Residents of Holly Lane Not Allowed to Meet with DOGAMI

Residents of Holly Lane were to meet with DOGAMI (Oregon Department of Geology and Mineral Industries) in order to discuss the new risk assessment maps that were just released on landslides in the Oregon City area.

Management at DOGAMI however, felt it better for them to attend Bill Burn's presentation, that was held on May 8th, at the County Services Building rather than to have them meet with Mr Burns at the DOGAMI offices.

Bill Burns did give a presentation on May 8th, at the County Development Services Building, but for County and Oregon City personnel only. The public was unfortunately not able to attend this presentation. "It was a sold out crowd of 60 people who attended the event to see the latest on DOGAMI's Risk Maps." Christine Kosinski, Corresponding Secretary of the Hamlet of Beavercreek, and Holly Lane resident said. "I'm excited that 60 personnel came to learn about Landslides and their risks, but I was hoping that some of us would have been able to attend."

Ms Kosinski had gone before the Oregon City Commission in February of this year, and requested they support a second Forum for the community on Landslides and Emergency Preparedness, however Oregon City has not yet indicated if such a program will be offered in the near future.

Ms. Kosinski attended the Oregon City Natural Resource Committee meeting on Wednesday, May 14th. She addressed the point that there is a need for Oregon City to complete their Landslide regulations, as promised since 2008, to include monitoring landslide areas for Low, Moderate and High Risk. Some of their members had requested Christine to present this information.

Whether you have Welsh heritage or not, you will be very welcome at this Celtic cultural event.

It is not generally known, but a fact nevertheless, that partsinging had its origin and early development among the Cymry, or as the English called them - the Welsh.

It is indeed a pleasure to listen to four-part hymn singing. In Wales, the small village chapels nestled in the lovely green valleys were centers of religious and social life. After services the Welsh would linger in chapel and would continue to sing old hymns and practice new ones. This tradition continues at Bryn Seion (Mt Zion) Welsh Church in Beavercreek, Oregon.

The church was built in 1884 by Welsh immigrants and is still active today. People come from all over the Northwest for this song festival. Music fills the church and spills over to the shaded grounds. It is a full day and you can attend any or all of the activities.

Come early to get a seat in the church or listen outside. Some outdoor seating is provided, but there are no reserved seats. Be prepared for any kind of weather. Everyone is encouraged to participate in the singing.



Clackamas County Declines to Participate in Public Sector Bid to Purchase Blue Heron Property

Clackamas County will not join with Metro and Oregon City in an effort to outbid a private developer for the former Blue Heron property.

Clackamas County Commissioners said there was not enough time to fully consider the financial impacts and structure of the bid proposal due by the closeness of the deadline to respond. The request to participate came in late Wednesday, April 23rd from Metro staff.

"It would normally take 30 to 60 days to negotiate the terms of a deal like this," said County Administrator Don Krupp.

The former Blue Heron site, which is located along the Willamette River in downtown Oregon City, was closed in February 2009. The property has been in bankruptcy for several years.

Clackamas County, Metro and Oregon City, along with other regional partners, have been working with a consult-

ing firm to develop a concept plan in order to attract developers to the site. Clackamas County has invested \$100,000 towards the visioning process with potential future financial assistance.

"The County remains committed to the vision for this site and the public partnership that has been working diligently over the last couple of years," said Commissioner Tootie Smith. "There just isn't enough time today to fully examine the commitment we are being asked to make."

A Washington State developer has submitted a \$2.3 million offer to purchase the property from the bankruptcy trustee. An overbid would have to exceed that amount.

"Public sector support may be needed to spur redevelopment of the site," said Commissioner Martha Schrader. "I hope we can continue to work together to develop the right approach." The Willamette Falls Legacy concept plan can be viewed at www.rediscoverthefalls.com.



a mix of flowers in bloom, next to dead grass and the remains of last summer's annuals. As you begin spring clean-up, please consider chipping or recycling your yard debris. But if burning is your only option, here are some tips to prevent that debris burn from becoming Oregon's next wildfire:

