October Hamlet Meeting Recap

Board chair Tammy Stevens provided an overview of the Community Leaders meeting. There are large upcoming budget cuts to Clackamas County. A survey link will be posted to The Hamlet of Beavercreek's website at beavercreek.org where members are able to provide a voice on the county budget. (The link is also available in this issue.)

Another topic discussed was how to build Hamlet participation. Suggestions included using "welcome messaging" to new residents, leveraging social media like NextDoor, and using community events to gather contact information.

Katie Wilson, County Liaison, distributed ballots for the Hamlet board elections. Incumbent board members Cheryl Buchert, Jack Hipp, and Kenny

Sernach were re-elected to serve on the Hamlet's board of directors.

With regards to the Carus CPO survey, it was suggested to limit the options on the survey to: "Do you want to merge with The Hamlet of Beavercreek?" A Korner Park update was provided and Katie explained the Department of Transportation and Development's strategy in taking on ownership of the property. For now, it can still be used as a community space. An update to the Courthouse was also provided.

Tammy Stevens presented land use application Z0380-19, Z0387-19 Owner Emma G Leyburn Trustee, Applicant John Kirk, 26060 S Jones Road, Beavercreek, zoned RRFF5, 4.77 acres, requesting a new Temporary Home for Care for Emma Leyburn. Issues were raised both by members and the board related to the potential threat to the fish in the creek, building 25 feet within of the allotted 100-foot boundary, and building in a high landslide

susceptibility area per Statewide Landslide Information Layer of Oregon (SLIDO) maps of the area. Multiple attempts to contact the applicant were unsuccessful and there are several unanswered questions. Bill Merchant made a motion to recommend denying the application. Joe Matteo seconded the motion and the public voted unanimously in favor. The board voted unanimously in favor.

Z0398-18-C, Conditional Use, applicant Troy Snyder with Mountain Meadow Solar, property owner Dennis Pikkarainen, address 7275 S Killdeer Road, zoned Timber, 32.17 acres. This remains in LUBA proceedings.

Bill Merchant reminded Hamlet members to send requests to view the previous year's budget to Cheryl Buchert. He provided updates to the Beavercreek Road Repaving Project and reported on the Community Road Fund Advisory Committee meeting. Jack Hipp raised concerns about the level of gravel compaction used on the new shoulder as there have been numerous accidents.

Tammy Stevens brought together the Tree Lighting Committee and is seeking more volunteers to make this year another successful one. She also provided an update of the Clackamas Soil & Water District building detailing some of the features of the facility. Saturday breakfasts are back on at the Grange. Also, the Little Free Library is

built but not yet installed. Concerns were again raised about the Beavercreek Elementary School pickup and drop off traffic on Yeomen Road. Pictures were requested.

The board informed residents the November will take place one week early to avoid Thanksgiving—it will be on November 20 at 7:00 p.m. as always at the Beavercreek Grange.

The Hamlet of Beavercreek is a volunteer-run community group that exists to protect and preserve the rural culture of the area. Monthly meetings are the best place to share feedback and learn how to get involved. Join us at 7:00 p.m. the fourth Wednesday of each month (except for December) at the Beavercreek Grange.

playing of "Taps," the national anthem, a military chaplain and other patriotic observances. State Rep. Marty Wilde, of District 11 representing central Lane and Linn counties, will deliver the keynote address.

Measles Cases in Oregon

A Lane County resident and a visitor to Washington County have been diagnosed with measles. Their illnesses are linked to an individual with the disease who passed through Portland International Airport earlier this month. New measles cases are emerging including one in Clackamas County. In each of the new cases, the people had not been fully vaccinated against measles.

Measles is a highly contagious virus that spreads through the air after a person with measles coughs or sneezes. People are contagious once they have symptoms, which typically start about 4 days before the rash, until 4 days after the rash. The virus can also linger in the air up to two hours after someone who is infectious has left the area.

Measles poses the highest risk to unvaccinated pregnant women, infants under 12 months of age, and people with weakened immune systems. The symptoms of measles start with a fever, cough, runny nose and red eyes, followed by a rash that usually begins on

the face and spreads to the rest of the body. Symptoms begin 7–21 days following exposure.

