Oregon City High School Drop-Out Rates Drop

There's good news from Oregon City High School... more students are staying in school and graduating today than in the past.

According to Oregon Department of Education data released in April, OCHS drop-out rates decreased from 5% during the 2005-2006 school year to just 1.9% in 2006-2007, the most current year that drop-out rates are available.

"We're taking students within our school and trying to provide them all of the tools they need to succeed," said Oregon City High School Principal, Nancy Bush-Lange. "We want every kid to have not only a high school degree, but

education beyond that as well."

During the same time, statewide percentages rose from 4.1% to 4.9%.

"We all know that there is no way that a student can expect to be successful in the future if they do not graduate from high school today," Oregon State Schools Superintendent Susan Castillo said. The Oregon Department of Education defines "a dropout as a student in grades 9-12 who withdraws from school without receiving a high school diploma, GED, modified diploma, or transferring to another school."

The Oregon City School district currently serves about 7,800 students and continues to put more dollars directly into the classroom than the state average.

Historic 40-foot Willamette Falls Officially Generating Green Power

*One of state's most treasured landmarks
now in exclusive "low-impact" club*

One of Oregon's first and oldest hydroelectric projects, the T.W. Sullivan Plant located at Willamette Falls, is now officially generating green power, with a designation achieved by only 33 hydro plants in the United States.

The Low Impact Hydropower Institute (LIHI) Board has certified PGE's hydroelectric project at Willamette Falls as low impact, based on an extensive array of fish protection and passage improvements being implemented at the project, including installation of a second fish bypass system at the powerhouse, and a flow control structure at the apex of the falls to improve downstream fish passage over the falls.

Portland General Electric's longest-running hydroelectric project, the Sullivan plant, was completed on the West Linn side of Willamette Falls in 1895. Since 1895, the Sullivan plant has required only one other major overhaul - in the mid-1950s - which included an expansion of the main powerhouse building and increasing the plant's generating capacity to 16 million watts. The 2,300 foot-long dam, located along the crest of the horseshoe-shaped Willamette Falls, also modified over the decades, diverts river flow into the powerhouse for electricity generation.

This designation marks PGE's second hydro facility to receive LIHI certification and the third statewide. PGE's 465-

million watt Pelton Round Butte Hydroelectric Project in central Oregon was LIHI-certified last March, making it the second-largest LIHI project in the nation. The other Oregon facility with LIHI certification is the 4.3-million watt Falls Creek Dam, northeast of Eugene.

LIHI certifies hydro projects after they have passed a rigorous series of tests that demonstrate minimum impact on fish and wildlife. Because of the impact on fish and other environmental factors, electricity from a U.S. hydro plant may not be considered eligible to be sold as "renewable" power until the related generating project has received LIHI certification. Wind, biomass, solar and geothermal energy have been historically accepted as renewable.

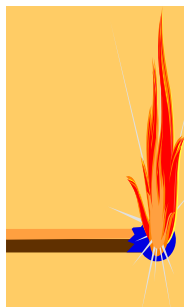

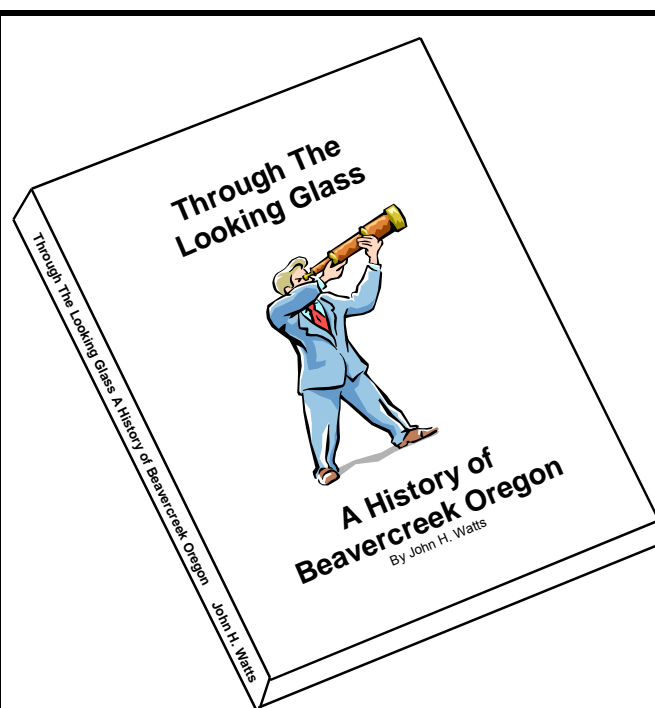
THELMA DORLENE ERTZ

Hamlet Bylaws and Rules Committee Meets

The Bylaws and Rules Committee met on April 10, 2008, at the Beaver Creek Cooperative Telephone Company's



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Community Room starting at 6:45 p.m.

Members present included: Norm Andreen, Rose and Bill Holden and Bill Merchant. Elizabeth Graser-Lindsey was absent. Steve Powell, citizen of Beavercreek, also attended.

