# Community Spotlight: Julie Hoffman

Long-time resident of Beavercreek Julie Hoffman shares her ties with the area spanning 100 years. It began with her great-grandfather Richard Simms who purchased their timber farm in 1909. "He cleared one acre of timber each year he lived here. Farmed the cleared land, half-timber and half-cleared land," she said.

Having lived in Beavercreek all her life, Julie is grateful that her family has been able to continue the tradition of farming. Living on the farm that her dad grew up on is meaningful to Julie as she looks back at the history of where it started.

"Richard and Cora Simms settled here in 1909. Their daughter Thelma Simms married another Beavercreek local named Ed Hoffman, my grandparents. Ed's parents had come to the area around the same time as the Simms. In the 1920s Ed was hired by the Beavercreek Coop to run the store at Beavercreek. He ran the store until his

death, over 50 years. They used to receive berries from the local farms and Grandpa would truck the berries to the cannery in Gresham. This is when most people produced berries or other crops."

In the 1940s Ed and Thelma Hoffman started a raw milk dairy. They delivered milk in glass bottles and the family ran the dairy until the 1970s. Since then the family has been farming berries, Christmas trees and timber.

"As time has changed, most of [Beavercreek] has become a bedroom community. As the years went by it was hard to support the family on our own

land and we at one time were renting and crop-shared land to farm."

When asked what her favorite thing about Beavercreek is, she said "I love the history."

Julie and her mom – along with her many nieces and nephews that keep her busy on the farm – hold a significant place in Beavercreek's history, not only because of their ability to farm the same land since 1909, but also because the land has been supporting the family for a long time.

# **August Hamlet Meeting Overview**

Watch Commander Lieutenant Marcus Mendoza of the Clackamas County Sheriff's Office was the first guest speaker. The office hired 30 new deputies last year and is on track to hire 30 this year, which would bring the total to 160 sworn deputy positions; some were lateral moves while others are new recruits, he said. Three deputies are now working on the Neighborhood Livability Project, an initiative created by the Sheriff's Office in 2015 to address 'problem houses' alongside several community and agency partners.

When asked about supporting a future National Night Out in Beavercreek, Lt. Mendoza said the Sheriff's Office would participate and bring deputies and likely canines. Lt. Mendoza reminded citizens of public data on call activity at <a href="https://www.clackamas.us/sheriff/stats">www.clackamas.us/sheriff/stats</a> that shows types of calls, priority, and other details. From the link, click on 'Unincorporated Clackamas County' then use the map to highlight Beavercreek.

The second guest speaker was Christian Snuffin, Senior Traffic Engineer, Clackamas County. In summer of 2023 the County will request community input on its Transportation System Plan, a process that takes place every 10 years that identifies projects for the next 20 years for potential funding, he said. Board chair Tammy Stevens noted that this is the time for local residents to advocate for projects to benefit Beavercreek.

Board members raised concerns about current transportation issues facing the Hamlet including vehicles speeding when traveling south on Beavercreek Road from a 45 mph to 35 mph zone. Christian confirmed that Beavercreek is on the waitlist for a temporary radar speed feedback sign, which may take two or more years, and that the Hamlet is a "strong candidate" to receive funding for a permanent sign, which would cost \$100,000 or more.

Other issues raised included speeding when going south from Beavercreek Road and transitioning to Kamrath, and west from Beavercreek Road and transitioning to Leland; deep ditches on Leland Road by Korner Park; and vegetation growth to the west of the post office causing visibility issues.

Christian suggested that the ditches could potentially be managed by community volunteers who received a Right of Way Permit. With regard to speed zones, Clackamas County will have authority to issue its own speed zone orders, subject to the laws and processes that the Oregon Department of Transportation requires, by approximately next spring.

New signs were added and pavement marking improvements were made to intersections in Beavercreek including Beavercreek, Kamrath and Leland; Windy City and Unger; Upper Highland; Larkin; Lower Highland; Carus; Ferguson; Kamrath and Carus; and Leland at Leslie. Crashes on rural roads end in fatality more often than urban roads, so the County is also adding curve warning signage to 21 corridors spanning 110 miles of roadway including Kamrath, Maple Lane, Henrici, and portions of Beavercreek and Leland.

