Clackamas and Multnomah County Boards Appoint Ann Lininger to Fill House District 38 Vacancy

In a joint meeting Clackamas and Multnomah County Commissioners appointed Ann Lininger to serve as State Representative in House District 38. The vote was unanimous.

Lininger will serve the remaining term of former State Rep. Chris Garrett, who resigned in December after accepting Gov. John Kitzhaber's appointment to the Oregon Court of Appeals. The term is scheduled to expire in 2014.

Earlier this month, the Democratic Precinct Committees for House District 38, which comprises parts of Clackamas and Multnomah counties, nominated three candidates for consideration. The candidates were interviewed by commissioners in a meeting conducted by Clackamas County Commission Chair John Ludlow.

The candidates were:

Ann Lininger, General Counsel for Oregon Iron Works and former Clackamas County Commissioner.

Sonya Fischer, a lawyer and advocate for disabled persons who is a board member for the Oregon Trial Lawyers Association.

Moses Ross, a political consultant and Chair of the Multnomah Neighborhood Association.

Clackamas Repertory Theatre returns for its 10th anniversary season, featuring an American classic, a Rodgers and Hammerstein musical, and the area premiere of a 2011 Broadway hit. The season was formally an-

nounced during the theater company's fundraiser on February 1.

The 2014 season begins June 27 with the 1939 comedy "The Philadelphia Story," by Philip Barry. Philly socialite Tracy Lord, on the eve of her second wedding, tries to juggle her fiancé, her ex-husband and a handsome visiting reporter who all vie for her attention. This mad-cap high society comedy starred Katherine Hepburn, Cary Grant and Jimmy Stewart in an Oscar winning film but is rarely done on stage. It's a comedy classic with style that will leave you happy and even a little romantic.

Doren Elias directs this classic American play, which features CRT company members Jayson Shanafelt, James Sharinghousen, Jayne Stevens and Ernie Casciato. "The Philadelphia Story" runs through July 20.

Clackamas Rep's annual musical, running August 2-24, is Rodgers and Hammerstein's "Carousel," directed by David Smith-English. The story is set in a whimsical carnival world filled with romance, robbery and intrigue, where the hero is not your typical romantic lead. Carnival barker Billy Bigelow is a rough roustabout who learns some tough life lessons. It's Maine in 1873 and this coastal town is filled with sailors and whalers and women. Billy commits a crime and in a twist fate winds up dead but is given a second chance at redemption. The brilliant and beautiful score features classics like "If I Loved You," "June Is Bustin' Out All Over" and "You'll Never Walk Alone." Company member Michael Mitchell is featured as Billy, with Dru Rutledge, such a standout in "Oklahoma!" playing Julie Jordan.

"Good People" was nominated for Best Play at the 2011 Tony Awards and helped establish David Lindsay-Abaire as one of America's hottest playwrights. The action takes place in the notorious South Boston neighborhood where the locals are known as "Southies." Margie Walsh lives a hard scrabble life there taking care of her disabled daughter, working at the local dollar store and playing bingo with her friends. When she loses her job she visits an old high school flame she claims owes her a good deed. Things get ugly and funny when she invades his home to see if he's still "Good People." David Smith-English directs. The play opens Sept. 19 and runs through Oct. 5.

CCC TV Provides Showcase for Student Work

There was a time when the Clackamas Community College cable access channel provided telecourse lectures for students to watch at home. With the growth of distance learning via computer, the days of telecourses are a thing of the past. Today the college's cable access channel provides a showcase for the work of students studying digital multimedia communications at the college.

Andy Mingo, director of the CCC Digital Multimedia Communications (DMC) program, is working in partnership with the office of Clackamas County Cable Communications, with support from the county's economic development services. The program is being positioned to both provide quality content for the cable television channel, but to also support the growing film and media production economic sector in the county and the state.

CCC started its DMC program five years ago as the creative services industry in the Portland area was taking off. Since 2007, the metro area has seen a 24 percent increase in film and video production jobs, and the sector is forecast to grow by 25 percent over the next 10 years. According to a recent study by the Northwest Economic Research Center report, Oregon's film and television industry has a direct impact of \$788, 825,355 in the state's economy.

Students in the program gain the skills needed to work in entry-level positions in film and video, broadcast journalism, production and related fields. CCC offers an associate's degree in digital multimedia communications, as well as high quality training for video production and multimedia reporting. Student work provides a variety of creative and informational content for the CCC cable channel. Gordon Christianson, a graduate of the DMC program, manages the content for the channel, which includes segments about college programs, speakers and events.