Several materials were passed out to those present by Chair Bill Merchant. There were also prepared packets for all Board members who might attend. Included in the packet was a copy of Clackamas County Code Chapter 2.10 which authorizes Hamlets and Villages. This is the ordinance that created the Hamlet of Beavercreek and provides the legal framework for its existence. Also provided, was information about open meetings from OpenOregon.com and copies of relevant sections of ORS 192, the Open Meeting Law.

After a discussion about the purpose of the rules, it was decided to expand the preamble explaining why the rules are being created, specifically referencing CCC2.10. That permitted the elimination of the previously proposed Article V rule and the previously proposed Article VI Section 1 and 2 since they are covered in the ordinance.

There was some discussion about confusion by the public and other entities when a Board member is representing the Hamlet, so a new rule was added under Article VI Section 5 (3) to make it clear that Board members may represent the Hamlet only at the direction of the Board and must make it clear when they are representing their own views or that of another organization.

All board members are free to represent their own views and positions as citizens or the views and positions of other groups they may represent, but it must be clear when they are and are not representing the Hamlet.

Article VII Section 1 was expanded to explain why matters presented by Board members need to be on the

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Agenda, ensuring that any Board member may be on a meeting agenda. The goal, in keeping with the spirit of Oregon Open Meetings law, is to not spring surprises on the citizens, but to give them as much information as possible.

The section was also expanded to emphasize that expenditures must be coordinated with the County, per CCC2.10, and that action must be taken and reported to citizens.

The meeting adjourned about 8:15 p.m. The proposed new rules will be presented for consideration at an upcoming Board meeting and announced at a Community Meeting when adopted by the Board.

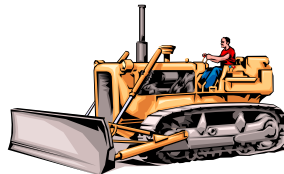

The 21-member Clackamas County Urban and Rural Reserves Policy Advisory Committee (PAC) held its first meeting from 6:30 - 9:00 p.m., Tuesday, April 22, in the Sunnybrook Service Center Auditorium at 9101 SE Sunnybrook Blvd., Clackamas. This meeting was open to the public and enables input during the public comment period.

The PAC is responsible for advising the Clackamas County Board of Commissioners on the selection of urban and rural reserves in the County, which is scheduled to be completed by December 2009.

The process of identifying urban and rural reserves is taking place throughout the three-County Portland metropolitan area during 2008 and 2009. The three metro Counties - Clackamas, Multnomah and Washington - and Metro are going through an extensive public involvement and study process to identify where urban growth should and should not take place in the region over the next 40-50 years.

A Note From Our Artist

Hello everyone,

This was my second week as the artist in residence at Clarkes Elementary School and the children (and I!) are growing as pastel artists.

This week we learned about abstract art and how abstract artists don't try to reflect or imitate an object from nature or the natural world like I do in my paintings. Abstract artists use their imaginations and generally emphasize lines, colors, generalized shapes and geometric objects.

Clackamas County Dog Services to Move to Larger More Efficient Space

With the approval of a contract for architectural and engineering services for the County Dog Services Facility, on March 20, the Clackamas County Board of Commissioners took a decisive step forward in preparing for a new adult detention facility in Oregon City and providing a larger, safer, more efficient space for the County dog shelter.

Clackamas County Dog Services is currently located in Oregon City, across Kaen Road from the County's Public Services Building and near the current county jail. However, with the new adult detention facility planning for that area, and with a 51-year-old, overcrowded dog shelter, the County determined that people and animals alike would be best served by moving Dog Services to different site.

The site chosen is a 15,000-foot office/warehouse building near Highway 212 that is currently owned by the County's Development Agency. While Dog Services will continue to provide the same programs and services as in the past, and no staff will be added, the new building will offer a number of benefits for the dogs, the staff and visitors.

Dog Services Manager Diana Hallmark is excited about the new space. "Now the staff and the dogs will be housed in the same building and we'll have more space for the dogs so there will be less overcrowding."

Hallmark notes that the particular advantage to less overcrowding is increased safety and health benefits for the dogs and for Dog Services employees. The new shelter will also have a lobby for visitors and a special "getting-to-know-you" room for people who want to spend time with a dog they are thinking of adopting.

The move to the renovated building is scheduled to take place in December 2008.

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County Plans Clinic Closures New Options for Primary Care

With rising costs and limited funding to provide medical
and dental care, Clackamas County – pending final approval
from the federal Bureau of Primary Health Care – will close
its three primary-care clinics over the next two to three years.

The County's Community Health Division, which operates
the clinics, will close its Molalla Clinic on June 30 and the
Sandy Clinic on Dec. 31. Its Beavercreek Clinic in Oregon
City is expected to remain open up to three more years, clos-
ing in 2010 or 2011.

It's a difficult decision, and we believe in the long run that
it's the right decision," said Clackamas County Chair Lynn

Peterson. "The County's role in delivering certain individual health services is changing, but our commitment to ensuring community access to sustainable primary care will continue."