Public health officials urge people to first call a health care provider or urgent care center by telephone if:

1. They have been exposed within the previous 21 days, AND
2. They have symptoms of measles (such as fever, cough, red eyes or rash).

People with questions about measles infection or the measles vaccine should call their primary care provider or the Clackamas County Public Health department at 503-655-8411.

Exposure locations

Most Oregonians have been vaccinated against measles and their risk is low. Risk may be higher for unvaccinated persons who may have been exposed at one of the following locations, dates and times:

Medicare Annual Enrollment Ends Dec. 7

The annual open enrollment for Medicare is open now through December 7, 2019 for 2020 benefits. Oregon Senior Health Insurance

Benefits Assistance (SHIBA) Program in the Oregon Health Insurance Marketplace is ready to help. There is a new Medicare plan finder tool this year, the first upgrade in a decade. The new plan finder is at <https://www.medicare.gov/plan-compare/#/>. The finder allows users to shop and compare Medicare Advantage and Part D plans, among other new features.

SHIBA provides free health insurance counseling to explain how the Medicare program works, more insurance options that work with Medicare, and help with reducing out-of-pocket costs. Free information and help is available by calling 1-800-722-4134 (toll-free) or visiting shiba.oregon.gov.

SHIBA is also advising people to protect their identity by guarding their Medicare card like they would their credit card or Social Security number. Identity theft from stolen Medicare numbers is becoming more common. To protect against identity theft, don't share your Medicare number or other personal information with anyone who contacts you by telephone or email, or approaches you in person, unless you have given that person permission in advance. Medicare will never contact you (unless you ask them to) for your Medicare number or other personal information. Also, don't let anyone borrow or pay to use your Medicare number.

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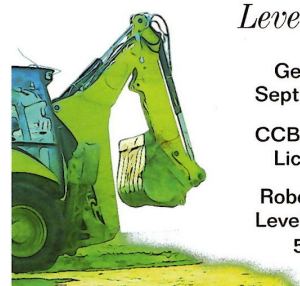
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Health Coverage Annual Enrollment Ends Dec. 15

Oregonians who do not get health insurance through their jobs, and who do not qualify for the Oregon Health Plan, have six weeks to sign up for 2020 coverage. Between Nov. 1 and Dec. 15 you can go to OregonHealthCare.gov to:

- Estimate if you will qualify for help paying for coverage
- Skim the different plans available in your area
- See what the plans cover, and how much they cost
- Find a local expert who can help you apply for a subsidy and enroll in a plan

Anyone legally present in the United States may shop through the Marketplace. People without job-based coverage, and who are not eligible for the Oregon Health Plan, are the most likely to qualify for subsidies.

Subsidies make a big difference to those who qualify. Karl B. is a home-remodeling contractor who got coverage through the Oregon Health Insurance Marketplace and agreed to share his story. "My subsidy is about \$250 a month," Karl said. "In the end, I think I'm paying somewhere between \$100 and \$200 a month, and that's to me a great price point."

Oregonians can apply for subsidies and enroll online on their own, or they can get free, local help with the application. Insurance agents and community-based advocates providing that assistance are listed at OregonHealthCare.gov/gethelp, or call 855-269-3767 (toll-free).

Holiday Cat Food Drive

Every cat deserves a little holiday gift this year, especially the outdoor feral and stray cats lucky enough to have someone looking after them. As part of its Season's Feedings cat food drive, the Feral Cat Coalition of Oregon (FCCO) is offering free cat food to caregivers who bring in their feral and stray cats to FCCO's spay/neuter clinic in December. Dry cat food has been generously donated by individuals and local pet stores.

If you are feeding feral or stray cats, call FCCO at 503-797-2606 to schedule a spay/neuter appointment. All surgeries are performed by licensed veterinarians at FCCO's SW Portland clinic. Services are donation-based and include a spay/neuter; vaccinations; flea and ear mite treatment; and an ear-tip. Throughout December you will also receive a bag of dry cat food for each cat brought in. For more information visit feralcats.com.

