Beware of Tax Identity Fraud

Every two seconds someone's identity is stolen. And, with tax season upon us, con artists are stealing Social Security numbers to file for fraudulent tax refunds. It's a big problem. To date, the IRS has identified around 15 million false tax returns alone. For more information on the latest trends in tax identify theft, check out AARP's Fraud Watch Network.

The Warning Signs

How do you know if you're a victim of tax identity theft? If someone files a fraudulent tax return using your identification, and then you file your return, the IRS will contact you by mail. The letter will state that more than one return was filed using your Social Security number. Note that the IRS will not contact you by phone, email, text or social media. You can check the legitimacy of any IRS mailing by calling 1-800-829-1040.

You'll also get an IRS notice if someone uses your Social Security number to get a job, and the employer reports that income to the IRS using your number. The letter will indicate that you did not report all of your earnings on your tax return. Another warning sign could be receiving a W-2 or Form 1099 from an employer for whom you didn't work.

If You Fall Victim

If you become a victim of tax identity theft, here are the steps to take:

- 1. Contact the IRS immediately using the contact information on the notice you received. You'll be asked to fill out an IRS Identity Theft affidavit, Form 14039.
- 2. Contact your bank and credit card companies and inform the credit bureaus of the fraud.
- 3. Ask one credit bureau -- Experian, TransUnion or Equifax to place a free fraud alert on your report, and the others will follow. A fraud alert lasts 90 days, but you can renew it.
- 4. Access your credit report free from all three credit bureaus. Ask the bureau that places your fraud alert how to obtain your reports.

- 5. File an Identity Theft report with the Federal Trade Commission. This will help you get fraudulent information removed from your credit report and stop companies from trying to collect debts related to fraudulent activity.
- 6. File a police report. Bring the form you filed with the FTC to the police.

Tips for Avoiding Tax Identify Theft

It's becoming ever more difficult to protect our identities, but here are some steps you can take to protect yourself and your family:

- a. Monitor your credit reports. You can order free reports from all three credit bureaus once a year at www. annualcreditreport.com.
- b. Never give your Social Security number or other personal information to phone callers.
 - c. If you file your tax return electronically, be sure to use

a private, protected wireless network. Filing your return from the local coffee shop, library or other public place is not a good idea.

- d. Provide information to your tax preparer in person avoid sending a fax that may easily be seen by someone else.
- e. Shred papers that contain sensitive personal informa-

Hopefully, you will never encounter any form of identity theft. Make sure to protect your personal information to the best of your ability, and know what to do if you've been victimized.



Volleyball Coach To Retire After 32 Seasons At CCC

Longtime volleyball coach Kathie Woods has announced her retirement from coaching at the end of the school year. Woods has been the head coach at Clackamas Community College since the 1983-84 season.

"Coaching volleyball at Clackamas has been the most fun and rewarding profession in the world to me," Woods said. "It has truly been an honor and I have loved every minute. I am excited to see what the next chapter in my life holds."

Woods is a native of Dallas, Ore., who coached for two years at Linn-Benton Community College in Albany before arriving at Clackamas. During her career she amassed a 836-522 record for a 61.6 winning percentage. This year she surpassed the 800 victory mark. Her 836 wins is the most by a volleyball coach in the Northwest Athletic Association of Community Colleges (NWAACC) and a mark surpassed by only five other two-year volleyball coaches in the history of junior college athletics.

During her 32 years of coaching at CCC, Woods was named NWAACC coach of the year three times, won two league championships, and was named Fellowship



of Christian Athletes coach of the year. Her 1996 team finished the season 12-0 in the region and 50-9 overall, winning the college's first NWAAC championship. The team was inducted into the NWAACC Hall of Fame in 2008

For Woods, coaching her students goes far beyond the volleyball competition. She coaches her students to "give 100 percent to school, volleyball and life." Her teams have been recognized by the American Volleyball Coaches Association (AVCA) eight out of the last 10 years for the Team Academic Award, given to teams that achieve a combined 3.3 team grade point average. Woods' players also perform community service, assisting at college events and holding an annual fundraiser to benefit care for animals with cancer.

"I want my girls to leave here being responsible young adults who are willing to give and not always receive," Woods said. "I want them to make their own decisions and be responsible for them, even when they make mistakes."

Sarah Hoeke, a CCC alumna, who played for Woods, will take over as coach on July 1. "I am so thrilled that Sarah will be taking over the helm," Woods said." She shares my coaching philosophy, and I just know she will do a fantastic job. I am excited to see her and the program grow into even higher heights. Once a Cougar, always a Cougar."



How Would You Handle A Vehicle Breakdown?