Clackamas County's support of the DMC program has enabled it to offer education and training that has not been available in the state before. Through Public, Education and Government (PEG) grants the county has provided to the college, the DMC program has purchased state-of-the-art equipment such as a 16-camera, Phasespace motion capture system and a RED Epic, professional cinema camera for educational training and workforce development.

"These two media systems are industry standard, and CCC is the only film or digital media program of any kind in the state of Oregon that is currently able to offer such a level of training for a growing and vibrant high-tech industry such as film and media," said Mingo.

This term, for the first time in the state, CCC is offering a motion-capture technology class, providing the training and equipment to support the state's growing movie, gaming and animation industry.



CCC Joins SALT to Assist Students with Debt Management

Student financial debt is a growing problem in the United States. Americans now owe more than \$1 trillion in Issues of the

student financial debt, surpassing credit card debt. Undergraduate borrowers who graduated in 2012 owed on average \$29,400 in debt, a 25 percent increase from just four years earlier.

At the same time, the default rate on student loans is growing, damaging borrower's credit, making it difficult for students beginning their careers to obtain mortgages, car loans and other types of financing.

To address the issue of financial literacy among students, Clackamas Community College has teamed up with SALT(TM), a financial education resource created by the nonprofit American Student Assistance (ASA), to empower students and recent graduates to take control of their student loan debt on a practical, day-to-day level.

"When managed properly, student debt is a great investment in the future and the foundation for building good credit," said Chippi Bello, director of Financial Aid at CCC "Where students run into trouble is when they don't have the proper information or skills to make financial decisions in their best interest."

SALT, available online at saltmoney.org, is a dynamic, multichannel educational program that teaches students and alumni how to borrow less for college, borrow the right types of loans, make repayment stress-free, and build money skills for life. Students can subscribe to the SALT website where there are numerous videos, tools, articles and even comics offering information on smart money management and decisions.

CCC joins a growing number of colleges and universities across the nation that have partnered with SALT. Several community colleges in Oregon have partnered with SALT including Rogue, Southwestern and Klamath community colleges.

ASA is a nonprofit organization with more than 50 years' experience helping people make better decisions about financing their education and repaying student loans.

Stop Invasive Weeds in Their Tracks

The term "weeds" is commonly used to refer to any undesirable plants, but fails to describe the onslaught of non-native invasive plants we see transforming our landscape today. More than just a gardener's dilemma, invasive weeds are having a profound impact on the world around us. It has been estimated that invasive species cost the United States 143 billion dollars per year. These expenses are absorbed by all of us through increased costs of food, forestry products, and livestock feed. We see increased taxes for State and local weed control, decreased property values.

Invasive weeds also have a negative impact on wildlife. Weeds adversely affect our forests and natural areas by replacing the native plants that are important to wildlife. These invasive weeds disrupt complex food webs and alter natural processes which have a ripple effect on a wide variety of wildlife. Ultimately, invasive weed infestation results in land that is severely degraded and less "Oregon-like".

February 23 - 28 is National Invasive Species Awareness Week (http://www.nisaw.org/) which serves as a reminder of the impact that invasive weeds have on our landscape and on our society. We encourage you to take the opportunity this week to learn how you can help spread the word and not the weeds.

The top 10 WeedWise tips to give invasive weeds the brush-off

- 1. Recognize invasiveness. Look for new or aggressive plants that spread rapidly and displace other vegetation. Familiarize yourself with invasive weeds in your area. Use online resources (http://www.oregon.gov/ODA/PLANT/WEEDS/Pages/statelist2.aspx) or attend local weed watcher trainings available in your area.
- **2. Stop them before they start.** Avoid disturbing the ground, and maintain healthy ground cover to prevent many invasive weeds from establishing.
- **3. Know what you grow.** Many of our invasive weeds have been introduced by a curious gardener. Research new plantings and only purchase seeds and plants from reputable vendors.
- **4. Start small and finish small.** Control invasive weeds when you first see them. By controlling small patches you reduce the time and expenses needed to eradicate them.
- **5. Heed the seed.** Prevent invasive weeds from setting seed to reduce the number of weeds in next year. Pull, dig, cut, or spray flowering weeds before they set viable seed. If weeds do set manage to set seed, remove and bag up any seed heads and dispose of them in your trash.
- **6. Don't spread as you tread.** Invasive weeds are most commonly associated with people. Recognize that you could be moving seed around during your day to day activities. If you are traveling through weed infested areas, be sure to clean your shoes, clothing, equipment, and vehicles to prevent spreading invasive weeds to other loca-



tions.

