Beavercreek Man
Arrested and
Charged on 30
Counts of
First Degree Sex
Abuse

Additional Victims Sought

On Friday, May 10, 2013, Clackamas County Sheriff's Office detectives arrested David Alan Feb on 30 counts of Sex Abuse of a Child.

Following a lengthy criminal investigation, Sheriff's Office Child Abuse Team detectives arrested David Alan Feb, age 60, at his Beavercreek residence and transported him to the Clackamas County Jail. He is charged with 30 counts of Sex Abuse in the First Degree. Bail is set at \$500,000.

The victim is a family member who was between the ages of 3 and 12 when the alleged abuse occurred. The numerous crimes allegedly occurred at Feb's Beavercreek residence between 2000 and 2009.

Investigators are not ruling out the possibility of other non-related victims.

### Oregon Insurers Propose Rates for 2014 Health Plans

The Oregon Insurance Division has posted health insurers' rate requests for small employer and individual health plans that start Jan. 1, 2014. The plans reflect new benefits and new rules under the Federal Affordable Care Act.

Thousands of Oregonians are expected to gain private insurance in the coming year with federal financial help. Consumers will have more choices than ever before since Federal law states that everyone qualifies for coverage, even if they have a pre-existing health condition. Also, the traditional insurers that make up Oregon's already highly competitive health insurance market will be joined by several new entities.

The 2014 health plans for small employers and individuals will include new benefits and limit deductibles. While focusing on preventive care, all plans will include doctor visits, hospital stays, maternity care, emergency room care, prescriptions, and mental health/substance abuse coverage.

In addition to new benefits, Federal reforms closed the gap between rates charged to older and younger people. The changes mean insurance costs may increase for some and decrease for others. For example, Oregonians with serious health issues who are now covered in government-operated high-risk pools can shop for competitive rates in the private market. They, along with many other Oregonians, may qualify for financial help that will lower premiums through Cover Oregon, the State's new health insurance marketplace. ### Rate filings

Along with 16 insurers, two Consumer Operated and Oriented Plans (CO-OPS) filed plans and proposed rates with the division.

The division's rate review focuses on technical projections about future claims costs but is open to public comment. Shopping for coverage will be easier after the division makes rate decisions by early July and insurers and Cover Oregon provide consumer-friendly information about plan benefits and rates.

Insurance Division actuaries have started their thorough technical review of the filings to determine whether the proposed rates are justified and reasonable. Oregon Insurance Commissioner Lou Savage must approve any rates before they can be charged to policyholders.

The division posted examples of proposed rates in seven regions covering Oregon at http://www.oregonhealthrates.org/?pg=proposed rates.html.

The charts show examples of rates because the amount a particular person pays depends on age, location, how many family members are on the plan, and plan choice. Tobacco use can increase the price of plans, too.

The proposed rates are for small group and individual coverage, which will affect about 10 percent of Oregonians.

"Oregon has one of the nation's most competitive health insurance markets, and one of its most rigorous and public rate reviews," Savage said. "We will be looking closely at what rates are justified in this reset of the market with new plans and new prices."


The division's rate website at www.oregonhealthrates.org links people to key documents, including a schedule for public hearings. Also, people can sign up for email notifications that alert them to rate filings, public hearings, and rate decisions.

Some Douglas-firs and other conifers in northwestern Oregon look noticeably haggard this spring, and concerned residents are asking why. As with most events in the long life of trees, the cause goes back a ways - in this instance, to last summer and fall.

"My best explanation is drought stress," said Brad Withrow-Robinson. "We had a pretty hard end of summer last year - No rain until mid-October - then, boom! It was winter."

The Oregon State University Extension forester explained that the lack of water stressed the trees. But because the dry conditions occurred late in the growing season, the effects didn't show up until now. People are seeing dead treetops and flared-out branches - classic signs of drought stress.

The recent warmer-than-average weather "seems to have made it more sudden and dramatic," he said.

