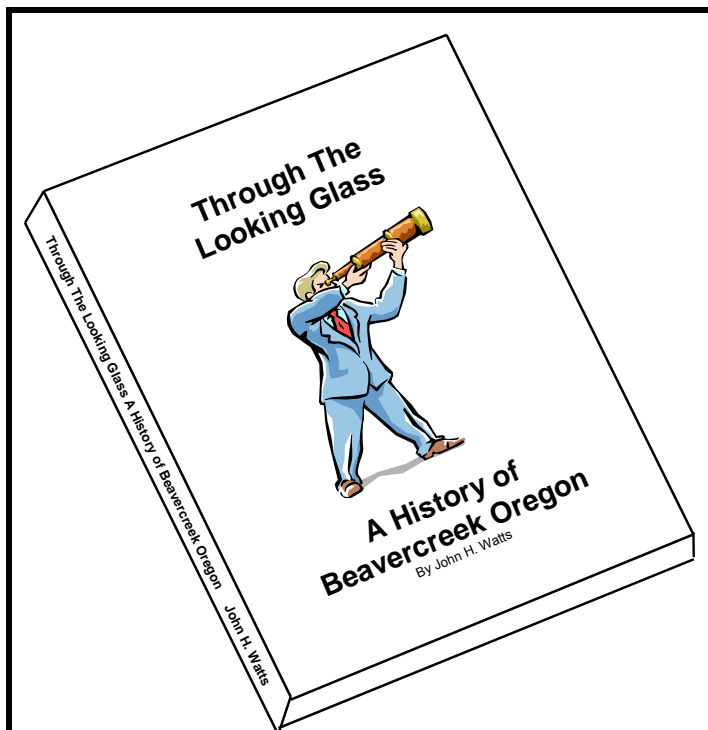

Grant Will Support Manufacturing Leadership Academy

Area business and industry will benefit from a new grant awarded to the Customized Training and Development Services at Clackamas Community College. The \$49,815 grant from the Department of Defense and the Manufacturing 21 coalition will be used to develop a leadership academy for supervisors in defense-related manufacturing.

Participants in the leadership academy will be selected from area manufacturers that are part of the defense logistics supply chain. The academy will include a Leadership Summit and two Saturday workshops a month for nine months. The workshops will cover topics such as decision making, self confidence, communication and conflict resolution.

Grants were awarded to several local schools and businesses including Clark College, Benchmade Knife Company and Miles Fiberglass. They were awarded funds from the US Department of Defense Materials Science and Manufacturing Research Grant. The total fund was procured through the joint efforts of the Pacific Northwest Defense Coalition and the Manufacturing 21 Coalition. These are federal funds allocated to support the growth of manufacturing companies that supply products to the United States military.

Opportunity Online Grant Program Brings Needed Computers to Oregon Libraries

The Oregon State Library estimates that the new Opportunity Online Grant Program announced by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation on July 15th will increase the capacity of Oregon's public libraries to meet the growing demand for public access computers by about 20% over the next two years.

"These new computers are greatly needed because most of our public libraries are still struggling to meet the demands of the public," commented State Librarian Jim Scheppke. "We thought we might be ahead of the curve by now, but we're not."

In the latest State Library statistics for Oregon public libraries there were a total of 2,216 public access computers in Oregon public libraries. The State Library estimates that the computers are used an average of 10,800 times a day, seven days a week, in all 129 Oregon public libraries.

The new Opportunity Online Grant Program will provide 57 Oregon libraries with 604 computers over two years. The Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation will invest nearly \$1 mil-

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lion and Oregon libraries will need to need to provide nearly \$600,000 in matching funds. Matching funds can come from any local funding source. The libraries were selected by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation as libraries that serve high concentrations of people in poverty and libraries that are at risk of having outdated computer technology.

Providing public access to the Internet has become one of the top services in Oregon public libraries over the past decade. "Our public libraries perform a tremendous service for many thousands of Oregonians by enabling them to be connected to health information, employment information, business information, not to mention their family and friends," said Scheppke. "Our public libraries are the first place many people turn to get connected. Increasingly, getting information and registering for services and filing forms



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can only be done online and our libraries are where people go to do that."

The Opportunity Online Grant program is the third major grant program that has helped most Oregon public libraries build and sustain a public access computing service in their communities. The State Library has successfully applied for all three programs beginning with the State Partnership Program in 2001.