- **7. Be patient and diligent.** Controlling invasive weeds can be a long term process. It is easy to get discouraged when tackling large infestations, but recognize that controlling invasive weeds gets easier with each subsequent year.
- **8. Report your invasive weeds.** Help in the statewide effort to combat invasive weeds. If you spot new and aggressive invaders, report them to your local weed expert through the Oregon Invasive Species Hotline (www.oregoninvasiveshotline.org).
- **9. Know when to seek help.** Some weeds can be difficult to control and may require particular methods or techniques for eradication efforts to be successfully. Contact your local weed control specialists for assistance (http://www.oregon.gov/ODA/PLANT/WEEDS/Pages/county_contacts.aspx).
 - 10. Get with the organization. There are many organiza-

Clackamas County Commissioners Approve Ambulance Contract with American Medical Response

Clackamas County Commissioners Thursday formally approved a five-year contract with American Medical Response (AMR) to provide emergency and non-emergency ambulance service for Clackamas County.

The vote was 3-2 with Commissioners Jim Bernard, Paul Savas and Martha Schrader voting in support and Chair John Ludlow and Commissioner Tootie Smith, voting no.

The contract with Clackamas County, AMR, and local fire districts includes an option to extend the agreement up to an additional five years based on performance.

The new contract includes:

Continued service for the nationally-renowned Reach and Treat Team and the county's River Rescue Program.

A 19 percent reduction in transport costs for the term of the contract.

Systematic commitments to innovation between AMR and local fire districts.

In February 2012, County staff began the process of developing requests for proposals (RFP's) for ambulance services after Commissioners decided to seek independent bids for service. A year later, RFP's were formally issued.

In April 2013, one bid was received by the deadline; another bid was not accepted because it was submitted after the deadline had expired. A month later, the County informed AMR that it would pursue a contract for ambulance service.

Earlier this month, Commissioners decided to go forward with a contract with AMR after nearly a year of negotiations

The onsite construction of Oregon's World War II Memorial began on the grounds of the State Capitol on Monday, February 3.

While no formal ceremony occurred, World War II Memorial Foundation board members and President Lou

Jaffe, ODVA Director Cameron Smith, and supporters observed the start of construction.

A formal dedication ceremony at the memorial is planned this year on June 6, the 70th anniversary of the Allied landings on the beaches of Normandy, France on D-Day.

Jaffe said the purpose of the memorial is not only to honor the war's veterans, but to educate young people. The memorial will honor members of the armed services, and everyone on the home front who demonstrated support through their work in the shipyards, in hospitals, as coast watchers, on the farms and elsewhere. That includes women who built ships in Portland and school children who held scrap metal drives and hauled wagons full of tin cans to make their small but significant contributions.

"It was probably our nation's finest hour, coming together in a unified manner. And that's what we're trying to preserve. All will be acknowledged in a series of storyboards that highlight Oregon's involvement in the war on the home front and specific military units," Jaffe said. "The veterans, families and Oregonians who participated in World War II deserve to have a memorial."

Located at the corner of Cottage and Court streets, the memorial will cover a 75 by 75 foot area. At its center will be a 33-foot-high obelisk, referring to Oregon being the 33rd state in the union. A world map will be engraved on the memorial's footprint with markers for major battles and theaters of operation.

Oregon is one of only six states in the U.S. without a World War II memorial to honor its resident veterans. In 2011, then-Gov. Ted Kulongoski and the Oregon Legislature

formalized a task force and foundation, authorizing it to build an official memorial in Salem.

The foundation's late-2013 fund raising efforts activated several matching grants that helped the project come closer to its needed goal of raising \$1.135 million before construction could begin. Jaffe expressed deep appreciation for the generosity of the Larry and Jeannette Epping Family Fund, the Murdock Charitable Trust, the R.H. Parker/United Foundation, Dick Withnell, and several other major contributors who helped make this endeavor a reality.

"But, the largest donation came from the State of Oregon who provided funding and support," he said. "We are incredibly grateful to them and to the hundreds of private donors, too."

Along the corner of a low wall on the memorial are the engraved names of the Oregon service members who died in or as the result of combat. Two black granite benches will invite visitors to sit and reflect on our nation and state's shared sacrifice during wartime.

