Community Spotlight: Jennifer Wooten- Macouzet

Jennifer Wooten-Macouzet moved her successful training and boarding business, Trinity Eventing, from Buellton, California to Beavercreek last December after her husband Andres Macouzet landed a job as a sports medicine equine vet at Northwest Equine Performance in Mulino.

Jennifer's experience includes competing at the top levels of Eventing, an equestrian sport that is composed of three mounted phases: Dressage, Cross Country and Show Jumping. Jennifer competed internationally from 2006 through 2013, including being short-listed for the 2008 Summer Olympic Games with The Good Witch.

When The Good Witch retired, Jennifer pivoted her business to focus on teaching and training, and has coached students through the upper levels of Eventing. To date Jennifer has taught 2,000+ riders, completed 131

international events, and competed in 5 countries.

Trinity Eventing moved into the Horsemasters facility last December, and updates Jennifer has made to the facility include rehabbed stalls, aisles, tack room, office and wash rack, new indoor arena footing, 16 new dry and grass turnouts, a new trailer parking and turnaround area, and a new outdoor all-weather arena.

Jennifer's Beavercreek business caters to the working professional who wants to have fun with their horse and progress in their partnership in a friendly and safe environment. Haul-in lessons and training rides are welcome, and clients enjoy an active clinic and show schedule.

A few competition highlights from Trinity Eventing's first year in Oregon include: Jennifer and her young horse, Kensington LV, won at Inavale Horse Trials in Open Novice. Jennifer and Kensington LV finished 6th at The Event at Rebecca Farm in Montana. Boarder and student Nicole Sharpe and her own Speedy Gonzales PP finished 5th in

Beginner Novice Amateur at the American Eventing Championships, and was on the Beginner Novice team that placed 2nd. Long-time student and Barn Manager Amanda Zeddy and her own Johnny's Sparrow won the United States Eventing Association Area VII Novice Rider Championship.

October Hamlet Meeting Overview

Diana Tourney was the first guest speaker. She's an adviser at the Clackamas Community College Small Business Development Center (SBDC) who hosts classes and workshops on

succession planning for owners of family farms and ranches. She's passionate about helping owners ensure family farms and ranches stay in operation to ensure they are preserved. Once they're gone we don't get them back, she said.

There are 37,000 family farms in Oregon and over 3,000 in Clackamas County with 537 up for sale as of Oct. 25, 2022. Many of the owners she's worked with aren't sure what to do with their farms and ranches in retirement.

Diana's job is to ensure they know their options including keeping it, selling it, gifting it, or any combination of those. She said that people often wait too long to plan, which reduces their options.

Succession planning starts with understanding your assets, e.g. land and buildings, equipment and tools, community presence or land leases, and type of entity. Diana also helps people understand strategies to minimize taxes, as Oregon has the highest tax rate in the nation. While most folks focus on the federal deduction of \$12 million, in Oregon after \$1 million you trigger estate taxes that start at 10%. If you have a farm that's worth several million, whether you choose to try and gift it or transfer it could be in jeopardy because your heirs may need to sell it for property taxes.

She noted that the federal deduction will be lowered to \$5 million in 2025 and

potential \$1 million unless Congress steps in.

She also suggests people consider training the next owners – whether its family or key staff – for those who wish to preserve their property. If you have family that are willing to help you for five years (510 hours/year) and you document their work, they are eligible for a \$15 million exemption (if 50% or more of your estate is your land). They must agree to operate the farm for five years after you pass away.

Next Lt. Steve Deters, assistant chief with the Clackamas Fire District #1 shared details about the potential for a local option levy in May 2023 that would primarily enable more staffing for the area. They would be able to staff another station in Beavercreek. Currently there's one that is staffed 24/7 while the other is staffed by volunteers the majority of the time. With the levy, they would be able to bring on full-time staff including medical care.

It would also allow them to bring hand crews on permanently versus seasonally. As wildfires increase, the hand crews are important for cutting trees, creating fire breaks, and more. They'd be able to do

more mitigation in the off-season. Clackamas Fire would also be able to expand their alternative response team, enabling them to use smaller vehicles for the majority of calls while fire engines would be reserved for fires.

They are hosting a series of community events with the first one happening in Beavercreek. [Editor's note: See details in this issue for dates and times.]

The next speaker was Lt. Marcus Mendoza who shared that the speed trailer was dropped off on Beavercreek Road across from Beavercreek Saloon and would be there for one week. Data captured will be shared with the Hamlet to understand whether people were appropriately slowing down in the 35 mph zone or speeding through.

- City of Oregon City, Park Place Crossing Master Plan, Livesay Road, Oregon City, a 92-acre 6 phase subdivision with approximately 476 residents. Sent letter to Planner on 4/11/22 with Hamlet's concerns. OC Planning Commission approved subject to conditions. Appealed to City Council who 4-0 declined application.

Hamlet board elections took place at this Town Hall meeting. Four positions were up for election. All incumbents reapplied with no other applicants submitting. Stacy Davenport, Public & Government Affairs, Clackamas County was online to tally the votes and all incumbents were voted in with 100% of the votes for all. Rachel Ringle officially joined the board, filling the spot left by Jack Hipp who had to vacate his seat early for personal reasons.