The State Library is working with the Bibliographical Center for Research in Aurora, Colorado, which is administering the Opportunity Online Grant Program for several states in the West.

Clackamas County Library will receive 10 computers from the grant with a value of \$26,000.00.

"Normally, audits only occur if there is a concern or problem. We requested this audit to ensure we are doing everything possible to uphold the standards of the NBP."

"We welcome any advice or suggestion that will improve our already exemplary biosolids management program," added LaPierre. "In fact, we are planning to request a NBP-sponsored audit every two years and conduct internal audits in between, with the goal of not only meeting NBP standards, but exceeding them."

An educator, counselor and supporter of many worthy causes, Sharon Hartsell lived a life devoted to helping students succeed. An innovative teacher, Sharon was especially known for helping those who struggled with study, work and life skills.

Known as "Shad" or "Shaddy," she was born Sharon Jane Slama in San Francisco on March 7, 1944. She was the daughter of Alex Slama and Ruth Helen Ellis. Alex died in World War II and Sharon was raised by Ruth and Marty Krumm of San Bruno, Calif. A graduate of Mercy High School and San Francisco State University, Sharon had several degrees and certificates in teaching, psychology, counseling and home economics.

An elementary school teacher and social worker in and around Modesto, Calif., Sharon married George Hartsell on Aug. 25, 1973. The couple moved in 1976 to a 4.5-acre site in Colton. She worked as a teacher in elementary schools in

The 2008 Clackamas County *Bike It!* map is a full-color, full-size, waterproof map showing the entire County on one side and the urban area of the County on the other side. The map provides a wide variety of information to help bicyclists determine the best routes for them, whether riding for work or recreation.

Map features include:

Bike lanes, paved multi-use roads and planned multi-use paths

Roadways, divided into four categories based on suitability for bicycles to share with vehicles – most suitable, moderately suitable, less suitable and difficult connection.

Hard-surfaced roads and gravel roads in Mt. Hood National Forest,

Single-track and double-track mountain bike trails

The map also highlights 10 recommended bike rides in

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both urban and rural portions of the County, from seven to 73 miles long, from relatively flat farmland to uphill all the way. Each recommended ride has its own map, ride summary, elevation profile and points of interest.

Bike It! will be released over the noon hour on September 4th at the Transportation Options Fair in the Fountain Courtyard at the Kaiser Sunnyside Medical Center. The 11:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. fair will include educational displays and exhibits, as well as a bike commute workshop by the Bicycle Transportation Alliance (BTA) and the opening of a new TriMet bus stop on the Kaiser campus. The public is welcome to attend; free bike maps will be given to people who attend.

The map will also be available free at Clackamas LIVE! a day-long celebration of Clackamas County on September 13 in North Clackamas Park in Milwaukie. The fun will include music, entertainment, crafts, food, a fine art show, dancing, wine and beer from local wineries and brewers, and an adult kickball tournament. The event is free, though there is a \$7 charge to get into the music performance area.

Bike It! was researched and designed by Clackamas County Planning Division staffers Scott Hoelscher and Lori Mastrantonio and GIS Specialist Jim Lugosi with the support and involvement of the County's Pedestrian/Bikeway Advisory Committee.

The map is funded through a grant from Metro, as well as support from Kaiser Permanente, Oregon's Mt. Hood Territory and the Clackamas Regional Center TMA. Maps will be available for sale at the county, in bike shops and recreational facilities, and other venues. Proceeds will be used to update the map in future years.

Welding Students Work with State on Improved Bear Trap

Bears don't read. They won't understand the sign on the side of the newest Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife bear trap that reads "Manufactured By Clackamas Community College Welding Department."

CCC welding instructors and students are proud of the handiwork they created over the past several months for the ODFW. Students in Dave Williams' welding fabrication class have been working on the trap for the last three terms, taking the project from conception to design to blueprint to welding fabrication, with revisions along the way.

"It's a beautiful trap," said Don Vandebergh, district wild-



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life biologist for the ODFW's North Willamette District. "We think this will be a real effective and functional tool for us."

Welding students also benefited from the experience. "We are always interested in providing students at the Community College with real-world projects," said Paul Wanner, chairman of the Applied Technology Department at CCC. "We look for opportunities to collaborate with industry and public agencies."

The trap is designed with modifications that make it easier to use in tight quarters in the field. Additional improvements make the trap safer to set. "The project gave Clackamas welding students a great educational experience," said instructor Dave Williams.

