# Beavercreek Community Planning Organization 2003 Legislative Efforts

The Beavercreek CPO decided an important way it can develop an increased role in its own future was to establish a legislative agenda during the current 2003 Session. Our priority issues are: 1) House Bill 3211, to give territories (communities) a deciding role in whether they will be annexed. 2) Senate Bill 511, and related bill to allow local government to expand system development chrages (SDCs) to education and other public services. Such SDCs would shift the cost of expanding infrastructure to meet the needs of new developments from existing taxpayers to the new development itself. These charges cannot be applied to maintenance of existing infrastructure. 3) Senate Bill 668, to make the designation of a 20-year land supply optional for local governments. The 20-year land supply law is what drives the urbanization pressures on Beavercreek. This bill is no longer active in the current session. 4) House Bill 3091, to give community groups more recognition. This bill is also no longer active in the current session.

The Beavercreek CPO has had visits from State Senator Kurt Schrader and Representative Wayne Scott, who represent the west half of Beavercreek. Senator Schrader, who has worked with our community in the past, helped us with legislative contacts and sponsored or co-sponsored our bills.

Representative Wayne Scott is a new representative for our area. We are working to develop relationships with Senator Rick Metsger and Representative Linda Flores who represent the east half of Beavercreek.

Your contacts with these representatives are very important in our work for our community.





### **Benchmark Tests**

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# "Beavercreek Oregon a History

# Through the Looking Glass"

This is Part IX of a series of articles on the history of the Beavercreek area. Written by Jack Watts, whose family were some of the early settlers of the community. This history is reprinted from his original manuscript that had until now never been published. by permission of Gordon Watts. We dedicate this series to a man and his love of the Beavercreek countryside who took the time to stop, look, listen and capture for all, his rememberances. The Editor.

### - - - AGRICULTURE AND INDUSTRY - - -

Beavercreek's climate is mild and humid, as is most of Western Oregon where almost any crop grown in the temperate zone can be cultivated. The principal crops in the early days were wheat, barley, oats, potatoes, and hay.

Mr. Michael Swartz, an early settler, owned acreage from what is now South Spangler Road to South Carus Road. His acreage was planted in part in hops, a A detailed agenda can be found on the County Web profitable endeavor. It was from this acreage that he donated the land upon which the famous Ten O'Clock Church and cemetery sites are now located.

> Starting about 1908 and into the 1920's many Italian prune orchards were planted and when in full production an abundance of fruit was produced and readily marketed. The quality was excellent and some of the larger producers built prune driers and operated around the clock in season. These driers were available to others for custom drying and processing and provided employment to many people, many of whom were women and older children who picked the prunes into boxes after husky men, who were hired as shakers, shook the trees causing the fruit to fall to the ground.

> Then a crew with a team and wagon picked up the boxes hauling them to the drier, another crew stoked the fires, while others were responsible for timing and removal for cooling, which required some skills to preserve the proper moisture content.

> Most farmers kept milk cows with most of them selling cream that was picked up twice each week by contract haulers to the Clear Creek Creamery. And, every farm had a flock of chickens that provided the lady of the house with incidental items not raised on

the farm by trading eggs and butter for what was needed. It seems to be a fact of life that over a period of years crops have a tendency to "peter out" either because of disease, pests, or depletion of the soil, especially when the same land is used for the same crops year after year. All of which proves that the successful farmer must be resourceful, smart enough to recognize the signs and read the signals that indicate any need for a change, and then to have the courage to follow through and make the change. Then, if in doing so he proves successful, almost inevitably his lead will be followed by others who are less innovative.

Among the first to experiment in raising black raspberries (blackcaps), was Mr. Adolph Gunther, who at the time lived at the intersection of South Beavercreek Road and Wilson Road, a mile or so north of the Beavercreek stores.

Once there was sufficient acreage to warrant it, receiving stations were set up. The first one was located on the farm of Mr. Cramer, also east of the Gunther farm. As more and more planted strawberries and cane berries such as raspberries and blackcaps, Hudson House opened another receiving station on Ferguson



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Road and at a later date opened one in the Carus area. Later the local group made arrangements with Watts' Food Center during the war years and in an emergency situation to receive berries for them. At the stations farmers' trucks and various and sundry cars with trailers lined up waiting to unload for the weigh-in. At our store many bringing berries were unable to maneuver their cars to successfully back those trailers into the dock for unloading, and Ted Watts stepped in to do it for them in the interest of saving precious time. And so it was that Beavercreek soon became known as the Blackcap Center of Clackamas County.

The Beavercreek Cooperative Store also received berries, but it is thought that they bought the fruit outright for the Portland Canning Company. The berries handled by the Watts' Store were delivered to



Portland by the Minger Truck Line. Those growers who had greater acreage and tonnage hauled capacity loads directly to the processing plants. During berry season the receiving stations became a beehive of activity; the berries were hauled usually in the late afternoon and well into the wee small hours of the morning. Mr. Herbert Steiner operated two large trucks - - one a semi, the other a flat bed - - of the Chevrolet gender and contracted to haul for Hudson House and at times delivered to Cottrel as well as to Hillsboro. Another important aspect of this type of operation was to have an adequate supply of "M.T." crates on hand, although there were times when growers wasted some time waiting for a new supply to arrive.

It is estimated that the annual tonnage from the combined stations, depending on the season, ranged from around 850 tons to 1,600 tons in the most productive years.

The blackcap was noted for its versatility. Some if its many uses, in addition to the jams and jellies, were for flavoring, ice cream, food coloring, and dyes, most notably for stamping grades on meat products. Even the seeds were utilized in the manufacture of gun powder.



CCFD currently provides fire protection and emergency medical service (EMS) to the City of Milwaukie and will begin full fire protection service and EMS to the City of facilities, and private placement agencies will have Oregon City starting on July 1, 2003. These cities retain the ownership of their facilities that house the fire fighters an Oregon City will also initially retain ownership of some of its equipment. The cities levy their own taxes and negotiate with CCFD the amount of the contract. CCFD's taxpayers pay a basic rate calculated by the constitution at \$2.412 per thousand. They also pay for the bonds that they passed for the construction of new fire stations, including the new Beavercreek Fire Station. If the cities charge their residents less for fire service and EMS, as the opponents state that they do,



that is their right. CCFD's directors do not control what the cities charge. CCFD charges a contract amount needed to cover its costs of providing the service.

The existing board, all five, have extensive experience in their respective areas of expertise, care deeply about the quality of the fire protection and EMS provided to the taxpavers.