While the Willamette Valley is idyllic for people, it can be a challenging environment for trees.

"Many of our soils in the valley are poorly drained, which is hard on most of our conifers, and other soils are fairly shallow and cannot hold much water," he said. "Also, our summers are hotter and drier than in the mountains."

These stressors lower trees' resistance to disease and pests.



### Public Invited to Comment

Public invited to comment online on proposed Clackamas County transportation project priorities through June 15th.

The public is invited to participate in an online open house at www.clackamascountytsp.com to review and comment on proposed transportation project priorities for the next 20 years in unincorporated Clackamas County.

After more than a year of work on the Clackamas County Transportation System Plan (TSP) update, County residents, the TSP Public Advisory Committee and transportation experts identified more than 300 projects for roads, bridges, sidewalks and bikeways that will be needed by

2035 throughout unincorporated Clackamas County.

The objective of these projects is to help residents, business people and tourists travel safely, smoothly and reliably throughout the County.

Since funds will only be available for a small proportion of these projects, each project was evaluated and ranked based on vision, goals, objectives and evaluation criteria set last year by the Public Advisory Committee. On the basis of that evaluation, projects were prioritized into the following tiers:

**Tier 1: 20-Year Capital Projects** –Those that can reasonably be undertaken within current estimates of available funding (approximately \$444 million over 20 years).

**Tier 2: Preferred Capital Projects** –Additional recommended projects the County hopes to undertake if additional funds become available (approximately \$444 million over 20 years).

**Tier 3: Long-Term Capital Projects** –Almost all other projects identified during this process. Although funds are not expected to be available for these projects during the next 20 years, these projects are still needed to meet the County's projected transportation demands.

There are also a few projects recommended to be removed from the project list.

Maps and lists of the proposed projects and project priorities are available at the online open house, which is open through June 15. Additional information about the TSP update process is available on the project website at w w w clackamascountytsp.com.




### Careless Debris Burning Causes Numerous Wildfires

lowed. Many districts have closed some or all of their protected lands.

A charged hose must reach to and all away around the burn pile. The 10-foot cleared area around the pile should be kept wet at all times. Use a shovel or rake handy. If burning is allowed, keep your burn pile small adding to it as it burns down. Stay with the fire at all times. Only yard debris is legal to burn - no garbage or lumber.

Once the debris is burned, soak the area of and around the burn. Check on it frequently to make sure no sparks remain.

"Wildfire prevention is an individual responsibility," reminds Mary Ellen Holly, president and CEO of the Keep Oregon Green Association. If you don't take precautions, you can be subject to suppression costs.

### AMR Trains More Than 51,000 People How to Save Lives With Compression - Only CPR

On May 22, American Medical Response (AMR) health care professionals went coast-to-coast and trained more than 51,000 people on how to save a life using chest compression-only CPR (also known as Hands-Only CPR) as part of the first AMR World CPR Challenge. One hundred and forty AMR operations in 40 states as well as operations in Trinidad and Tobago and India participated in the daylong event.

AMR Operations in the Portland Metropolitan area and Josephine County in Oregon held sixteen events and trained 1328 people how to perform live-saving compression-only CPR. An additional 832 people were trained in Clark County on May 17th at a separate event last week bringing the total number of people trained locally to 2160.

Compression-only CPR performed by a bystander can more than double the survival rate of a cardiac arrest victim. "There's a strong chance that someone we trained this week will save a life in the future," said Randy Lauer, General Manager of Oregon Operations for AMR. "Training people to provide life-saving CPR is one way we can make an important difference in the community."

Participants in the event were trained to perform compression-only CPR in about five minutes by local AMR paramedics and EMTs.

A law passed by the Oregon Legislature takes aim at recovering fraudulently claimed unemployment benefits. Senate Bill 259, passed on April 18, allows the Employment Department to intercept all or part of Federal Income Tax refunds from individuals who committed unem-



ployment fraud in order to repay the debt. The Employment Department already has the authority to intercept State tax refunds; the new law gives the agency another method to recoup fraudulently collected benefits.

