October Town Hall Recap

Voting for the 2018 Hamlet elections took place at the October meeting. There were four open seats and three candidates applied. Residents voted and all three were elected including Bill Merchant, Christine Kosinski, and Tammy Stevens. Each has served as a director for many years, and will now continue their support of the Hamlet of Beavercreek for another two-year term. The board has the power to appoint and fill the fourth open seat per the bylaws, which can be found at www.beavercreek.org.

Since July 2017, several meetings have included a discussion about whether the Carus Community Planning Organization (CPO) may want to join the Hamlet of Beavercreek, as they may otherwise go inactive or dissolve. The Hamlet expanded before to include Kelmsley Estates because they came to the CPO and requested representation. Recently two CPOs in the Sunnyside area combined to form a larger CPO for better representation.

The Carus CPO represents people along the northern part of Highway 213 and Leland near the church. Board members said that many people in the northern part of Carus feel more a part of Beavercreek, while the southern tract feel like they're part of Mulino. The board is speaking to the Mulino Hamlet about the possibility of splitting the Carus CPO by proximity.

Members asked about pros and cons. Board members pointed out that if Carus has no representation, residents will not be

proactively notified nor will they have a say in land use issues, which could be problematic given their close proximity to the rapidly growing City of Oregon City. Absorbing the Carus CPO means that the Hamlet of Beavercreek will be notified of all land use issues and will communicate to all members.

If Carus joins, more people may attend the monthly meetings. Residents asked if it would dilute the board's current activities or have financial implications; the board said it would not beyond needing more snacks for meetings. Additional funding needs would be submitted to the County. Another pointed out that the

Beavercreek Community Park on Leland - which is now part of the Carus CPO - would become part of the Hamlet. Members voted 17-1 in favor of allowing the Carus CPO to join. The next step is to speak in depth with the Carus and Mulino CPOs.

Michelle Amend from Clackamas County Code Enforcement joined as a quest speaker to share what's changed, what they're working on, and how residents can help them improve. She shared a document with a list of codes enforced in Clackamas County, and who the appropriate enforcement agencies are. For example, they handle accessory structures, building codes, garbage and trash, graffiti, and home business (among others), but not animal abuse (Sheriff's Office), landlord/tenant (civil issue - contact an attorney), roads (Road Concerns) or standing water (Vector Control), among others. Code Enforcement staff handle about 350 cases each. They are currently hiring additional staff to reduce that number to about 225 cases each. They have added two trucks for a total of three in service. They prioritize cases that are life, safety, and building code related. For all other code violations, they must receive at least two confidential complaints to investigate. Confidentiality is protected by law. Michelle quipped that "there's a difference between 'complaining' and making an actual 'complaint'" based on codes.

She addressed a list of concerns that had been submitted to Code Enforcement by members of the CPO Summit - a coalition of local CPOs - including an individual receiving notice that a their complaint had been logged, which was previously not in place. Residents asked about code violations they had observed such temporary care facilities expanding beyond what was permitted, a horse boarding facility with a setback violation, and others. Michelle will check on status.

Code Enforcement also collaborates with a

number of agencies to help those who are in code violation but in need of care from Health & Human Services, Veterans Outreach, and many others. Michelle said, "We all are human and nice people and we do try to work with people."

Road funding and the vehicle registration fee for passenger vehicles and motorcycles was discussed at a recent Community Leaders meeting that included board members from CPOs and Hamlets. The County is planning a series of community meetings to share info and get public feedback, which will be shared on NextDoor.com. Commissioner Ken Humberston was in attendance and shared that, while the County has the most road miles in the tri-county area, it has few sources of funding compared to Washington and Multnomah Counties. Previously roads were funded through timber sales, but that has reduced from \$15 million to around \$1 million today.

Ken also gave an update on the Cross-Laminated Timber project, discussed his goal of getting high-speed internet in every home and business in Clackamas County, and his upcoming trade mission in China on behalf of the County.

Land use applications included notification that the County is seeking input on its long-range land use and transportation projects for 2019-2020. The Hamlet submits a letter with requests that are important to the area, including help with ditches, shoulders on the

November 28 at 7:00 PM Beavercreek Grange roads, and support for the dangerous intersections at Kamrath and Leland, as well as Beavercreek, Steiner, and Yeoman.

