Spotlight: Patrick Whitmore

If you've ever been to the Beavercreek Saloon, you may have seen owner Patrick Whitmore and his dog Duke sitting at the first table as you walk in. It's his spot. The locals know him, and the newcomers are quickly welcomed into the community when they meet Patrick and Duke for the first time.

Patrick was born and raised in Beavercreek. He and his partner Barb bought Kissin Kate's/Buffalo Bills Saloon in June 2016 and changed the name to Beavercreek Saloon to honor the Hamlet where he grew up. The restaurant is well known as a friendly community gathering place with great food. This is reflected in the statement on the Beavercreek Saloon website that reads: We believe in community. We want to give our community a place to meet, gather, celebrate, laugh, cry, and share stories and life experiences. With changing times, we want you to have a place to go that feels like home—good home-cooked food, camaraderie of



friends and family, and cheer. It's country. Let's keep it country!

When asked what his favorite part about Beavercreek is, Patrick couldn't put into words all the things he loved in a few sentences. He said, "People can come live here in Beavercreek and be free to live how they want" and that there's



such a beautiful and eclectic variety of folks that end up in Beavercreek. He enjoys every single person that walks through the saloon doors.

Patrick received the Community Action Impact Award in 2019 from Clackamas County for his humanitarian efforts to support people impacted by the Paradise, California wildfire. But he was quick to point out that the efforts of the whole community is what made it the success it was. He donated an unused RV he had to a single mother, Veronica, who lost everything in the fire. The RV was parked in front of the Saloon for a week to collect donations from the local community before it was driven to Paradise to help those in need. People from Beavercreek and as far as Beaverton filled the RV with clothing,

toiletries, and other items that would help people in Paradise get back on their feet. Patrick still speaks to Veronica who is now thriving with her kids in their own home now.

The Beavercreek Saloon serves breakfast, lunch, dinner, drinks and changing daily specials. All You Can Eat catfish is available every other Thursday, Prime Rib specials on Fridays and Saturdays, karaoke is every Saturday night, and we can't forget the very popular Taco Tuesdays! They also host bingo nights to benefit local charities and members of the community, and local bands play on the Saloon's stage a range of country, rock, and everything in between.

Patrick's favorite menu item is the Reuben, so give it a try if you're not sure what to eat on your next visit.

January Hamlet Meeting Recap

This was the first in-person meeting the Hamlet has held since 2020, and it was a hybrid meeting with people attending virtually. It was held at the Conservation District with staff member Lisa Kilders sharing an update on the organization's strategic planning effort taking place over the next five to six months.

Guest speakers Fire Chief Nick Browne and Assistant Chief Steve Deters from

Clackamas Fire District discussed the local option levy intended for the May 2023 ballot. It would address staffing and equipment needs required to handle increased wildfire risk being driven by our topography, droughts, and weather pattern changes / climate change.

Thirty years ago, wildfires would burn an average of 111,000 acres annually. Today, that number has risen to 746,000 acres annually and is expected to rise to 1.4 million in the next 10 years. The primary cause of fires is lightning, power or wind, and a wide range of human causes such as backyard burning, campers, fireworks or vehicle sparks.

In the 2020 wildfire event, they handled 144 working fires in a 72 hour period. Out of those 144, 24 were greater alarm fires requiring a lot of resources; the District typically handles about that many annually on average. Five of those were 5-alarm fires or greater. To improve future response, the District hired CAL FIRE to audit their 2020 response, which is detailed in the report *2020 Fire Siege After-Action Review* available on the District website.

In 2021 the District experienced budget cuts due to the pandemic, and was not eligible to receive pandemic aid from the federal or state governments due to their classification as a Special District. This resulted in a staffing reduction of 24%. They formed the Future Funding Task

Force to explore funding options, which lead to the development of the levy.

The levy would add 62 firefighters and ensure 24/7 staffing in rural areas, including Clarkes and Logan which are on the frontline of the wild land and urban interface. It would also add lighter, quick response vehicles strategically placed in areas with the highest call volumes, which will help preserve more expensive equipment such as fire engines and ladder trucks as prices for those have almost doubled in the past few years.

