March Hamlet Meeting Recap

The meeting began with a welcome from Lisa Kilders of the Clackamas County Soil & Water Conservation District (CSWCD) who reminded residents that various tools are available for rent including a weed wrench for pulling scotch broom during this optimal time of year.

Guest speaker Joe Marek from Clackamas County Transportation gave an update on traffic safety projects in the Beavercreek area. Their goal is to eliminate fatal and serious injury crashes by 2035. The County takes the Safe System Approach, which focuses on redundancies to help prevent crashes and damage to us. It includes six principles: Death/serious injury is unacceptable; Humans make mistakes; Humans are vulnerable; Responsibility is shared; Safety is proactive; Redundancy is critical.

Five elements to implement a safe system include: Safe road users; Safe vehicles; Safe speeds; Safe roads; Post-crash care. (Details at TowardZeroDeaths.org.) Joe emphasized that safety is holistic and requires all of us to contribute.

Transportation manages 1,400 miles of road and 2,400 intersections in Clackamas County. They review questions such as: How much safety is enough; are there more crashes than we'd expect in a certain area; and how much will certain changes reduce or eliminate crashes?

They recently began using software designed for safety engineers that more quickly evaluates crashes and crash patterns, predictions and benefits of safety measures, and examines road segments and intersections. It has enabled them to make quicker investments and spend money wisely—especially as the County has experienced a 30-70% price increase for bids on its projects, which is affecting how many projects it can complete.

The County has added more than 4,000 new signs in the past five years—e.g. curve warning signs, advanced intersection warning signs—as they're

one of the most effective and low cost safety measures. Central Point Road and New Era has been realigned so there's better visibility as you go south.

Joe said additional signage will be added to Beavercreek Road near Henrici, Ivel, and other areas; and a radar feedback sign is slated to be added to Beavercreek in the 35 mph zone near Beavercreek / Kamrath / Leland starting June 30, 2024 "assuming nothing happens to our budget," he said.

Left turn lanes will be added to Redland at Ferguson and Bradley roads with construction to start later this year. A traffic feasibility study is being conducted near Redland and Holly Lane. And several roundabouts will be added including Tolliver and 213; 211 and 224; and others.

BCT submitted an application for a large loan that would enable broadband expansion to bring fiber to every home in the Beavercreek area. They expect to receive an answer in April.

CSWCD hired two new people to help with land management for invasive species. They will be raising the price of rental equipment by \$25 per item to help with maintenance costs and upgrades, as they haven't raised the price in many years. For example, the seed drill has a waitlist of 15 people so they hope to purchase another one.

Oregon City Education Program for Startups Pays Entrepreneurs to Learn

Oregon City's Economic Development
Department is launching a new
educational program for entrepreneurs
– The Biz Pod. The limited-admission
program was crafted for emerging and
startup company founders from all
sectors who want to take a deep dive and
look for ways to not just keep their
business open, but to help them thrive.

Each pod will be comprised of only six members. The exclusive format will create small cohorts of serious-minded entrepreneurs matched with advisors dedicated to ensuring their success. The seven-module course covers essential business areas, including business planning, marketing, finances and operations. In the unique setting of The Biz Pod, participants collaborate extensively, emphasizing "work on my business" time while limiting distractions.

In addition to a \$3,000 grant at course completion, they receive one-on-one time with business advisors during the course and after. The participant makeup will include a range of sectors such as restaurants, retail, small manufacturing, technology and services.

Public Comment to ODOT: I-205 Toll Project Environmental Assessment

The Oregon Department of Transportation (ODOT) is planning tolls on the Abernethy and Tualatin River bridges to pay for improvements that will reduce congestion and improve safety. Tolls collected from drivers will be invested back into Clackamas County.

On Feb. 21, 2023, ODOT published an Environmental Assessment (EA) -- a detailed report that describes ODOT's plans, and the benefits and impacts of I-205 tolling and improvements in Clackamas County. FBI Offering \$25,000 Rewards for Information About Energy Facility Substation Shootings

FBI Field Offices in Oregon and Washington are seeking the public's help to identify the individual(s) responsible for vandalism at electrical substations in Tumwater, Washington and Oregon City, Oregon. The FBI is offering rewards of up to \$25,000 for information leading to the identification, arrest, and conviction of the suspect(s) responsible for each of these crimes.

On November 22, 2022, in the early morning hours, Puget Sound Energy discovered an incident at the Barneslake Substation in Tumwater, Washington. Fluid was leaking on the ground after one of the radiators of transformers had been punctured multiple times and caused the substation to go offline for several hours. Three 9 mm shell casings were located. The outage resulted in loss of power to 5,200 individuals.

On November 24, 2022, shortly before 2:00 a.m., several reactors were shot at the Bonneville Power Administration Ostrander Substation in Oregon City, Oregon. Investigators found a hole cut in the perimeter fence of the energized yard and discovered bullet holes in several reactors.

Attacks on power grid substations pose threats to communities, as hospitals, schools, and local businesses may be incapacitated for many days. Anyone with information is asked to call 1-800-CALL-FBI (1-800-225-5324), contact their local FBI office, or submit a tip online at tips.fbi.gov. You may remain anonymous.

April is Window Fall Prevention Month

You can protect your child from falling from a window. Window falls are predictable, therefore preventable. We need your help to reduce the risk of injury to children. According to the Consumer Product Safety Commission, about 12 children under the age of 10 years old die each year, and more than 4,000 are treated in hospital emergency rooms for window fall-related injuries.

The Window Safety Task Force offers these suggestions to help protect children:

- Teach children to play away from windows
- Teach caregivers and children that screens keep bugs out, but they don't keep children in
- For any windows that are six feet or higher from the ground, install window stops or guards, limiting open windows to no more than four inches

- Keep windows closed and locked when not in use
- Keep furniture or anything a child can climb on away from windows
- Always supervise children and ask about window safety when your child visits other homes
- Lessen the potential impact of injury from a fall through strategic landscaping – use wood chips, grass, or shrubs beneath windows

These awards honor and recognize people for their outstanding achievements in fire prevention and safety education. The Golden Sparky acknowledges a member of the Oregon fire service, and the Silver Sparky recognizes a member of the public.

"We know Oregonians are doing great work around fire prevention and safety in their communities. This is a great opportunity to honor their achievements," Oregon State Fire Marshal Mariana Ruiz-Temple said. "Past recipients were instrumental in creating fire adapted communities, leading smoke alarm installations at the neighborhood level, and advocating for fire safety through creative campaigns."

The nomination deadline is April 3. Include an explanation and examples of your nominee's contributions to preventing fires and fire losses in Oregon. Anyone can submit a

nomination; you do not have to be a fire service member to nominate someone.