CCC offers a full range of welding programs to meet the growing demand for welders in the State. The college has a fully equipped, 34-booth welding and fabrication facility, offering a wide array of welding curriculum for the professional welder including American Welding Society certification. The department recently gained a Computer Numeric Controlled (CNC) plasma cutter to add to the program's state-of-the-market facilities and course offerings for students.

Forestry Resumes Seasonal Road Restrictions for Hunting on West Tillamook

The Oregon Department of Forestry (ODF) will resume road restrictions this fall in the western part of the Tillamook State Forest to improve deer and elk escapement during hunting season.

Some roads will be closed to motorized use during general archery and rifle hunting seasons in September, October and November. Selected roads in the North Fork Trask River, Hembre Ridge and Little North Fork Wilson River areas will be gated and signed.

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Hunters and other recreational users are welcome to access these gated areas by foot, mountain bike, horse or other non-motorized means.

Controlled access during those three months is designed to reduce hunting pressure in these areas where expanded clearcuts have left the deer and elk more vulnerable.

ODF accelerated its rate of clearcut timber harvest in recent years in the western part of the Tillamook State Forest to convert diseased stands of Douglas-fir to disease-resistant species of trees. This has resulted in larger clearcut areas. Deer and elk generally benefit from openings created by clearcuts as more forage is available to them, but cover for hiding tends to decrease.

ODF is partnering with the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife (ODFW) and the Tillamook Chapter of the Oregon Hunters Association (OHA) in this program.

Motorized access by ODF staff or contractors working in those areas may occur on occasion. Maps of the road management areas are available at the Tillamook ODF office located at 5005 Third Street, Tillamook and at the Tillamook District's Web site at <http://egov.oregon.gov/ODF/>

Oregon Fisheries Update

Willamette Valley/Metro -

Anglers wanting to fish the mainstem Columbia have their eyes on the dam counts at Bonneville. Counts will increase dramatically in early September, just in time for the September 1st opener of what will likely be a very productive fall salmon fishery from Tongue Point to Bonneville Dam.

Summer steelhead are still providing good opportunity in the gorge but effort is shifting as anglers prepare for the coming salmon run.

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Sturgeon fishing in the lower Willamette remains slow with warm water temperatures contributing to poor catch rates. The recent storm event may improve conditions.

With the North Santiam river level and flow stable, steelheading has improved but the bite is light, so use sensitive equipment.

The Sandy was showing a little milky color over the weekend although it did produce some steelhead.

It's still too early for coho in the Clackamas but they should be showing soon. Steelheading is slow with no fish being recycled from the hatchery for the last 2 weeks.

Scheduled to be stocked with trout are Faraday Lake, North Fork Reservoir, Small Fry Lake, Clear Lake and Leaburg Lake.

Northwest -

Catch rates in the Buoy 10 fishery are surprising anglers and biologists alike. Anglers averaged better than .5 fish per rod over the last week with chinook making up the bulk of the catch. Managers will meet by phone today to discuss the remaining quota for this fishery. Chinook in the 15 to 25 pound range are taking both fresh herring and spinners downstream of the Astoria Bridge with the Oregon side of the river producing the best results.

Ocean coho fishing off the entire Oregon Coast is now closed and rough seas may subside by the weekend. Albacore tuna will still be a top priority for ocean anglers as we enter the season when live bait becomes the preferred

method for taking fish.

Crabbing is improving in the lower Columbia River but effort is light. Salmon trollers are working the crab grounds heavily so prepare for gear conflicts if you drop crab gear.

A sharp rise in north coast streams should bolster summer steelhead opportunities in the Wilson and Nestucca Rivers. Some early Coho may show as well with the Trask and North Fork Nehalem the best options. Early fall chinook may also be on tap on Tillamook Bay by the weekend but the ocean bubble fishery won't open until September 1st.

Rumors of early chinook are coming from the lower portions of the Siletz and Alsea Rivers. Weak tides favor herring trollers this weekend with crabbing a good second option.

Southwest -

With ocean coho now closed, anglers are pursuing rockfish, lingcod and at times, tuna. The all-depth halibut summer season remains open every Friday through Sunday.

As of August 18th, boat anglers may no longer retain cabezon as the quota has been met. Anglers fishing from shore can still keep them.

Ocean crabbing closed on August 14th but has been improving in coastal bays and estuaries. Crabbing will improve as Dungeness harden into fall. Soft tides this coming weekend favor good results.

