

November Hamlet Meeting Recap

The Clackamas Fire District provided a general update including a plan for a short-term merger with the Estacada Fire District, as well as promoting the forty-fifth annual Operation Santa Claus donation event and parade on Sunday, December 1. Details in this issue.

The Clackamas Soil and Water
Conservation District will soon move in
to their new headquarters on
Beavercreek Road, now expected to be
the first week of December, said general
manager Tom Salzer. An open house is
in the works for January. Tom answered
questions raised by the members.
Currently, there is no plan to use the
barn other than to preserve it.

Land use application Zo446-19 was presented. Board chair Tammy Stevens provided an overview of the application and Tiffany Bailey was in attendance to answer a few clarifying questions. Norm Andreen moved to recommend approval in support. John Burke seconded the motion and the public voted

unanimously in favor. The board voted unanimously in favor.

Land use application Zo456-19 was presented. Nathan Edmonds was in attendance to answer questions. He provided an overview of his plans to increase efficiencies in the expansion of the building, including some estimates of patient base. There were some concerns from the members around impacts on traffic patterns. Norm Andreen moved to recommend approval in support with questions to the impacts on traffic patterns. Joe Matteo seconded the motion and the public voted unanimously in favor. The board voted unanimously in favor.

Tammy provided an update on the Beavercreek Road Concept Plan including the plans to continue with a five-lane highway up to Glen Oak, no roundabouts, the failure of Highway 213 and Beavercreek Road intersection, and other traffic issues. Norm informed the members the ODOT "failure" classifications have been modified. Board member Cheryl Buchert reminded members that they could request the treasury and year-end

financial reports by sending her an email at cheryl@beavercreek.org.

The Beavercreek Road paving project is close to completion. A member suggested writing a thank you letter of appreciation for the efficiencies. There was also a mention of a very helpful and caring citizen acting as a traffic reporter for Beavercreek paving project on social media. Safety concerns around Yeoman Road and the Beavercreek Elementary School were raised.

Tammy provided an update on the annual holiday event on December 7 including a potluck at the Grange, Santa parade, and the tree lighting with warming fires, cookies and hot beverages at Korner Park. New activities include better lighting, sound, and an Ugly Holiday Sweater competition in which participants must be present at the Grange to win. Details in this issue.

Pam Furlan of the Beavercreek Grange provided an update of the Grange's current and upcoming activities including the musical "The Wiz" and the first Saturday monthly breakfasts. Some miscellaneous questions were raised regarding the Clackamas River Water project timeline, the post office address designations of the new development north of the Beavercreek Saloon, and the Villages at the Falls.

The next Hamlet meeting will take place in January. Happy holidays!

Local Resident Finds Missing Molalla Girl

"A search for a little girl lost in the woods Thursday November 7th ended in a relieved reunion, after Clackamas County Sheriff's Office deputies, a local search and rescue team, numerous loggers, and a woman on horseback and her pair of dogs all stopped to help." So begins an Oregonian article about local resident Tammy Stevens, who serves as Hamlet board chair and on the Clackamas County Planning Commission, who found a two-year-old who had run ahead of her grandmother while on a hike and become separated.

At approximately 11:19 a.m. on Thursday, November 7, 2019, the Clackamas County Sheriff's Office was notified of a missing two-year-old girl in the Molalla River Recreation Area. When deputies arrived at the location, they learned Gayla Ann Jay of Molalla had been on a walk with her two grandchildren in the Molalla River Recreation Area when two-year-old Iris Nix had run ahead on the trail and out of sight. While trying to catch up to Iris, Gayla came to a four-way split in the trail and did not know where Iris was. After searching for 15 minutes, Gayla sought out help.

There were several logging crews passing by on the road. Flagged down by Gayla, multiple loggers stopped and



began to scour the area in an effort to find Iris. Search & Rescue Coordinators also began summoning resources and directing deputies and officers in the area. The Clackamas County Water Rescue Consortium was summoned, due to the proximity to the Molalla River. Resources from across Clackamas County deployed to the area to assist. Residents in the area also spontaneously stepped up to help. Among them was Tammy Stevens of Beavercreek on her horse Bo with dogs Wilson and Maddie.

When Tammy heard there was a missing two-year-old in the area, she immediately joined the search, scouting the terrain on horseback, flanked by her two dogs. Tammy described some of the terrain she was checking as steep and dangerous. After about 20 minutes of searching, Tammy heard a child crying. She told Wilson, "Go get her."

Wilson led Tammy to a very steep hill. Tammy dismounted and climbed up the hill — about 70 feet up — and found Iris just after 1 p.m. About 10 minutes later, Tammy found Dave, a logger who had been out searching as well. Dave was able to bring Iris to where deputies and medical personnel were staged. Iris was checked out by paramedics with Molalla Fire and reunited with her family. The

Find Unclaimed Medals or Military Insignia

The Oregon Department of State Lands encourages veterans or their heirs to check in with DSL's Unclaimed Property program to see if they have military medals or insignia to claim that are under state stewardship. "Our veterans and their families have sacrificed so

much, and these medals and insignia are physical representations of that sacrifice and their service," said DSL Director Vicki Walker. Scam Alert: Calendar Fraud

Scammers have started sending online users calendar invites. In many cases, the calendar's default settings allow the invitation to simply appear on your account. The fraudster could be offering you a prize or an invitation to some special, swanky event. Just click on the link and you can register — or click, put in your credit card number, and you are on your way to winning the jackpot.

Of course, these are fakes. At the very least, the sender is able to access your bank account. At most they have loaded malware onto your device and now has access to all of your passwords, personal info, and more.

How do you protect yourself?

 Never click on a link or open an attachment – or in this case a calendar invitation – that you aren't expecting or is from

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- someone you don't recognize.
- Report calendar phishing attempts to the calendar service you use. That will help the providers block such spam attempts in the future.
- Set your calendar permissions so that invitations do not automatically load in your system. Do a simple internet search to find out how to increase the security settings for whichever calendar option you are using.

If you have been victimized by a cyber fraud, be sure to report it to the FBI's Internet Crime Complaint Center at https://www.ic3.gov/or call your local FBI office.


