Commissioners Ignored Will of Voters When Filling Vacancies

The following is a reprint of an article that originally appeared in the Clackamas Review on February 3, 2009, by Ted Pattee.

In Clackamas County we had two elections last year. The primary was in May and the general election was in November. The voters spoke and the candidates who received the most votes are now in office, with some notable exceptions.

Since the first of the year the county commissioners have appointed two commissioners and a state senator. None of the appointees were selected from the candidates for the office during the last election cycle. It appears that the sitting commissioners are making appointments while ignoring the recently expressed will of the voters.

The first vacancy occurred when Lynn Peterson resigned her seat to assume the chair position to which she was elected. The BCC (Board of County Commissioners) appointed Bob Austin to that position. He is a past mayor of Estacada and did not run for commissioner.

A vacancy in the state senate was created when Kurt Schrader resigned to assume his new congressional post in Washington D.C.. The Clackamas County Democratic Committee sent the BCC a prioritized list of three candidates. The first choice was Toby Forsberg, who ran for the senate and received 13,921 votes. Instead of taking this recommendation, the commissioners selected one of their own, Martha Schrader, the third choice on the list.

This appointment of Schrader has created the third vacancy, one wonders if that had any bearing on her selection. The "short" list of candidates, including Ann Lininger, a Lake Oswego lawyer who was selected, did not include the names of any of the folks who ran for the office during the last election cycle. In fact, two people who ran made themselves available to the voters and made impressive showings. David Mowry ran in the primary and received 17,130 votes and Ron Adams ran in the general election and received 56,869 votes. The voters in Clackamas County may be confused to learn that their choices for county commission positions are of no importance to the sitting commissioners.

How does it happen that four commissioners decide to ignore the will of their constituents so recently expressed? The citizens decided that we wanted five commissioners for several reasons; among them was diversified representation and expertise. With three past mayors, one of whom

was appointed, and a past city councilor, the BCC has solidified an urban perspective for a largely rural county.

In expanding the commission, Clackamas County voters expressed a desire for more efficiency, greater transparency and a broader approach to county issues. They also wanted better access to the commissioners. Yet when asked for an audience with the board, concerned citizens are told, "we are not individually meeting with those recommending applicants." When a suggestion for a public comment period was offered, there was no reply at all from the commissioners. This doesn't seem to be improved access. Appointing a past mayor when there are already two on the board does not improve diversity or expand expertise.

Perhaps what we need to do is change the way vacancies are filled, requiring that replacements be selected from those



Stone Creek Golf's David Phipps Receives National Honors For Environmental Stewardship at Golf Course

David Phipps, Stone Creek Golf Club's maintenance superintendent, received national recognition for environ-

mental stewardship in 2008 on the golf course from *Golf Digest* and Golf Course Superintendent's Association of America (GCSAA).

"This year's winners are to be commended for their commitment to environmental stewardship on the golf course," GCSAA President David S. Downing II, "They, along with their facilities, have demonstrated that golf courses can be compatible with the environment, and in many cases enhance it." Issues of the

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Winners of the ELGA program will be featured in an upcoming issue of *Golf Digest* magazine and GCSAA's *Golf Course Management* magazine. Syngenta Professional Products and Rain Bird Corp. - Golf Division are the presenting partners of the award.

Judges selected winners in three national categories (public, private and resort courses), and an international winner, with an overall winner selected from those four. Recognition was given to the top entry from each GCSAA affiliated chapter, and merit honors were awarded to those who did not earn national or chapter honors but deserved special recognition in the opinion of the judges. Honors will be awarded in New Orleans this spring.

Phipps, a nine-year GCSAA member, is a GCSAA Class A superintendent at Stone Creek Golf Club in Oregon City. He is a three-time Environmental Leaders in Golf Award (ELGA) chapter winner and has been a merit winner as well. Stone Creek is a Certified Audubon Cooperative Sanctuary, and signage around the course is an important part of Phipps' communication process.

He works with the local Audubon Society to provide annual birding and golf course tours for sixth-graders. Phipps also teaches a class called "Golf Course-Quality Lawns" to inform local residents how to properly care and cultivate their lawns using environmentally sustainable practices. The National Association of Conservative Districts is developing the program into a nationwide public outreach initiative.

Stone Creek's extensive drainage system feeds the holding ponds from which the irrigation is drawn. All of the water features at Stone Creek are buffered to create an extra level of protection from runoff. The buffer strips of vegetation also create habitat for a large variety of waterfowl.

Phipps has innovatively found ways to utilize environmental waste, such as aerification plugs to plant new stands

of grass on worn out cart path edges and driving range; relocating dead trees to wetlands for wildlife habitat; and making posts from fallen fir trees to help guide golf cars along cart paths.