The current levy for taxpayers is \$240 per thousand on assessed market value (vs. real market value). The new five-year levy would increase that to \$292 for that time period and be re-evaluated at that time.

The next guest speaker was Clackamas County Sheriff's Office (CCSO) Watch Commander Lieutenant Marcus Mendoza. He shared an update on call activities in Beavercreek for 2021 and 2022, which are accessible on the CCSO website. Clackamas County handled 91,596 incoming calls in 2022 with 2,248 in Beavercreek (just over 2%). The types of calls that saw an increase in 2022 were: domestic violence, robbery, hit and run, and behavior.

Lt. Mendoza also shared that the speed trailer previously located on Beavercreek Road near Kamrath Rd. will be

returning to the Hamlet – near Carus Rd. – after handling maintenance issues.

The Hamlet board shared updates from committee members. The Tansy Tamers of Beavercreek were recognized by the Conservation District for their volunteer work to combat the invasive and noxious weed in our area. The board shared updates from its strategic planning meeting in December. The Parks Committee confirmed events at Korner Park for 2023 including an Easter event on April 9 and Tree Lighting Ceremony in December, and they're discussing plans for a Stars in the Park and Open Air Market.

The Beavercreek Park, called Leland Park by locals, is planning to remove invasive plants, finish the barrier around the parking lot, grade the parking lot, host cleanup days, install a fence and security light, and provide a dog waste disposal system.

The next Community Meeting is February 22 with guest speaker Joe Marek from Clackamas County Transportation, as well as guest speakers from Clackamas Fire District #1 and the Clackamas County Sheriff's Department.

Beavercreek, Leland & Kamrath Intersection

In the Hamlet of Beavercreek, we know we have a lot of dangerous intersections, but none more than the one in the heart of Beavercreek – Beavercreek, Leland and Kamrath Roads. Your Hamlet Directors have seen the comments, frustrations, concerns, suggestions and fear on Facebook and other media platforms regarding this intersection.

We have shared your feedback with Clackamas County's Assistant Director of Transportation who met with his transportation and maintenance teams to have a discussion about this intersection.

In a nutshell, a four-way stop cannot be considered without a lot of excavating and expense. The roads don't line up, and the grades are not level and drop away. Because Beavercreek Road (which would include two stops) get far more traffic than Kamrath and Leland roads, it is not ideal for a four-way stop. The crash history provided by Clackamas

County Sheriff's Office does not indicate a strong need with six accidents in five years. A study was conducted and during rush hours the queue would be 10 seconds in one direction and 15 seconds in the other, which would likely result in many more complaints and people running the stops (as two stops will be mostly empty).

We were surprised to hear about the accident history, as there is no day that goes by that you don't hear horns honking, tires squealing, and unsafe and inappropriate vehicle movement through this intersection. We were given an excellent analogy in that there are less accidents when people cross a street without crosswalks—because they are very careful—than within crosswalks where people assume drivers are watching. That may be why we see less accidents; because it is a confusing and dangerous intersection.

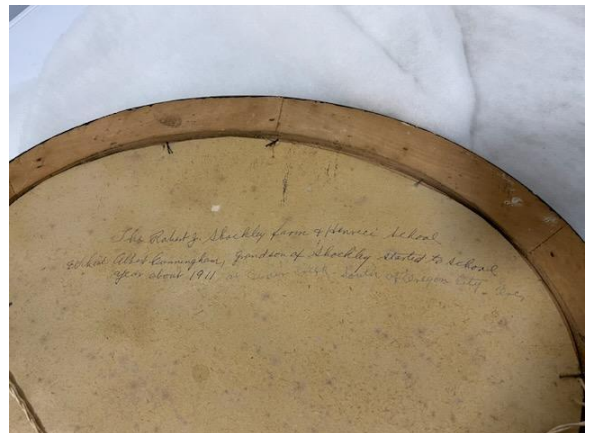
A roundabout is another option but is years away due to expense and need. So your Hamlet Directors have chosen the route of education. We'll be using various media platforms to highlight this intersection and others that require all of us to understand the challenges of these intersections, pay attention, slow down, and put safety first. Let's all make a New Year's resolution to drive safely and be patient.