Others included an applicant on Moore Rod requesting a new home occupation permit, which residents supported; a Measure 49 request to partition a subject property on Beavercreek Road into two parcels that was left for the commission to determine; and a design review request for the commercial buildings on Rifle Way. Another last-minute inclusion was for a review of the marijuana production license that would limit the number of producers allowed per tract in certain districts (Ag/Forest, Timber, Exclusive Farm Use), as some land owners have allowed multiple licensees on the same tract of land thus making agricultural land seem more commercial/industrial with multiple indoor and outdoor grows abutted next to each other. That will go before the Planning Commission on November 26, 2018.

Oregon City is also reviewing several code

revisions including Accessory Dwelling Units. The board attended a hearing at the County regarding the request to add a 10 acre solar farm off Killdeer Road, and a decision will be known in another month or two. The Park Place Concept Plan remains in the Land Use Board of Appeals (LUBA). The Evergreen Development across from Oregon City High School has been delayed due to issues with sewer. They also decided to change their name to the Village of Beavercreek.

The board shared that four people have volunteered to help with upcoming projects. Additional volunteers are needed to help with the Annual Tree Lighting Ceremony at Korner Park. If you're interested in volunteering, email info@beavercreek.org.

The flashing yellow light being added near Oregon City High School will most likely happen in early 2019. It will inform drivers when students are present so they know to slow to 20 mph, and will be off when it's acceptable to drive the regular speed limit.

Accident at Beavercreek Memorial Cemetery

An accident occurred around 6:00 a.m. on October 10 that caused several headstones to



be damaged. A driver was going north on Kamrath Rd. on his way to work and went through the Cemetery's fence at a high rate of speed. The Clackamas County Sheriff's report states that the driver had dropped his coffee mug and it lodged between the accelerator and the console, causing the car to increase speed, and that he wasn't able to dislodge it.

At least a dozen older headstones were damaged and will need repair and/or total replacement including one from 1903. Insurance is likely to cover the repairs, according to Laura McKay who works for the Cemetery. Maybe you prefer the charm of the historic Carnegie building. Whereever you choose to work within the Library, our WiFi network will keep you and these Chromebooks online.

These laptops are designed to be borrowed for in-library use only. Their operating systems will disable if taken outside the Library. They can be borrowed for up to four (4) hours with a maximum session time of three (3) hours, and the session timer will begin upon logging in with your library card. LINCC library card holders whose accounts are in good standing and over 18 years of age are eligible to check out laptops. No holds or reservations can be placed on them.

In anticipation of this laptop cart project, the Library also invested in wireless printing access. Extra computer mice and headphones were purchased and processed by the Library's technical services team for patrons to check out; earbuds (\$1) and flash drives (\$5) are available for purchase at the Hello Desk. While these additional services complement the laptops, they are also available to all library users during their visits.

Beware of Deceptive Fishing Licensing Website

Better Business Bureau Northwest + Pacific has seen a rise in complaints nationwide regarding a licensing website claiming to be based in Idaho. Consumers report FishingLicense.Org in Coeur D'Alene, appears to be selling fishing licenses but is, in fact, selling downloadable informational guides.

BBB initially warned about the company in August 2017 but has continued to see complaints increase. In the past three years, the company has received <u>26 complaints</u>, with 14 reported in the last year.

Consumers claim when they complete an online search for "fishing license" the search engine leads them to a page on FishingLicense. Org. The page tells the user they can purchase, renew or replace their license. But after a purchase is made, the consumer discovers they ordered an informational guide. The website does offer verbiage stating the consumer is purchasing an informational guide, however, the site is set up to appear as if visitors are actually purchasing a license.

Since more than 140 million Americans are involved in outdoor activities, BBB suggests consumers follow this advice before purchasing a license online:

* Read the fine print. The FishingLicense.Org website does state that it is a private company and not



affiliated with any government agency, but the warning can be easily missed. Be sure to review all the information on a website before making a purchase.