The wetland and native areas provide corridors throughout the course enabling wildlife to travel undisturbed, and wildlife habitats are designated throughout the course, encompassing nearly 45 acres. Wildflowers are planted along many native areas to attract honeybees and butterflies, and fruit trees were planted on the course to attract black tailed deer and birds.

Stone Creek is also taking part in a project to revive native Willamette Valley plants, which have been planted in various locations throughout the course.

Twenty-one Prescott bluebird boxes are systematically set around the course. The swallows that live in the dead trees left standing help control the insect population, red tail hawks hunt regularly in the native areas throughout the golf course, and ospreys nest along the tree tops, feeding upon the bass stocked in the ponds for mosquito control. In cooperation with the Xerces Society, many nesting sites of pollinating bees have been located and preserved throughout the property.

Stone Creek also maintains a walking path that circles the property for exercise and nature watching.

House Passes Bill Banning Dangerous Toy-like Novelty Lighters

Bill is part of House Democrats' 2009 Roadmap for Oregon's Future

On February 4, 2009, The House of Representatives passed HB 2365 banning the manufacture, sale, and distribution of dangerous and deceptive, toy-like novelty lighters on a unanimous vote. Readily available at hardware stores, gas stations, and convenience stores, toy-like novelty lighters are easily mistaken for toys and routinely contribute to unintentional fires and injuries to children and families.

"As a former police officer and current firefighter, I'm happy to see we're taking an active role in protecting our children and families from burn injury, death, and property loss," explained Representative Greg Matthews (D-Gresham). "We cannot and should not wait any longer to get these dangerous products off the shelves."

"The hard work done by the State Fire Marshal's office and the Fire Safety Community has been thorough and extraordinary," said Representative Paul Holvey (D-Eugene). "Their leadership on this critical issue has proven vital to the success of the bill."

"If it's predictable, it's preventable," said Randy Simpson, Oregon's State Fire Marshal. "This bill gives us the ability to prevent the fire danger these lighters pose to children, families, and communities."

Banning the sale of dangerous toys, including toy-like novelty lighters, is part of the Oregon House Democrats' 2009 Roadmap for Oregon's Future. HB 2365 awaits a vote in the Senate.

Beavercreek Announces It Will Support World Wildlife Fund's Earth Hour 2009

Join Tens of Millions in Turning Off Lights for Largest Climate Event in History

Beavercreek, February, 25, 2009-The Hamlet of Beaver-

creek announced today that it will officially support Earth Hour 2009, a global climate event led by the World Wildlife Fund. More than 240 cities around the world have already committed to go dark for one hour on March 28, 2009, at 8:30 p.m., as tens of millions of people from all corners of the world unite in a call for global



action on climate change.

"If every household of the 6,500 people who live within the Hamlet were to swap out one regular light bulb for a compact fluorescent light, millions of kilowatt hours could be saved right here in our community," said Bill Merchant, Hamlet Chairman. "We value our rural lifestyle, and protecting our environment is one way to enhance it."

From Amman to Warsaw, city skylines will go dark for one hour as individuals, businesses, government buildings, schools, and major landmarks turn off non-essential lighting in what will be the largest climate event in history.

The list of participating cities in the US includes Atlanta, Chicago, Las Vegas, Los Angeles, Miami, and Nashville with more signing up every day.

"As lights go out in cities around the U.S. and the world on March 28th, Earth Hour will provide world leaders with an unmistakable mandate to negotiate a new international climate change agreement," said WWF President and CEO Carter Roberts. "The climate crisis threatens the ability of our planet to support its inhabitants, and it has never been more urgent that the voice of the people be heard on this issue. Earth Hour not only focuses global attention on the need to find solutions to climate change, but demonstrates the power that each of us has to make a difference in the future of our planet."

400 cities on all seven continents turned off their lights as major icons also went dark, including the Sydney Opera House, the Coliseum in Rome, Stockholm's Royal Castle, the Empire State Building and the Golden Gate Bridge in San Francisco. Google turned its homepage black for an entire day in tribute. But it's not just city dwellers who can make a difference. Hamlet of Beavercreek Acknowledged

Recently, Hamlets and Villages were given a voting seat at the table of the Clackamas County Coordinating Committee (C4). This group, primarily composed of elected officials from Cities, Special Districts, the County Commissioners, and now us, makes transportation recommendations to Metro for distribution of Federal transportation dollars. The proposals come from the Cities, the County, and Area Councils on Transportation (ACTs), which are partnerships between Cities or a City and the County.

Since people living in rural areas (about a third of Clackamas County's population) had only the indirect voice of the Commissioners to represent them, in the last C4 recommendation to Metro on transportation projects the only project without a City sponsor or cosponsor was the extension and improvements to Sunnyside Road.