It's the peak time of year when the elements can wreak havoc on our roadways and vehicles, giving us the least ideal driving conditions. However, your vehicle can also break down in the most pristine conditions or shortest of drives.

Whether your vehicle is having a mechanical failure, an overheated engine, or a flat tire, it's important to know what to do in case it does break down. Hopefully it never happens, but if it does, know what to do with these five tips from AARP Driver Safety:

1. Have a reaction plan. Vehicle breakdowns can be scary; thankfully, precautionary measures can be taken to reduce the chances of experiencing one. The easiest way is to keep your vehicle well-maintained. In the cold winter months it's especially important to check the air pressure in all tires, tire tread wear, and your vehicle's fluids regularly. You should also stay one step ahead by carrying an emergency roadside kit in your vehicle. AARP recommends your

emergency roadside kit contain signaling devices, a pocket knife, a flashlight, a first aid kit, water, and nonperishable food items. During the cold-weather months, your kit should also include a warm blanket. If you are a frequent traveler, consider investing in a roadside assistance service.

- 2. Use your hazard lights. When you sense a problem with your vehicle and decide to pull over, turn on your hazard lights or "emergency flashers." Hazard lights will visibly notify other drivers you may be driving slowly or erratically. When other drivers see your hazard lights flashing it makes it easier for them to respond and allow you to pull over to reach the shoulder.
- 3. Pull over the right way. If you do feel the need to pull over and are on the highway or interstate, the ideal course of action is to pull off at a rest stop or get off at the nearest exit. However, if you suspect your vehicle will not make it that far and you must use the emergency shoulder, make sure your vehicle is as far to the right as possible. Be sure to park with your wheels turned to the right so that if your vehicle is struck from behind, your vehicle will not cross the lane into moving traffic. Once parked, stay inside your vehicle with your seat belt on, whenever possible. If you must exit the vehicle, always do so from the right side to avoid traffic.
- 4. Set up traffic warning signals. If you have enough distance between your vehicle and the nearest lane, and traffic is not too heavy, carefully exit your vehicle on the right hand

side to set up a traffic warning signal. Cones, reflective triangles, or flares can all be used, but you will need at least three signals to effectively warn oncoming traffic of your vehicle breakdown. The first traffic warning signal should be placed at least 50 feet directly behind your vehicle. The second should be placed midway between the first traffic warning signal and your vehicle, but closer to the open lane on your left. The last signal should be placed toward the back of your vehicle and a few feet into the roadway so you can divert traffic away from you. Once you complete this set up, quickly return inside your vehicle. Safety should always be your first priority, so remember to only exit your vehicle if it is necessary and safe to do so.

5. Get help. If you know you're going to need assistance, use your cell phone to call a roadside assistance service or the highway patrol. In the case that you do not have a cell phone, hang a white cloth or a piece of paper out your window and wait for the highway patrol. Also make sure your car doors remain locked at all times.

For more tips on how to stay safe on the road, consider taking a driver improvement course, such as the AARP Smart Driver(TM) course, available online or in a classroom setting near you, in both English and Spanish. In some states, you may even be eligible for a multi-year insurance discount upon completion of the course.* AARP membership is not required to take the course. Oregon City Police Execute Search Warrant on Drug House

On February 18, 2015 a three month investigation into the distribution of heroin and methamphetamine came to an end when members of the Oregon City Police Department and the Clackamas County Sheriff's office executed a search warrant on the residence of 13531 Clairmont Way #175, in Oregon City. During the search warrant, heroin, methamphetamine, and evidence of distribution of narcotics were found within the residence.

35 year old Phillip Andrew Wanhoff was ultimately arrested on charges of Delivery of a controlled substance-Methamphetamine, Possession of a controlled substance-Methamphetamine, and Possession of a controlled substance-heroin. Wanhoff is being held at the Clackamas County Jail on \$65,000 bail.

Penalties Assessed For Not Filing Information Returns Electronically

Starting with the filing of 2014 returns this year, the Oregon Department of Revenue will be assessing penalties for failing to file information returns electronically.

Oregon requires businesses filing any number of W2s or more than ten 1099s to file those electronically through iWire by March 31.

The penalty will be \$50 per return, with a maximum of \$2,500. If a business knowingly fails to file or knowingly files an incomplete, false, or misleading return, the penalty will be \$250 per return, up to a maximum of \$25,000.

All electronic filing must be done through iWire, a free, browser-based application available through our website. Many software vendors and payroll providers have updated their programs to support Oregon iWire. If your software does not support Oregon iWire, submit your file using the specifications provided on our website.





