult decisions. I will also be meeting soon with representatives from OCEA and OSEA in order to engage them in further discussions about how to address our revenue shortfall. I greatly appreciate the leadership of both groups; our previous problem-solving sessions have been collaborative and productive. Our goal has been and continues to be finding solutions that don't require the reduction of positions or programs.

These are gut-wrenching times. Perhaps a sunny, three-day weekend will mend the spirit.

People interested in finding out if their dog is a "good citizen" are invited to Clackamas County Dog Services at 11:00 a.m., Saturday, June 5, to have their dog evaluated for American Kennel Club's Canine Good Citizen (CGC) certification.

The annual Clackamas County dog license fee is reduced by 25 percent for dogs who receive CGC certification.

The evaluation includes testing a variety of behavioral areas, including how the dog reacts to friendly strangers, other dogs and distractions; responding to commands, and walking on a loose leash.

The evaluation will be conducted by a trained evaluator at the Clackamas County Dog Shelter, 13141 SE Highway 212, Clackamas. There is a \$15 charge per dog for the

Working In The Garden? Oregon Food Bank Encourages You To Plant A Row To Help People Who Are Hungry

Working in the garden this weekend? Consider planting a few extra plants or even an extra row to help fight hunger. Join Plant a Row.

"It's easy to join Plant a Row," says Rebeca Siplak, OFB Learning Gardens program coordinator. "Simply plant a little extra in your garden. At harvest time, donate the extra produce to a local food agency."

"Refrigerated space is often limited, so OFB's partner agencies especially appreciate produce that transports and stores well, such as tomatoes (pick them slightly underripe), green beans, garlic, onions, hot peppers, cucumbers, zucchini, collard greens, beets and summer squash," says Eric Sopkin, OFB Metro Services coordinator, who helps gardeners partner with local agencies at harvest time. "No quantity is too small."

During the 2009 harvest season, gardeners donated 81,630 pounds of nutrition produce to food pantries, soup kitchens and other agencies in the Portland metro area. That's equivalent to two semi-truck-loads of produce.

The Oregon Forest Atlas 2010 Is Available Online

Nearly half of the State of Oregon is covered in forest. Maybe you've wondered about our forests and asked questions such as these:

How much of the state's forest land is owned by the federal government, wood products companies or family woodland owners?

How much of the state is set aside for either conservation or wilderness land?

How much Oregon forest has been damaged by wildlife,

insects or tree diseases?

You can find answers to these questions, and many others, through the Oregon Forest Atlas 2010 project, recently released on the Oregon Department of Forestry's web site, www.oregon.gov/ODF.

Oregon's forests are considerable, covering 30,472,000 acres within the ninth-largest U.S. state, making Oregon the second-most forested state by acreage in the country (behind Alaska). In addition to the first group of 32 statewide maps (many of which also feature map 'zoom-ins' of particular regions of the State) released in April 2010, the dynamic nature of the web-based atlas allows for new maps using different data sets to be developed and provided on the web site.

Maps developed for the Oregon Forest Atlas 2010 use Geographic Information Systems (GIS) data obtained from several sources, including the U.S. Forest Service's Pacific Northwest Research Station, Oregon State University and the Oregon Department of Forestry. The Forest Atlas 2010 was created by the Oregon Department of Forestry as a public education product of the Statewide Forest Assessment and Resource Strategy, which is designed to identify Oregon's current forest resources, develop a strategy for

managing forests that are identified as priority areas in the state, and report on the effectiveness of how federal resources were used.

The Oregon Forest Atlas 2010 maps form an ideal research tool, either for personal interest and awareness about Oregon forests or educational projects such as school science presentations, conversations about conservation projects in local communities or discussions about ecosystems and habitats.

Data contained within the Oregon Forest Atlas 2010 maps do come with limitations, including some data models relying on site information at least one year old and even in instances where satellite imagery is used, maps do not necessarily reflect conditions at a fine-detail level. Forest Atlas maps are not intended for legal, engineering or surveying purposes.

The Oregon Department of Forestry provides a diverse range of services to Oregon's public, including forestry landowner assistance and rules providing natural resource protection on 12 million acres of private and state-owned forest, management of 848,000 acres of State Forests and fire protection on 15.8 million acres of forest land, most of it privately owned.

Off-duty Firefighter Clay Buford, relaxing himself in a boat on the river, spotted the man struggling and yelled to a local cabin owner for assistance.