Board updates:

- Clackamas Walk Bike Advisory Committee is looking to revise its plan for biking and walking in rural areas now through 2024.
- Parks Committee said the bingo event to benefit the park was a huge success, generating \$1,300. Funds will go toward updating lighting and other things for the Tree Lighting Ceremony on Dec.

3. People who want to help stuff stockings to give away at the event should come to Beavercreek Saloon on Nov. 13 between 5-7pm.

Jessica Sernach discussed ladder safety as people put up lights or decorations this holiday season. Tips:

- Approach ladders and ladder safety with mindfulness.
- Inspect ladders. If bolts are missing or there's damage, do not use.
- Dress for the weather. Wear sturdy nonslip shoes.
- Get a stabilizer for your ladder or a spotter to whom you can call for help when you need it.
- Make sure you have a solid, strong surface when placing the ladder. For extension ladders, use the 4:1 ratio: for every 4 ft in height put the base of the ladder 1 ft away from the structure.
- Use three points of contact at all times, and try not to overreach. A good rule of thumb is to keep your belt buckle between side rails.
- Stay at least 10 ft away from overhead power lines.
- Take your time! No job is so critical you need to rush and risk safety.

Old business:

- Someone on the Beavercreek Forum on Facebook shared they

also got t-boned traveling west on Beavercreek Road by someone coming from Kamrath. Over 80 people commented sharing similar experiences, which the Hamlet board captured and shared with key people at Clackamas County who are taking it seriously and meeting in November to discuss. Previously discussed options for that intersection have been a four-way stop, aligning the streets, or a roundabout.

- Four brand new “Welcome to the Hamlet of Beavercreek” road signs have been added throughout the Hamlet so people know when they’re entering the Hamlet boundaries.
- The next edition of ClackCo magazine is highlighting Hamlets including Beavercreek.

The November meeting will be held one week earlier to avoid the holiday on November 16. The guest speaker will be someone from ODOT to talk about I-205 tolling.

The Hamlet of Beavercreek is a volunteer-run community group that exists to protect and preserve the rural culture of the area. Monthly meetings are the best place to share feedback and learn how to get involved. Join us via online conference at 7:00 p.m. the fourth Wednesday of each month (except for December). Clackamas Fire District Community Forums for Proposed Levy

Clackamas Fire District will host three community forums to discuss elements of a potential levy, which could be referred to the voters on the May 2023 ballot if approved by the Fire District Board. Two of the forums, scheduled to be held in November, will discuss Clackamas Fire's proposed levy priorities: Staffing, wildfires, and alternative response. The third forum's topic, scheduled to be held in January, has not yet been determined.

Be Safe While Cooking During the Holidays

Clackamas Fire reminds residents to be safe while cooking and gathering this holiday season. Thanksgiving is the number one day of the year for home cooking fires in the U.S., and unattended cooking is by far the leading contributing factor in cooking fires and fire deaths. Other holiday-related home fires involve heating and electrical sources.

How to be safe in the kitchen:

- Check on food regularly while cooking and set timers. Never leave cooking unattended.
- Keep children and pets at least three feet away from the stove.
- Keep your cooking area clean. Remove items, such as towels, oven mitts, and food packaging away from the stove. Keep handles for pots and pans turned toward the back of the stove.
- Don't wear loose fitting sleeves or clothing while cooking.
- If a fire starts on the stove top, cover it with a lid or metal cookie sheet and turn the stove off. Do not throw water on a grease fire.
- If there is an oven fire, keep the door closed and turn off the oven.
- If you experience a fire beyond the pan that has spread, get outside, and call 9-1-1 immediately.

As a reminder, make sure that you have working smoke alarms in your home. Test the alarms once a month to ensure they are functioning properly.

Plan, Practice, Be Prepared with a Home Fire Escape Plan

You and your family may have less than two minutes to safely escape your home during a fire. Each year in Oregon, an average of 32 people die in home fires. These statistics are just a few reasons why the Oregon Office of State Fire Marshal (OSFM) is urging Oregonians to create and practice a home fire escape plan as part of Fire Prevention Month this month.

The OSFM is kicking off a campaign called “Plan, Practice, and Be Prepared with a Home Fire Escape Plan” to educate and highlight the importance of having and practicing a plan. To support the OSFM’s campaign, Oregon Governor Kate Brown proclaimed October as Fire Prevention Month.

“Home fire escape plans save lives,” Oregon State Fire Marshal Mariana Ruiz-Temple said. “This October, we ask everyone to create a plan and practice it with all household members to be prepared if there is a fire inside their home.”

There are some simple steps to plan and prepare your safe home fire escape:

- Ensure your home has working smoke alarms and check alarms monthly.
- Make an escape map showing every window and door and share it with everyone in your home.
- Have two ways out of every room.
- Designate an outside meeting place a safe distance from the home where everyone should meet.
- Plan for everyone: If you have children, elderly, or differently-abled people in your home, plan for their escape. Consider other challenges like second-story bedrooms.
- Practice your home fire drill at least twice a year during the night and day.
- Get out and stay out if your smoke alarm sounds; never go back inside for others or pets.
- Call 9-1-1 when you’re safely outside.
