Lorie and Larry eventually built the home that sits on their property now. "One project seems to inspire another," said Lorie who recently completed interior painting and window replacements. They grow blueberries and Concord grapes and enjoy "the best juice ever" every fall, using a gifted steamer from an uncle in Germany.

As a retired registered nurse, Lorie is still involved at the Adventist Medical Center as a constant observer and would consider helping those in our community in need of a few hours of respite. Through Adopt-a-Road with Clackamas County, her section of the road runs from the corner of Beavercreek Grocery to Glen Oak and her sign reads "I Love you Larry." She

enjoys making cards and teaches a class at her church in non-summer months, and likes walking the country roads (while often picking up can/bottles that others toss out). We can all appreciate that!

Lorie appreciates Beavercreek for its rural living and acreage minimums that provide space between neighbors – while emphasizing that “neighbors who look out for each other” is another reason she loves living here: a common theme among many Beavercreek residents. Lorie leaves us with her favorite scripture “I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me.”

April Hamlet Meeting Recap

Lisa Kilders of the Clackamas Soil & Water Conservation District shared that the organization recently offered a domestic well and septic system workshop. Residents can also apply for residential septic system repair and replacement grant. Visit <https://bit.ly/3p5FJhC> for details.

First guest speakers were Deputy Director Jamie Poole and Daniel Nibouar from Clackamas County who shared information on how to stay informed during emergencies such as power shutoffs, wildfires, and more. For details visit <https://bit.ly/3LOElcf> and sign up.

The final guest speaker was Holly Krejci, Clackamas County Staff Liaison, who shared updates relevant to our area including that the transportation maintenance facility will be opening down the road in Beavercreek with an open house will be in September; volunteer advisory boards and commissions have several openings; and public input has been requested for the regional transportation plan, the metro transportation improvement plan, and a travel survey.

- Z0139-23 Parrott Creek Family Services, 22518 S Parrott Creek Road, Oregon City, zoned EFU, requesting a nonconforming use permit to replace 6 structures to accommodate additional staff and residents.

Hamlet board member Bill Merchant shared that BCT board positions for District 1 (from Leland to west of 213) and District 2 (from east of 213 to Thayer and Henrici) are up for election. ([See map.](#)) Call BCT for details and to apply at 503.632.3113. He also shared that BCT is operating in the black. The organization is still waiting to hear back on its loan application from the federal

government that would enable BCT to deliver fiber to everyone in Beavercreek.

Regarding 1-205 tolling, the end of the comment period was April 21. The Hamlet board voiced their concerns about traffic safety to ODOT via a letter. They agreed with Clackamas County who suggested a rejection of ODOT's environmental assessment, requesting an environmental impact statement instead, which is a more detailed report that would better address traffic safety concerns.

Hamlet board member Jessica Sernach gave the Conservation District (CD) update, mentioning the septic program, Tansy Tamers, how the CD will be using drones for its WeedWise program to identify weeds in hard to reach areas, and that they've purchased a new tractor and trailer now available for rental.

The 10 O'Clock Church is hosting an Earth Festival on May 20th from 9am to 4pm. The Hamlet board is volunteering and will be providing seed packets to attendees.

Hamlet board member Mark Hillyard gave a Parks Committee update, labeling the Easter event a huge success. Approximately 250 people attended including 100 kids who sat with the Easter bunny and received a golden egg. Gift baskets were donated by the Saloon, the Distillery, and three others and were

raffled off to raise over \$1,000 for the park improvement fund.

The historic Carus School building has found a home—an application has been submitted by a local resident to bring it just north of where it sits today. It will likely become a community center for people in the area. The volunteer committee supporting this effort is discussing a fundraising website and is providing overall help for the process to ensure it finds a good home.

Next month's guest speaker will be Heather Nielson from the Conservation District.

The Hamlet of Beavercreek is a volunteer-run community group that exists to protect and preserve the rural culture of the area. Monthly meetings are the best place to share feedback and learn how to get involved. May is Wildfire Awareness Month

During the month of May, the Oregon State Fire Marshal is asking Oregonians to take part in Wildfire Awareness Month by creating defensible space

around their homes. This zone gives your home added protection against wildfire. Defensible space can prevent embers from igniting your home or prevent flames from reaching it. Another important advantage of defensible space is it creates a safe space for firefighters to work during a wildfire.

Start with a plan. Walk around your home and identify areas where an ember could land and ignite. Look at the base of your home and work outward. Studies show the leading cause of home fires during a wildfire is embers igniting combustible materials, spreading fire to the house.

Consider the following defensible space projects at your home:

- Space and prune trees. ([see linked diagram](#))
- Remove leaves, needles, wood, bark mulch, and other debris from within 100 feet of the structure or to the property line.
- Keep roofs and gutters clean of leaves, needles, and other debris.
- Move flammable material away from the outside of your home, including mulch, flammable plants, leaves and needles, and firewood piles.
- Keep flammable or tall plants from growing directly under the eaves; a minimum of five feet away is recommended.

- Keep firewood piles and lumber at least 30 feet from any structure.
- Keep plants in your yard healthy and maintained. Clean out old leaves or pine needles from your plants. Prune away any dead portions.

One home with defensible space gives added protection against wildfire for that single home. When neighbors create defensible space as a community, protection increases exponentially for everyone involved. We are again partnering with the Clackamas Soil & Water Conservation District, which brings a wealth of information about Earthwise practices, and the Beavercreek Hamlet, which will have a booth with seeds.

For lunch, Climate Café will be catering a delicious, sustainably sourced and produced, plant-based meal for the community....General Tso style veggie bowls with stir fried soy curls, spring veggies, and asparagus in a taste-tempting hoisin sauce plus strawberries and hazelnut cream for dessert. Carus Historic White Schoolhouse Update

The Canby School District owns the Carus Historic White Schoolhouse and requested its removal in late 2022 in order to expand their parking lot. A family was working with the Canby School District, Clackamas County, and service providers to relocate the Schoolhouse, however, in late March 2023 the plan was rescinded.

Community members who value history, community, and this beautiful

schoolhouse formed a committee in early 2023 to assure the building was not demolished – the Friends of the Carus Historic White Schoolhouse. This committee has been working nonstop to secure the transportation of the building to an appropriate Carus location and the various services needed. The goal is to offer this historic building to The Hamlet of Beavercreek community as a center to meet, enjoy theater, hold classes, sell local products, celebrate, and enjoy community.

Once permits are secured and moving and set up plans are in place, additional details will be provided. We look forward to continuing the story of this 1926 schoolhouse that has served our community for nearly 100 years! Please stay tuned for additional information and requests for support.