- * Contact government agencies. To make sure consumers are getting exactly what they pay for, they should contact the state's department of fish & wildlife or department of licensing before purchasing a license. It's also wise to research the type of license and costs on these secure, official websites.
- * Specify the online search. Consumers are easily drawn to click on these two websites since they have high rankings on online searches. BBB advises using keywords such as the consumer's state and a specific license type instead of vague license searches.
- * Start with trust. Before purchasing online, consumers should also check business profiles at bbb.org/northwest-pacific or on the BBB App to see if a business is accredited, in good standing, and read consumer reviews and alerts.

Anyone who believes they may be a victim of a scam can report it to BBB. For more trustworthy tips on online purchases, visit bbb.org/shoppingonline/.

Support Clackamas Fire's Annual Programs



Oregon City's Newest Park Named Tyrone S. Woods Memorial Park

The City of Oregon City's Parks and Recreation Advisory Committee has accepted and will recommend Oregon City Commission approve the name, Tyrone S. Woods Memorial Park, for a new 9.1-acre park located in the Caufield Neighborhood.

Tyrone S. Woods was a native Oregonian and a 1989 graduate of Oregon City High School where he was a star wrestler. Woods was a Navy Seal and served several decorated combat tours in Iraq and Afghanistan. He lost his life in 2012 in service to his country while working for the CIA.

Nominations for the park name were submitted online over a 5-week period; over 400 suggested names were provided. These

submittals were narrowed down to 4 names that received 8,572 public votes August through September, the majority for Tyrone S. Woods Memorial Park.

The park, located at the intersection of Glen Oak Road and High School Avenue is slated for construction Spring 2019. The park will include an open lawn area, playground, picnic shelter, boardwalk, walking path system, and off-leash dog park.

Preventing Chimney Fires

A chimney fire in Canby in October reminds us of the importance of chimney maintenance. Following are tips to know when you have a chimney fire and how to avoid one.

The Chimney Safety Institute of America explains how to tell if a chimney is on fire:

- * Loud cracking and popping noise
- * Flames shooting from your chimney
- * Low, loud rumbling noise that sounds like a freight train or airplane overhead
- * A lot of dense smoke
- * An intense, hot smell

If you're in doubt about whether your chimney is on fire, dial 911 immediately.

Here are a few simple tips to prevent a chimney fire from starting in your home:

- * Hire a professional and certified chimney sweep to inspect and clean your chimney annually.
- * Cleaning your chimney is not a DIY job. There is little margin for error with the consequences putting you and your family at risk.
- * Only burn dry or cured wood. Burning wet or uncured wood leads to more creosote buildup in your flue. It's that creosote buildup that usually leads to the ignition of a chimney fire.
- * Don't burn garbage in your fireplace. Not only does garbage contain chemicals that are dangerous to inhale, it can also

lead to more dangerous buildup of combustible materials in your chimney.

- * Keep your fireplace clean. Never start a fire on top of a bed of coals or ash for a previous fire. Doing so can cause the fire to burn even hotter than normal, sparking a chimney fire.
- * Install a smoke alarm and carbon monoxide detector close to your fireplace.

Sheriff's Office Domestic Violence Sweep in October

On Wednesday, Oct. 17, 2018, the Clackamas County Sheriff's Office Domestic Violence Enhanced Response Team (DVERT) worked with agencies throughout Oregon -- as well as agencies across the country -- to arrest persons with outstanding family-violence warrants. Locally, they made 18 arrests during the sweep, on a variety of charges. Nationwide, the 16th Annual Family Violence Apprehension Detail included over 300 county sheriffs' offices, police departments, probation departments, and community agencies from 29 states. All agencies served outstanding arrest warrants -- with charges ranging from harassment to murder.

In Clackamas County alone, by 10 p.m. Thursday, this massive enforcement effort resulted in the arrests of 18 men and women brought to the Clackamas County Jail on existing arrest warrants on a variety of charges, some of them DV-related. A PDF of Clackamas County mugshots and arrest charges (ranging from strangulation to assault to other crimes, including theft and DUII) secured during yesterday's sweep is attached. (These figures may be updated as more agencies report in.)

Clackamas County results:

- * 269 warrant attempts
- * 18 arrests at this writing
- * 59 local law-enforcement members participating

This collaborative effort, commonly known as the SWEEP, helps raise awareness of the problem of family and domestic violence in our communities. It also demonstrates to offenders that they will be held accountable for their violence. For more information on DVERT, click here:


