

(Cont. from pg. 2, Col. 1) The area residents who form the panel met to begin the process of determining a governance model for the "Hamlet" designation. A "Hamlet" is an unincorporated community with an active CPO (Community Planning Organization) that responds to land use proposals and makes recommendations to the Board of County Commisssioners. Being a 'Hamlet" also assumes increased communications with the County.

The group is to determine how to define a "Hamlet." What will it take to get there? What would be a logical boundary, what would be the best organizational structure, what type and level of services and who should provide them and more. It is planned to have broad community discussion on these issues at a later date.

What the "Hamlet Work Group" comes up with, including information gathered from comminuty input, will be compared with those from other pilot communities. The final recommendations will be presented to the Board of County Commissioners for approval and implementation. The Editor

North Clackamas Parks 'Going to the Dogs Again' With Fifth Annual Dog Daze Monday, September 8th

Take part in North Clackamas Parks and Recreation District's fifth annual Dog Daze of Summer at North Clackamas Aquatic Park - and have a howling good time.

Dog Daze takes place the day before the Aquatic Park closes down for three weeks of annual maintenance Monday, Sept. 8th. All pools will be drained immediately after our canine friends swim. The pools will be cleaned, serviced and sanitized before they are filled with 100-percent fresh water and re-chlorinated.

Sessions are noon to 2:00 p.m., fresh water, \$5 per dog and \$7 for a multiple-dog family; 3:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m., semi-fresh water, same prices; 6:00 p.m. to 8:00 p. m., not-so-fresh water session, \$4 per dog and \$6 for a multiple-dog family.

The Clackamas County Health Department determined that there would be no significant health risks posed by allowing the dogs to swim in the facility.

"Beavercreek Oregon a History

Through the Looking Glass"

This is Part XIII of a series of articles on the history of the Beavercreek area. Written by Jack Watts, whose family were some of the early settlers of the community. This history is reprinted from his original manuscript that had until now never been published, by permission of Gordon Watts. We dedicate this series to a man and his love of the Beavercreek countryside who took the time to stop, look, listen and capture for all, his rememberances. The Editor.

- - - THE POSTAL SERVICE (CONT.) - - -

After serving 35 years, Mrs. Marie W. Havill retired as Postmaster in 1955, at which time Mrs. Irene Steiner received the temporary appointment as acting Postmaster and served until July 27, 1956, which coincided with the appointment of Mr. J. Gordon Watts as the permanent Postmaster. Mrs. Marie Londergan was a long-time Clerk who served under both Mrs. Havill and Mr. Watts until her retirement, when Mrs. Adeline McKay came into the service on June I, 1959, and served until February 23, 1979.

The Post Office occupied three corners of the store during the time it was operated by the Hoffs (followed by the Havills), before it was moved to the east end of the store building. Construction of the present Post Office began on April 15, 1976, and the new facility was opened October 17, 1976.

Mrs. Mary Gach entered the Postal Service at Gladstone on March 22, 1969 and was transferred to Beavercreek on November 24, 1973, and serves as Clerk and fills in occasionally as substitute carrier during vacations or illness of the regular carriers.

Mr. Roy Kelm began as a substitute carrier on May 21, 1977, and as Mr. Francis retired and Mr. McBurney moved to Route 1, Mr. Kelm became the regular carrier on Route 2.

Mrs. Gail L. Quimby began her service with the Oregon City Post Office and came by transfer to Beavercreek as a substitute rural carrier on November 4, 1978. On May 5, 1979, Mrs. Lucy A. Vertner came to the Beavercreek Post Office as a Clerk and is the newest member of the staff.

Mrs Kriss Yamasaki served in several communities in California including Cardiff By The Sea, California, before transferring to Gladstone, Oregon on March 23, 1979 where she served as clerk until transferring again to the Beavercreek, Oregon Post Office on December 1, 1979 serving in the same capacity.

J. Gordon Watts received his appointment during the Administration of President Dwight D. Eisenhower on June 4,1956.

He enlisted in the Navy at the outbreak of our entry into World War 2, and served three years, nine months, being assigned to the U.S.S. Preston a destroyer (tin can), which was lost in the battle of the Solomon islands in the south Pacific on November 15, 1942. His enlistment time along with his Postal service made him eligible for retirement on October 31, 1982, but was able to retire early by reason of accumulated leave time he had not taken, on August 21,1982. He served until Mrs. Patty Leon was transferred from the main Post Office in Portland and named "Officer in Charge" at Beavercreek, Oregon, Post Office and served until Mrs. Anna Hirsch who was transferred from the main Post Office of Portland to become the Postmaster at Beavercreek effective as of January 8, 1983.

Mrs. Hirsch was born in Glasgow, Montana. She was raised on a farm near Boring, Oregon, attended Orient Grade school, a graduate of Gresham High School, attended Mount Hood Community College, Portland Community College, Portland State university and Postal management courses. She served 16 years in the Postal service prior to coming to Beavercreek, as window clerk, mail classification, customer complaints, delivery services Supervisor and financial technician, was active in the Marriage and family life Council. Beginning experience (Theology, Psychology group for those ending a meaningful relationship) as well as various charity and Bond drives. Gordon Watts was honored with a retirement party arranged by the Beavercreek Post Office staff, clerks, carriers. The party was hosted by Mr and Mrs. Micheal Gach in their home. Then on March 2, 1983 Gordon, his wife Carol and his parents were invited to attend the main Post Office in Portland, where among a group of other Postal retiree's were presented their "etirement Certificates" in an impressive ceremony complete with pictures, the presentations were made by Mr. B.W. Luscher Postmaster of the Portland Post Office.

