Outdoor Burning Begins March 1st

Outdoor burning begins in the Beavercreek area on March 1st and continues through June 15th. As a reminder here are the guidelines and rules established by the fire district and DEQ.

Open Fire Safety Rules

- 1. Open fires must be limited in size, be controlled, and not be a hazard to people, property, or standing vegetation No fire may be larger than 10 ft. x 10 ft. x 10 ft. without a special burn permit. A minimum of 25 ft. clearance from other combustibles or structures is required.
- 2. Combustibles should be removed from around burn piles that would contribute to the spread of fire. The width of the fire break should follow this guideline: Pile height plus the pile width, divided by four.
- 3. A garden hose connected to a water supply and a shovel or other approved fire-extinguishing equipment shall be readily available.
- 4. Burning material shall be constantly attended by a person knowledgeable in the use of the fire extinguishing equipment. An attendant shall supervise the burning material until the fire has been extinguished.
- 5. Burning of materials in any manner where smoke or flame damages or endangers persons or property of others is prohibited.
- 6. All fires shall be extinguished and smoke free two hours before sunset unless otherwise specified by the prescribed burn hours on the Burn Information Number 503-632-0211.

Agricultural Burning

Agricultural Burn Permits have not been issued since 2005. All agricultural open burning is restricted to the Open Burning Seasons:

March 1st - June 15th October 1st - December 15th

Exception: Agricultural operations that are inside the DEQ "no open burning" control area will still require an agricultural burn permit. Contact the Fire Prevention Division at 503-742-2660 if you have any question whether an agricultural burn permit is required.

Residential "Backyard" Burning

Residential backyard burning is restricted to the Open Burning Seasons:

March 1st - June 15th

Prior to burning, call Clackamas Fire District #1's burn information number at 503-632-0211 to determine if it is a burn day and the hours in which burning is allowed. All fires must be smoke free by the end of the prescribed burn hours. Burn piles may be no bigger than 10' x 10' x 10'. There must be 25' minimum clearance from other combustibles or structures. No stump burning is permitted within 6 miles of any incorporated city within the fire district. Only materials such as yard, tree, and garden debris may be burned.

Recreational Burning

Recreational fires are permitted unless all burning is closed due to extreme fire danger. These include campfires, ceremonial fires, bonfires, and cooking fires (in ground pig roasts). Permits are required for all but campfires. Contact the Fire Prevention Division at 503-742-2660 if a permit is required.

Special Burn Permits/Slash

Special Burn Permits are required for burning slash, land clearing debris or for any burn piles greater than 10 ft. x 10 ft. x 10 ft. A 50 ft. minimum clearance from any other combustibles or structures is required. A minimum 20 ft. wide firebreak down to mineral earth must surround each burn pile. Contact the Fire Prevention Division at 503-742-2660 for permit information.

Prohibited Materials

Garbage, paper, plastic, rubber, wire insulation, asphalt, cardboard, construction debris, auto parts, petroleum products or treated materials, animal remains, materials which normally emit dense smoke or noxious odors, slash from commercial land clearing, burning of uncut or standing vegetation, any treated lumber, materials transported from another location for the purpose of being burned.

Enforcement

Burning in violation of the Open Burning Rules and Guidelines is both a Uniform Fire Code violation and a violation of DEQ Air Pollution Regulations. Failure to comply with the Uniform Fire Code is a misdemeanor under ORS 478.960 and 478.990(2). Violation of air pollution regulations may result in a fine of up to \$10,000 per day from DEQ.

Any open fire must be extinguished by the responsible party when so ordered by any officer of a police or fire department if it is determined that the smoke emissions are offensive to occupants or surrounding property, or if

burning is determined to constitute a hazardous condition or appears to endanger the property or persons of others. The person responsible for any fire can be held liable for damages to other persons or other person's property as a result of their fire. The fire district may also charge for costs to respond and extinguish any fire not permitted under these rules (minimum fee of \$125.00 per violation).

Wagon Wheel Park open for enjoying greenspace - not for 4-wheeling

Clackamas County's Wagon Wheel Park on the Molalla River offers river access for boat launch and retrieval only - not the four-wheeling activity that has been a problem recently.

Wagon Wheel is an undeveloped, 21-acre natural area with a gate open only between December 1 and April 30.

"We are sensitive to our neighbors' property damage caused by illegal activity of those who don't follow County, State or Federal guidelines," said Mike McLees, Clackamas County Parks Manager. "In bringing this to the public's attention this time of year, we're reducing the risk of property damage and injury to citizens in and around the park."

The park had more amenities until flooding washed



When Kirstin was almost 3 years old, she began treatment for Ewing's Sarcoma. The cancer was located behind her jaw. She underwent a vear of surgery, chemotherapy, and radiation. At present, she is in remission. Due to the extent of

surgery and radiation, scar tissue formed that makes it impossible for her to open her jaw and most of her teeth have no roots. Because of these complications, she will need a great deal of surgery, physical therapy, and dental implants in order to once again be able to open her mouth and have teeth to smile with and chew. For four years Community 101 has been raising money for Kirstin's closet which supplies the hospital with pajamas for children with cancer. 