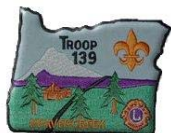
For several years Clackamas County has struggled with financial challenges posed by the clinics. Its decision to work with community-based organization Yakima Valley Farm Workers Clinic Inc. reflects the fact that most other County public-health agencies typically do not operate primary-care facilities.

Community Health Division representatives are coordinating continued primary-care services with Yakima Valley Farm Workers Clinic Inc., an independently operated non-profit agency. The provider, with health centers in Oregon and Washington communities including Woodburn and Southeast Portland, is preparing to begin accepting Clackamas County patients in July, pending federal approval.

"Our goal is a seamless transition," said Community Health Division Director Melinda Mowery. "As the process moves forward, we will update residents to prevent any service interruptions."

Patients will receive written notice by mail regarding this year's clinic closures, including options for continuing their health care at the Beavercreek Clinic or with the new provider.

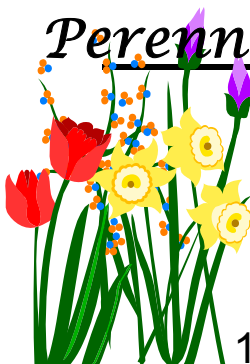

Rising Costs Lead to May 1 Increase in Transportation Fees for Developers in Unincorporated Clackamas County and Happy Valley

One-time transportation fees assessed on new or expanded developments in unincorporated Clackamas County and the Happy Valley area will be increasing by 6.6 percent on May 1, 2008.

The fees, known as Transportation System Development Charges (TSDC's), are based on the number of vehicle trips a particular land use generates. They are established, in accordance with state law, to equitably spread the costs of essential capital improvements to new development.

The higher TSDC's will apply in unincorporated areas countywide and to the joint Clackamas County/Happy Valley area. Complete building permits submitted to the County before May 1, 2008 will be reviewed using the current rate.

The TSDC rate is re-evaluated each year and revised, as necessary, to keep pace with inflation. System Development Charges are one-time fees charged to new or expanded development to help pay a portion of the costs associated with building capital facilities to meet needs created by growth.

The April Community Meeting of the Hamlet of Beavercreek took place at the Beavercreek Grange on Kamrath Road with 25 residents and guests in attendance.

There was no guest speaker.

The highlights of the March meeting were read and approved.

The treasurers report was also given and it was explained that the account for the Hamlet was being changed due to an error at the bank.

One renewal for temporary care was approved and the members were given an update on past applications and the decisions by the County.

There was public comment from a member who lives in a neighborhood adjacent to Trinity Lutheran Church who told those present that her property and the property of her neighbors is flooded due to run-off from the church property. It poses a health issue due to mold, etc from the excess moisture. There was an issue before the church was built, but it has worsened since the church was built. There is concern in their neighborhood that the new additions proposed by the church will further exacerbate the problem for the neighborhood.

She was advised to contact the County and make them aware of the situation as soon as possible since the project has been approved with conditions that need to be met.

Bill Merchant gave a report on the Rural/Urban Reserves Policy Advisory Committee meeting that he attended on April 22, 2008. The Policy Advisory Committee members were chosen by the Clackamas County Board of Commissioners. We are very fortunate to have the current Chair of the Hamlet chosen to be on this very important committee. More information appears elsewhere in this issue.

The Hamlet's Rural/Urban Reserve Committee will be meeting in early May to start work on the process for our input into this process. All meetings are open to the public, notice of location and time will appear on the Hamlet's web site and posted at the Post Office. The Rural/Urban Reserve decisions will impact the Hamlet of Beavercreek for the next 40-50 years. We need to be pro-active.

How to best contact those who live within the Hamlet's boundary is an issue that needs to be addressed. The need to keep the residents apprised of Hamlet issues is essential. The possibility of doing a mailing to everyone within the Hamlet was discussed.

The Hamlet would also like to hold meetings to keep the residents informed during various phases of the Reserves identification process, but finding a meeting place large enough is an issue. It was suggested that we might contact area churches to see if one of them would host a community meeting.

An update was given regarding the carving of "the Hamlet of" that is to go atop the "Beavercreek" sign at the saloon. John Hoult who did the carving on the original "Beavercreek" sign has graciously volunteered to do the addition.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:30 p.m. Two political items were scheduled after the adjournment.

A report was given by Christine Roth, County Liaison to the Hamlet, on a proposed Library Levy. Due to the loss of Federal Timber money the County has decided to form a Library District that will need to be funded by a levy. The levy will ask for \$.39/\$1000.00 of assessed value to cover the cost. The fate of the Oregon City Library is not known at this time, but it is thought that the City will not put the funding before the citizenry in a levy, but levy a tax instead. The lease on the City Library, located in Danielson's Shopping Center, expires in January 2009.

Rick LaMana, Candidate for County Sheriff, who asked to talk to the group after the regular meeting, did not attend.

Everyone is encouraged to attend the monthly Hamlet Community meetings and the quarterly Town Hall meetings to participate and share ideas and concerns on the issues pertinent to our community. Members 18 years of age and older who live, own a business, or property within the Hamlet area may vote on Hamlet issues.
