Beavercreek Road Concept Plan Update

The February 24, 2020 Planning Commission Agenda is now available for review at <https://oregon-city.legistar.com/Calendar.aspx>. Meetings may be attended in person, viewed Live on Comcast

Channel 28 or on the City's website via streaming video.

City of Oregon City staff have prepared a report and findings for the formal review and recommendation of the Planning Commission for the packet of amendments that implement the Beavercreek Road Concept Plan. This file proposes amendments to the Comprehensive Plan Map, Zoning Map, Title 16 and 17 of the Oregon City Municipal Code, Beavercreek Road Concept Plan, Parks Master Plan, Trails Master Plan and the Transportation System Plan to Implement the Goals and Policies of the Beavercreek Road Concept Plan.

Staff has prepared a staff report that analyzes the proposal to amend the Comprehensive Plan Map, Zoning Map, Title 16 and 17 of the Oregon City Municipal Code, Beavercreek Road Concept Plan, Parks Master Plan, Trails Master Plan and the Transportation System Plan to implement the Goals and Policies of the Beavercreek Road Concept Plan and found that it is consistent with the Oregon City Comprehensive Plan and State Land Use Goals. Staff recommends approval of Planning file LEG 19-00003.

A worksession with the City Commission is tentatively scheduled for March 10, 2020 with City Commission Hearings starting soon after.

ClackCo Services Survey Results

The county requested input from Clackamas County residents on which services they value most to inform upcoming budget conversations. Comic about the Coronavirus for Kids

The first and second confirmed cases of the coronavirus occurred over the weekend - Feb. 28 and Mar. 1 - in Lake Oswego. The Oregon Health Authority (OHA) continues to recommend that Oregonians take everyday precautions to prevent the spread of many respiratory illnesses, including COVID-19 and influenza:

- Cover your coughs and sneezes with a tissue and then throw the tissue in the trash.
- Wash your hands often with soap and water for 20 seconds. If soap and water are not readily available, use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol.
- Avoid close contact with people who are sick.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose and mouth with unwashed hands.
- Clean and disinfect surfaces that are often touched.
- Take care of your health overall. Staying current on your vaccinations, including flu vaccine, eating well and exercising all help your body stay resilient.
- Consult CDC's travel website for any travel advisories and steps to protect yourself if you plan to travel outside of the US.

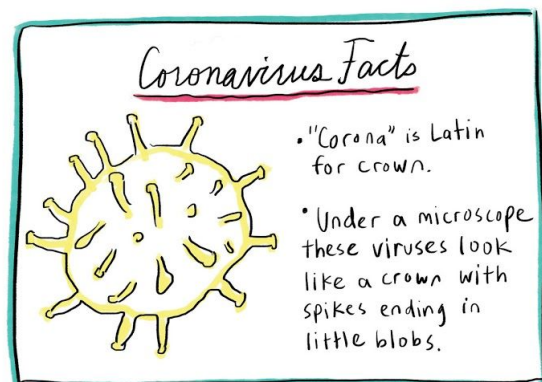

Borrow Weed Equipment

By Clackamas Soil & Water Conservation District

The Clackamas Soil and Water District [WeedWise Program](#) has a Weed Equipment Library which includes many excellent brands of shrub and tree

removal tools and lake rakes available for use in your weed control project. These tools are available for use, free of charge, for projects within Clackamas County. Please stop by the District office at 22055 S. Beavercreek Rd., Beavercreek, OR to check out one of these tools. We recommend that you call us before dropping by at 503-210-6000 to check on availability.

Lake Rake

The lake rake is useful for clearing weedy or unwanted vegetation from your pond. This tool comes with a rope to help you reach deeper into your pond. We have two lake rakes available for checkout including one with an extension handle.

[Shrub Buster™](#)

The Shrub Buster™, also known as the Honeysuckle Popper™, is useful for uprooting shrubs of all sizes with fibrous root systems. The tool is no longer being manufactured. We have two sizes of this tool – one for large shrubs and one for small to medium sized shrubs.