New rates are now set at 28.5 cents per mile, up from 11 cents per mile. A maximum deductible is set at \$46.62, \$15.54 for round trip, and \$7.77 for one-way visits. Deductible amounts can be waived upon approval of financial hardship to the veteran. Deductible increases were packaged as part of the 2008 appropriations act.

Director Jim Willis of the Oregon Department of Veterans Affairs understands the impact this benefit increase will have on the veteran population of Oregon. "The earned benefit will make an immediate difference in the lives of many Oregon veterans. Veterans who travel many miles to a VA medical facilities will have more money in their pocket at the end of the day." Willis said while describing the livelihood of Oregon veterans.

VA Secretary Dr. James B. Peake was able to authorize this increase within the first 30 days of taking command of the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs. When announcing the increase Peake said, "This increase helps veterans -- especially those living in rural areas -- offset some of the gasoline costs as they travel to VA's world-class health care."

Veterans wounded or disabled in service to their country are able to claim this benefit when traveling in relation to a Compensation and Pension (C&P) Examination. Free VA Health Care is available to returning combat veterans. For assistance for all VA Benefits, veterans, survivors, and dependents should contact their local County Veterans Service Officer or the Oregon Department of Veterans' Affairs.

Students who have earned Associate's degrees in professional and technical fields have a new pathway to complete a four-year degree through an agreement between George Fox University and Clackamas Community College.

"This opens up a whole new route for students in professional technical programs," said Carol Green, Dean of the School of Professional Studies at George Fox. "We're creating a pathway for students who have been denied a pathway in the past."

The new articulation

agreement will recognize the credits earned in professional technical programs ranging from accounting to horticulture to welding – potentially dozens of programs. Students who have earned Associate's degrees at CCC can apply the credits earned in those degrees toward a Bachelor's degree in one of five programs in the university's School of Professional Studies.

Matriculating to a Bachelor's degree has been a challenge for students in professional technical fields in the past, said Scott Giltz, Dean of Career and Technical Education at CCC. Even after earning an Associate degree, students pursuing a bachelor's degree often had to begin at freshman status because many of their credits earned in technical courses were not accepted.

The George Fox School of Professional Studies offers accelerated undergraduate programs designed to allow working adults to finish their degree in about 16 months. Classes are offered one night a week and some week-

ends. Starting fall term 2008, George Fox will begin a degree-completion program in Management and Organizational Leadership at CCC's expanded Harmony campus. A second program in Social and Behavioral Studies will begin January 2009.

Oregon Veteran's Home Loan Rates Drop Below 5 Percent

The Oregon Department of Veterans' Affairs (ODVA) has announced they are currently offering home loan interest rates approaching 30 year lows. Using the agency's ORVETS home loan program, qualified veterans may now get a fixed rate mortgage for as low as 4.875 percent with a 1.5 percent loan origination fee, or a 4.99 percent loan rate with a 1 percent origination fee.

The current maximum loan amount for veterans using the ORVETS home loan program is \$417,000. Federal rules prohibit ODVA from refinancing most existing mortgages.

The ORVET home loan program is a State of Oregon veteran benefit and is separate from the federal VA home loan guaranty program. Even if a veteran has purchased a home using the federal VA program they may still be eligible for an ORVET home loan. A requirement for the OR-

VET program is that veterans must apply before they reach the 30-year anniversary of their military discharge date.

"Our veterans have served our country with distinction and they deserve the very best we can offer them. These new reduced rates that we offer may allow some of them to take advantage of a great opportunity for home ownership," said Jim Willis, Director of the Oregon Department of Veterans' Affairs.



The February Community Meeting of the Hamlet of Beavercreek took place on Wednesday, February 27, 2008, at the Beavercreek Grange on Kamrath Road with 29 members and guests in attendance.

There was no guest speaker, but after the meeting was adjourned, Kami Kehoe, candidate for Clackamas County Commission Position 5, gave a brief presentation sharing her civic background and why she was running for office. The highlights of the January 23, 2008, Community Meeting were read and approved.

A member asked if we had an itemized billing from the attorney that was consulted in regards to the Beaver-creek Road Concept Plan. It was noted that we had not received a bill at this time. The member expressed concern about how the money was spent since there was apparently no opinion written on the matter by the attor-

ney consulted in the paperwork handed out previously. She wanted to know exactly what we paid for.

It was announced that three of the four "Welcome to the Hamlet of Beavercreek" signs have been placed. There seems to be an issue with ODOT on the placement of the fourth on Hwy 213, but it is hoped it can be worked out in the near future.

There were several land-use issues before the group; a Home Occupation Permit, the Alteration of a Non-Conforming use and a Temporary Care Permit.

The members were made aware of concerns over the placement of a manufactured home North of Leland Road in an area prone to flooding. It appears the placement is in the floodplain too close to the stream and that the foundation may have been placed on fill and not bearing soil. Members approved contacting the County with the concerns and asking the County to look into the matter.

A motion was made to go on the record with the County that the Hamlet of Beavercreek desires to place the land South of the golf course on Beavercreek Road into the Rural Reserves. The motion did not pass however, as it was felt that more information was needed before taking that action. The subject will come before the members again at the March 26th Town Hall Meeting that will be held at Beavercreek Elementary at 7:00 p.m. It is important for residents of
