Urban/Rural Reserves Update

Representatives from Clackamas, Multnomah and Washington Counties have produced final proposals on Urban and Rural Reserves

What's happening now?

After months of collecting data, analyzing land suitability and consulting stakeholders and citizens, the Metro Council and Clackamas, Multnomah and Washington County Commissions have arrived at preliminary agreements on maps of urban and rural reserves for each County. They have also crafted the legal agreements that will determine the use of reserves into the future. These proposals identify 271,517 acres of rural reserves and 28,086 acres of urban reserves.

The three County Boards of Commissioners and the Metro council were scheduled to vote the week of Feb. 22nd to adopt the maps and intergovernmental agreements. In Clackamas County the County Board of Commissioners were scheduled to meet at 10:00 a.m. Thursday, Feb. 25, 2010, at 2051 Kaen Road, Oregon City.

What's happened so far?

This work has been led by the "Core 4" - one commissioner from each County and one Metro councilor. Acting as emissaries from their respective governing bodies, they have brought the interests of their constituents to these ongoing negotiations over the size and configuration of both urban and rural reserves. After each meeting, these four representatives return to their council and commissions to share progress they have made and consider next steps. Between meetings, they consult with officials and stakeholders around the region.

The Core 4 completed their initial proposed regional reserves map on Dec. 16, 2009, and released it for public consideration in January. In early February, officials reviewed public comments gathered at open houses and hearings around the region and revised their proposals.

The Core 4 met on Feb. 8, 2010, and determined that each County would work with Metro to revise maps and draft principles that will guide development and conservation of reserves over time.

What's next?

Later this spring the Counties will pass ordinances designating Rural Reserves and will adopt policies in their comprehensive plans to implement them. Metro will pass an ordinance designating Urban Reserves and will adopt policies within the Regional Framework Plan to implement Urban Reserves. The reserves map, intergovernmental

When you look at the proposed map for the Reserves for Clackamas County all the area all the area around the Urban Growth Boundary (pink) that lies South and Southeast that is not designated as "Urban" (blue) is designated as "Rural" (green) except around Oregon City where there are four areas that were left undesignated. These areas are white. One of these, the largest, includes Beavercreek. Why? A very good question! So much for public comment!

Several Persons Convicted For Criminal Trespass Following Oregon State Police Investigation

Seven people who were found illegally operating their All Terrain Vehicles (ATVs) on Longview Timber Company during archery season near Silverton in September 2009 have pled guilty in Marion County Justice Court.

In September 2009, an Oregon State Police (OSP) Fish & Wildlife Division trooper responded to complaints from archery hunters regarding a group of five people operating ATVs on Longview Timber property. The operation of ATVs on Longview Timber property is prohibited year round. The complainant confronted the riders and told them they were not allowed to ride their ATVs on the property. The five people ignored the warning and continued on their way. The trooper located the group approximately seven miles from the nearest locked gate. There were signs outlining the restrictions that the riders had driven past. The group had driven around a locked gate. Members of the group indicated that they didn't think it was a big deal because they were on gravel roads.

Each of the defendants was ordered to pay Court Fees of \$167.00; a Fine of \$250.00 as well Restitution to Longview Timber in the amount of \$500.00

Personnel from Longview Timber Company were at the

court appearance. They served the five defendants with notice that they are not allowed on Longview Timber Company property for five years.

Six days later, the trooper was patrolling the same area. The trooper heard ATVs approaching his location. He waited and then observed two ATV's. The riders told the trooper that a contractor had opened the gate and let them into the property. The trooper located the contractor, who told the trooper a totally different story. The contractor was leaving the property and met the riders at the gate. He had told the two riders that they were not allowed to ride their ATVs on the property. When the contractor opened the gate to leave, the two riders squeezed by him through the gate, and continued on.

Each of the defendants was ordered to pay Court Fees of \$167.00; a Fine of \$250.00 as well as Restitution to Longview Timber in the amount of \$500.00.