[Extractigator™](#)

The Extractigator™ is useful for uprooting woody stems up to 2 inches in diameter. We have two of the standard size version of this tool complete with BigFoot™ attachment.

Weed Wrench™

The Weed Wrench™ is the original shrub removal tool. It is no longer being

manufactured. We have four sizes: Mini, Light, Medium, and Heavy.

[Puller Bear™](#)

The PullerBear XL™ is useful for uprooting woody vegetation. We have the Pro XL and Grip XL versions of this tool.

[Uprooter™](#)

The Uprooter™ is useful for pulling woody vegetation. It is very similar to the Weed Wrench and is manufactured by a former employee of the Weed Wrench company. We have two of the standard Uprooters.

The Clackamas Soil and Water Conservation District also operates an agricultural [Equipment Rental Program](#) including: 3' seed drill, 7' no-till drill, manure spreader, harrow, box scraper, aerator, fertilizer/lime spin spreader, and water wagon.

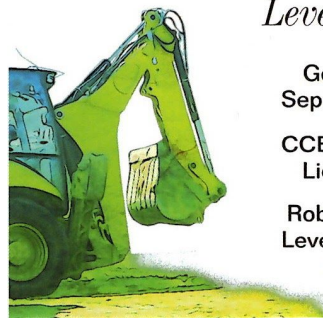

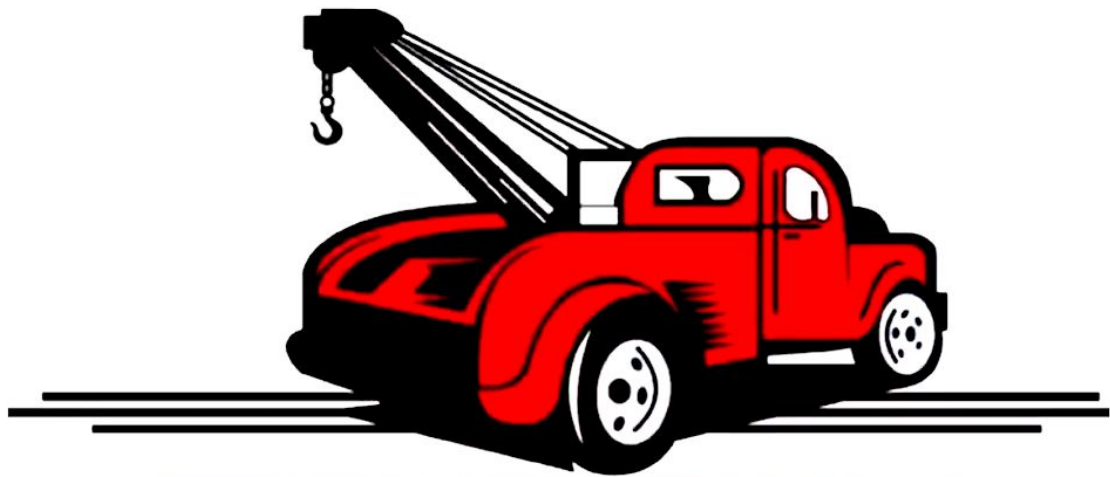

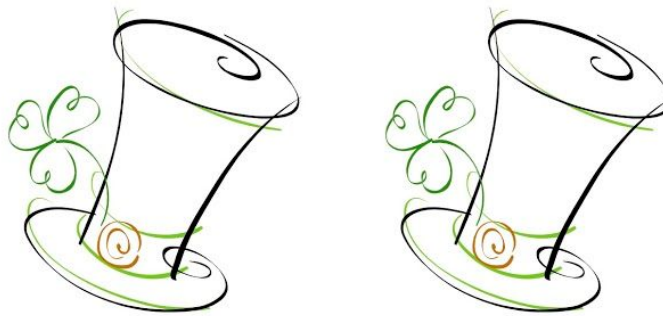
