PUBLIC'S HELP NEEDED IN FINDING WANTED OREGON CITY MAN REWARD OFFERED



Clackamas County Sheriff's Office is offering a \$1000 reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of an Oregon City man who led deputies on a chase this afternoon, Oct 20th, in three stolen cars south of Oregon City. At about 2:00 p.m., NATHAN ALLEN OLNEY 20, was driving a stolen 1994 white

Honda and fled on foot after he eluded a deputy in the area of S. Schubel School Road and S. Beavercreek Road, Beavercreek. After tracking Mr. Olney on foot for two hours, deputies discovered that he had stolen a red 1986 Ford F250 pickup at 18047 S. Red Fir Road, Beavercreek.

At 4:17 p.m., deputies located the stolen Ford pickup abandoned in a field near S. Spangler Road and S. Beavercreek Road, Beavercreek. A nearby neighbor then reported his black 1984 GMC Jimmy stolen. It was later found abandoned in the 24000 block of S. Eldorado Road, Mulino.

NATHAN ALLEN OLNEY currently has Clackamas County warrants out for his arrest for Unlawful Use of a Motor Vehicle (Felony) and Contempt of Court (Misdemeanor.) Charges from today's incidents will be pending.



Beaver Creek Cooperative Telephone Company History

In last months issue I presented Part I of the Beaver Creek Cooperative Telephone Company History. Here then is part II. (The original transcript done by O.F. Dickson) The Editor

In June of 1934, "Beaver Creek Mutual Telephone Association" filed its Articles of Incorporation. From that date forward the company has been referred to as "Beaver Creek Cooperative Telephone Company."

A decision was made in 1939, at a special meeting of the membership, to establish a 5 cent toll on calls to and from Oregon City. Each company would retain the monies.

1940 saw the end of the old division (line routes) system of line maintenance. Maintenance costs were now assessed on a member basis.

In 1950, Arlene Graham became manager just in time to have to cope with the telephone plant that was seriously damaged in 1949 and 1950 due to numerous storms. In 1951, the Rural Electrification Association (REA) was contacted regarding a loan to repair and rebuild the damaged telephone lines. This was the company's first loan with REA.

In 1953, after much discussion concerning additional toll trunks to Oregon City, a vote of the members was taken and carried 43 to 22 to sell the toll lines to Portland Telephone & Telegraph (PT&T), a Bell operated company. The sale was completed in November for \$2,000.00.

March 12, 1956, Beaver Creek Cooperative Telephone Company joined the Oregon Independent Telephone Association.

OREGON CITY - Instructor Craig Lesley retired in September after 30 years in the English Department at Clackamas Community College. Lesley, 56, is the award-winning author of four novels and the writer-inresidence and Ford Professor of English Literature at Willamette University.

He is a native of Eastern Oregon who earned his bachelor's degree at Whitman College in Walla Walla, WA. "He's very much a writer and teacher of the working person," said Emily Orlando, chairwoman of the English Department. "He always understood the demands of a full-time job, full-time family and trying to get an education."

Lesley's novels "Winterkill" and "The Sky Fisherman," were both nominated for Pacific Northwest Booksellers Association awards, and he won the Oregon Book Prize for "Storm Riders." 
Become a volunteer to enhance the reading skills of all our students and provide additional support to existing reading programs to ensure school success.

Pregnancy Prevention Group Looking for Teen Leaders and Volunteers

As schoolrooms across the County fill with children again, Oregon's abstinence-only, pregnancy-prevention education program, STARS, kicks off its sixth year by reaching out to several local districts for teen leaders and volunteers.

"Students Today Aren't Ready for Sex" (STARS) is the nation's most widely implemented, abstinence-only curriculum. Oregon's teen pregnancy rate has dropped from 19.2% in 1995, when the program started, to 13.9% in 2000. In Clackamas County, STARS is funded by Providence Health Systems, and operates today in Oregon City, Estacada, Colton and North Clackamas School Districts.

STARS uses a peer-led model, with volunteer facilitators assisting teen leaders, to present an abstinence-only curriculum to 6th graders. The program tears down myths about pregnancy, presenting clear information about the consequences of sexual involvement and teaching students refusal skills that empower them to resist peer pressure and make positive decisions. The program is currently accepting applications for both teen leaders and volunteer classroom facilitators for the following schools in our area:

Beavercreek Elementary, Colton High School, Colton Middle School, Oregon City High School and Redland Elementary.

Teen leaders and facilitators all receive STARS

training before working in classrooms. Teen leaders need to be in 10th, 11th or 12th grade, show strong academic achievement, maintain the belief that it is best for 6th graders to abstain from sex and demonstrate an interest in working with youth.

Classroom facilitators support and coach the teen leaders in their preparation and delivery of the curriculum, and need to be high school graduates with a strong interest in helping youth. Clackamas County Offers Furnace Loans

The Clackamas County Community Development Division is accepting applications for its Furnace Repair Loan Program. Funding is provided by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

Eligible people are those living in Clackamas County who are buying or own the home. Property taxes must be current and the loan applicants must be living in the home. Yearly maximum gross income guidelines are as follows: 1 person \$31,300; 2 persons \$35,800; three persons \$40,250; four persons \$44,700.

The amount of the loan depends on the cost of repairs and the amount of equity in the property. County

Fall Enrollment Jumps Nearly 8 Percent

OREGON CITY - Early fall enrollment figures at Clackamas Community College indicate a 7.4 percent increase in full-time equivalent (FTE) students over the same period in 2000.

Within the second week of the term, FTE students at the college totaled 1,799. FTE represents the combination of full and part-time students added to make one full-time student. A total of 7,166 students are attending CCC this fall. In addition, more than 5,000 non-credit students are expected to take fall classes.

"During the last legislative session, additional resources were provided for the state's community colleges to meet growing needs," said Clackamas Community College President Dr. Earl P. "Joe"

Johnson, "And those funds allowed us to add classes in e-commerce, computer science, microelectronics, teacher education and more."

Certain programs at the college are at peak capacity, including the manufacturing department where all classes are full. "As the unemployment rate goes up so does our activity," said Scott Giltz, Chairman of the manufacturing department. Traditionally, enrollment at community colleges increases in times of economic downturn.

Milwaukie's Harmony Campus extension has also seen an increase in student activity. Enrollment at the CCC campus located off Sunnyside Road is up nearly 10 percent from a year ago. More classes have been added at the campus, and existing classes are growing to capacity.

"Our instructors are getting a good reputation, and our location is convenient for working students," said Debbie Baker-Antcliffe, director of Community Education.

OREGON CITY - The Pauling Gallery at Clackamas Community College is one of nine area locations that will show portions of the 196-piece "Visual Chronicle of Portland" collection in November.

There has been quite a discussion surrounding the issue of direct dollar contributions vs. fund-raising for the PTO budget. The PTO funds and operates programs and events with an operating budget of \$42,645. In determining the cost per student, we first removed the costs of the fund-raisers and concluded that the PTO spends approximately \$26,395 for the programs and activities, this breaks down to a cost of approximately \$55.00 per student.