Personnel from Longview Timber Company were at the court appearance. They served Ms. Rogers and Mr. Schumacher with notice they are not allowed on Longview Timber Company property for lifetime. NOTE:

This article is not about timberland in the Beavercreek area, but none the less, ATV riding and trespassing on private land has been an issue. The fines, etc., above could also apply in these cases. If it is posted and you fail to heed the warning a similar fate may meet you. The Editor



change," said Teresa Miller, administrator of the Insurance Division. "We look forward to providing even more information to Oregonians about potential rate changes and receiving their input through a new public comment process."

The Insurance Division must review health insurance rates for individual, small employer (2-50 employees), and portability plans before they take effect in Oregon. Portability plans are available to people who lose employer-sponsored coverage.

As in many States, health insurance rates in Oregon have been rising by double digits, reflecting increases in medical spending. Experts expect that trend to continue in 2010, particularly for individual policies.

New rules just adopted put in place reforms passed by the 2009 Legislature. These include:

A 30-day period for the public to comment on rate requests. Consumers can learn more at: http://tinyurl.com/ORHealthRates.

More detail about what insurers spend on salaries, broker commissions, marketing and advertising, and other administrative expenses.

Ability to consider an insurer's overall profitability rather than just costs for a particular type of insurance such as individual health plans.

All the changes are effective for rate requests filed on or after April 1. An advisory committee that included insurers, small businesses, and consumer groups worked with the division on the rules.

"Our department has been working for the past several years to make health insurance costs more transparent," said Cory Streisinger, director of the Department of Consumer and Business Services. "Providing the public with information is key as we as a state and nation grapple with escalating health care costs."

A law the department proposed in 2007, made health insurance rate review filings



The Women's Empowerment Project (WEP), a Federally-funded program, is designed for women who were in abusive relationships in the past, or are thinking about ending a current one.


Sponsored by Clackamas County Community Corrections, the WEP classes are the first of its kind. The classes are free and open to all women in Clackamas County. Evening and morning classes begin in March and will run for 14 weeks. Topics include: the cycle of violence, coping mechanisms, effects of abuse on children, risk assessments, safety planning, non-violent communication and self-esteem.

Domestic violence impacts families across Clackamas County. Abusers hurt their victims economically, emotionally, verbally and sexually. They usually control their violence carefully, and make sure their behavior is kept out of the public eye.

Local Families Get Free Tax Help Through United Way's Tax Preparation Partnerships

Aiming to put savings and tax refunds in taxpayers' pockets, United Way of the Columbia-Willamette is funding free tax preparation programs for people across the region who may be eligible for tax refunds through the Earned Income



Tax Credit (EITC).

EITC can be a financial boost for working people hit by hard economic times. Typically, Earned Income Tax Credit is available to most families earning less than \$43,279 annually; and to individuals with an annual income of less than \$13,440. Working families claiming EITC can receive up to \$5,657 annually with tax credits. According to IRS records, about 25% of individuals and families living in Oregon who qualify for the earned credit don't receive the refund because they haven't filed for it. The refund is not automatic, and taxpayers must incorporate EITC into their tax filing.

United Way has allocated \$77,500 to support free tax preparation programs in the Portland-Vancouver metro area. Of that amount, \$50,000 came from United Way's strategic initiatives fund, while Bank of America Charitable Foundation contributed \$12,500. The WalMart Foundation dedicated \$15,000 to provide tax assistance for people with disabilities.

"As many continue to feel the impact of the challenging economy, our goal is to establish a more integrated and accessible program that helps American better their lives," said Margaret McKenna, president of the WalMart Foundation.

Since 2008, Bank of America has supported free tax preparation services in the Portland-Vancouver metro area. The effort is part of the larger Bank of America-funded United Way Financial Stability Partnership, which is designed to improve the financial well-being of low-income in-

dividuals and families by providing tools to increase their income, build savings and develop and maintain their assets.

"Building the financial security of our local families is critical to revitalizing our economy," said Roger Hinshaw, Oregon and Southwest Washington president, Bank of America. "Free tax preparation sites provide an opportunity to help put money back in the pockets of hard-working families. Our longstanding financial stability partnership with United Way is one great example of how the bank is helping support pathways out of poverty."

Through United Way's EITC efforts, trained volunteers at area agencies have already begun providing tax assistance to low-wage families and individuals, free of charge. Many volunteers are members of local AARP chapters. Funding provides software and training to volunteers, who are required to take a 40-hour tax preparers' class and pass an IRS exam. Last year, over 600 volunteers helped families and individuals with free tax preparation.