- Call before you burn - If you're planning to burn, check with your local Oregon Department of Forestry district, fire protective association or air protection authority to learn if there are any current burning restrictions or regulations, and whether a permit is required. Fire officials may designate certain days for burning based on weather

and wind conditions. In Beavercreek call 503-632-0211

- Know the weather forecast Never burn on dry or windy days. When conditions are windy or dry, it is easy for open burning to spread out of control.
- Clear a 10-foot radius around your pile also make sure there are no tree branches or power lines above.
- **Keep your burn pile small** A burn pile is less likely to escape control if it is kept small. A large burn may cast hot embers long distances. Add debris in small amounts as existing material is consumed.
- Always have water and fire tools on site When burning, have a charged water hose, bucket of water, and shovel and dirt or sand nearby to extinguish the fire. If you used sand or dirt to knock down a fire, go back and drown the pile with water, stir the coals, and drown again. Repeat until the fire is DEAD out.
- Attend your burn at all times A burn left unattended for only a few minutes can grow into a costly, damaging wildfire. Monitoring a debris burn continually from start to finish until dead out is required by State law, to ensure that any escaped sparks or embers can be extinguished quickly.
- NEVER use gasoline or other accelerants (flammable or combustible liquids) to start or increase your open fire. Every year, 55-60 percent of all burns treated at the Oregon Burn Center in Portland are the result of backyard debris burning.
- Make sure it's out Completely extinguish your debris burn before leaving. Go back and recheck old burn piles, as they can retain heat for several weeks and rekindle when the weather warms and wind begins to blow.
- Burn ONLY yard debris Some plastics, treated lumber and other manufactured products give off toxic fumes when burned. State regulations prohibit the open burning of any

material that creates dense smoke or noxious odors.

- Escaped debris burns are costly - State law requires the proper clearing, building, attending and extinguishing of open fires any time of year. A first-time citation carries a \$110 fine. If your debris burn spreads out of control, you are responsible for the cost of fire suppression and very likely the damage to neighboring properties. This can range from a few hundred to thousands of dollars. ODF spent over \$190,000 in 2013 on fires caused by debris burning.

"I encourage homeowners to consider all other options to dispose of their yard waste prior to choosing debris burning," cautions Interim Oregon State Fire Marshal Jim Walker. "Every year, there are a number of fires caused by debris burning, even when done by the most well-intentioned homeowners."

Following the warrant service, deputies arrested Michael Andrew Brennan, age 50, on three counts of Theft 1 by Deception. ble victims; tips are sought.

Authorities believe Michael Brennan had been accepting donations through a website and Facebook page, both titled "Saving America's Heroes" -- telling donors that proceeds went to the "Matthew M. Brennan Foundation ... a 501 (C) (3) non-profit organization ... for America's soldiers." However, no such 501 (C) (3) filing exists.

Michael Brennan and his wife Maria Brennan wrote that the foundation had been created to help soldiers with PTSD, and had been founded in honor of their late son Matthew Brennan, an Oregon Army National Guard veteran who committed suicide in 2011 at age 22. A 2011 Oregonian story on the Brennans can be found here: http://blog.oregonlive.com/oregonatwar/2011/08/the life and death of an orego.html

Authorities have found evidence that funds and services donated to "Saving America's Heroes" did not go toward the stated mission of the website.

Authorities also allege that Brennan stole money from his father-in-law -- a 65-year paraplegic -- taking money from the victim's bank account and using it for personal purchases.

Brennan also allegedly convinced multiple local contractors to donate remodeling services to the Happy Valley home in the name of the Matthew M. Brennan Foundation,

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which does not have the 501 (C) 3 designation repeatedly claimed by Michael Brennan.

Michael Brennan was booked into the Clackamas County Jail. His bail is \$45,000.

Agencies assisting in the investigation include the Clackamas County Sheriff's Office (Investigations Division), Adult Protective Services, the Oregon Department of Justice, the Social Security Administration Office of the Inspector General, and the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs.

Three Clackamas County cities -- Damascus, Happy Valley, and Wilsonville -- contract with the Clackamas County Sheriff's Office to provide municipal police services.



CCC Partners to Promote STEM Education

Clackamas Community College will partner with local high schools and other colleges and universities to increase access to science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM) opportunities through an Oregon Education Investment Board (OEIB) grant. Focus areas for CCC include health sciences, manufacturing technology and engineering. The activities will result in more STEM dual credit courses for high school students in the CCC district.

The South Metro-Salem Partnership is one of six regional STEM Hubs in Oregon, funded under Gov. John Kitz-haber's strategic investment program to emphasize STEM opportunities for students and connecting to high-demand careers. The partnership formed to encourage Oregon stu-

dents to achieve STEM degrees and certificates, and reach Oregon's education goals by increasing the access and engagement of students in STEM courses and experiential learning.

- · Building a "STEM NETwork" of mentors, programs and events that inspire students and sponsors to highlight the value of STEM activities to the classroom, and utilize the region's rich industry and community resources.
- · Expand accelerated credit collaborations between schools, colleges and universities to raise student achievement through dual credits, advanced placement, and incentives to attract students into STEM degree paths.