Fish the tailouts on the North Umpqua for a fair to good chance at a summer steelhead. The mainstem and South Umpqua are reliable for smallmouth.

Fishing offshore out of Gold Beach has been good when the ocean has allowed. Rogue Bay trollers are experiencing occasional flurries of chinook catches. Coho are in the mix and have occasionally been mistaken for chinook. Upriver, fishing for summer steelhead adults and half-pounders has been good from Agness to Gold



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Beach.

Surf perch fishers are landing good numbers of fish to two pounds or better on south coast beaches.

Rock fishing offshore out of the Port of Brookings has been excellent and lingcod catches are improving. Tuna fishing has been spotty and required a 50-60 mile trip this week.

Diamond Lake has continued to fish well for jumbo rainbow trout, although action is slowing as the water warms up.

Section 5 of the Rogue River is scheduled for trout planting.

Eastern -

Odell anglers are making fair to good catches of kokanee averaging 10 inches. They're not yet showing signs of spawning. The algae problem is all but gone.

Green Peter has been slow to fair for kokanee with trolling most effective.

Steelhead are entering the Deschutes in decent number now. Trollers at the mouth are seeing fair but steady action on plugs. Early mornings are producing for anglers throwing spinners on the lower river

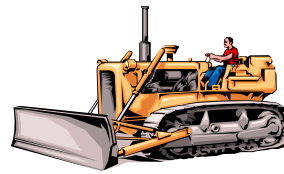

Since 2003, Clackamas County has provided federal timber funding to augment Extension's programs. The loss of the federal funding following fiscal year 2008-2009 will leave a major hole in the County's budget and will affect a number of its departments and partner programs - including the Extension Service.

"The cut in Federal revenue allocated to the County has led to budget cuts that affect many programs" said Clackamas County Commission Chair Lynn Peterson. "Forming a Clackamas County Agricultural Extension and 4-H District will allow a dedicated source of funding for the important Extension Service programs that benefit the entire community."

For the past 90 years, the Agricultural Extension Service has served residents of Clackamas County to provide unbiased university, research-based information to address local issues, problems and needs. Extension helps farmers and forest owners to improve the productivity and profitability of their lands, teaches youth practical life skills that prepare them to be contributing members of their communities and addresses critical environmental quality questions facing rural, suburban and urban residents.

"Clackamas County has a long and proud tradition of supporting Extension Services to the residents of the County," said Commissioner Bill Kennemer. "Today with this ballot measure, voters have the opportunity to create a special district with long term sustainable funding to continue Extension's important mission."

Clackamas County has the largest 4-H program in the

State, with more than 5,000 youth, kindergarten through 12th grade, participating in community clubs and in-school and after-school programs.

"With the loss of Federal Secure Rural Schools funding to augment Extension's programs, we had to act in order to save this program," said Commissioner Martha Schrader. "There's a lot of talk these days about being green and sustainable. None of this is new to Extension programs in the County. Extension has been teaching our citizens about sustainable agriculture, forestry and gardening for years."

The proposed rate for the creation of the Service District is 5 cents (a nickel) per \$1,000 of assessed property tax valuation. The creation of a Service District would generate approximately \$1.5 million for the upcoming fiscal year to provide long-term sustainable funding for Extension Service in Clackamas County.

Another Accident! Luckily This Time No Fatality

On the morning of Saturday, August 9, 2008, there was an accident at the intersection of S. Ferguson Road and S. Beavercreek Road. Anyone trying to get through Beavercreek that morning is aware of the crash as the roadway was closed for a number of hours and people had to take detours.

Lea Dell Robertson, age 82, of Oregon City was driving westbound on S. Ferguson Road in a 2002 Gold Ford Taurus when she pulled out in front of the 2001 blue Ford truck driven by Donald Raines, age 45, of Beavercreek. Mr. Raines was driving Northbound on S. Beavercreek Road.

Mr. Raines swerved to try to avoid the crash and collided with Ms. Roberson's driver rear quarter panel. He then crashed through the fence at 21981 S. Beavercreek Road at the residence of Mike Mullikin and broke PGE power pole #450. Both vehicles were towed from the scene.

Luckily no one was injured in this accident. Both drivers were wearing lap/shoulder belts.

An investigation into the incident was conducted by the Clackamas County Sheriff's Office.

Clackamas County's Water Environment Services (WES) Hires Local Construction Manager for Tri-City Wastewater Capacity Expansion Project

A builder of wastewater treatment plants and other facilities in the Northwest was selected August 7 to become what is known as the Construction Management/General Contractor (CM/GC) for Clackamas County's short-term wastewater Capacity Management Program (CMP.)