In Multnomah, Clackamas, and Washington counties, United Way funding supports CASH Oregon's tax preparation and filing sites. In Clark County, Community Housing Resource Center is United Way's partner in providing tax services. Tax preparation services to people with disabilities made possible by the WalMart Foundation grant are offered through Cascadia Behavioral Healthcare's Garlington Center in North Portland.

A number of partners also provide culturally-specific tax help for low-income households. Bilingual volunteers are available at sites that serve ethnic immigrant communities, such as Latino, Russian, Ukrainian, Chinese, Korean, and Vietnamese, among others. United Way's partners in providing culturally-specific tax services include: Bienestar in Washington County; Impact NW, serving seniors and Russian-speaking residents in southeast and outer SE Portland; the Asian Health and Service Center; and the Native American Youth & Family Center (NAYA).

The County was reluctant at the beginning to embrace the mapping, but as the landslide data is coming in the County has been blown away with the information that the mapping has made available. This information will be very helpful in the future for citing roads as well as future development.

Christine also gave another report on cell towers. There have been issues in the past with companies requesting cell towers and the County approving them while not knowing where existing towers were located. This does not follow the guidelines set for cell towers. The companies are supposed to co-locate on existing towers, not put up another proprietary tower. Bill Merchant shared that in the "ground truthing" phase of clarifying the lines of the property South of Henrici Road, that has been designated for Urban Reserves, it was suggested that the water tower that is owned by Oregon City also be brought in. That way the property with the water tower would be within their jurisdiction.

It was announced that there will be a tour of the County Planning Department, Wednesday, March 3, 2010 at 6:30 p. m. in the Development Services Building, 150 S. Beavercreek Rd. All are invited to attend.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:42 p.m.

Portland General Electric Q & A

Question:

I remember when the electric company used to let you trade in your old light bulbs for new ones. How are we supposed to dispose of them, especially the fluorescents that you often recommend? I know that can't be good in the landfill!

Answer:

You're right — old light bulbs should be kept out of the trash. That's because all fluorescent light bulbs contain a small amount of mercury, and incandescent light bulbs contain lead. Both are substances we want to keep out of our air and water and should be disposed of properly.

For perspective, compact fluorescent lights average age about 5 milligrams of mercury in each bulb. Mostly as mercury vapor — compared to 500 milligrams found in a mercury thermometer.

In most communities, you can dispose of CFLs, fluorescent tubes and incandescent light bulbs at centers set up to recycle or safely store household hazardous wastes such as paints, solvents, batteries and automotive oil.

Also, IKEA and The Home Depot now accept used CFLs for recycling. See a list of disposal sites in our

Oregon Home Insurance Costs Among Lowest In Nation

Oregon homeowner insurance is among the least costly in the nation, averaging \$496 a year, according to a nationwide survey. That compares to an average \$822 nationwide and is lower than all States except Idaho and Wisconsin.

The 2007 data, the most recent available, was released recently by the National Association of Insurance Commissioners (NAIC).

"Oregon's competitive insurance market helps keep premiums low, as does the lack of hurricanes and tornadoes in the State," said Teresa Miller, administrator of the Oregon Department of Consumer and Business Services' Insurance Division.

Since the late 1980s, catastrophes have been occurring with greater frequency and severity, and, in the past decade, have become a bigger factor in the pricing of home insurance, according to the survey. Of the 10 most costly insured property U.S. catastrophes through 2008, eight were hurricanes. That includes Hurricane Katrina in 2005, according to Insurance Services Office (ISO) statistics. ISO's Property Claim Services (PCS) unit provides catastrophe loss information to insurance and other industries.

Flooding, earthquakes, and wildfire are more common concerns in the West.

"Homeowner policies typically don't cover floods or earthquakes, but coverage can be purchased separately for gated the collision and cleared the highway. both," Miller said.

Renters' insurance is also lower in Oregon compared to other States. The average annual cost in Oregon was \$161 in 2007 compared to \$182 nationally, according to the report. That amounts to less than \$14 monthly for a policy that protects against everything from fire to theft.