26 Arrests Made During Domestic Violence Sweep

On Wednesday, Oct. 23, 2019, the Clackamas County Sheriff's Office [Domestic Violence Enhanced Response Team \(DVERT\)](#) worked with agencies throughout Oregon -- as well as agencies across the country -- to [arrest](#) persons with outstanding family-violence warrants. Locally, they made 26 arrests during the sweep, on a variety of charges.

In Clackamas County alone, by 10 p.m. Thursday, this massive enforcement effort resulted in the arrests of 26 men and women brought to the Clackamas County Jail on existing arrest warrants on a variety of charges, some of them

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DV-related. The Sheriff's Office founded this national warrant sweep and has coordinated the nationwide effort for the past 17 years. As of last year, authorities across the U.S. had made a total of 88,468 warrant attempts and served 18,726 warrants over the first 16 years of the sweep.

This collaborative effort helps raise awareness of the problem of family and domestic violence in our communities. It also demonstrates to offenders that they will be held accountable for their violence.

Sheriff Roberts also formally recognized local officials who worked behind the scenes in support of the passage of [Senate Bill 1562](#), which finally made domestic-violence strangulation a felony in May 2018.

Free Vaccinations at Local Clinics

Clackamas County residents interested in getting vaccines to avoid the flu; measles, mumps, and rubella; and hepatitis A may do so at a free vaccination clinic offered by Clackamas County community partners. The clinic will be held on Wednesday, Nov. 6 from 2:30-6:30 p.m. at Clackamas Town Center, 12000 SE 82nd Ave., Happy Valley, 97086, in the event tent in the

parking lot at the corner of 82nd Ave. and Monterey Ave.

Free flu; measles, mumps, and rubella; and hepatitis A vaccines will be offered to children and adults on a first-come, first-served basis or until the supply of vaccines last.

Community partners: Clackamas Community College; Clackamas County Health, Housing & Human Services; Clackamas Fire District #1; North Clackamas Schools; Providence Milwaukie Hospital; Rotary Club of Clackamas and Walla Walla University.

Kicker Check Details Confirmed

A more than \$1.5 billion tax surplus was confirmed by the Office of Economic Analysis (OEA) earlier this month, triggering a tax surplus credit, or “kicker,” for the 2018 tax year. Instead of kicker checks, the surplus will be returned to taxpayers through a credit on their 2019 state personal income tax returns filed in 2020.

To calculate the amount of your credit, multiply your 2018 tax liability before any credits—line 22 on the 2018 Form OR-40—by 16 percent. This percentage is determined and certified by OEA. Taxpayers who claimed a credit for tax paid to another state will need to subtract the credit amount from their liability before calculating the credit.

You're eligible to claim the kicker if you filed a 2018 tax return and had tax due before credits. Even if you don't have a filing obligation for 2019, you still must file a 2019 tax return to claim your credit. There will be detailed information on how to claim your credit in the 2019 Oregon personal income tax return instructions: Form OR-40 for full-year Oregon residents, Form OR-40-P for part-year residents, and Form OR-40-N for nonresidents. Composite and fiduciary-income tax return filers are also eligible.

Keep in mind that the state may use all or part of your kicker to pay any state debt you owe, such as tax due for other years, child support, court fines, or school loans.

A What's My Kicker? calculator will be active on Revenue's website for personal income tax filers when filing season opens in January. To calculate your kicker, you'll enter your name, Social Security Number, and filing status for 2018 and 2019.



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CCC Offers New Medical Billing and Coding Program

For those looking for a career in health care but don't want to give injections or draw blood, Clackamas Community College has a new medical billing and coding program that teaches how to work with physicians and assist patients in the front office.

Medical coders analyze doctor documentation using specific guidelines to determine the correct codes for billing doctor services. These professionals are excellent critical thinkers who possess a strong focus and are detail orientated. They are able to meet production and accuracy standards while working independently or as a team. Medical billers apply health care laws to create and submit claims for doctors' work. They work with insurance companies and patients to track the claims through the payment of services

rendered. Medical billers demonstrate initiative while maintaining effective verbal and written communication skills with patients, teammates and providers.