Attendee Bill Flood shared that he is a contractor for Clackamas County tasked with assessing community engagement, researching best practices, and making recommendations for improvements. He joined to observe the meeting and asked what could be improved. Board members shared they would like the monthly Hamlet meetings to be hybrid, and that communication from the County was inconsistent. The Hamlet has a County liaison, but is often initiating contact to stay informed.

Board members also recommended Bill read the Complete Communities paper from 2004 on how the Hamlets and Villages program originated, which they discussed in detail during the meeting. Beavercreek is unique because it is both a Hamlet and a Community Planning Organization (CPO).

- Senate Bill 762 has been delayed due to issues with the drawn boundaries; it will be re-issued next spring.
- Following up on a question raised in last month's meeting: seismic

- upgrades being made to I-205 will enable it to withstand a 9.0 magnitude earthquake.
- The new welcome to Beavercreek sign is nearly complete thanks to community donations from Patrick Wilson (the large chunk of wood) and Harold Taylor (engraving), with Joe Matteo organizing and constructing with help from Paul Rooney.
- Jack Hipp is retiring from the board after serving since 2017.
   The board thanks him for his service. His position will be filled for the board for the remaining one year.
- Four Hamlet board of director positions are up for election this October including the seats of Joe Matteo, Bill Merchant, Jessica Sernach, and Tammy Stevens.
   The board has discretion to add up to three additional seats for those in the Carus area who may be interested. Those interested in running for a board seat must submit an application which can be found at <a href="https://beavercreek.org/volunteer/">https://beavercreek.org/volunteer/</a> by the September 28 Hamlet meeting.

Next month's meeting is September 28 and will include a guest speaker to discuss the I-205 tolling project.

# Horse Rescued After 200 Foot Fall Down Ridge

As reported in the Oregonian, Beavercreek residents on a four-day pack trip on the Pacific Coast Trail encountered fallen trees they had to navigate with five horses, but a loose stirrup caught on a log sent one horse "somersaulting through the branches down a ridge."

Owner Jessica Mandt expected the worst, however, the group was able to rescue the horse with help from the division chief of operations for the Hoodland Fire District, U.S. Forest Service firefighters, and volunteers from the Oregon Humane Society Technical Animal Rescue team.

# The Tansy Tamers of Beavercreek

Tansy ragwort is a noxious, invasive weed that is dangerous to humans and livestock due to a poisonous alkaloid in its tissue which causes liver damage when ingested. It is abundant in Beavercreek (and many rural areas) due to its ability to easily spread.

Beavercreek resident Ally Buchanan knows the dangers and asked neighbors on the Facebook Beavercreek Oregon Forum if they'd be willing to join her in some tansy pulling parties. Dozens of people answered her call and she reached out to local landowners who needed support. Ally hosted eight pulling parties with about 15 people joining to help at seven different properties in the area. No more parties are planned for this season, though she aims to start up again in the spring.

For those seeking to control Tansy on their own properties, a few tips: Mowing prevents immediate seeding, but stimulates vegetative growth leading to more plants and stems in the same season, according to the Clackamas Soil & Water Conservation District. The best management includes pulling in early spring or chemical control methods, while biological controls like Cinnabar moths help to weaken or kill plants. Additional resources:

### **Barbeque Safety**

If you are regularly using a barbeque pellet stove for your summer cookouts, these safety tips can help you to prevent fires and to use your barbeque safely.

Ensure your barbeque pellet stove is functioning properly:

- Maintain, according to the manufacturer's specifications.
- Check the heat shield for holes or warping.

- Check the fire box for holes.
- Keep it covered to limit rust and wear and tear.

You can help prevent fires:

- Never leave garbage unattended.
- Keep barbeques away from structures.
- Clean out dry vegetation from under your deck.
- Keep barbeques clean do not allow grease to build up.