Now that Hamlets and Villages sit on C4, we have begun the process of forming a Rural Equity Area Council on Transportation (REACT) which we will use to advance transportation issues in rural Clackamas County.


After attending the community meeting at Park Place

School last week I feel compelled to write because our children's voices and their concerns need to be heard throughout our entire community. I guess I just wish more of you could have been present at this meeting, as was Commissioner Nicita, to hear the stories of the people from this community as they wrestled, with much difficulty, at hearing that their community school may have to be closed.

Park Place School is a Title I school and highly credentialed. It is a school with an especially high enrollment of children with special needs and a school which serves many of our low income families. But more than this, this is a special school because this is what brings this community together as they work towards a common goal to educate their children in their neighborhood school.

As I listened to each story, I began to see the terrible devastation to the people of Park Place. The possible closing of their much loved school was beginning to tear at the very fiber of this community. Some parents are so distraught at the possibility of losing their neighborhood school that there is talk of them moving away. It was difficult to watch as Fathers and Mothers wept for the future of their children. One Father in particular related, when he was younger, his school was closed due to budget shortfalls. The trauma he endured was so overwhelming that he never returned to school. He is now older and still 1 ½ years away from completing his GED. When his two Sons were born, he promised he would never let this happen to them, but unfortunately, this Father's dream may not come true.

There were glowing stories of the outstanding teachers at Park Place and how the children attending this school are happy and have excelled, where they did not excel elsewhere. One parent stated "This is the most kid friendly school with several of the most outstanding teachers in the District, Park Place should be a pilot study in mentor-

Report Business-Related Personal Property by March 2

From anvils to zeppelins, your personal property used for business may be taxed. The Oregon Department of Revenue reminds business owners to file personal property returns by March 2.

Oregon law requires that all business owners—even owners of home-based businesses—file a return with their County Assessor that lists all business-related personal

property.

Personal property includes anything that is used for business purposes. It also includes leased equipment such as copiers.

The County Assessor calculates the tax due each year based on the business owner's personal property return. The assessor may cancel the tax if total personal property is valued under \$15,000.

However, even if a business owner's personal property value falls below \$15,000, they still must file a return, according to Syndi Gates, a department tax analyst.

If you're a business owner, you must file a return each year even if:

- 1. you didn't receive a tax return form from the County in which your business property is located;
- 2. the tax was cancelled in prior years;
- 3. you sold or closed the business during the year or
- 4. you sold or disposed of the personal property.

"If a business owner files late," Gates said, "there is a penalty that varies from 5 percent to 50 percent of the taxes due, depending on how late the return is filed."

Personal property is included as part of the business owner's property tax statement. The tax is due each November 15.


Family members have not heard from him since then and he has not returned to the Milwaukie apartment he shared with his roommate. He has not been to work since his disappearance.

Clackamas County Commissioners Issue Resolution Calling for Exhaustive Review of Palomar Pipeline

Clackamas County Commissioners have issued a resolution calling for an extensive review of the environmental consequences and potential threats to endangered species and protected forest lands posed by construction of a natural gas pipeline through portions of the County. In addition, the resolution specifies the commission's concerns that neither LNG facilities nor associated pipelines should be approved until the need for such facilities in Oregon has been established.

consistent with federal laws, and it is shown that the public need outweighs the private harm to landowners and to natural resources throughout the County.

Palomar Gas Transmission has filed an application with the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) for approval of the pipeline which would cross approximately 66 local rivers and streams in the Mount Hood National Forest, including the Molalla and Clackamas Rivers.

"The Palomar pipeline should not be approved until State and Federal agencies have conducted a thorough, objective and scientific examination of the environmental benefits and consequences of alternative routes including a rigorous evaluation of impacts on threatened and endangered species, the Wild and Scenic Clackamas River, and recreation opportunities in the Mount Hood National Forest," Commissioners declared in the resolution that was approved unanimously.

"We have heard from Clackamas County residents who have been angered by the Federal review process for these facilities. While the Clackamas County Board of Commissioners does not have a decision making role in this project, we want to be clear that a comprehensive review of this proposal is necessary and the need for this facility should be established before it goes forward," said Lynn Peterson, Chair of the Board of Commissioners. "The board issued this resolution to demonstrate that the Commission is united on its concerns about the proposed natural gas pipeline."

The resolution calls for "close coordination" with State and Federal agencies reviewing the pipeline and to work directly with citizens to provide information on issues related to eminent domain.

The Federal review process is expected to extend throughout the year with a FERC decision in November or December 2009. The project is a joint venture involving Northwest Natural Gas Corp. and TransCanada Corp. If approved, the construction is scheduled to begin in 2011.

The February meeting of the Hamlet of Beavercreek took place on Wednesday, February 25, 2009, at the Beavercreek Grange on Kamrath Road at 7:00 p.m. with 28 residents and guests in attendance.