Unemployment insurance benefits are meant for individuals who are out of work through no fault of their own. Money for these benefits comes from the unemployment insurance trust fund, which is funded by Oregon employers.

Unemployment fraud frequently occurs when an individual claims benefits while working. When fraud is detected, the Oregon Employment Department works to collect the improperly paid benefits. If those collection efforts fail, the department now has the authority to intercept tax refunds.

Upon the passage of Senate Bill 259, the Employment De-

partment mailed notices to 14,000 individuals who collectively owe \$55 million due to unemployment insurance fraud. The notices give these individuals 60 days to make payment or prove they do not owe the money, or the debt will be referred to the US Department of the Treasury for collection.

The new law strives to give the Employment Department a powerful new tool to recapture benefits paid out because of fraud and return those funds to the unemployment insurance trust fund. This will contribute to the health of the trust fund, and protect Oregon employers' tax rates.

Oregon maintains one of the healthiest unemployment trust funds in the nation. During the most recent recession, 36 states' trust funds became insolvent causing those states to borrow money from the Federal Government in order to pay unemployment benefits. Oregon's trust fund remained solvent during this economic downturn; ensuring benefits were available to those who qualified, while containing the tax rates for Oregon employers.

Clackamas County Commissioners
OK Five Day "Business Week"
for Construction-Related
Support Services

extend construction-related support services in certain County departments to a five-day business week.

Currently those departments operate on a four-day schedule for public access.

The decision extends to building codes, planning and zoning, code enforcement and other divisions within the Department of Transportation and Development (DTD) and other County divisions, such as Water and Environment Services, that provide support services for contractors and the public.

The volume of hours will likely not change significantly due to a decrease in demand but the public counters will be staffed on Fridays.

A more comprehensive proposal to expand the five-day work schedule to the entire County was defeated by a 3-2 vote.

The approved motion was an expansion of a vote last month extending public counter services to Friday within divisions of DTD, starting in July.

The motion was supported by Chair John Ludlow and Commissioners Paul Savas and Tootie Smith. Commissioners Jim Bernard and Martha Schrader opposed.

The proposal to expand the schedule countywide was supported by Chair Ludlow and Commissioner Smith and opposed by Commissioners Bernard, Schrader and Savas.

Clackamas County initiated the four-day work week as a pilot project in 2008 and continued the program after the pilot period expired. The schedule allowed for additional hours of public service early in the morning and later in the afternoon.

The four-day schedule covers most County employees and agencies except for emergency personnel and other departments supporting five-day a week operations such as the District Attorney and for other services such as recording of property deeds.

The change for construction-related support services was slated to begin in July, but more information about the implementation of those expanded operations is still being gathered.

### TriMet Grant Supports CCC's Green Line Shuttle

Clackamas Community College has been awarded a \$30,000 grant from TriMet to support the Green Line Shuttle. The CCC Green Line Shuttle runs express service between the college's main campus in Oregon City and the MAX Green Line terminus at Clackamas Town Center.

The CCC grant is part of \$683,513 in federal Job Access and Reverse Commute (JARC) monies awarded by the

transit agency to nonprofit and government programs that connect low-income residents to jobs and job-related services.

The CCC Green Line Shuttle provides free express service for students and the public week days during the academic terms. It has been a popular service for students that is full during rush hours.

Seventy-two percent of incoming CCC students receive financial aid; slightly over half of these students live below the federal poverty level and 42 percent work more than 20 hours a week. The shuttle service provides a direct trip that is not available on TriMet and connects the MAX infrastructure to the under served area around CCC's Oregon City campus.

Shuttle service began on a trial basis in spring of 2010, through a partnership between the college, the Transportation Management Association, Clackamas County and Premiere Transportation. Towncenter Express (TX) proved successful with students, county employees and the public.

CCC has continued to fund the shuttle through a variety of grants and other funds. The annual cost of operation is \$48,000.
