## **BCCP** Update

## BCCP Members Discuss Options with Political Leaders

BCCP members met Monday, May 10th, with Metro Councilor Bill Atherton and Clackamas County Commissioner Michael Jordan to discuss options for Beavercreek.

The first topic of conversation was Rural Reserves. Commissioner Jordan described two Rural Reserves recently established by the City of Canby and City of Sandy. Basically, these cities established an Inter Governmental Agreement (IGA) with the County and Metro to establish green spaces or corridors by freezing zoning between their city and neighboring cities, i.e.: Oregon City and Gresham respectively. Commissioner Jordan explained that Rural Reserve agreements are not permanent and can be changed or terminated with a thirty day notice. Also, Rural Reserves can not restrict annexation by neighboring cities.

When applying this concept to Beavercreek, several questions surfaced. Would Beavercreek citizens want to establish a Rural Reserve and What "area" would be leave zoning as is? established as Beavercreek? Since Beavercreek is not a governmental body, can Clackamas County contract for our area? Since Rural Reserves are basically a green space or corridor, what is the objective... a green space between Oregon City and Molalla? How long would this agreement last? How do the Metro Urban Growth Boundary Reserves -- Areas 25 and 26 (within Beavercreek) affect such an agreement? Can you have Urban Reserves within a Rural Reserve? Would a Rural Reserve provide representation at all levels of government and allow planning and decisionmaking authority? Answers to these and other questions would have to be researched.

The second topic of conversation was the possibility of creating a Special Planning District. A Special Planning District is a municipal government, which can offer the following:

Elected officials providing citizen input and accountability,

The authority to create plans and perhaps create zoning,

create zoning,
Raise funds through taxes and fees,

Recognition by other levels of government, Hire planners and create plans,

Zoning control, and

Not required to meet "city" guidelines.

Though there is little information or regulations regarding Special Planning Districts, Commissioner Jordan feels that this is a viable option for Beavercreek and both he and Councilor Atherton committed to researching this option and answering such questions as: is it legal, does it

provide annexation protection, what impact do Metro Urban Growth Boundary Reserves have, what type of citizen input and feasibility work is needed, can the District zone, etc?

Commissioner Jordan shared that he will be discussing multiple County Planning Commissions arranged geographically throughout Clackamas County with his fellow Commissioners.

Councilor Atherton reported that he will be exploring issues in State land use law with State Representatives who are interested in ways to establish smaller communities in Oregon.

So, what does all this mean? Beavercreek has viable options to become a seperate community with the responsibility and control to shape its own future. However, if Urban Reserve Areas 25 and 26 are maintained to meet current State requirements to accommodate forecasted growth, then incorporation as a city may be our only option if the citizens of Beavercreek want to control their destiny.