The guest speaker of the evening was Officer Sara McClurg, Community Service Officer, from the Clackamas Sheriff's Office. Officer McClurg is the Crime Prevention Coordinator. She addressed those present regarding the crime in the Beavercreek area. She had a map she circulated that showed an overview of the crimes and calls from October 2014 to the present.

In the Beavercreek area there have been nine burglaries since October. Many from garages and outbuildings. Thieves are targeting used farm equipment and tools as there is a market for the resale of these items. So, keep your outbuildings locked at all times if possible. Homes that are targeted are targeted for jewelry, credit cards, drugs, game consoles and games as well as small electronics and anything with personal information to assist in identity theft. Master bedrooms, entertainment rooms and offices are prime targets. She noted that there is also an uptick in thefts from vehicles (80% of the vehicles were unlocked). She stressed the importance of locking your vehicle. There have also been three vehicle thefts. There have been two assaults (one domestic). There have also been fraud cases every month since October.

Under Public Comments Norm Andreen shared that Leland Road had been removed from the proposed bike path the County is working on. Carus road has been chosen instead due to better sight lines and less traffic. This is a much safer route than the one proposed. The route will be from Oregon City to Beavercreek along S. Beavercreek Road. Continuing down S. Kamrath Road then turning right on Carus Road. Following Carus Road to Central Point Road. Then Taking Central point road back to Oregon City.

The highlights of the January 28, 2015 Hamlet Town Hall Meeting was read by Secretary, Joan Martinez. The report was approved by acclamation with one correction.

Land Use Applications -

There was a land use application before those present for a white water rafting business located on S. Boone Ct. The applicant was not in attendance. Since this was a renewal and there was no negative testimony, it was voted to recommend approval of the application.

Land Use Activities -

The proposed 9.7 acre development across from the high school was discussed. There is opposition to this development due to no concept plan in place and major transportation and safety issues. Testimony in opposition has been given and it is possible the issue will be sent to LUBA (Land Use Board of Appeals) to be sure the public interest and safety are addressed.

Hal's Construction Comprehensive Plan amendment and zone change is still ongoing. The proposal is to have an Industrial zone in a residential area. This has been sent to LUBA and remanded back to the County. It was also appealed to the Court of Appeals. The outcome of the appeal will not be known until March.

14783 S. Henrici Road. Permit for Temporary Care. Approved with conditions.

The Treasurer's report was given by Treasurer Cheryl Boffard. She also handed out an Annual Report Summary for 2011 to 2014.

A member asked about the status of the speed zone in front of the high school. It was noted that it has been briefly set aside due to other issues, but would be ad-

Oregon City Teen Dies

At approximately 6:08 p.m. Friday, February 20, 2015, Clackamas County Sheriff's Office Deputies responded to an injury traffic crash on S. Redland Rd near S. Lyons Rd in Clackamas County. Initial reports were two vehicles crashed head-on and there were multiple injuries.

18 year old Madison Kealoha West from Oregon City was extracted from one of the vehicles, a Saturn coupe, and transported to the Hospital. She later died at the hospital.

The second vehicle, a Hummer H3, had two occupants. The male driver, 58 year old Steven Mark Naylor, of Oregon City, was transported to the hospital and then released. A 7 year old male juvenile was the passenger and was taken by Lifeflight to the hospital and is still listed critical condition. The male juvenile was reportedly unrestrained in the vehicle.

The Clackamas County Criminal Reconstruction and Forensic Team (CRAFT) assisted with the crash investigation. Initial investigations show the Saturn veered into the oncoming lane.

Oregon Department of Revenue Addresses Fraud in Light of Recent Scam

The Oregon Department of Revenue has identified inconsistencies in recently-filed State tax returns prepared with third-party tax preparation software, indicating potential fraudulent activity.

However, this is just one of many scams detected and stopped this filing season by the State's tax administration agency. "Fraudulent attempts are on the rise and we're working to stop fraud where we find it," explained the department's director, Jim Bucholz.

Bucholz attributes the current detection of fraudulent attempts to the business rules and processes in use by the department. The characteristics of this specific fraud have been incorporated into these business rules. No department systems have been breached and taxpayer information on file with the department has not been compromised during this current situation, Bucholz said. Staff are reviewing and verifying the validity of a number of returns. The department may contact victims of identity theft.

The department is working with TurboTax-developer Intuit to determine the extent of the impact on Oregon tax-payers, Bucholz said. "If we can identify victims of fraud early, it's easier for us to help them."

If you've received notification that a tax return has already been filed on your behalf when you try to file your State return, contact your third-party tax preparation software vendor. Intuit, the vendor for TurboTax, has set up a dedicated hotline for its users at 800-944-8596.
