

and emergency apparatus decorated in a Christmas theme that goes through many of the neighborhoods in the fire district. Residents bring food and gifts destined for the less fortunate and needy members of our community. The food is collected and distributed just before Christmas.

The foundation is also responsible for providing funds for fire fighters to use to help them in meeting the

needs of people whom they come into contact with that are hurting. The foundation has purchased and placed into local curriculum schools aids that assist teaching teachers in teaching safety lessons. The curriculum, called Risk Watch, is a nationally recognized and proven one that provides lessons in pedestrian



safety, bike safety, fire safety, poisoning prevention and four other topics. The funds for these projects come from gifts and donations, many of which are made by the fire fighters through payroll deductions.

Another way that the foundation raises money is through "spare change" canisters located in many of the local Safeway stores. These canisters are in the shape of a fire hydrant and are an attractive display piece. When you see one be generous. The money goes to victims of fires and other incidents that cause people suffering. Lions' Community Presence Do We Have One?

It's a tough question to answer either "yes or no". When in Portland and around the state talking to other Lions clubs, the mention of Beavercreek brings a variety of responses. Some who have no clue will say, "and where is that?" Others, with a little idea, will say something like "Isn't that near Oregon City" or "Molalla" or "Estacada". An occasional geographic expert will answer, "Yeh, that's over on the southeast side, one of those 'bedroom' communities near Oregon City." But the most common is "Beaverton?" That one drives me nuts.

Part of the problem, as I've come to see it, is that different factions within our Beavercreek community have built up their own reputations, but there is no unified presence. When talking to someone about the Lions club, they'll either answer "Oh yeh, the Auction club", or "don't they do those Christmas baskets?" When queried about the Boosters, you inevitably here about The Bust. When mention is made of the UCC, people talk about 'the 10 o'clock church', and the list goes on. We've got Boy Scouts, Cub Scouts, Lions, Boosters, Grange, Camp Fire, churches, businesses, and even a community planning organization, but no centralized presence.

Not a problem, you say? What does it matter? Well, there are a lot of good people in our community doing a lot of good things, but they keep tripping up over each other. Just this last month there were two groups doing fundraising feeds on the same Saturday night. Not a problem, but not the most efficient. More people might have gone to each if they were better coordinated. A prime example is the annual Christmas Project, where lots of our groups DO come together to work for a good cause. We should organize a community calendar. It could easily be a part of this bulletin, and a part of their online presence as well. If all of us, Lions, Boosters, Grange, Scouts, businesses, churches, etc. were to have a person be a regular contact with the BCCP, a comprehensive community calendar would emerge that would not only help prevent conflict and competition, but promote more and more of our community members to come out and see what's going on. Beavercreek Residents Invited To Complete Communities Discussion

A meeting to incorporate the community of Beavercreek's priorities and vision in the Complete Communities for Clackamas County project is scheduled for Tuesday, September 12, from 7:00 - 9:00 p.m. The discussion will be held at the Beavercreek School located at 21944 S. Yeoman Road in Beavercreek.

"This is our opportunity to talk about what's unique about Beavercreek," says Alan Burr, Beavercreek resident. "It is important that we have a voice in planning the future of our community and the county as a whole."

All citizens are encouraged to attend this discussion of Complete Communities. Participants will be asked to think about the priorities, issues, opportunities and challenges that will make Beavercreek complete for themselves and their families. A Complete Communities video will be shown followed by a discussion and questionnaires.

Complete Communities is an ambitious, high-priority project initiated by the Clackamas County Board of Commissioners. It is a countywide undertaking to engage a broad range of citizens to talk about a future direction for the County and its individual communities. The County Commissioners have pledged that the final recommendations will influence and guide their decisions as the County continues to grow. Local officials and organizations will be given information that pertains to their communities.

A Complete Communities Congress will be held October 28, 2000 from 8:30 am to 2:30 pm at Oregon City High School to discuss findings from community meetings, questionnaires, and the county survey.