Numbers reported in the survey are averages; premiums for individual homeowners and renters may be higher or lower. A particular homeowner's insurance costs, for example, depend on the amount of insurance purchased, the types of property covered, the types of perils covered and the limits and deductibles a policyholder chooses.

"Even though average premiums in Oregon are low, homeowners may see increases from time to time." Miller

said. "It's always beneficial to shop around for insurance and make sure you're receiving any discounts that apply."

OSP Reports First Month Enforcement Effort For Cell Phone Law Violations

During the first month of enforcing Oregon's new cell phone law banning most uses of mobile communication devices while driving a motor vehicle, Oregon State Police (OSP) troopers statewide reported citing 41 drivers and warning over 250 others.

Effective January 1, 2010, with some exceptions, it is unlawful in Oregon for a driver to use a cell phone without using a hands-free accessory while operating a motor vehicle. Violation of the cell phone law is a primary offense, meaning that a police officer may stop a driver solely for observing the violation, is a class D traffic violation with a minimum base fine of \$142.

Clackamas County Approves Agreement With Metro To Set Urban/Rural Reserves For Next 50 Years

UPDATE!

At its February 25, 2010, business meeting, the Clackamas County Board of Commissioners approved an intergovernmental agreement (IGA) with Metro to designate Urban and Rural reserves in Clackamas County for the next 50 years.

Clackamas County Commissioner Charlotte Lehan, the County's representative on the Core 4 regional decisionmaking group, said, "This is certainly a significant milestone in the regional reserves process. After two long years of hard work and compromise, of gathering and reviewing data, and of talking with the public and communities about the future of this special region, we have reached agreement."

The IGA includes a map of designated Urban and Rural Reserve lands in Clackamas County, and planning principles for the Urban Reserves. There are 70,500 acres of Rural Reserves (areas that will not be urbanized in the next 50 years) and 13,660 acres of Urban Reserves (areas that may be brought into the Portland Urban Growth Boundary [UGB] during the next 50 years).

Lehan added, "We have come a long way in this process and, though Clackamas County is not yet fully satisfied with the results, we continue to be committed to working as an equal partner with Metro, Multnomah and Washington Counties to maintain and enhance the livability and prosperity of the region."

The agreement requires concept planning for any Urban Reserve area brought into the UGB. That planning must involve extensive public involvement, as well the participation of adjacent cities and area community groups. Other provisions in the IGA and related principles include:

may take place separately, but concept planning for the Stafford basin areas will be coordinated.

- Concept plans will be approved by Metro, the County and cities that will have jurisdiction of new urban areas, and new urban areas will be governed and planned by cities.
- Metro and the three metro area counties will review reserve designations in 20 years.

"This agreement could only have happened with the involvement and commitment of hundreds, even thousands of people - citizens, community groups, businesses, County and Metro staff and elected officials who worked diligently," said Clackamas County Commission Chair Lynn Peterson. "On behalf of the Clackamas County Board, I would like to express deep appreciation to everyone who has worked on and been involved with this process."

After Metro's approval of the IGA, Metro will incorporate Clackamas County's Urban Reserves into its Regional Framework Plan and Clackamas County will proceed to adopt the reserves and implementing materials into its Comprehensive Plan. That process will begin Monday, March 8, when the Clackamas County Planning Commission holds a public hearing on reserves at 6:30 p.m. at the

Development Services Building at 150 Beavercreek Rd., Oregon City.



Clackamas County Receives High Marks in County Health Rankings

A report by the University of Wisconsin Population Health Institute and the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation the first annual "health checkup" of the nation's counties ranked Clackamas County high on overall health third best of 36 Oregon counties.

"The County Health Rankings report is important because it helps us identify factors that are making our residents un-



healthy, and it helps us understand how we compare to

The County Health Rankings also show how Clackamas County ranks on individual factors that influence its overall health ranking. The county received a high ranking in the areas of percentage of the population age 25 or over with at least a 4-year college degree; low premature death rates; and low teen birth rates.

While Clackamas County ranked high overall, the report helps identify areas of improvement. For example, although the county ranked comparatively well for the rate of adult obesity, those rates continued to rise.

Although the county's rankings are favorable compared to other Oregon counties regarding some environmental factors such as access to healthy foods, Clackamas County would like to further improve access for residents to locally grown, fresh foods.