There was no guest speaker.

All Directors were present, except Christine Kozinski, who was excused.

The minutes of the January 28, 2009, meeting were read and approved.

It was announced that the Beavercreek Grange will be hosting a St. Patrick's Day Dinner at the Grange on Kamrath Road on Sunday, March 15th from noon to 4:00 p.m.

The menu will consist of Corned Beef and Cabbage with boiled potatoes and carrots. There will also be drinks, ice cream and cookies.

This is an all you can eat dinner, so bring your St Patrick's Day appetite. Prices will be \$6.00 for adults, kids 6-12 \$3.50 and children under 5 free.

The Grange will also start hosting breakfasts once a month from June to October. Further information will be in the Beavercreek Bulletin at a later date.

The Treasurer's report was given.

There was a land use action before those present for a cell tower at 20350 Henrici Road. There were about 8 residents present who were in opposition of this proposed cell tower. Land slide issues for this area were a primary concern due to land movement during heavy rains this past winter and a history of unstable ground in the area.

Because of this land instability there is the potential for any residence or building within a 150 ft radius of the monopole suffering extensive damage. This would be a public safety issue.

The area for the placement of this pole has already had its trees and vegetation removed as well as cuts made into the steep hillside that could add to the land movement and further instability issues. It was recommended that slide maps need to be studied.

There was a motion to deny the application due to the safety and land slide potential for this location.

It was also announced that there has been another application for a cell tower. This time at 16941 S. Howards Mill Rd. The Board advised those present that the Board had requested that this application be denied as there is already a new cell tower approved for the area by the Hamlet. It was suggested that the new applicant should mount their equipment on that tower instead up putting up one of their own. This is consistent with Clackamas County co-location rules.

There was a request made for individuals from the Beavercreek Hamlet to volunteer to sit on Clackamas River Water Board and Budget Committees. We need to be represented since we pay more for our water than others in the North service area and our voices are not being heard.

It was discussed to look into the Hamlet participating at the Oregon City Farmers Market. It starts up again the first weekend in May. Anyone have some ideas?

Christine Kozinski was to give a report on the Oregon City Schools impacted by budget shortfalls, but she was not present.

It was announced that the Hamlet of Beavercreek along with the Mulino and Stafford Hamlets will have a seat at the Clackamas County Coordinating Committee (C-4) meetings. Villages will also be included. The Hamlets will rotate quarterly on who votes on behalf of the Hamlets. Currently, Norm Andreen of Beavercreek is in the voting position. C-4 makes decisions pertaining to transportation, so it will be good to have a voice on this committee.

It was announced at the meeting that the Hamlet of Beavercreek will be taking part in Earth Hour on March 28, 2009, at 8:30 p.m.

Tens of millions of people in hundreds of cities around the world will come together once again to make a bold statement about their concern about climate change by doing something quite simple—turning off their lights for one hour from 8:30 to 9:30 p.m.

Bill Merchant, Chair of the Hamlet, read a Proclamation and Resolution regarding the Hamlet of Beavercreek's participation in Earth Hour. At the end of the Earth Hour presentation everyone attending the meeting was given a compact fluorescent light bulb (CFL) to convert one light in their home. If every household converted one light to a Compact Fluorescent Light it would save Gigawatts of energy and reduce our carbon footprint!

It was noted that CFLs have hazardous chemicals inside. So when a light goes out they need to be recycled at the Metro Transfer Station at the Hazardous Waste Facility. They are recycled free of charge. The meeting was adjourned at 8:20 p.m. The next meeting will be held at Beavercreek Elementary School on Yeoman Road. This will be a Town Hall Meeting and will include a raffle for prizes.

Everyone is encouraged to attend the monthly Hamlet Community meetings and the quarterly Town Hall meetings to participate and share ideas and concerns on the issues pertinent to our community. Tax Credit Could Ease Burden of Paying Child Care

Oregon's Working Family Child Care (WFC) tax credit may Hopkins Memorial Tree Farm: Three certificates for help low-income families recoup some of their child care costs.

A refundable credit means that if the credit is more than Oregon City Golf Club: Two 18 Hole Rounds of Golf, do- the tax you owe, the state will pay you the difference. "A family that qualifies for the credit could get some money back from the state even if they don't owe taxes," Ball said. You may qualify for the credit if: you paid qualifying child care expenses to allow you (and your spouse or registered domestic partner) to work or attend school, and you had at least \$7,500 of earned income, and you had less than \$2,951 in investment income (such as interest, dividends, or capital gains), and your income was less than the limits for vour household size.

> You must be able to prove you made the payments for the child care. Keep proof-of-payment records for at least three years from the date you file your return. If you have no proof of your expenses, we may deny your credit," she said.