"Students who complete our medical billing and coding program will leave qualified to work in the industry, earning between \$42,000 and \$51,000 annually," CCC Health Sciences Director Jarett Gilbert said. "In less than a year, we can prepare you for a profession in the health care industry."

Water Environment Services Committee. This commission currently has two vacancies. The sixteen-member commission provides

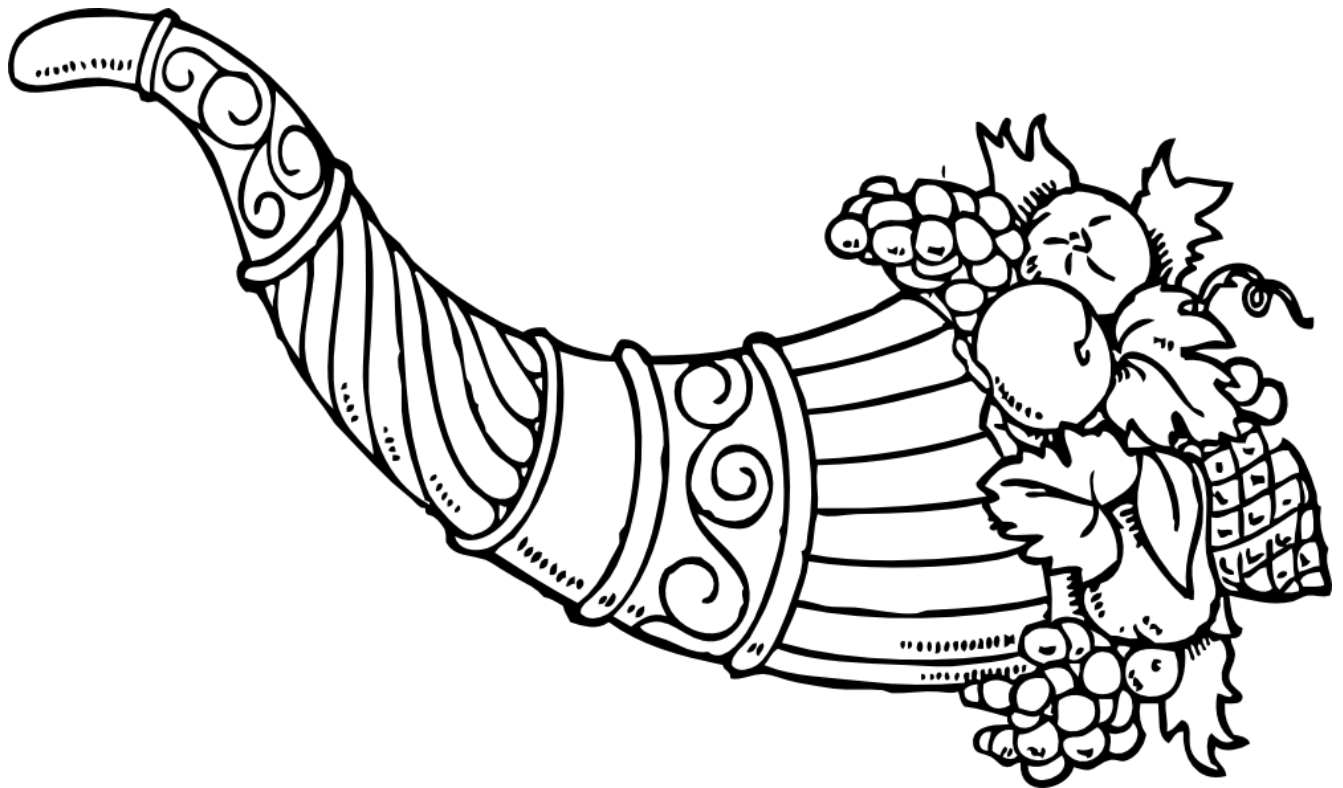