Two young woman were transported by ambulance to area hospitals after the car they were driving fishtailed and ended upside down in a gulley that was filled with water.


The accident occurred on Beavercreek Rd., just south of Red Hereford Rd., on July 28, 2003.

Two Beavercreek Teens Injured

Two 18 year-olds are recovering from injuries received when the pipe bomb they were trying to make exploded.

The incident occurred on Tuesday, August 19, 2003, in the 21000 block of Unger Rd. The teens were attempting to build a 3" pipe bomb in the garage when the explosion took place. The debris from the blast embedded pipe pieces into a half-inch thick piece of plywood. The one teen suffered extensive

damage to one of his hands.

Both teens were taken to Legacy Emanuel Hospital and Health Center in Portland. Anthony Naylor suffered the hand injury and both he and Kyle Bodle were hit by shrapnel and suffered powder burns. Naylor was listed in serious condition the day after the accident.

The young men face accusations of manufacturing and possessing a destructive device. These are Class C felonies and are punishable by up to a five-year sentence and a \$100,000.00 fine.

Clackamas County Family Devastated After Serious Motor Vehicle Accident

A Clackamas County family is devastated after a horrible accident kills their six-year-old boy and seriously injures their three daughters just after 9:00 p. m. on Saturday, August 30, 2003. The family was traveling westbound on South Beavercreek Road just south of Oregon City when the pickup truck, driven by the father, left the roadway which caused the attached camper, which the four children were riding in, to strike a tree.

The camper was sheared apart and all four children, ranging in ages from thirteen to six, were ejected onto the side of the road. Multiple fire/paramedic units from Clackamas County Fire District No. 1 and American Medical Response rushed to treat all four children.

Two of the three daughters suffered serious injuries, and the third, which suffered critical injuries, was flown by Lifeflight helicopter to a local area trauma center. The father was not injured and the mother of the children was not present. The cause of the accident is being investigated by the Clackamas County Sheriff's office.

Although it is legal to ride in campers when they are attached directly to the bed of a pickup truck, this incident illustrates the dangers when adults and children are not properly restrained by seatbelts or car seats.

Even a minor accident could cause serious injury to anyone who may be standing up inside a camper during an accident.



Communication Arts Center Work Begins


Work is now under way on the sixth and final new construction project at Clackamas Community College. The Communication Arts Center will provide a home for theater, music and speech and will feature a theater with seating for more than 400.

Students and staff at CCC have thrived for years in

less-than-ideal facilities. The theater where dramatic productions take place is a converted lecture hall. Music rehearsals take place in a converted hallway, competing with the sound of bouncing balls in the gym. The art gallery at the college is in the corridor of a classroom building. All that will change when the Communication Arts Center is completed in December 2004.

The 43,000 square-foot building will feature a theater with professional quality sound and lighting equipment, dressing rooms, green room and a real shop where sets will be designed and built. The flexible space can seat from 250 to 400 people. Music students will practice in dedicated vocal and instrumental rehearsal rooms. The facility will feature a recording studio that will offer students the latest computer and technological enhancements.

The center will also feature a secure art gallery that will showcase the work of emerging artists and will serve as a lab for students studying museum science. "The new center will create a sense of possibilities for



art students," said David Andersen, chairman of the Art Department.

Three of the six buildings funded through a bond passed by voters in November 2000 have been completed. The welding and industrial technology building opened for classes spring term. Summer term classes are taking place in both the new studio arts center and the Streeter annex. Two more buildings, Pauling annex and the Gateway building are on line for completion late this fall.

In the meantime, portions of the campus remain a construction zone, shifting parking areas, and on occasion, pedestrian walkways. The parking lot between the Dye Learning Center and Gregory Forum is closed during the Communication Arts Center construction. A new temporary parking lot has been installed to the east of the Barlow parking lot.

The August meeting of the Beavercreek Community Planning Organization, aka BCPO, was held on Wednesday, August 27, 2003, at the Beavercreek Grange on Kamrath Rd. The meeting began at 7:00 p.m. with 18 members and guests in attendance. There was no guest speaker.

Descrambling Changes BCI To Begin in Septmber

Beavercreek Cooperative Telephone Company (BCT) will be descrambling their extended basic channel line up in September to an unscrambled format. Scrambling of the extended basic tier was originally implemented to reduce visits to a customer's residence for requested lineup changes. That format has been in place since 1995 when the first customer came on line and has served the purpose very well.

A lot has changed since then. There are pressures at the national level to push more towards digital delivery to conserve bandwidth. Moving to digital delivery provides compression and cost efficiencies as channels are added. For example one analog channel takes 6 megahertz of bandwidth to deliver. That same 6 megahertz of bandwidth will support 8 to 12 digital channels dependent on the manufacture of equipment and compression technology employed.

When BCT first began offering digital they were able to purchase digital settops with a feature that also descrambled analog signals. That allowed BCT to continue with the scramble format that was in place. The industry no longer supports that technology. BCT looked at where the industry is headed and decided that unscrambling the extended basic analog tier was in the member's best interest. Premium, pay per view and digital channels will still be scrambled requiring a set-top to view. Frequency trapping will be employed to authorize viewing of extended basic programming beyond the basic tier.

BCT will rearrange the lineup as well during this transition. From time to time cable companies realign their channel lineup for better organization and channel frequency allocation. BCT sent out replacement channel cards to its members so we can easily find our favorite channels after the rearrangement is complete. If you have not received a new line up card just stop by BCT's office and they can provide you with one.

Some people have asked will everything work okay if I leave the set-top in place after the change. The answer is yes you do not have to change a thing, but if you do remove the set-top make sure you return the set-top to BCT. It is still property of BCT.