The Clackamas County Board of County Commissioners (BCC) approved a \$10-million contract for Slayden Construction Group, Inc., of Stayton, Oregon to complete portions of construction for the CMP project. The project is designed to increase sewage treatment services for residents and businesses in Clackamas County Service District No. 1 (CCSD #1), while protecting public health and the Willamette River.

The total project, estimated at \$116.6 million, includes expansion of the Tri-City Wastewater Treatment Plant in Oregon City, improvements to the Kellogg Creek Treatment Plant in Milwaukie, sewer pipelines connecting to Tri-City. It also includes repairs to the 82nd Drive Pedestrian Bridge which carries a major pipeline across the river to the Tri-City Plant.

The expansion is a key part of the strategy to serve CCSD #1, which has leased treatment services from Tri-City because the Kellogg Creek Plant is currently over capacity and can no longer meet the wastewater demand of the District. Work at the Tri-City Plant will start after Labor Day. The early work package includes mobilization, excavation, yard piping, foundations and piling construction. There was no guest speaker.

The meeting was called to order at 7:05 p.m. by Chair Bill Merchant.

Secretary, Joan Martinez, read the highlights of the July 23, 2008, meeting that were approved as read.

There were questions asked regarding the work being done across the road from the Beavercreek Saloon and Restaurant. They were stopping traffic in order to run utilities under the road to serve the new subdivision.

Someone asked about the new triple wide going in next to Skyles Drilling. The Board had no information on what was being done on the site at this time.

The Treasurer's report was given and the Board asked for approval to spend up to \$500.00 for the 2nd Annual Hamlet Happening on September 13th. It passed.

The Nominating Committee report was given. There are 7 individuals who have been nominated to fill the 4 vacancies. The four vacancies are Chair, Secretary and 2 board members. It was noted that two of the candidates have not filed their application for the election as of August 27th. It was also noted that the application deadline was Friday, August 29, 2008.

It was noted that one candidate was out of town. They will be contacted as will the other nominee, to make sure they get their application in by the deadline. There were no nominations from the floor.

Christine Roth, who is our County liaison, gave an expla-

nation of the voting process and how it will be done at the September 24th Town Hall Meeting that will take place at Beavercreek Elementary School.

There was only one land use action before the members. It was a proposed changed to ZDO 220 (Zoning and Development Ordinance 220). The proposal was for amendments to Section 802, Two and Three-Family Dwellings, and Section 301, Minimum Lot and Structure Design Requirements. These are housekeeping changes to remove the RA-2 designation from Section 802. There will be a Planning Commission hearing at 6:30 p.m. on September 22, 2008, at the Sunnybrook Service Center, 9101 SE Sunnybrook Blvd., Clackamas. There will also be a Board of County Commissioners hearing at 9:30 a.m. on October 29, 2008, 2051 Kaen Road, Oregon City.

The members were also advised as to land use decisions that were decided since the last meeting.

The Hamlet Happening was also discussed. More information is available elsewhere in this issue. Volunteers are needed to help set up and clean up after the event. If you would like to volunteer call 503-632-4330 and ask for Judy. This is a community event and community participation is vital!

There was an update on the "Welcome to the Hamlet of" that is to be added to the "Beavercreek" sign in front of Skyles Drilling. It should be up soon.

The History and Design Review Committees were also briefly discussed.

So far about 250 surveys have been returned to the drop-off sites (Beaver Creek Cooperative Telephone Company, Beavercreek Fire Station and Oregon City Golf Club).

Surveys will be available at the Hamlet Happening and at the Oregon City Farmer's Market.

Christine Kozinski made various reports on the status of the Beavercreek Road Concept Plan, Clackamas River Water rate increases, Oregon City Code and Ordinance changes, the purchase of the McLean Clinic by Oregon City for County offices as well as the new Wilco Store in Oregon City and an update on the proposed subdivision on Thayer Road that was denied, but is still being negotiated.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:45 p.m.

Everyone is encouraged to attend the monthly Hamlet Community meetings and the quarterly Town Hall meetings to participate and share ideas and concerns on the issues pertinent to our community. 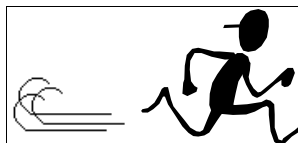