Approximately 152,000 Oregonians served in World War II and of those, more than 3,700 gave their lives. There are more than 20,000 Oregonian World War II veterans still living.

Ansel Adams: Masterworks on Exhibit at the Oregon History Museum Now Through April 15

The Oregon Historical Society's Oregon History Museum has just opened the popular traveling exhibition "Ansel Adams: Masterworks," on view until April 15, 2014. The exhibition features a collection of forty-eight works by Ansel Adams (1902 -1984), constituting about two-thirds of a selection Adams made late in his life to serve as a succinct representation of his life's work. He himself felt these photographs were his best. Called "The Museum Set," these works reveal the importance Adams placed on the drama and splendor of natural environments that might not, to the ordinary passing hiker, have revealed their secrets.

Included are many of Adams' most famous and bestloved photographs which encompass the full scope of his work: elegant details of nature, architectural studies, portraits, and the breathtaking landscapes for which he is revered. The exhibition also includes a photo portrait of Ansel Adams by James Alinder.

In a career that spanned more than five decades Ansel Adams became one of America's most beloved landscape photographers and one of its more respected environmentalists. Adams profoundly influenced the course of 20th century photography not only through the example of his sumptuous and technically precise images, but also by means of his personal energy and devotion to advancing the cause of photography as an art form. As an artist, educator, innovator, and writer, he helped establish many of the institutions that have come to represent the highest aspirations of the medium of photography.

The collection was donated to Turtle Bay Exploration Park, Redding, CA, by Dr. Fidel Realyvasquez in 2002. The exhibition is organized by Turtle Bay Exploration Park, Redding, CA, in association with Landau Traveling Exhibitions, Los Angeles, CA.

The February meeting of the Hamlet of Beavercreek took place on Wednesday, February 26, 2014, at the Beavercreek Grange at 7:00 p.m. with 26 guests and residents in attendance.

There was a surprise visit by John Ludlow, Chair of the Clackamas County Commissioners, who spoke to the group about the need for funding to maintain our rural roads. He shared that the County Commissioners are looking into ways to pay to maintain these roads. One option is a \$10/mo. fee to be paid by each rural household. This would raise \$880,000.00/year. This was followed by the guest speaker for the evening, Michael Bezner, Engineering Manager.

Mr. Bezner shared that there are 806 miles of City roads and 1400 miles of rural roads maintained by the County. 58% of the roads in the County are in fair to poor condition and there is a lack of funding to pay for them. Costs keep increasing and funding keeps decreasing. The average resident pays \$4.25/mo per vehicle for road maintenance. Clackamas County gets no local fees for roads (as cities do) only State revenue. The group was given a list of all the costs involved with road maintenance. The list is

After Mr. Bezner's presentation Mr Ludlow got up and asked those present how many households would be willing to pay \$10/mo. for road maintenance. About 50-60% raised their hands. The Board of County Commissioners will continue with the outreach through March 20th. Then there will also be a public opinion survey taken late in March followed by discussion by the County Commissioners through April.

There was no reading of the February minutes as the Secretary was not present. They will be read at the next meeting in March.

The first land use application before the meeting was for a retaining wall on a steep slope for a property on Overlook Dr., at Beaver Lake, in Oregon City. The need for the review is due to the steep slope hazard status of the subject property.

The second land use issue was a ZDO interpretation for a property in Hubbard. There were concerns because the ap-

plication to be interpreted could be interpreted in two different ways. One of the interpretations was problematic. The Hamlet voted to recommend opposition to the interpretation that would allow the home site, after the lot line adjustments, to be only 2 aces because of problems it would cause with template tests and the fact that a 2 acre property would not be viable for agriculture.

Two land use decisions were shared. A renewal of a Temporary Home for Care was approved with conditions of approval. The second for a machine shop in the Mint Lake area was tentatively approved subject to to conditions of approval and after evidence of compliance of conditions 17-21 are submitted and verified.

It was also noted that the Scheubel School Property application was approved and that the County Planning Commission voted 5-3 not to approve rezoning of Hal's Construction property on Hwy 213 to Industrial. The Board of County Commissioners will issue their decision on March 12th.

Bill Merchant notified the Hamlet that BCT had approached the Hamlet board about co-sponsoring a "Movie in the Park" this summer.

Everyone is encouraged to attend the monthly Hamlet Community meetings and the quarterly Town Hall meetings
